




# JERALD PRINCE TO BE INDUCTED INTO INTO IHSA FOOTBALL HALL OF FAME

After a 33 year coaching career, Brother Jerald Prince, owner of JZ Enterprises and Past Master of Universal Lodge #65, will be inducted into the Illinois High School Football Coaches Hall of Fame on April 10, 2010 in Champaign, Illinois. Brother Prince began his coaching career at Carver High School in Chicago as Assistant Head Football Coach from 1971 to 1973. After success at Carver, he became the head football coach of Whitney Young High School in 1975 and would serve in this role for 20 consecutive years and boast a career wining percentage of



nearly 70% with multiple state-championship qualifying teams. From 1995 to 2005, he served as the Athletic Director and Assistant Head Coach for Dunbar Vocational Career Academy where they won several city championships and one Prep Bowl Championship against the Catholic League in 1997. In addition, he holds the distinction of being the only coach in the history of Illinois High School Football to have coached the number one pick in the NFL draft, Russell Maryland, of the Dallas Cowboys. Maryland won three Super Bowls along with three National Championships at the University of Miami, where he also won the Outland Trophy in recognition of the best coaches in Illinois High School Football History and justify his selection this honor. 

Matron- A married woman or a widow, especially a mother of dignity, mature age, and established social position.




Most of the Prince Hall family is aware that the first Prince Hall Grand Lodge in America is located Massachusetts, and was organized in 1791 and since its inception Prince Hall Grand Lodges have for the most part been organized and chartered in due form. We have the great abolitionist, Prince Hall, to thank for having the insight in 1784 to petition the Grand Lodge of England, the Premier Grand Lodge of the world now known as "The United Grand Lodge of England" for a charter to organize a regular Masonic Lodge because he and his brethren had grown weary of the limited privileges to only meet as a Lodge, march in procession on St. Johns' Day and bury their dead. These privileges were bestowed upon them on July 3, 1776 by the Irish Military Lodge #441 prior to the American Revolutionary War. African Lodge #1 originated from this relationship.

As the Lodge was not officially chartered by the Grand Lodge of England, they applied for and were granted a charter on September 29, 1784. By virtue of the charter, African Lodge #1 had become African Lodge #459 of Boston, Massachusetts. African Lodge became the first black Lodge of Master Masons in America with a legitimate charter from England and one of the only Lodges, black or white, to have a valid charter in the United States of America. Prince Hall was the first Worshipful Master of 459 and used that position to help end slavery in Massachusetts. He also started the first black school in Boston in his own home since the city refused to supply a building (two little known black history facts).

As I mentioned earlier, the first Prince Hall Grand Lodge was organized in 1791 but not under that name. The original name was African Grand Lodge and Prince Hall was appointed its Provincial Grand Master by His Royal Highness King George IV, the Prince of Wales in 1791. The history of this can get somewhat confusing because although they organized in 1791, they did not become an official grand body until one year after Prince Hall's death. He died in Boston on December 7, 1807 but issued warrants (or charters) to Lodges before his passing just like Worshipful Masters had done in Europe. He issued a warrant to African Lodge #459 of Philadelphia on March 22, 1797 after Absalom Jones, an ordained Episcopal Priest, visited Boston to make the request.

# Most Worship: Grand Lodge






It is to the Prince Hall Grand Lodge in Massachusetts or the Prince Hall Mother Grand Lodge that all Prince Hall Affiliated Grand Lodges must trace their origins to claim legitimacy. Each new Prince Hall Grand Lodge had to be sponsored by an established Prince Hall Grand Lodge from a different state. Thus, the PHAmily tree begins.

Subsequently,

The first state to become organized under the recognition of the Prince Hall Mother Grand Lodge was Pennsylvania. In 1815, the Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania was established and chartered. Pennsylvania had a very interesting beginning and during the early years of its existence as it found itself divided due to the strewed conflict between the Grand Lodge and Union Lodge of Pennsylvania. This resulted in Union Lodge declaring itself independent and forming Hiram Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania in July of 1837. Eventually they reunited in 1847 and formed a Grand Lodge named Free and Accepted Ancient York Masons of Pennsylvania under the newly organized National Compact of Grand Lodges. However, that union was short lived as another Grand Lodge sprung up under the name of the Colored Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania with Emory Cronkin as Grand Master. These grand bodies shared the State of Pennsylvania as separate entities until 1882 when they were brought together by Grand Master William H. Miller of the Ancient York Masons. As a result, they consolidated and changed their name to the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge, Free and Accepted Masons of the State of Pennsylvania. (Next Page)



Prior to the Emancipation Proclamation of 1863 which allegedly freed the slaves, black men were eager to join the brotherhood of Freemasonry. A young brother from Philadelphia, Richard Howard Gleaves, had been appointed as a Deputy Grand Master for the expansion of Masons in North America. Our various Prince Hall Grand Lodge histories have shown that a majority of the states started their Grand Lodges after first forming three subordinate Lodges. With this in mind, Bro. Gleaves set out on his journey to form Lodges in unchartered locales. He played a key role in the formation of several Grand Lodges through 1865 including Maryland, District of Columbia, New Jersey, Ohio, Delaware, 1849, and Virginia. These Grand Lodges also have the Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania to thank, because through them each gained its sovereignty and started the long history of our family tree.

We cannot leave out the rich history of the Most Worshipful Prince Hall Grand Lodge Free and Accepted Masons of the State of Illinois and its Jurisdiction. I will not go into great detail because our history can be found on our Grand Lodge website but I will say that we have the Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Ohio and Brother Richard Gleaves to thank for our establishment.

Throughout the years, Prince Hall Grand Lodges were formed and the majority of them had the name "Prince Hall" in there somewhere. However, history doesn't always allow us to continue the traditions that we try to maintain. With that being said, we have a couple of Grand Lodges in America that do not have the name "Prince Hall" attached to them. Nevertheless, they are legitimate Prince Hall Grand Lodges. To confuse you a little more, we also have Grand Lodges with "Prince Hall" attached to their name that are not legitimate Prince Hall Grand Lodges. So, you might be wondering how this happened? Well let's start with the first incident.

The first irregular or bogus Grand Lodge was formed in the State of Florida in 1917 and was named the Most Worshipful Prince Hall Grand Lodge A.F. & A.M. of Florida and Jurisdiction, Inc. It was issued an illegitimate charter by the

state in 1935. The legitimate and regular Grand Lodge of the State of Florida is The Most Worshipful Union Grand Lodge, Most Ancient and Honorable Fraternity, Free and Accepted Masons, Prince Hall Affiliated, Florida and Belize, Central America, Incorporated.

A Mason named Charles F. Dailey became Deputy Grand Master of the Southern Jurisdiction under the umbrella of the previously mentioned Hiram Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania. During that time Brother Dailey was not aware of the irregularities of Hiram Grand Lodge and the National Compact Lodge so in 1867 he started the traditional number of lodges (3) that led to formation of the Grand Lodge in Florida in 1870. The three lodges were, Solomon Lodge #50, Saint Johns Lodge #51, and Mt. Moriah Lodge #52. However, Hiram Grand Lodge eventually reconciled with the Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania and with the proposed dissolution of the National Compact Grand Lodge in 1877 in Wilmington, Delaware, Union Grand Lodge became Prince Hall Affiliated.

The second state to endure this conflict was Mississippi. In Greenville, MS on June 24, 1889, Most Worshipful Prince Hall Grand Lodge Free & Accepted Ancient York Masons, Prince Hall Origin, National Compact, U.S.A., Jurisdiction of Mississippi was formed after the "real-deal" was already in place. On July 3, 1875, the Most Worshipful Stringer Grand Lodge Free & Accepted Masons, Prince Hall Affiliated, Jurisdiction of Mississippi had already been established. It was named after the Reverend Thomas W. Stringer, who was the first black man elected to the Mississippi State Legislature in 1870. Five years prior, Stringer organized Pearl Street African Methodist Episcopal Church in Jackson, MS. I had the pleasure of visiting Stringer Grand Lodge in 1997 and received a personal tour of their marvelous building by one of the trustees. The two irregular/bogus grand lodges that have the name "Prince Hall" attached to it paints a clear picture for us to not always look at titles or organizations at face value but to dig deeper for the truth within.

I only touched on the surface of the links that bind our Prince Hall Grand Lodges in America which extends to over 40 Grand Lodges situated across the country. This includes the newest addition, the Most Worshipful Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Hawaii and Its Jurisdiction, Inc., the birthplace of our 44th President of the United States, Barack Obama, was organized in 2001. ### Leadership 101 – Part (1 of 3)

So you Think it's an Easy Task

### Learning to Lead

Effective leaders recognize that what they know is very little in comparison to what they still need to learn. To be more proficient in pursuing and achieving objectives, you should be open to new ideas, insights, and revelations that can lead to better ways to accomplishing goals. This continuous learning process can be exercised, in particular, through engaging yourself in a constant dialogue with your peers, advisers, consultants, team members, suppliers, customers, and competitors.

Leading others is not simply a matter of style, or following some how-to guides or recipes. Ineffectiveness of leaders seldom results from a lack of know-how or how-to, nor is it typically due to inadequate managerial skills. Leadership is not always about creating a great vision. It is about creating conditions under which all your followers can perform independently and effectively work toward a common objective.

James O'Tool, a noted management theorist proposes a new vision of leadership in the business world - a values-based leadership that is not only fair and just, but also highly effective in today's complex organizations. It is based on:

- your ideas and values;
- your understanding of the differing and conflicting needs of your followers;
- your ability to energize followers to pursue a better goal that they had thought possible;
- your skills in creating a values-based umbrella large enough to accommodate the various interests of followers, but focused enough to direct all their energies in pursuit of a common good.

### **Building Better Leaders through Attributes**

Leadership attributes are the inner or personal qualities that constitute effective leadership. These attributes include a large array of characteristics such as values, character, motives, habits, traits, motives, style, behaviors, and skills...

- Integrity: While leadership is always important to organizational performance, there is a growing realization that effective leaders with integrity are absolutely crucial to successfully navigating the New Economy of the 21st Century. In addition there is also a growing realization that the characteristics of the Leader of the 21st century are dramatically different than the leader of the past, even the recent past...
- Coaching a Vital Skill for Leaders: The new breed of leaders recognizes that autocracy no longer works, yet that member alone empowerment is not enough. The skills of coaching have lately been rediscovered by more effective organizations and teams. You cannot be a leader without a following, and you have to delegate appropriately. The leader is best placed to enhance the performance and learning abilities, on the job, of colleagues. Coaching aims to enhance these abilities. "It involves providing feedback, but it also uses other techniques such as motivation, effective questioning and consciously matching your management style to your members readiness to undertake a particular task.

# Blaise Diagne: An African Freemason

When we think of Freemasonry we often think of it from an African American perspective. We tend to think about different Jurisdictions and our own individual Grand Lodges and Lodges within our own communities. However, there is a whole world out there with a wealth of information captioned by a tremendously rich history which has seeded itself all over the earth. Moreover, Freemasonry has bounced itself from country to country and continent to continent. As Prince Hall Masons we are recognized and known throughout the world and by the same token there are Africans

that carry the same labors we contend to deliver to those less fortunate than ourselves.

I have read that, currently, twelve African Kings are Freemasons. Many of us are aware that Europe dominated the Americas. Europe also dominated the Continent of Africa. Consequently, Freemasonry was galvanized all over the world including parts of the earth that had not yet been interrupted by Europe. Although, Europeans did explore, Africans did so as well, Ivan Van Sertima can certainly confirm that assertion. However, many scholars contend that Freemasonry is of African origin and rooted in Egyptology. In more recent centuries, organized Freemasonry has been in the hearts and minds of African Americans and Africans alike, whether by a denied-petition turned paramount-organization or by the infiltration of Europe setting up Lodges throughout the Motherland that had influence on Africans.

I would like to introduce a Freemason that connects with African American history as well as Masonic history. Blaise Diagne, was born on the small island of Goree' off the coast of Dakar into a well-to-do Senegalese middle-class family. His families had the political rights of French citizens and were among the Africans who could elect a deputy to the French National Assembly. Diagne studied in France before his political career began and, in 1899, became a Freemason affiliated with the Grand Orient de France.

In 1914 Diagne was elected to the National Assembly in Paris, defeating six European candidates. On September 29<sup>th</sup>, 1916, he achieved the enactment of law that bears his name and which reaffirmed the rights of Franco-African citizens at a time when there was a movement in France for their curtailment. In 1912 Diagne was appointed commissioner of the republic and placed in charge of conscription in West Africa which is the enrollment into the armed services. In this post he helped recruit over 180,000 men to fight for France in World War I. Re-elected Deputy by large majorities in 1920 and 1924, Diagne also served as president of the 1919 International Pan-African Congress and cooperated with prominent Americans like W. E. B. Dubois and Marcus Garvey on African-American improvement initiatives.

In his first election manifesto, Diagne told his followers that "your adversaries tremble at the idea of your political and social awakening". However, he sought his alliances with various elites and sought to reach the "masses" only indirectly. Diagne also bettered the status of the Senegalese troops in the French army, giving them a sense of self-importance that persisted to the creation of an independent army of Senegal.

Considering himself to be the personification and justification of French Colonialism, Diagne went on to become the first African to hold a high ministerial position in the French government. From June 26, 1931, until February 19, 1932, he was the Undersecretary of State for the colonies. He was also Mayor of Dakar. These accomplishments were tremendous considering the times.

Diagne's efforts prove that he was a pioneer of black African electoral politics and an advocate of equal rights for all. In his honor, a large boulevard and a high school is named after this accomplished African Freemason, as well as Senegal's new international airport. It is clear that his labors and vision have helped to mold the Senegal government that exists today. May he be forever cemented in our memories.

In this edition of the Prince Hall Masonic Journal, we have identified a unique individual who wholeheartedly exhibits this sentiment. He is Worshipful Brother Calvin White of Dunbar Lodge #97. Originally from Florissant, Missouri, Brother White is an Airframe and Power Plant Technician who participates in multiple activities across the Illinois Masonic Diaspora. As the Worshipful Master of Dunbar Lodge #97 of Alton, Illinois, he works to ensure that he follows in the great footsteps of his paternal lineage through which he initially became interested in the Masonic Order. From the examples set by his grandfather, Fred White, 33°, and his father, James L. White, 33°, who became a Mason in 1962, Brother White is motivated to have an impact on society as a whole.



Legacies within the Masonic Order have been a tradition within African American Freemasonry for some time which has boded well for the stability of the Prince Hall Masonic Order in America. As such, Masonic values are indoctrinated through the bloodline and contribute to the construction of a strong Masonic lineage. Utilizing the Whites as examples, the core Masonic principles and ideals were obviously transposed into the minds of the sons by the fathers which provides a plausible explanation for the natural Masonic instincts of brotherly love, relief and truth that are exhibited by Brother White on a regular basis. Of the most important, the search for truth remains prominent within him. He states "each and every day I seek light and look around to see what impact I can make on this world to leave it in a better place than I found it." The quintessential optimist, Brother White feels that the Masonic Order has come a long way. Also, the quintessential Mason, he acknowledges, though, that there is much more that we can and must do. These truths remain prevalent across the Masonic Order as a whole and serve as the fuel which keeps the order and White's mission relevant today.

In identifying new opportunities, Brother White recognized a need to improve communications from a conversation concerning Shrinedom with Worshipful Brother Armand T. Harris, 33° and his father. 

### GRAND HISTORIANS

The Office of the Grand Historian is pleased to submit two updates pertaining to closure, involving the scandal at Burr Oak Cemetery in Alsip, Illinois and, to the inventory of historical documents in the Grand Lodge Vault.

On August 6, 2009, the Office of the Grand Historian reported that on July 6, 2009, a scandal was brought to light regarding the exhuming of over 300 bodies from graves resell plots employees at Burr Oak Cemetery. We pleased to bring closure to this disturbing matter with "good news". On July 16, 2009, we visited the cemetery to determine if the grave sites of our Prince Hall Masonic Family members had been tampered with including the dedication plaque from the Grand Lodge recognizing Most Worshipful Brother Prince Hall. The cemetery was determined a crime scene by state law officials and was closed to the public shortly after the plot was revealed. After reopening in December 2009, it was revealed that the graves of our beloved Masonic Family were not disturbed.

On September 1, 2009, the Grand Historians, began the cumbersome task of inventorying hundreds of historical documents contained in the Grand Lodge Vault. As of January 4, 2010, the documents have been categorized and will be archived. Several were discarded for health reasons

because they were contaminated and molded. However, all is not lost.

because we will continue to retrace our history through the collection of personal archive information and through interviews with our senior brothers and sisters.

Sister Tammy M. Hampton, MLS, Assistant Grand Historian-Archivist, #90, is a librarian by profession. Her expertise will be of great value.


