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
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FAREWELL SALUTE TO ICONIC PUBLIC SERVANTS

COLIN LUTHER POWELL (April 5, 1937 – October 18, 2021) was an American politician, statesman, diplomat, and United States Army officer who served as the 65th United States secretary of state from 2001 to 2005. He was the first African-American Secretary of State. He served as the 16th United States National Security Advisor from 1987 to 1989 and as the 12th chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff from 1989 to 1993. A staller example of servant leadership, me he rest in peace.

TIMUEL D. BLACK JR. (December 7, 1918—October 13, 2021), educator, activist, historian and author was a counselor to many, brother to several and leader to all whose influence crossed multiple eras. It was commonplace to see him pictured in the background of photos with Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., Rev. Jesse Jackson, Honorable Harold Washington and other African American civil rights leaders and politicians particularly in the State of Illinois. The Honorable Barack H. Obama even leaned for counsel in matters of social and civic affairs. This historian extraordinaire will truly be missed.

DESMOND M. TUTU (October 7, 1931—December 26, 2021), South African Anglican bishop, theologian and human-rights activist, was a man of deep faith who put his faith to work all over the world. He was ordained an Anglican Priest in 1960 and served in multiple, senior positions on behalf of the South African Anglican church until he was elevated to the role of Bishop of Johannesburg in 1985 and Archbishop of Cape Town in 1986. He played a prominent role in securing peace in post-Apartheid South Africa. This prince of peace converted many to a belief in God by way of his works.

SIDNEY POITIER (February 20, 1927—January 6, 2022) was an American actor, film director, activist, ambassador and an excellent role model for African American men. This hero paved the way for many African American actors in film and television by mastering roles of leadership and fortitude in eras where many were often portrayed negatively. The first black actor to receive a nomination for an Academy Award (*The Defiant Ones*). He won the best-actor Academy Award in 1964 for his performance in *Lilies of the Field*. Very selective of the roles he played, he did not play a role in which he felt he would be demeaned. His fealty to this ideal and savvy also made him a "first" in another spectrum. He commanded a million dollar salary per film. However, in lieu of a full salary, he negotiated to be paid from the gross revenues of film sales. This is "THE" model that many actors utilize today. Farewell Mr. Tibbs!!


Eureka Grand Chapter Order of the Eastern Star

Levi H. Morris Grand Court Ladies of the Circle of Perfection



She is the daughter of Cora and Lovest McCastle, the oldest of three siblings, and sister of MAGM Her. Arnita Harris. Public service and RPM McCastle are synonymous as she continues to serve the iconic 21st Ward and Chicagoland areas for over 55 plus years by exemplifying black pride, culture, and excellence.

Public service was introduced early grounded in Baptist traditions at New Friendship Baptist Church. She attended Calumet High School, where she sang in the Concert Choir. Patrice graduated from Jones Commercial High School,

where she performed in their Annual Gala and started their Annual Mother/Daughter Luncheon for the Senior Class, graduating in the Class of 1970. She left Chicago to attend her HBCU of choice, Bishop College

Rose Priorate No.1, Princesses of the York Cross of Honour in 2012 where she served as Deputy Regal Prioress in 2018, was crowned Queen and served as the Grand Regal Prioress in 2019. She was elected Royal Grand Perfect Matron of Levi H. Morris Grand Court Ladies of the Circle of Perfection on July 29, 2021.

Grand Lodge Makes History

Over the years, there have been several elections at the Grand Lodge level that have made history. Here is an incomplete list of some of these firsts:

- The first Past Grand Treasurer to serve as Grand Master was **Isaac H. Kelly** who served as Grand Treasurer (1867-69, 71-77) and Grand Master (1869-70).
- Blood brothers who have served in elective Grand Lodge Office at the same time:
 - James H. Kelly, Grand Secretary (1875) / Isaac H. Kelly, PGM and Grand Lecturer (1875)
 - Joseph W. Moore, Grand Master (1884-87) / Richard E. Moore, Grand Secretary (1878-1913)
- The first Grand Master elected from today's 2nd District was **Henry E. Burris** (1898-1906).
- The first Past Grand Patron of the Order of the Eastern Star to be elected Grand Master was **Thomas H. Samuels** who served as Grand Master (1919-24) and Grand Patron (1913-16).
- The longest serving Grand Master, who is now the namesake of Decatur Lodge #17, was **John C. Ellis** (1924-44) who served over twenty years is that office.
- The only Past Grand Master styled as Most Worshipful Brother, Most Excellent Companion (York Rite—HRAM) and Most Illustrious Commander-In-Chief (Scottish Rite—Deputy) is **Melvin Frierson** who achieved this with his appointment as Deputy for the Illinois in 2008.
- No Lodge has had two officers serve as Grand Secretary and Grand Treasurer at the same time until the elections of **Sean Queen** and **Daryl Andrews** of Cornerstone Lodge #91 (2013-16). Andrews is also the only Prince Hall Mason in Prince Hall Freemasonry to have served as Grand Auditor (2009-12), Grand Secretary (2012-13) and Grand Treasurer (2013-2018).
- The election of **David Thomas** as Grand Treasurer (2018) made him the first Certified Public Accountant (CPA) to serve in the office.

The financial offices of the Grand Lodge carry very weighty ties. The Chief Executive Officer of the Grand Lodge is the Office of the Grand Master. The Chief Financial Officers of the Grand Lodge is the

Office of the Grand Treasurer. The Chief Operating Officer is the Office of the Grand Secretary and he is expected to be an expert on Masonic Administration. This is critical because all things flow through this particular office and those who have served in it have done so at great expense in time, relationships and personal finances. Though stipends are provided for all of the aforementioned offices, the stipends do not equate, **not even closely**, to the actual amounts of labor that are performed by this office. These labors have often been done out of the eyes of the Craft. As such, all who have served as Grand Secretary must have a special place in the Grand Lodge.

Over the course of 155 years, the Chief Operating Officer has changed only 31 times. Yet, prior to 2021, none had ever served as Grand Master but several had been elected to line offices including:

- Richard M. Hancock (1868-70,77-78) was the first as he was elected Grand Senior Warden in 1871.
- John G. Jones (1873-75) and James H. Kelly (1875-77) were elected Deputy Grand Master in 1875 and 1877 respectively. Jones was expelled from Freemasonry in 1904.
- Richard E. Moore was elected Grand Senior Warden in 1876 prior to Grand Secretary (1878-1913).
- James C. Adams was elected Grand Junior Warden in 1915 prior to Grand Secretary (1917-20).
- 80 years later, Clarence W. Hayes Jr. (1990-92) served as Grand Lecturer (1992-95), Grand Junior Warden (1995-97) and Grand Senior Warden (1997-2000).
- Michael E. Patterson Sr. (1992-97) was elected Grand Lecturer (2009-2012).

While their accomplishments were great in many instances, elevation to the Office of Grand Master eluded them. As such, the 2021 Annual Session of the Most Worshipful Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Illinois was truly a historic moment. The election of Most Worshipful Brother Roland G. Simon, Grand Secretary from (2003-2012), made him the very first Past Grand Secretary to serve as Grand Master of Illinois Prince Hall Masons.

Congratulations to Most Worshipful Brother Simon and the Grand Lodge on this history-making moment. We salute you along and offer prayers for continued success.

Leadership in Illinois continues to extend to ladies who are of the highest caliber and now sits in the hands of Princess Tammy Hampton, Regal Prioress with advisory assistance provided by Sir Knight Phillip Patton Jr., Knight Advisor.






Illinois State Grand Assembly Order of the Golden Circle

Faith Coalition: Finding Purpose in Helping the Community during COVID-19

On December 31, 2019, I retired from the Illinois Department of Veterans' Affairs. I began to enjoy my retirement in January 2020. Well, at least I thought I was. The COVID-19 pandemic was just starting, then in March 2020, the United States shut down. Everyone started running to the stores to stock up on the most important items we usually sparingly purchase, hand sanitizer and disinfectant spray. Stores started running out. The hand soap, paper towels and toilet paper were running out. Food and other grocery items were sparse.

As months went by I found myself getting up as early as 5 a.m. to run to stores throughout Springfield looking for items I listed above. Sometimes I got lucky and sometimes

I did not. Some stores only allowed you to get one item of each. It was like the employees were on police patrol guarding how many you were trying to get. So, I said okay, I am going to go back and forth and put my purchase in the car and go back to get more. When I got a certain amount, I started contacting family and friends to see if they had the items; some did and most did not.

Going back to my retirement. Things were at a standstill, no vacation trips, and no visiting people out of town and no retirement party, no big backyard parties. Everything was very limited. I remember being in the store and someone coughed and sneezed and everyone froze. I could not believe it. When Easter came it was very quiet. I started to think, how long are we going to be like this? We have to wear masks, stores limited the number of people to enter. I found myself standing outside in the rain at times. During the month of May 2020, I had

a small gathering for my birthday. Everyone had to wear masks and sanitize hands. I limited myself being around people and the number of people in attendance.

Well, the numbers started going up with people catching COVID as well as dying. I could not believe my eyes. I constantly had my eyes glued to CNN. Then all the other stuff start happening with police which I do not wish to go into but just to mention, it was during the pandemic.

My lord! My life changed, confined to home or my friends' homes. We all were comfortable around each other. We would keep our circle very small. So, it was the normal thing as months went by while they were trying to find a cure for the COVID-19.

November: I normally have family over and we have a blessed good time. Well, not this year. Everyone decided to stay home. I decided I would do something different. I fed several of my senior friends as well as other friends. I cooked a big meal like I always did and had them come by and pick up to-go plates. Everyone was so grateful for what I did on this day. I was blessed to be retired and able to serve over 12 people on Thanksgiving.

In November I was to have scopic surgery and was told I had to take a COVID test. Well, it came back positive and I could not believe I got it! I did everything I was supposed to do to protect myself and my family and, to this day, I have no idea how I got it. I then told my children and their family to get tested. Everyone came back negative except my granddaughter who is 10 years old. Man, she took it hard. I felt bad because I may have given it to her. She had been hanging out with me a lot since school shut down. This pushed my surgery back to December 17 which did happen and was very successful.

Christmas came and it was small but blessed. In 2021, I lost an uncle, several friends and a mentor. I

received my first COVID vaccine on February 23rd and the second one on March 23rd. I received the Moderna vaccine. After the first shot I had side effects, headache, and chills and was very tired. Following the second one, I had to go to the ER because my blood pressure was 177 over 120. Thank God I am here today. In April, I received a call inviting me to be a

In April, I received a call inviting me to be a Health Ambassador for Faith Coalition for the Common Good. I would go out in the community to reach people of color (mainly) and others, to educate them about getting the COVID shot. The job consisted of doing a survey with people that had not yet had the vaccine and to find out why. At the same time I was being trained for this special task, I was in the process of setting up a Community Partner Vaccine Clinic at Pleasant Grove Baptist Church to which I belong. So, this was right on time.

I want to thank Erin Conley, my alderwomen, for mentioning the IDPH Community Partner Vaccine Clinic. What was so special is that the month of April was National Minority Health Month. I had the first clinic on May 1st.

As Ambassador for Faith Coalition, we were responsible to get 50 surveys. Out of the 50 surveys, I was able to get 24 vaccinated. Praise God. The second vaccine was administered on May 22nd. As I was watching TV, it was mentioned that over 1.5 million people never returned to get their second vaccine.

As I spoke to people one on one as I was doing the survey with them, it truly touched my heart. People lost jobs, loved ones, housing, had to work double shifts due to COVID spread and more. I can go on and on. I feel I have made a difference for the 24 that were vaccinated. I took this special task very seriously because it affected me and I was not alone.

I want to thank organizer, Tyshianna Bankhead, for leading this task as well as the Faith Coalition. I really enjoyed doing this task and will do it again in a heartbeat. So, this is me "Being Affected by COVID."

The Saga of the Black

Black Male Slaves were the first true North American Cowboys

As we continue with our February, 2022, Annual Black History Month Celebration, our culture is so rich in history that we have many legendary icons to reflect upon. As the Grand Historian and a Texas Cowboy, I would be remiss if I did not discuss a topic so dear to me—the history on "The Saga of the Black American Cowboy". Yes, as a young "Cowboy Wo" growing up in Texas, I rode wild horses and I competed in Rodeo Events. My favorite competition was "Bull Riding". Let me ask you three questions. You can give the answer to yourself then I will discuss further. Are you ready?

#1: Did you know that Prince Hall Masons were Buffalo Soldiers and Black Cowboys?

In fact, Brother Mark Matthews (right), a Prince Hall Mason, was the oldest living Buffalo Soldier. In 1997, he was 104 years old. He was a member of Charles Datcher Lodge #15 of the Most Worshipful Prince Hall Grand Lodge of the District of Washington, D.C. Columbia, September 6, 2005, he died at the age of 111. His burial was at Arlington National Cemetery. In an interview with a Prince Hall Masonic Brother prior to his death, Brother Matthews he stated that his father and grandfather lived to be 110 and 116 years of age, respectively. Brother Matthews was born in 1894 in Greenville, Alabama and joined the Buffalo Soldiers when he was 15. A Master Horseman, he said "there was no horse that he could not break". He also stated that he fought indians and outlaws in the Southwest.

During the Korean War the 24th Infantry Division Regiment, named, "The Buffalo Soldiers" was the last segregated regiment to engage in combat. The 24th, 27th and the 28th Calvary (Horse Calvary) were deactivated in 1951. Brother Matthews was a member of the 28th Calvary. The death of this "Living Legend" at the age of 111 marked the end of a long, proud, and accomplished era in American History. More importantly, he was a "Prince Hall Mason", a "Cowboy" and the Oldest Living Buffalo Soldier. What a rich history.

#2. Did you know that nearly a third of all American Cowboys are Black?

#3. Did you know that an estimated 5,000 African American Cowboys took part in the

legendary trail drives North and West from Texas between 1886 and 1895?

Brothers and Sisters please allow me to give to you "The History of the Black American Cowboy". In the Old South, slaves who had learned herding skills in Africa were of considerable value to farmers and plantation owners with live stock. Horseback riding and roping became part of the cattle ranching in the 1820's with Texas slaves. After the Civil War and the Emancipation Proclamation many former slaves chose to hire themselves out as cowboys earning their livings on ranches through Texas and on cattle trails to the North and West.

Cowboys were mainly responsible for tending and branding cattle on the ranch and then driving herds north to grasslands on the plains. They rode out of Texas along the Chisholm Trails to Colorado, the Dakotas, Kansas, and Wyoming. On many cattle drives, entire cowboy crews were black with the exception of the trail bosses. Cattle drives were at times intensely unpleasant and fairly dangerous. cowboy could easily be killed in a stampede, drowned during a river crossing or frozen to death in a blizzard. After riding out of Texas some Black Cowboys remained to settle at their destination. Others rode back to Texas to do it again and many became citizens of towns along the way. Some of those cowboys were apart of the settlement where I grew up in Texas. Some of my friends and school classmates were the

To earn a living some cowboys joined Wild West Shows and traveled throughout the land demonstrating their unique skills. Some became rodeo stars. Among the most famous Black Cowboys of the late 1800's were Bill Pickett, Nate Love, and Bose Ikard. Please allow me to give a historical briefing on these "Legendary Cowboys".

• Bill Pickett (right), born on December 5, 1870 in Austin, Texas, was the most famous of all Black Cowboys. He was the son of former slaves and one of thirteen children. He stood 5 feet 6 inches tall and weighted 145 pounds. In the early 1900's Bill was a member of "The Miller"



Brothers 101 Ranch Wild West Show". millions western entertained of throughout the United States and Europe. He popularized the Rodeo Event called "Bulldogging". His method involved biting the animals nose or upper lip as he dragged it to the ground. On March 19, 1932, Bill was breaking a horse at the 101 Ranch when he was kicked in the head. After 14 days in a coma, he died at the age of 61 at a hospital in Ponca City, Oklahoma. In 1971, he became the first African American inducted into the National Cowboy Hall of Fame. The annual "Bill Pickett Invitation Rodeo" held in Denver, Colorado is dedicated to Black Cowboys and Girls in his honor for his contributions to the profession.

Nat "Deadwood Dick" Love born in 1854 in (right), Tennessee, is the son of slaves. He Died in 1925 at the age of 71. In fact, Nate Love is a dist<mark>ant</mark> relative of Right Worshipful Brother Steven R. Coleman, Deputy Grand Master, of the Most Worshipful Prince Hall Grand Lodge, State of Illinois. What an honor for Right Worshipful Brother Coleman, Deputy Grand Master to have such a distinguish member in the family. Nate Love became one of the most successful cowboys of his time mostly because of his relentless self promotion. He acquired the nickname "Deadwood Dick" by winning most of rodeo events at an 1876 Rodeo in Deadwood Arizona. He spent the bulk of his career working as an ordinary cowpuncher and driving cattle up the old Chisholm Trail.

By 1895, the Rail Lines had reached Texas and Oklahoma and because of this progress in technology he was forced to make a career change and became a Pullman Porter on the railroad.




Yes, following these Legendary Trail Blazing Cowboys came many more. Just to name a few are:

- Myrtis Dightman, a Houston Bullrider who, in 1966, became the first African American to qualify for the National American Finals Rodeo. He has been the recipient of many honors and has a signature hat named for him by the American Hat Company. Although he retired from competition, he rides his horses every day.
- Charles Sampson small in stature and my good friend in 1982 became the first African American to win a Rodeo World Championship in Bull Riding Competition. In 1996, he was inducted into the Pro Rodeo Hall of Fame. Charlie resides in Denver, Colorado.
- Fred Whitfield also a Houston resident is a three time National Finals Rodeo Champion Calf Roper. He was the first African American to win a World Championship in a timed rodeo event. (next page)

Why Honor Prince Hall Americanism Day

The founding father of African American Freemasonry, Prince Hall and his examples of service make him a pioneer to be celebrated. There are a few topics that have been placed in question as it relates to Prince Hall. We know for a fact that Prince Hall received a charter from the Premier Grand Lodge of England that was issued in 1784 and received in 1787. However, was Hall actually a Grand Master? Was he truly a Provincial Grand Master for North America? Did he fight in the Revolutionary War? Was he the black man on the row boat with George Washington crossing the Delaware? The answers to these questions may surprise you.

Per the records of the Most Worshipful Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Massachusetts, African Grand Lodge was established after the death of Hall in 1808. Yet, acting in the capacity of a Grand Master, Hall did establish the Lodges which eventually comprised the African Grand Lodge. In the minutes of African Lodge proceedings, however, Hall is referred to as Grand Master at a time when only the African Lodge was in place. Some say that this was a term of endearment and reverence for Hall as an actual **Worshipful Master** but there is no evidence to prove this. However, there is another view. As no other Lodges were organized with black men in the region due to the racial climate, referring to Hall as Grand Master could have been a precursor to his intent to expand the Order among black men in the capacity of a Grand Master or Grand Lodge. He did establish Lodges in Pennsylvania and Rhode Island after all. While no evidence has been presented to show that he was ever elected Grand Master or that the Lodge converted itself into a Grand Lodge, there is no doubt that Hall established other Lodges like a Grand Lodge would do. This has often been challenged by historians and Masonic detractors of Prince Hall Masonry since the 19th Century. Most Worshipful Brother John Jones, Past

Grand Master of Ohio, however, provided evidence that Hall's expansion fell in line with other Lodges and Grand Lodges that were established during the 18th Century. Several 18th Century Lodges in Germany, in particular, were the examples that Jones used in his article titled "A Colored Mason's Defense of Prince Hall Lodge and Its Offspring" published in the Chicago Daily Tribune on January 20, 1876. He cited the Lodge of Unity in Frankfort which instituted the Lodge of Unity in Nuremburg. The Lodge of Three Globes was organized in the Grand Royal Mother Lodge of the Three Globes in 1744. The Grand Lodge that these Lodges organized had never been considered irregular. As such, the challenges against Hall's labors at that time were rebuffed.

While the United Grand Lodge of England (UGLE) does not affirm that Hall was ever appointed as a Provincial Grand Master, it also cannot disprove it. The UGLE is the result of a **consolidation** of the Antient and Premier Grand Lodges of England during the War of 1812 in 1813 at a time where England was engaged in war on two fronts with the United States and France. Consider also that the UGLE was organized **AFTER** the death of Prince Hall which also means it was organized **AFTER** the organization of the African Grand Lodge. During the consolidation, many Lodges were left off of the rolls either deliberately or mistakenly and several, if not all, were renumbered including African Lodge. Can it be stated for certain that all items were incorporated during the consolidation during a period of war? Considering all of this, the answer to this question is actually inconclusive. To date, no records

from the Premier Grand Lodge have been found to come to a conclusion so it cannot quite be rejected either. Nonetheless, Prince Hall was definitely titled "BROTHER", the highest honor that any Mason can attain.

fought as a member of the Bucks of America at the Battle of Bunker Hill in June of 1775. Hall and his brethren fought as Americans even though they were likely courted by the British. The American Revolutionary War forced many citizens to choose sides for the American Forces or the British crown. Eventual freedom in exchange for service was the prize. So, were the actions of the Irish Military Lodge to initiate Prince Hall and fourteen others into Freemasonry in March of 1775 actually an attempt to woo them over to the side of the British before the war began three months later? Furthermore, George

As it relates to Hall's service in the American Revolutionary War, he

Washington and several founding fathers were slaveholders and did not hold black citizens in high regard. Consider Washington's decree on November 12, 1775 after black soldiers had already proven themselves in battle. After seeking more troops, he decreed that "neither negroes, nor boys unable to bear arms, nor old men" be enlisted. His decree was immediately countered, two days later, by British Commander Lord Dunmore's Proclamation which pledged freedom for blacks in return for service to the British Army. While over 20,000 chose to fight for the British on this basis, more chose to fight for America and their heroic contributions laid the foundation for the freedom which was not immediately given though, in many cases, after war's end.

This is also the perfect time to eradicate a rumor relative to Washington and Hall. Hall absolutely **WAS NOT** the black man on the boat with George Washington when they crossed the Delaware in December of 1776. This

assertion is either a grand mistake or the conjecture of a misguided author. Prince **Whipple** was the black man in the boat and not Prince **Hall**. Whipple was an aid to General William Whipple who was also on the boat.

Consideration of Prince Hall's track record for his country and service to his community provide clear reasons for Prince Hall Americanism Day should be celebrated all over the country. Hall helped to free the enslaved before the term "abolitionist" was even coined. He turned his home into a school for African children. He was a major driver to end the Slave Trade in Massachusetts and was prominent on the team of citizens who continually presented measures to the



Massachusetts legislature to see it through to the end. He was a Methodist Minister who entered, passed and raised other clergy and citizens of the community into the Masonic ranks. He appeared to gather them together to corporately fulfill the works that had been placed on the trestleboard after being "worshipful" or consulting with the almighty. These labors and their products freed many, educated hundreds and provided opportunities for leadership for many that may never have been presented and are worthy of remembrance.

So, Prince Hall Americanism Day is not a parade for celebration's sake. It is a reminder of what Prince Hall Masons are supposed to be doing in the current era. Masons are supposed to be active in the communities in which they live. Masons supposed to be leading charitable efforts to help citizens along their ways in life. Masons are supposed to be disciplined enough to see plans through from start to finish. Masons are supposed to be men of high character and above reproach. An annual reminder of how Masons are to conduct themselves, should spark activities that aid the more



community without the need for recognition. The Holy Bible reads "Though I speak with the tongues of men and of angels, and have not charity, I am become as sounding brass, or a tinkling cymbal." Soul Brother Number One, James Brown, communicates the same sentiments in his song "Talking loud and saying nothing". The Prophet Muhammad communicated "A man is not a believer who fills his stomach while his neighbor is hungry." So, whether Christian, Muslim or regular Soul Brother, the mission is still the same. Our beliefs must be put to work or we are just making a lot of noise.

With this in mind, celebrate Prince Hall Americanism Day as the start to the "next" set of charitable works. Engage it as a renewal of the bonds of Freemasonry to implement changes for the betterment of humanity. In doing so, Masons will have fulfilled their true purpose on the earth which is to make the world a better place.

1619:

The Beginning of Problems for Africans in America

Does the number 1619 mean anything to you? Just think about it before you read this article. Dr. Carter G. Woodson, Father of Black History Month, said "race prejudice is merely the logical result of tradition, the inevitable outcome of thorough instruction to the effect that the Negro has never contributed anything to the progress of mankind." Yes, it is that time again, Black History Month, the year now is 2022. We all know that Dr. Woodson is the sole factor why we celebrate Black History Month. Yes, the month of February is a very important month in the lives of African Americans all across this globe because it gives us an opportunity to reflect on the pioneers of our race and the contributions they made to society.

In 1926, Dr. Woodson initiated the annual February observance of Negro History Week. He chose February because February 12th was President Abraham Lincoln's birthday and February 14th was the accepted birthday of Frederick Douglass—an American slave who secretly taught himself to read and write - a crime punishable by death. Douglass became a famous orator, journalist, autobiographer, revolutionary and leader of his people. By the 1990s. Negro History Week had been expanded to the full month of February and re-named Black History Month.

Now that I have given you the history and origin of Black History Month, let us return to my original question asked of you in my opening paragraph. The question is "does the number 1619 mean anything to you?" Of course it does. Please allow me to discuss this very important year - 1619.

In August 1619, over four hundred years ago, the first 19 slaves, who were kidnapped and enslaved Africans, were taken from their native land to be sold as slaves by British Colonies. The need for slaves was due to a shortage of labor workers. In some instances, slaves were traded for supplies. The enslaved Africans were brought over on a privateer ship named "White Lion" to Point Comfort in the Colony of Virginia located in Jamestown, Virginia. Today, Port Comfort is renamed Fort Monroe and is now located in Hampton, Virginia. Several days later, a second ship named "Treasurer" arrived in Virginia with

more kidnapped, enslaved Africans and, over the following two centuries, an estimated 600,000 were brought to North America.

A slave is a person who has been held captive in bondage by another human being who has complete control over this person. Laws written during the 16th and 17th centuries stated that slaves are considered as property of another and were deprived of most of the rights ordinarily held by free people. Yes, these enslaved Africans are our ancestors. In fact, Prince Hall himself was a slave, a man who rose from Slavery to become one of the most respected men in American History. Prince Hall was the first black man to be made a Mason in America. He was initiated and became a Mason on March 6, 1775 in Boston, Massachusetts.

There was much work to be done on the plantations. Cotton dominated the economy and, by the mid-19th Century, it was called "King Cotton". The regional plantations needed a large group of field workers to plant and harvest their crops. This is the reason for the need for slaves. Southern planters had built a cotton kingdom on the shoulders of enslaved blacks and they meant to preserve their way of life. During the harvest time, adult slaves worked shifts of up to 18 hours a day. In plan old simple "English", the slaves worked from sun-up to sun-down. Children also were slaves. Those ranging in the age 8-12 worked in the field picking cotton or tobacco. Rebellious children that resisted doing the fieldwork, received harsh treatment. Either they were whipped, required to swallow worms or worse.

Slaves were given food rations every Saturday. They usually ate corn meal, lard, some meat, molasses, peas, greens, flour, rice, dried beans, yams and peanuts. Their entertainment had limited leisure hours, mostly on Sundays and holidays. Their music was woven into the fabric of everyday life. A large drum was beat with the naked hand and loud vocal sounds were made with emphasis. The men and women danced in large circles until they fell to the ground from exhaustion. According to Michael L. Cooper, author of "Slave Spirituals and Jubilee Singers" published in 1950, he quoted a statement by

Frederick Law Olmstead who had become famous from designing New York City's Central Park. Olmstead described being awakened at dawn by slaves walking to the fields—"Suddenly one raised such a sound as I never heard before. A long, loud musical shout, rising and falling and breaking into falsetto, his voice ringing through the woods in the clear frosty nigh air like a bugle. As he finished, the melody was caught up by another and then another, and then by several choruses." Grand Historian researched Archives of President Historical Abraham Lincoln, the 16th President of the United States of America. There were several recorded statements made by President Lincoln about Slavery:

- As a 28 year old state legislator, he recorded his belief that Slavery was "found on both injustice and bad policy".
- Ten years later as a Congressman, he voted with his party to stop the spread of Slavery and he introduced a bill to outlaw Slavery in the nation's capitol where he said that he "hated Slavery".
- On April 6, 1859, Lincoln, in a letter to another politician said "he who would be no slave, must not consent to have a slave. If Slavery is not wrong, nothing is wrong. I cannot remember when I did not so think and feel."
- "As I would not be a slave, so I would not be a master. This impresses my life of democracy. Whatever differs from this, to the intent of difference, is no democracy."
- "I have always though that all men should be free; but if any should be slaves, it should be first those who desire it for themselves, and secondly, those who desire it for others. Whenever, I hear anyone arguing for Slavery, I feel a strong impulse to see it tried on him personally." Lincoln expressed this in a public speech given to an Indiana regiment on March 17, 1865.
- On January 1, 1863, President Abraham Lincoln signed the Emancipation Proclamation freeing enslaved people in the Southern States. Ordinarily, President Lincoln signed his name "A. Lincoln". However, on this day the Historical Archive records showed that he signed his full name "Abraham Lincoln" and, upon signing the Emancipation Proclamation, he said the following "If my name ever goes into history, it will be for this act."

The Emancipation Proclamation did not reach the slaves in Texas until two years later on June 19, 1865. Union Army General Gordon Granger, Commander of a Texas District, who arrived in Galveston, Texas, stood on the balcony of the Galveston Villa and read aloud the contents of a General Order No. 3 informing slaves in accordance with a proclamation from the Executive of the United States, "all slaves are free". The freed slaves classed that day "Juneteenth". Because of the late arrival of the proclamation to the State of Texas, slave owners benefitted an additional two years of free labor. I was born and raised in Galveston, Texas. I am very familiar with the history and importance of Juneteenth because I was taught this at an early age.

It took the end of the American Civil War in 1865 to turn the words into law. On April 14, 1865, General Robert E. Lee, Commander of the Confederate Army surrendered. On April 14, 1865, President Lincoln and his wife Mary attended a play at the Ford's Theater in Washington, D.C., where John Wilkes Booth assassinated President Lincoln. On April 15, 1865, President Lincoln died at the age of fifty six.

On June 17, 2021, President Joe Biden, the 46th President of the United States of America signed into law a bill to make Juneteenth the 12th Federal Holiday commemorating the end of slavery in the nation. President Biden stated "this is a day of profound weight and profound power, a day in which we remember the moral stain, the terrible toll that Slavery took on the country and continues to take."

Now, my Brothers and Sisters, we all know the full history of the year 1619 involving the first nineteen Africans kidnapped and enslaved and why they were brought to America. We know that during that period of two centuries an estimated 600,000 Africans were enslaved and brought to America. We also know President Abraham Lincoln disliked Slavery. We know why President Lincoln wrote and signed his full name on the Emancipation Proclamation freeing enslaved people. Lastly, on June 17, 2021, President Joe Biden signed into law a bill to make Juneteenth a Federal Holiday commemorating the end of Slavery in the nation.

Yes, our African ancestors who were enslaved and brought over against their will built our great nation that we live in called the United States of America and they did it for free. In conclusion, "only when lions have Historians, will hunters cease being heroes" - African Proverb. Out.

Although we are getting reports that the production of goods have almost reached its normal levels we are now seeing holes in the imports and exports of those goods which is still causing a great need in some communities.





Under the coordination of our Senior Warden Bro Joseph Talton who reached out to the Peoples Resource Center in Wheaton to ask what the current needs of the center were, a lodge food drive began. On November 1st Ashby B. Carter #138 filled the void of feeding 30 families for the Resource Center by making a food delivery. In all, the lodge provided 1,300 lbs of non perishable item to the Center for distribution.

MEALS ON WHEELS

Opportunities for help can develop from any given moment and this opportunity is a great example. As the brothers sometimes do they were hanging out and smoking some of their best sticks with friends and a conversation was had about a few seniors in the area that were struggling and not able to



prepare their traditional holiday meals for their families. That conversation was shared in the next regular communication and Meals on Wheels was born.

MLK Day Bowling in Illinois























The State of Illinois is filled African American firsts and achievements. While many believe that honorable Shirley the Chisholm was the first African American deliberately seek the Office of President of the United States of America in 1972, she actually was not. That distinction is held be two Illinois Prince Hall Masons namely William T. Scott and George E. Taylor. Scott was a resident and business owner from Cairo whose activity in the social and political arenas were extensive (pictured above). The National Liberty Party, independent party, selected Scott as its candidate for the Presidency of the United of America. States However, due to legal challenges which were later declared unfounded, he was replaced by George Taylor Edwin Springfield. In 1904, Taylor actually received votes scattering across the country but fell victim to the juggernaut Theodore Roosevelt.

Scott was a member of Lincoln Lodge #5 of Cairo. He also served as Grand Senior Warden of the Grand Lodge in 1878. Taylor held membership in Central Lodge #3. Farewell Salute to the
