

# Alzheimer's & Brain Awareness KNOW THE 10 SIGNS

The month of June marked Alzheimer's & Brain Awareness Month in which many joined the Alzheimer's Association to help raise awareness of this devastating disease. You can start by learning and sharing the 10 warning signs of Alzheimer's disease.

It may be hard to know the difference between age-related changes and the first signs of Alzheimer's. Some people may recognize changes in themselves before anyone else notices. Other times, friends and family will be the first to observe changes in memory, behavior or abilities. To help identify problems early, the Alzheimer's Association has created a list of warning signs for Alzheimer's and other dementias. Individuals may experience one or more of these in different degrees:

- 1. Memory loss that disrupts DAILY LIFE.
- 2. CHALLENGES IN PLANNING OR SOLVING PROBLEMS.
- 3. DIFFICULTY COMPLETING FAMILIAR TASKS AT HOME, AT WORK OR AT LEISURE.

- 4. CONFUSION WITH TIME OR PLACE.
- 5. TROUBLE UNDERSTANDING VISUAL IMAGES AND SPATIAL RELATIONSHIPS.
- 6. NEW PROBLEMS WITH WORDS IN SPEAKING OR WRITING.
- 7. MISPLACING **THINGS** AND LOSING THE ABILITY RETRACE STEPS.
- 8. DECREASED OR POOR JUDGMENT.
- 9. WITHDRAWAL FROM WORK OR SOCIAL ACTIVITIES.
- 10. CHANGES IN MOOD AND PERSONALITY.

If you or someone you care about is experiencing any of these signs, please see a doctor to find the cause. Early diagnosis gives you a chance to seek treatment and plan for your future.

# THE SCOTTISH RITE IN ILLINOIS




Prior to 1881, five Supreme Councils were in existence in the United States of America among African-American Freemasons:

- King David Supreme Council (KDSC) -Philadelphia, PA (1850)
- 2. United States Supreme Council (USSC) -New York, NY (1864)
- 3. Supreme Council for the Southern Jurisdiction (SC-SJ) Baltimore, MD (1864)
- 4. Supreme Council for the Southern and Western Jurisdiction (SC-SWJ) Washington, DC (1871)
- 5. King Frederick Supreme Council (KFSC) -Philadelphia, PA (1871)

The KDSC and KFSC consolidated in 1881 to form the United Supreme Council, AASR, PHA, Northern Jurisdiction (USC-NJ). The SC-SWJ and SC-SJ consolidated to form the United Supreme Council, AASR, PHA Southern Jurisdiction (USC-SJ). The USSC maintained its independent status. While in today's era, the Northern and Southern Jurisdictions are separated primarily along the Mason-Dixon line, they both contains Orients that are in other countries and continents including the Bahamas, Europe, Far East to name a few.

The Scottish Rite in the State of Illinois




# FROM 1879 TO THE CURRENT ERA

originates from the SC-SWJ. Prince Hall Consistory was organized in 1879 in the City of Chicago with Illustrious Richard M. Hancock as its first Commander-In-Chief. A second Consistory, Occidental Consistory, was organized in 1889 by the USSC. Thus, the two Consistories serve as the source of the Scottish Rite within the state.

Challenges within the spectrum of the Scottish Rite during this era drove the creation of additional Supreme Councils. Shifts of fealty based on the decisions of the fraters during the early period of expansion

lead to the existence of multiple bodies within the same domains. Illinoisans founds themselves torn between legitimate and illegitimate Supreme Councils until the early 20th Century. This was not resolved until 1913.


In the early 20th Century, Prince Hall and Occidental Consistories consolidated under the name of Occidental. The declaration of fealty of Occidental in 1913 to the USC-NJ stabilized the Scottish Rite in Illinois under a single jurisdiction allowing the Orient of Illinois to expand as outlined in the following timeline:



# Sovereigns of Illinois: Illustrious Neal F. Carson

Sovereign Grand Inspector General Neal F. Carson, 33°, is the founding father of Marquette-Joliet Consistory #104. Carson suggested that the name of the Consistory be the namesake of the founding fathers of the City of Joliet—Father Jacques Marquette and Louis Joliet. It was granted and the Consistory stands strong today.

A Mason since the 1960s, Carson is a member of Stone City Lodge #35. He served as its Worshipful Master in 1972 and 1973 and his Lodge served as the host Lodge for the Annual Grand Lodge Session of 1972. In his welcome address published in the Souvenir journal for the session he wrote:



This address summarizes the essence of Carson.

After passing the chair in 1973, he was appointed District Deputy Grand Master for the Grand Lodge. Already a Scottish Rite Mason, he was well acquainted with the teachings of the Rite and utilized those teachings along with the true spirit of brotherhood in the grand performance of his tasks as District Deputy Grand Master. So, while ensuring the stability of the district, he also elevated within the Scottish Rite which resulted in the expansion of the Orient of Illinois.

Carson actually joined Western Consistory #28 of the Valley of Chicago in 1967 after several conversations with Oscar Edmond. A remarkable Mason, Edmond was the general chairman of the Grand Lodge Committee in 1972. The success of this and subsequent efforts in the region built strong reputations for both of them. This served as the basis upon which a new Valley in the Orient of Illinois would be forged.

Andrews: You were a charter Commander-In-Chief of a Consistory. What was that journey like?

Carson: I gauged the interests of brethren during visits



as a District Deputy Grand Master. I approached Illustrious Vernon B. Williams, Deputy for the Orient of Illinois, with a proposal to organize a Consistory. I had to obtain commitments from at least 50 Fraters. By July 31, 1983, I had secured 64 and "Marquette-Joliet" was organized under dispensation. The charter was granted at the United Supreme Council on May 7, 1984 in Colorado and presented on May 25, 1984.

The establishment of Marquette-Joliet Consistory with Illustrious Carson as its very first Commander-In-Chief formally extended the Orient of Illinois by one Valley. This accomplishment in addition to all of his other labors for the Scottish Rite are feats that were worthy

of recognition. As such, he was crowned a Grand Inspector General by the United Supreme Council in 1985 and has moved forward ever since.

**Andrews**: When you look back over the years, what are your most memorable experiences in the Scottish Rite?


Carson: Starting the Consistory was definitely one. Also, being elevated to the 33rd Degree. I was an honorary member for 16 years before being elevated to a Sovereign Grand Inspector General in 2001. When Illustrious Brian L. Abrams was the Deputy for the Orient of Illinois, I joined him on two visits to Consistories in Germany. I enjoyed it the first time and had to do it again. One of the most memorable is being elevated to the Active Grade in 2020. The work to get the Consistory started is the most memorable of all.

Carson remains active today because it is important for me to set an example of how Scottish Rite Masons should act. He stated "I am quiet but some mistake my quiet nature for weakness. I observe and correct because character is an important trait in Freemasonry in general but in the Scottish Rite in particular. The Masons back in the day were very strict and very high on character. For anyone who wishes to join us, they need to understand that these traits are common in Scottish Rite Masons. If you work diligently and advance, you may be selected for the thirty third Degree but the numbers are not as important as the character of the man that you are."





