



- Please be safe and Blessings to all.


LOYAL LADIES OF THE GOLDEN

Bazemore, presented his strategic plan, designed to move the Northern Jurisdiction United Supreme Council forward in commitment and service, which included involving the Ladies of the Golden Circle within the "Circle" of the Supreme Council. He charged each of

his Deputies, to provide him with one Lady from their Orient that could come together to form a "Working Group" that would work alongside their State Grand Loyal Ruler, who is accountable to the Deputy, in providing for a more efficient operation of local Assemblies. "Joseph A. Walkes, Jr: The Legacy of a Trailblazing Prince Hall Mason" by Alton G. Roundtree explores the life of one of Prince Hall Freemasonry's most renowned Masonic scholars and founder of the Phylaxis Society. Early in his Masonic career Walkes was "really bitten, but good" by the Masonic research game. His quest for a Masonic education beyond the ritual and four walls of the lodge hall put him in contact with the who's who of Masonic scholars. With their help, he built one of the world's largest private Masonic libraries. He not only collected Masonic books, periodicals and Grand Lodge proceedings, he dissected them, analyzed them, and absorbed them, then used the information to defend Prince Hall Freemasonry against ALL challengers.

OUR HISTORY SHOULD NOT BE

DO YOU KNOW WHERE/HOW YOUR CONSISTORIES ORIGINATED?

As we always do about this time...here is your semiannual installment of consistorial history. As the time has passed it has become increasingly difficult to source information on the origins of our Consistories. This is mainly due to much of the early records being lost to time; calamity (fire, flooding), or not being recorded and kept. In addition, our sages are slowly leaving us and, with their absence, the knowledge disappears as well. I am reaching out to you all, the readership, to assist me with enlightening you. If you have a written history of your Consistory and your Consistory has not been profiled (or even if it has) please forward it to reginald.b.stewart@uscnipha.org.

Our history is the only thing we have after all the glitz and glamour and pomp and circumstance has faded. Many thanks go out to the Editor, S.G.I.G. Daryl L. Andrews 33°; the Illustrious Grand Keeper of the Archives, S.G.I.G. Wayne O. Tompkins 33°; the Cathedral administrative team of Ms. Renee Isaac and Ms. Debbie Miles; and our Sovereign Grand Commander Melvin J. Bazemore 33° for assisting me in making these articles possible.

Nathan W. Thatcher Consistory #107 Valley of Manhattan, Orient of Kansas

Nathan W. Thatcher Sr. (1884–1952) was a prominent citizen very influential in virtually all aspects of life for Blacks in Kansas City, Kansas, in the

early half of the 20th Century. From politics to fraternal affairs he was involved a great deal. An avid parishioner of Walnut Boulevard Missionary Baptist Church, he was the driving force behind the creation of Westlawn Cemetery where he was ultimately interred. Fraternally, he was a member of Widow's Son Lodge #17 (served as Worshipful Master for 7 consecutive years); Sheba Chapter #19, OES; Koran Temple #33, AEAONMS (Past Potentate/past Imperial Deputy of the Desert); Stringer Lodge #14, Knights of Pythias; Past Exalted Ruler, Ranger Lodge #417, IBPOEW; but it was as a member of Orient Consistory #19 (Valley of Kansas City) of the Scottish Rite of freemasonry that he made his most notable impact. He was Elevated in

the Class of 1922 during the Annual Session held in St. Paul, Minnesota, and, in May 1937, reclassified to the Active grade and appointed as Deputy for the Orient of Kansas.

Illustrious Thatcher was so well renowned that then Lieutenant Grand Commander Leland D. French 33° attended his funeral. Even though they shared membership in the Scottish Rite, their mutual profession as morticians/funeral parlor owners (and also pioneers in that field in their respective areas of Kansas City and Cleveland) more than likely contributed to Illustrious French's attendance. Not

The Artiste Reiss J. Byrd

The stellar artwork that has been on display across the Holy Empire is the work of Ill. Reiss J. Byrd. Born in Chicago, Illinois on July 5, 1977, he is a veteran who

served in Operation Iraqi Freedom in 2007 and 2008. After he PCS'ed to Grafenwöhr, Germany, he demitted to Herman E. Bradley Lodge #74 where he was introduced to the Scottish Rite

in the Orient of Europe on July 30, 2011 into Booker T. Alexander Consistory #117. In his Consistory, he has served as Ill. Commander-In-Chief for multiple terms serving in this role today. He has dedicated his talents to the USC and stands ready to serve.

Phylaxis—Scottish Rite Research Institute

The Scottish Rite Research Institute (SRRI) of The Phylaxis Society works with members of legitimate Masonic origin to research and publish findings on the Scottish Rite. The findings range from new information to new revelations on the Scottish Rite locally and



abroad. It is a valuable community for Scottish Rite Masons and resource for Grand Inspectors General, in particular, whose duty it is to teach the ways of the Scottish Rite. A Mystery Part XIII

Sovereign Grand Inspector General Reginald B. Stewart, 330-Grand Historian

surprisingly, his services were held in his own funeral home. His son, Nathan W. Thatcher Jr., inherited the business after his father's death—the oldest Black-owned funeral home in the State of Kansas with more than 100 years of service. He became the first Black president of Kansas State Board of Embalming. Nathan Jr. was a prominent Prince Hall Mason as well and passed in 1980. Possessing all the above accolades (and then some) one can understand why the Fraters decided to name the youngest Consistory in in the Orient of Kansas in honor of Nathan W. Thatcher Sr.

Eureka Consistory No. 40 Valley of Lawrence, Orient of Kansas Constituted circa 1919 (Defunct)

This Consistory was set up by Deputy for the Orient, Sovereign Grand Inspector General Allen P. Smith 33°, but it was not without controversy. A group of men were misled by Milton F. Fields. Eventually they made an overture to the United Supreme Council, Northern Jurisdiction and were formed into this Consistory. However, 6 years prior Kaw Valley Consistory #16 had been constituted in the Valley of Topeka—less than 30 miles away. That caused a bit of consternation among the Fraters, but it was quelled by a visit from Most Puissant Sovereign Grand Commander James F. Rickards 33°.

Purportedly, "Eureka!" was the word exclaimed by Archimedes when he had finally discovered a method of determining the metallurgical breakdown of the crown of the King of Syracuse. Commonly it is used in place of "I



found (got) it!" The name "Eureka" is ubiquitous in Prince Hall masonry. It is (and has been) the name of many Lodges (Eureka Lodge #52, Cleveland, Ohio); Chapters of the Order of the Eastern Star (Eureka Chapter #2, New Haven, Connecticut); Royal Arch Chapters (Eureka Chapter #3, Atlantic City, New Jersey); Royal & Select Councils (Eureka Council #7, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania); Commanderies of Knights Templar (Eureka Commandery No. 1, Detroit, Michigan); and Consistories of Scottish Rite Masons (Eureka Consistory No. 29, St. Louis, Missouri, United Supreme Council, Southern Jurisdiction) in our Order.

The "Eureka" name was resurrected for use by a Consistory located in Hanua (Germany), Orient of Europe, chartered in 1993. It is still operating today.

140th Annual Session of the

The 140th Annual Session of the Northern Jurisdiction was held virtually on May 28-29, 2021 due to restrictions that were implemented as a result of the COVID pandemic. The meeting was held via the Zoom Video Conferencing system for the Holy Empire under the direction of Ill. Daniel R. Poole, Recording Secretary, and a team of Information Technology professionals who secured all sessions. Special thanks are offered to that team as hundreds were able to attend without issue.

On May 28th, the Deputies, Overseers and Assistants met in a morning session to obtain status updates from each Orient. Several Grand Inspectors General were reclassified to Active and Emeritus status accepting higher responsibilities associated with their various reclassifications. Updates were also presented on multiple initiatives that are underway at the United Supreme Council level many of which are considered "legacy" initiatives. The Walk of Fame Paver Project continues as a viable method to generate finances for the efforts of the Scottish Rite

while beautifying the Holy See. The Cradle to College Program, a legacy from the term of Ill. Solomon Wallace, continues to uplift youth across the country (see pg. 14). The Scottish Rite Reflections Project, a new program, has captured the essence of the Scottish Rite through the words of members at all levels. The Lifetime Membership Program under the direction of Ill. Wayne Phillips has created a nest egg that will leave a lasting legacy after our working tools can no longer work. These and other initiatives are helping to achieve the vision laid out in 2019.

The afternoon session began at 1:00 PM and consisted of all Actives, Emeriti and Past Actives. After being called to order by Ill. Sidney D. Broadnax and after a word of prayer by Ill. Wilton E. Blake, the Sovereign Grand Commander Melvin J. Bazemore, who was introduced by Ill. Jerry Springer, welcomed all attendees. Most Worshipful Brother Roderick Anderson, Grand Master of Michigan was introduced by Ill. Christopher Buck, Deputy, Orient of Michigan. After a roll call of the membership, the session began.

Financial reports were presented by the financial officers affirming that the United Supreme Council is in a strong financial position despite the tide of COVID. Efforts engaged by program teams and stellar financial management by Ill. Roland Lee and Ill. Edward Brooks minimized COVID impacts. Lifetime Membership effort, in particular, is helping to achieve the financial goals outlined in the United Supreme Council Strategic Plan. Ill. Poole provided a status of the plan indicating that the organization is meeting its goals. After updates from the Convention Director, Ill. Carl Williams and closing remarks from Ill. Bazemore, the session closed with prayer.

The Open Session on May 29th was opened to all members of the Holy Empire. The Memorial Service was a grand start as it reminded members of the legacy of those who have gone on to glory and implored them to build upon the framework that they left behind. The B. Albert Ford Medical Symposium followed and provided great details on the COVID virus; stressed the importance vaccination and CDC

guidelines; and focused on wellness initiatives. Ill. Bazemore, then, gave his annual address to the Holy Empire as witnessed by the Sovereign Grand Commanders of the Southern Jurisdiction (PHA), Northern Masonic Jurisdiction and Southern Masonic Jurisdiction. He touched upon the status of the missions outlined in the Strategic Plan and reaffirmed that the goals are on track to be met. He looks forward with great anticipation to the innovations that are to come from all levels. After a closing prayer and recognition of Class Donations to the Benevolent Fund, the session officially closed.

After the session, the broadcast continued. The Annual USC Raffle was conducted in the Orient of Indiana under the direction of Ill. Gino Anderson. In honor of front-line COVID service providers, the raffle winners were selected by the local Indiana Fire Chief in the gallery dedicated to Veterans Affairs. With the raffle winners declared, the broadcast concluded shortly thereafter ending the proceedings of the 140th Annual Session.

Veterans Affairs: Veterans

Welcome to the USC Bulletin's Veterans' Affairs column. The intent of this column is to inform and educate the Veterans, service members and their family members among our membership on federal benefits for which they may be eligible. Due to the positive responses received for previous articles pertaining to this subject, S.G.I.G. Daryl Andrews, 33°, Editor for the USC Bulletin asked if I would take on this endeavor and I gladly accepted. Thank you for the opportunity Illustrious Andrews!

In previous issues of the Bulletin, I presented articles that provided a general overview of a majority of benefit programs available through the Department of Veteran Affairs (VA). The most common were VA Disability Compensation and Pension. As a refresher, shown below is a brief description of those programs:

- "<u>VA disability compensation</u> (pay) offers a monthly tax-free payment to Veterans who got sick or injured while serving in the military and to Veterans whose service made an existing condition worse." (U.S. Department of Veteran's Affairs, 2021) Injuries incurred during or aggravated due to military service are referred to as "service-connected" and are subject to VA disability compensation.
- "<u>The Veterans Pension program</u> provides monthly payments to wartime Veterans who meet certain age or disability requirements, and who have income and net worth within certain limits." (U.S. Department of Veteran's Affairs, 2021)

Rather than readdressing information provided previously, I want to take this opportunity to share some recent success stories in which veterans, family members and surviving spouses of the Prince Hall Masonic family have benefited from these programs. I'm confident will this better illustrate the importance of these programs and the impact they may have for some of our membership. Regarding these success stories, I will describe the situations, actions taken, and the results attained.

- **Situation**: A retired U.S. Army Veteran died due to kidney failure leaving behind a surviving spouse that is living with multiple sclerosis. The primary cause of death and contributing causes were listed on his death certificate. The Veteran was service connected for Type II diabetes which was related to his kidney failure.
- Action: After reviewing the veteran's VA file, I verified that he was 100% totally and permanently disabled for over 10 years upon his death. This paved the way for his surviving spouse to qualify for several benefits. She qualified for a service-connected death benefit, Dependency and Indemnity Compensation (DIC), and special monthly compensation (SMC). I helped her draft the required forms and submitted them to the VA.
- Result: Approximately 2 weeks after her application was submitted, the VA decided that the Veteran's death was in fact due to diseases related to his military service and he was 100% totally and permanently disabled for a period in excess of 10 years. She was granted the maximum \$2,000 service-connected death benefit. Additionally, she was granted a monthly non-taxable monetary DIC benefit of approximately \$1,600. Furthermore, due to the surviving spouse being deemed in need of a SMC benefit called "Aid and Attendance", she was granted an additional non-taxable monthly monetary benefit of approximately \$300. Combined, she will receive \$1,900 a month in VA benefits for the remainder of her life. Although she lost her husband, she stated that she was appreciative that the VA was able to grant her benefits for his service.

The next story involves a veteran with a back condition that impacted his ability to obtain and maintain gainful employment.

Benefits Success Stories

• **Situation**: The veteran had been service-connected for a lower back condition since retiring from the military on or about the year 2010. Although his back condition has worsened over the past 10 years, he never applied for an increase in compensation. He informed me that often times his back "locks up on him" causing him to limit his activities and rest for several days, leaving him somewhat incapacitated. Additionally, he stated that he left his previous employment in part due to the tasks he had to perform, which aggravated his back condition.



- Action: After reviewing the veteran's VA file, I found that he was service connected for his back at a 10% disability rating. I submitted an "Intent to File" to the VA on or about February 2020 which allowed him to gather evidence in support of his claim and at the same time ensure the earliest possible effective date for the claim. This is important because if his claim is granted, the VA will pay the Veteran retroactively to the date of the Intent to File. I advised the Veteran to bring me any new and relevant medical evidence to demonstrate that his condition worsened. After several months, he provided the evidence. I helped him draft the required paperwork in addition to a statement describing how his back condition impacted his ability to maintain gainful employment. His claim forms and supporting documentation were submitted to the VA during January 2021.
- Result: In March 2021, the VA made a decision on the Veteran's claim and granted an increase from 10% to 40% disabling for his back condition. This resulted in his combined disability rating increasing to 90%, which equates to a non-taxable monthly benefit of \$2,044. Additionally, because the VA found that his service-connected back condition did impact his ability to obtain and sustain gainful employment, he was granted a benefit called "individual unemployability" which allows the VA to compensate (pay) a Veteran at the 100% rate, which equates to a monthly benefit of \$3,325. Furthermore, because an Intent to File was submitted to the VA in February 2020, the earliest effective date for the Veteran's claim was established entitling him to a retroactive non-taxable benefit payment of approximately \$17,700.

These are just a few of the success stories I and several members of our Prince Hall Masonic family have experienced after applying for federal

VA benefits. Whether or not you are a Veteran, surviving spouse, family member, or friend of a Veteran, etc., I hope that you see and understand how the VA may assist Veterans and their family members. If you know of someone that may benefit from these programs, simply refer them to a Veteran Service Officer or Veteran Service Organization such as the American Legion (ALG), Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW), Disabled American Veterans (DAV), and many others. They will likely be

able to help them select the proper VA forms and acquire the necessary documentation to successfully develop and submit claims to the VA.

Mentoring in Connecticut has been slowed but not hampered as we took "out of the box action" and continued our work within the bounds of safe and sound action. During the pandemic we used "Yankee ingenuity and "true grit" to keep our program going in a limited fashion. Our mentors kept in touch with mentees in a wide variety of ways- zooms, telephone calls and email. Lots of contact were made with school officials to get progress reports of activities on the system's plans to keep students, parents and volunteers engaged in the education process in the present and in the future. The biggest take-away for the program this year was being able to keep up with the academic progress of mentees with whom we had contact and to provide much needed scholarship awards to them. It must be emphasized that it was because of the regular feedback we got from school officials we could track the progress of our mentees. Action is productive and measurable. Plans are underway for the new academic year. There are plans for meetings that will take place between the Program and school officials in early Fall (Sept.). The system is preparing for a full in-class operation and full day sessions starting in the last week of August/first week of Sept. for the 2021-22 School Year. Some early thoughts on the program offerings for the year are:

- 1. Saturday visit to the United Nations in New York with a late lunch scheduled at a local famous restaurant. Family members will be encouraged to attend.
- 2. College sporting events are now being planned.
- 3. Upcoming culture events are being considered.
- 4. College visits and tours being planned.
- 5. Establishing a stronger relationship with student who attend Tech Schools and expanding our mentoring program to offer symmetry to the newly formed/proposed collective.





Born from humble beginnings, he became an attorney and utilized his skills and passion to implement positive change in the communities where he lived and served. As a black citizen, he endured a great deal of challenges to his manhood based on racial discrimination but his dignity and moral code drove him to excellence despite the tide.

Crawford was born on October 21, 1877 to William and Charlotte Oliver Crawford. At the age of nine, his family moved to Birmingham. He attended Tuskegee Institute, worked in the financial offices as a student under Booker T. Washington (right) and graduated in 1896. He,

then, entered Talladega College graduating in 1900. Alabama Jim Crow segregation laws prohibited African Americans from attending whites-only law schools. So he applied to the Yale School of Law in New Haven, Connecticut graduating in 1903 with honors.

Although he studied, worked and resided in Connecticut, Crawford never forgot his Alabama roots. In 1905, he was elected to the Talladega Board of Trustees while working as a clerk for the New Haven probate court. Keenly aware of the racial environment and willing to fight for rights, he started his own private practice in 1907, which he continued through 1950, and was thrusted into the civil rights movement via the Niagara Movement.

The 1908 Race Riots in Springfield, Illinois drew much national attention and drove many citizens of all races into action. The lynching of an Illinois Prince Hall Mason, William Donegan, and the reporting of the

riots by Ida B. Wells and others prompted the Niagara Movement to build a larger coalition. Together, with concerned citizens, they organized the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) in 1909. Crawford served on its Board of

Directors along with W.E.B. DuBois (above) and, became a Mason in Widows Son Lodge #1 of New Haven the same year. DuBois followed him into the Lodge and, working with like-minded brethren, they became a force for service and justice. In 1911, Crawford married Sadella Donaldson, an English teacher at Tuskegee and traveled between Alabama and Connecticut until settling in New Haven. By 1917, he had become a father of a daughter, Charlotte, and founder of the New Haven Branch of the NAACP.

Crawford is one of a handful of individuals who engaged in intellectual intercourse with two of the greatest minds of the 20th Century. Taught in Tuskegee by Washington and collaborations with DuBois helped to develop a strong, intellectual mixture and sense of servant-leadership. The practical application of this intelligence through the

Talented Tenth concept of DuBois made Crawford uniquely situated for leadership at a critical time in African American history. The products of his labors affirm this.

In 1914, Crawford published Prince Hall and His Followers to document the legitimacy of Prince Hall Masonry and combat challenges motivated by racism in that era. He also authored The Immortal Fifteen, a play, to showcase this history. The formalization of the history became the basis upon which Masonic illegitimacy challenges were combatted.

In 1915, Crawford was elected Grand Master of Connecticut Prince Hall Masons and crowned a Grand Inspector General of the United Supreme Council, Northern Jurisdiction. The same year, Birth of a Nation by D.W. Griffith was released. The film stoked the flames of racism by elevating the Ku Klux Klan to hero status. Although the film could not be quelled, Crawford lead successful legal efforts through the NAACP to edit the most egregious scenes from showings in New Haven. This set a precedent that other locales followed. Promotion of these and other victories by Prince Hall Masons and others resulted in growth of the NAACP Legal Defense Fund (NLDF) and new NAACP Chapters across the nation.

Crawford's efforts in Freemasonry and fights for civil rights had become extensive through the first half of the 20th Century. He had become an elected officer of the Northern Jurisdiction in the 1920s and was elevated to Sovereign Grand Commander in 1949. He continued to work with members of the Southern Jurisdiction through the NLDF like Thurgood Marshall (left), to secure civil



rights victories while elevating in the Connecticut legal arena. His victory in the 1937 Waterbury Case for which he obtained acquittal for thirteen white defendants who had been charged with breach of public trust opened more doors for him professionally. In fact, the same year Crawford was appointed as Corporate Counsel in 1954 for New Haven, Marshall won Brown v. Board of


Education which ended segregation in schools. Many credit the pressure exerted by Sovereign Grand Commander Crawford as a factor in this victory.

Crawford's legacy is filled with an abundance of accomplishments in multiple arenas. In honor of his service, George W. Crawford Manor, a high rise in New Haven, became his namesake in 1966. He was a member of the Board at Talladega College and Howard University in Washington D.C. He was also a member of Sigma Pi Phi Fraternity, Order of Odd • Encyclopediaofalabama.org/article/h-4080, ret. 9/1/2021 Fellows, and the Ancient Order of the Foresters who lauded him during and after his death on August 2, 1972. In 1979, the Greater Hartford Black Law Society changed its name to the George W. Crawford Black Bar Association in his honor. May peace be unto the ashes of this phenomenal prolific leader.


ORIENT OF THE BAHAMAS




Judge Houston served in his 31st year as the Treasurer General of the Holy Empire, NJ, AASR. He served as the Most Worshipful Grand Master of the Jurisdiction of Delaware for 13 years. He had a Lodge named after him, C.P. Houston No. 34 of Ankara Turkey of which Deputy SGIG James A. Scott is a Past Master. CP served on the Imperial Council of AEAONMS as Imperial Chanter of The Koran, Imperial organist and Imperial legal staff. C.P. Houston was a licensed Pilot, also a Veteran of the Army National Guard. He served us well.

The Fraters of C.P. Houston, Jr., Consistory #119 have continued to function and flourish even in this trying time brought on by the COVID-19 pandemic. 

Sovereign Grand Inspector General Christopher Buck, 33°—Deputy



Sovereign Grand Inspector General Johnny L. Cummings, 33°—Deputy





Our goal is to build back better ensuring that the Grady Edge Reading Program will be the catalyst that maintains and restores a love for reading in the lives of our youth as


we reclaim normalcy.


named as the "Charles W. Hales Class". Despite the COVID-19 pandemic curtailing our in-person activities we found a way to continue business as usual.


also extremely engaged in worthwhile endeavors in his private life through his association with The Salvation Army; Habitat for Humanity; and Toastmasters International.




ORIENT OF WASHINGTON/OREGON
