EDITORIAL








LAST OF ORIGINAL TRIPLE NICKELS DIES AT 96

Five years ago Past Master Charles Cooper introduced the Illinois Prince Hall Masonic Family to the Triple Nickels, the 555th Parachute Infantry Batallion. The batallion was the first Black Paratroopers Unit of the United States Army serving

during World War Two. The last living member of the groundbreaking team, Clarence Beavers died in December of 2017 at the age of 96.

#VETERANOFTHEDAY

The 555th Parachute Infantry Battalion or Triple Nickels, was never as well known as the Tuskegee Airmen or Buffalo Soldiers. Yet the group played a pivotal role in the integration of the military and the development of smoke jumping. Smoke jumping was used during World War Two combat forest fires set by Japanese incidiary devices. Parachuters were deployed into the specific locations to combat the resulting

fires locally before they could spread and decimate United

States soldiers in combat.

Beavers was the first volunteer of what was known as the test platoon of black paratroopers, a unit that was meant to decide the fate of African Americans in the airborne. In what he later recalled was "extremely rough and extremely personal training," he and his fellow black soldiers slept two-to-a-bunk in a cramped, in an unheated hut and ate separately from their white peers in the mess hall. German prisoners of war experienced better conditions at the base, platoon members later said. Still, 17 of the unit's 20 original members, successfully earned their wings, becoming the founding members of the all-black 555th.





Edward Allen Fulton & Griffin T. Watson

Worshipful Master of North Star Lodge #12 of Chicago, Illinois in 1855 when the Lodge was under the Jurisdiction of Ohio, Edward A. Fulton was a noted abolitionist and Masonic stalwart in the region. His efforts in the abolitionist movement and in serving his community drove his elevation through the ranks of the elective Grand Lodge offices of the Grand Lodge of Ohio. He served as the 7th Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Ohio from 1863 to 1865. When North Star, G.T. Watson and Central Lodge organized a Grand Lodge for the State of Illinois, he was considered a founding member of the Grand Lodge. Fulton relocated to Little Rock, Arkansas during the era of Reconstruction and served as the lone African American legislator at the state level. He survived an assassination attempt resulting from his staunch efforts in supporting civil rights. His achievements and efforts on behalf of his people made him one of the most renown Masons in the South.

The second Grand Master of Ohio Prince Hall Masons, it was under the leadership term of Most Worshipful Brother Griffin T. Watson that the first Masonic Lodge in the State of Illinois was organized and warranted over 165 years ago in the year 1852. He became the namesake of the second Masonic Lodge organized in the State of Illinois by the Grand Lodge of Ohio—G.T. Watson Lodge #16 of Alton, Illinois in the year 1856. At the time, the City of Alton, Illinois was the largest city in the state because of its strategic location at the confluence of the Mississippi, Missouri and Illinois Rivers. It is from this Lodge that several noted abolitionists were sourced including, the most famous of all, Isaac H. Kelly, who became the namesake of the 11th Lodge organized in the state. Grand Master Watson met his demise in 1866 prior to the organization of the Grand Lodge of Illinois in which G.T. Watson Lodge #16 was renumbered as G.T. Watson Lodge #2.

20th Anniversary of

In April of 2018, the Most Worshipful Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Illinois and the Grand Lodge of Illinois celebrated 20 years of mutual recognition. As both Grand Lodge can tie themselves back to legitimate sources, both are the ONLY two legitimate Masonic Bodies in the State of Illinois. Here's a brief timeline:

- 1996—Under the term of Grand Master Trotter, Clarence W. the Most Worshipful Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Illinois was recognized by the United Grand Lodge of England, the Mother Grand Lodge of All Freemasonry, as a Just and Regular Grand Lodge as it is able to trace its lineage through the Prince Hall Grand Lodges of Ohio, Pennsylvania and Massachusetts to the charter of African Lodge #459 issued by the Grand Lodge of England in 1784 to Prince Hall and 14 other Master Masons.
- 1998—Most Worshipful Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Illinois and the Grand Lodge of Illinois agree to mutually recognize one another.
- 1998—By virtue of the mutual recognition agreement, the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Illinois was recognized by the United Grand Lodge of England as a Just and Regular Grand Lodge in the State of Illinois as it is able to trace its lineage to the Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania, a Just and Regular Grand Lodge, and agree to jurisdictional terms with the Most Worshipful Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Illinois.

This agreement has remained in tact for 20 years and has allowed visitation privileges between the two Grand Lodges in the State of Illinois.

There are only a handful of legitimate Masonic Jurisdictions in the United States of America where a father and a son can "Most both be called Worshipful Brother." The Jurisdiction of Wisconsin is, now, one of those Jurisdictions. With the election of Most Worshipful **Brother** Micah Tharpe as the 31st Grand Master of Wisconsin Prince Hall Masons in 2016, he and his father, Most Worshipful Brother Marshall Tharpe, the 23rd Grand Master of the Wisconsin Jurisdiction, are now in an elite group of men.

Imagine the degree of pride that a father could have in his son for achieving such a milestone on his own laurels. The accomplishments of Most Worshipful Brother Micah Tharpe highlight leadership and service at multiple levels in the Masonic ranks. He is most definitely a Mason's Mason whose work speaks for itself.

After some research, the "Most Worshipful Brothers Tharpe" may actually be unique. As of this date, no father-son Grand Masters were ever styled as "Most Worshipful Brother" while both were living. Unless further research disavows this claim, they are in a class all by themselves.

DEVONTE MATTHEWS, MASTER MASON

In a conversation on April 21, 2018, with M.W. Bro. Dwayne A. Smith, Grand Master, I was instructed to write an article on Devonte Matthews for publication in the Prince Hall Masonic Journal. The Grand Master had given Devonte the First and Second Degrees. The conversation took place at the 20th Year Masonic Recognition Celebration between the Most Worshipful Prince Hall Grand Lodge and the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Illinois, Ancient Free and Accepted Masons, held at the Doubletrees Suites, Downers Grove, Illinois. Well, on April 28, 2018, eighteen year old, Devonte Matthews made history at the location of the Most Worshipful Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Massachusetts, Boston, Massachusetts, where Most Worshipful Brother Yves R. Madigan serves as Most Worshipful Grand Master. The historical occasion was witnessed by Brothers from across the country who are members of the symbolic African Lodge No. 459. This



occasion was titled "The Re-opening, A Celebration of Prince Hall and African Lodge 459, the birthplace of Prince Hall Masonry, Where It All Began".

As we, all know Prince Hall Masonry is the Oldest Black Fraternal Organization. On April 28, 2018, Devonte and 14 other True Fellow Crafts from various Prince Hall Grand Lodge Jurisdictions were raised to the Sublime Degree of a Master Mason on Castle Island, Boston Harbor, Massachusetts. The raising of Devonte Matthews was the same as Prince Hall, Our Founder, the First Black Man to be made a Mason in America in Boston, Massachusetts. It is because of Prince Hall's labors, dedicated service and sacrifices, that the Prince Hall Masonic Family, globally exists. There is a strong possibility that Devonte could have stood in the very same spot where Prince Hall once stood. For sure, he "definitely" stood on the same ground, Castle Island, that Prince Hall stood over two hundred forty years ago.

This was truly an experience that Devonte and his Fellow Craft Brothers will never forget. Just ask him. But, let me tell you why Devonte was selected by Most Worshipful Brother Dwayne A. Smith, Grand Master, to travel to Boston to be raised in like manor to the Degree of Master Mason the same as Prince Hall. His selection was not by accident. Let's start this talk with my interview with Sister Detria Matthews, his mother. I title the below interview, "The Making of A Master Mason".

Since 2008, Sister Matthews has been a member of the Order of the Eastern star (OES). She is a Past Worthy Matron of Princess Orpah Chapter No. 127 (OES), Past Most Ancient Matron of Rahab Court No. 61 (HOJ), Daughter of Arabic Court No. 21, member of the Ladies Circle of Perfection-Prince Hall Court No. 1 and a Royal Deputy Matron. Her voice beamed with pride as she talked about her son.

Devonte was born on September 24, 1999, in Chicago, Illinois. He is currently 18 years of age and, on June 7, 2018, will graduate from Gary Comer College Prep High School. 

In 2017, the City of North Chicago, its Mayor and City Council, honored Dr. Wadell Brooks, Sr. and Dr. Daisy M. Brooks, his wife, by presenting them with the Senior Citizen Hall of Fame Award. They are lifetime residents of North Chicago, and are true pillars in their community. The Doctors Brooks were recognized for their contributions, there diligent work, there gift of guidance and support to the many citizens and families of North Chicago. They were very humble and appreciative of this great honor while there family and friends beamed with pride. Their prolific backgrounds read like a well documented manuscript. Dr. Brooks and Dr. Brooks are an amazing couple and truly, someone you should know.

Dr. Wadell Brooks, Sr., is known for his ground breaking ventures. He was the first African American student to graduate from East St. Louis Senior High School, and is a centennial graduate of Illinois State Normal University. Dr. Brooks, Sr., received two Honorary Doctorate Degrees from Faith Grant College in Birmingham, Alabama. He is a veteran of the United States Army. He served 16 months in Korea and received the Korean Service Medal. He was honorably discharged and began his civilian career service with the United States Federal Government. Dr. Brooks Sr., initiated and hosted "NAACP Focus", a weekly radio talk show on WKRS AM 1220 airing on Sunday mornings. He also hosts a weekly Community Access talk show, "Community Forum" on Comcast Channel 17. In 1994, Dr. Brooks, Sr., received the Best of Lake County First Production by a Producer Award for his show. What an honor.


Brother Brooks, Sr., is a Prince Hall Mason. He is a Past Master of Rufus Mitchell Lodge No. 107, Waukegan, Illinois and is the "1987 Mason of the Year" for the Grand Lodge. CENTURY OF PROGRESS MATRONS & PATRONS

85 Years Ago, a "Century of Progress" International Exposition, the 1933 World's Fair was held in Chicago to celebrate the city's centennial. The theme of the fair was technological innovation. The fair's motto was "Science Finds, Industry Applies, Man Adapts". Its architectural symbol was the Sky Ride, a transporter bridge perpendicular to the shore on which one could ride from one side of the fair to the other. The great Zeppelin also made its appearance. The site of the blimp put fear in the minds of many visitors as it was a show of power by Adolph Hitler who had risen to power in Germany. Yet, visitors were astounded at the technical advances in automobiles, trains and other products that would become available in the future. The 1933 Worthy Matrons and Patrons Club became the namesake of the World's Fair as granted by Sister Callie Harris, Worthy Grand Matron and Brother Robert Maxwell, Worthy Grand Patron. The name also highlighted the duties that were expected of the club. Answering the call, the club hosted sisters and brethren from across the globe during the fair. The club is credited with helping to guell the fears of all citizens at the site of the Zeppelin approaching the great metropolis. The hospitality shown helped to lift the reputation of Eureka Grand Chapter Order of the Eastern Star and the overall reputation of Prince Hall Freemasonry in the State of Illinois.



African Martial Arts

The MenTu-Ra or MonTu-Ra: The General name for the Ancient martial arts is MenTu or sometimes called MonTu. This name is derived from Montu the falcon-god of war in the ancient Egyptian religion. Logically, many of the combat arts & sciences were attributed to him. Similarly, the Romans later followed this with attributing their version of the Egyptian War God, known as MARS, with his name being the root of the word Martial.

Africa has contributed heavily towards establishing the foundation that the modern world is built upon. Most cultures of the world are derivatives of its ancient ingenuity in the arts and sciences. In ancient times it was the learning center of the world in mathematics, art, physics, language, philosophy, architecture, business, trade, medical sciences, and combat sciences. Africa shared all of this knowledge to all, even with the threat of it someday being used against her, which in time it actually was and lead her drastic demise. Nevertheless, with many attempts to write Africa's contributions out of history, there remain remnants of her benevolence and knowledge. Although she has contributed a vast amount to civilization, my focus, presently, is

to give a very brief introduction of the various combat arts and sciences that existed then, that exist to our present day, and have been distributed around the world in their various forms.

Most people, from my experience, associate martial arts disciplines with the Chinese and Japanese. Although they are well respected and are the most popular, even they give credit to the Indus Valley (India) and India to the Nile Valley Civilizations (Ethiopia). It seems that even they know that the Ancient "African" civilizations of Egypt, Ethiopia, Israel, Arabia, Phoenicia and Sumer were the sources. Keep in mind that for the purposes of this article that all of these cultures are considered as one with Ethiopia at the heart. Although these cultures may have separated at some point in time.

Therefore, it only makes sense when you have hundreds of pictures on the Pyramid walls in the Northeast African Territories of Egypt and Ethiopia. The pictograms display hand to hand combat, grappling/wrestling, and stick fighting and fencing techniques. Many of the Indigenous Tribes of Africa and Arabia still practice the art forms of

their ancestors mostly in the form of tribal sports and rituals. Let us look at the multitude of martial styles.

Ancient Egyptians practiced these arts as shown on the hieroglyphs:

- Tahtib The Art of Fencing and Stick Fighting: This combat art included sword & shield, spear and shield, Short stick, and long stick.
- Combat Wrestling / Grappling Arts

These arts are still practiced in the present day in various forms:

- Istunka The art of fencing and stick fighting practiced in Ethiopia, Sudan, and Somalia.
- Engolo or Ngolo A system of kicks and hand strikes blended with dance and music. Practiced as a ritual, combat training, and tribal social functions. It is the progenitor of the Afro-Brazilian art of Capoeira.



- Dambe A West African Boxing style where boxers fight with one wrapped hand and block punches with the other. It is practiced as a test of bravery, a rite of passage, and for combat preparation.
- Musangwe Boxing. It is popular in Azania (Indigenous name of South Africa).
- Lutte A West African form of wrestling with the goal of getting your
 opponent out of the ring. Similar to the Sumo Wrestling of Japan.
- Nuba Wrestling Ancient Egyptian wrestling practiced in Sudan, Chad and Ethiopia.
- KuPigaNa Ngumi A central African Style similar to Kung Fu, Karate, and jujitsu. It literally means "grappling fist" however, grappling in the sense of engaging in combat, rather than strictly wrestling. It is used by the Askari Hodari (soldiers) of Kenya and Uganda. Furthermore it is the present general name that most African martial arts are under. Made popular in the Americas by numerous "African-American" karate masters of the 1960s and 1970s era, it is practiced in the Americas, in major cities in the United States (primarily New York, Chicago and Denver) and other parts of the African Diaspora.

Isinaphakade Samathongo – Originates from Azania (South Africa). It is very similar to Judo, Tai Chi Chaun, Yi Quan, Taikiken, Pakua, Bagua, Shaolin Kuna Fu. Focuses heavily on meditation, healing, diet, footwork, boxing, and grappling. Popularized by the late Dr. Hodari Mgulo. It is practiced among the Zulu, Ndebele, and Xhosa Tribes and has worked its way through the Congo to West Africa and from there to the Americas. In the United States, it can be found wherever the following martial art, Moyo Nguvu, is taught.



Moyo Nguvu – It means spirit strength. Originated in West Africa among Yoruba and Ifa priest and practiced in the Americas. It is a combat art that focuses on meditation, mental strategy, breathing, and all fighting ranges: ground fighting and wrestling, close guarter combat – high use of elbows and knees -similar to Muay Thai Boxing, 52Blocks and Jailhouse Rock boxing styles, kicking and sweeping, knife, sword, and projectile weapons. This style is under the banner of Kupigana Ngumi and incorpates all of the teachings of Isinaphakade Samathongo. Popularized by the late Dr. Abayomi Meeks, top student of Dr. Mgulo Hodari. It is still practiced in New York, Chicago, Gary, Indiana, and Denver.

Kushikana – Grappling Arts – Combat Wrestling and Grappling. Very similar to Judo and Jujitsu. Popular in Central and Southern Africa and in the Americas. These styles are connected to the Ancient fighting arts of Egypt. This style is under the Kupigana Ngumi banner and also taught within the Moyo Nguvu system.

52Blocks Boxing – originated in Harlem New York and has throughout the Americas. This art consist of traditional Boxing combined with Jailhouse rock fighting system. It is Combat Boxing versus sport boxing and has an

"anything goes" philosophy. This style can be integrated in with any other

There are countless other names and styles that exist throughout the continent and the entire world. Many people had no clue that there was such a thing as African Martial Arts. I encourage you to research and watch videos on these arts if you are interested.

martial art. This style is under the Kupigana Naumi banner.

MORGAN CONTINUED...having an awareness and knowledge of their contributions to humanity.

In 1926, Dr. Woodson, initiated the annual February observance of "Negro History Week". He chose February for the observance because February 12 was President Abraham Lincoln's birthday and February 14 was the accepted birthday of Frederick Douglas. By the 1990's, "Negro History Week" had been expanded to the full month of February and renamed, Black History Month".

This leads me to my topic of discussion, Mr. Garrett Morgan, an African American, inventor of the Gas Mask and the Electric Automatic Traffic Signal Light. It is because of Garrett Morgan inventions that we can cross the streets safely and we are protected against certain gas. Born in the last quarter of the Nineteenth Century to former slaves, armed with a sixth grade education, this amazing man created a life saving invention and a traffic light management device that is being used around the world.

Brother Morgan, yes, I, said Brother Morgan, is a Prince Hall Mason. He was initiated a Prince Hall Mason in the early 1900's and was an active member in Excelsior Lodge No. 11, in Cleveland, Ohio. Excelsior Lodge No. 11 received its Charter on June 20, 1865 and is still in existence today. He was also an active member in Antioch Baptist Church which is still in existence. Brother Morgan was a member of several civic organizations in Cleveland, Ohio and an honorary member of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity.

Garrett Augustus Morgan was born on March 4, 1877, in Claysville, Kentucky, and died on July 27, 1963 at the age of 86 in Cleveland, Ohio. He was buried at Lake View Cemetery in Cleveland, Ohio. He was the son of former slaves, Sydney Morgan and Elizabeth Reed Morgan. Possessing a sixth grade education from Branch Elementary School in Claysville, Kentucky, at the age of 16, he moved to Cincinnati, Ohio in search of employment. Most of his teenage years were spent working as a handyman for a Cincinnati landowner.

In 1895, Mr. Morgan moved to Cleveland, Ohio, where he began repairing sewing machines for a clothing manufacture. The experience of repairing sewing machines kindle his interest in how things work. His first invention developed during this period was a belt fastener for sewing machines.

In 1907, he opened his own sewing machine and shoe repair shop. He began developing other inventions such as the Smoke Hood which was completed in 1912 and received a U.S. Patent the same year. An indepth discussion about the Smoke Hood is discussed below under a separate heading.

In 1913, he incorporated hair care products into his growing list of Patents and he started the G.A. Morgan Hair Refining Company. In this business, he sold hair care products including his patented hair straightening cream, a hair dye, and a hair straightening comb. Later in life, he developed glaucoma and by 1943, he was blind. He had poor health the rest of his life but he continued to work on his inventions. One of his last inventions was the self-extinguish cigarette.

In 1904, Garrett Morgan invented a safety smoke hood protective device after seeing firefighters struggle from the smoke they encountered in the line of duty. The "Safety Smoke Hood" consisted of a wet sponge to filter out.....

Namesake Lodge Series: WB Kennedy #106

Born September 15, 1861 to John and Lucinda Kennedy in Tennessee, William B. Kennedy was a Mason's Mason. Employed as a Railroad Porter in his adulthood, he married Emma S. Kennedy. Together, they both were escalated within the Masonic ranks in the Illinois Jurisdiction.


William B. Kennedy was a member of Hiram Lodge #14. He served as Worshipful Master of the Lodge in 1896 during a period of much racial unrest in America. This is the year that Plessy vs. Ferguson was decided by the United States Supreme Court and is set to mark the start of the African American Civil Rights movement. Kennedy led the Lodge through local disputes in the City of Chicago on the topic. He also was a member a leader in Eureka Chapter #3 HRAM, St. George Commandery #4 KT, Arabic Temple #44 AEAONMS, Western Consistory #28, AASR and Guiding Star Chapter #73 OES (Past Patron). He also served as Worthy Grand Patron of Eureka Grand Chapter Order of the Eastern Star. His wife, Emma S. Kennedy served as Worthy Grand Matron of Eureka Grand Chapter from 1922-1924.

William B. Kennedy died after a long illness on May 1, 1918 at the age of 56 while serving as Worthy Grand Patron of Eureka Grand Chapter and Treasurer of Hiram Lodge #14. He was buried with full Masonic Honors at Oak Woods Cemetery in Chicago, Illinois. During the term of his wife as Worthy Grand Matron of Eureka Grand Chapter, Grand Master Thomas H. Samuels,

also a Past Worthy Grand Patron, saw fit to make the 106th Lodge established by the Most Worshipful Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Illinois the namesake of Kennedy.

Warranted under dispensation in the early 1920s, the Lodge organized to combat clandestine Masonic activity that was stretching its way to the State of Wisconsin. With Widows Son Lodge #25 and Capital City Lodge #72 already established by the Grand Lodge in Milwaukee and Madison, the organization of a third Lodge in the City of Beloit would provide Wisconsin with the opportunity to organize its own Grand Lodge to solidify the state of Prince Hall Freemasonry in Wisconsin. As such, William B. Kennedy Lodge was chartered in October of 1923. Shortly thereafter, L.H. Palmer Lodge #115 was chartered in Milwaukee. As a result of their establishment and commitment Prince to Freemasonry, they came together to organize a Grand Lodge for the State of Wisconsin in June of 1925.

By the hands of Grand Master John C. Ellis, Grand Master of Illinois Prince Hall Masons, Grand Master L.B. Shepard (Past Master of Capital City Lodge from 1906 to 1909) was installed as the first Grand Master of the Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Wisconsin and the Lodges were subsequently renumbered and named Widows Son Lodge # 25, Milwaukee as #1; Capitol City Lodge #72, Madison as #2; W.B. Kennedy Lodge #106, Beloit as #3; and L.H. Palmer Lodge #115, Milwaukee as #4.


The first song he sung was "Rainbow 65". In fact, Rainbow was



He is a Past Worthy Patron in Talma Chapter No. 2, Order of the Eastern Star, a 33° Mason, created a Grand Inspector General in 2010, a member of Western Consistory No. 28, and a member of the Commanders of the Rite, Valley of Chicago, Orient of Illinois.

And yes, Brother Robert Sengstacke Abbott was a Prince Hall Mason. Brother Abbott is the founder of the Chicago Defender Newspaper, founded on May 5, 1905. Through the Chicago Defender, Brother Abbott instigated the Great Migration, resulting in the movement of six million Blacks out of the Rural Southern United States to the Urban Northeast, Midwest, and West that occurred between 1910 and 1970. At one, point



during the migration north, 3000 African Americans were arriving weekly in Chicago. Between 1916 and 1919 more than 50,000 African Americans migrated to Chicago from the south. And yes, following Brother Abbot's death in 1940, a relative, Brother John Sengstacke, also a Prince Hall Mason, Mt. Hebron Lodge No. 29, became the successor and heir to the Chicago Defender Newspaper who took the newspaper to an even greater height.

Moreover, on Saturday, March 17, 2018, Brother Chandler served as Honorary Chairperson for the "Tall Grass Arts Association" at its 61st Annual Beaux Arts Ball benefiting its Gallery and School. The event was held at the Lincolnshire Country Club in Crete, Illinois.

Yes, Brother Chandler is worthy of this prestigious award. He never forgot where he came from and he continues to serve various communities and the less fortunate. Charity is the brightest ornament of our Masonic profession. Whoever emulates the character of a good and worthy Mason should always be ready to assist and to aid the less fortunate in a time of necessity. This is the best description that describes my brother and friend, "the Duke", Brother Gene Chandler, "The Duke of Earl". Congratulations on a recognition well earned and deserved and may your light continue to shine ever so brightly.

Saint Maurice was the leader of the legendary Roman Theban Legion in the 3rd century, and one of the favorite and most widely venerated saints of that group. He was the patron saint of several professions, locales, and kingdoms. He is also a highly revered saint in the Coptic Orthodox Church of Alexandria and other churches of Oriental Orthodoxy.

Maurice became a soldier in the Roman army. He was gradually promoted until he became the commander of the Theban legion. It is said that his legion (top right), consisted of six thousand men and was called from Thebes in Egypt to Gaul to assist emperor Maximian to defeat a revolt.

The legion was dispatched to clear the Great St Bernard Pass across Mont Blanc (below). Before proceeding upon the mission, they were instructed to offer sacrifices to the pagan gods and pay homage to the emperor. While Maurice pledged his men's military



allegiance to Rome, he refused to worship pagan Gods and slaughter fellow Christians at the pass.

The practice of decimation was a military punishment in which every tenth soldier would be killed. In response to Maurice's



initial refusal, the emperor ordered decimation on the legion. After additional orders were given and subsequently refused, a second decimation was ordered. A third refusal of additional orders drove Maximian to execute all of the remaining members. The sacrifice of the legion made them Christian martyrs.

The site of the slaughter was Agaunum, Switzerland. The martyrdom of Maurice and the legion earned Maurice Sainthood. The location is now named Saint-Maurice, Switzerland. The Abbey of St. Maurice (right) was eventually erected on the site in the 6th Century.

Because of his dedication to Christianity, Saint Maurice eventually became a patron saint of the Holy Roman Emperors. Relics and regalia associated with Maurice were held in high regard across the Holy Roman Empire. The sword and



spurs of Saint Maurice were part of the regalia used at coronations of the Austro-Hungarian emperors through 1916. Maurice is traditionally depicted in full armor.

Saint Maurice gives his name to many towns and cities across Europe. More than 50 namesake towns and states including St. Moritz and an Indian Ocean island state named Mauritius have been dedicated to him. Over 650 religious foundations dedicated to Saint Maurice can be found in France and other European countries. In Switzerland alone, seven churches or altars in Aargau, six in the Canton of Lucerne, four in the Canton of Solothurn, and one in Appenzell Innerrhoden can be found. The Abbey of Saint-Maurice, the Church of Saint Moritz in the Engadin, and the Monastery Chapel of Einsiedeln Abbey are also his namesakes.

Chivalric Orders including the Order of the Golden Fleece (1430), Order of the St. Maurice (1434) and the Order of Saints Maurice & Lazarus (1572) have either been named in his honor or created with him as a portion of the histories or legends of the Orders themselves. Historically, these Orders have been linked to FREEMASONRY through multiple forms. The Knights Templar have a direct linkage to all of the above. In today's era, the CHI RHO FRATERNITY of the Phylaxis Society pays homage to this Saint.

In Europe, St. Maurice is clearly depicted with African features. Paintings from the Middle-Ages show him distinctly as a man of color. Statues in Switzerland clearly portray him as a black man, a Moor. His sacrifice and the sacrifices of the men of his legion were sourced from a strong faith in God above. Hence, the creation of Orders in his namesake. Many of which evolved into the ranks of **FREEMASONRY**.

With this in mind, BEHOLD St. Maurice, a Christian martyr, leader of men and premier example of faith in the eyes of death. May peace be unto his ashes.

ORIGINS & COMMON BONDS OF FREEMASONRY & BLACK GREEK

In order to meet the demands of the day and age, African Americans have historically banded together to create power and share resources. While the formal organization of African Lodge can be tied to the charter issued to the Lodge in the year 1784, organizations like the Free African Society had been in place years prior to meet the challenges offered during the Institution of Slavery. The objectives of this organization were not only to free the enslaved but also to provide those who made it northward with the resources and abilities to start and sustain a new life.

As faith, hope and charity fueled these actions, it is no secret why Prince Hall Freemasonry pulled from these ranks to fill Masonic Lodges. Their faith in God and worship yielded directions from which the resulting actions implemented solutions for the issues of the day. The relief provided by them also gave others hope in a better tomorrow. These acts of charity were, in fact, acts of love that set a stage for other organizations to follow. It is this sentiment that carried over into the fraternities and sororities of today's day and age.

While multiple Black Greek Letter Organizations (BGLO) have been created since the turn of the 20th Century, there are several that receive acclaim for their works at the professional and collegiate levels. Their organization served the purpose of advancing African Americans in multiple circles. Their continued existence and the products of their unions provide evidence to their relevance.

Sigma Pi Phi Fraternity is considered one of the first African American Greek fraternal orders in America. With its members affectionately known as the Boule, the fraternity was organized at the turn of the 20th Century as a means for African American professionals to share resources. Its ranks included physcians,

scientists and other professionals who sought the need to come together, to convene and to design solutions that would extend the careers of black professionals and open doors for subsequent generations. Many black Freemasons were members of these ranks in its early stages including Dr. Allen A. Wesley of North Star Lodge #1 and others. Their success in uniting like-minded individuals opened new doors and new ideas on college campuses across the country.

Contrary to popular belief, the turn of the 20th Century found many African American students attending some of the nation's most prominent universities. In order to ensure success, several felt it necessary to band together for protection and to share resources that would allow ALL to succeed. This is certainly the premise for the creation of all BGLOs.

Alpha Phi Alpha was founded in 1906 on the campus of Cornell University in Ithaca, New York. Influenced by the Boule, its founding fathers organized themselves into the first black fraternity to ensure mutual success at the collegiate level. The fraternity grew at Cornell and expanded across the country. The Beta Chapter was organized as the first fraternity on a Historically Black College or University (HBCU) in 1907 at Howard University in Washington, DC. Its success in this area provided a basis and a model upon which other fraternities and sororities would establish and extend themselves across the country.

Alpha Kappa Alpha sorority followed suit in 1908 on the campus of Howard University in Washington, DC. It was the first sorority to be organized on the campus of a HBCU. Its founders were true women of distinction who sought to bring together link-minded ladies. Their focus on scholarship and service became a

factor which drew more into its fold. Their formation sparked the establishment of other new sororities and fraternities on the same campus in subsequent years.

Like Alpha Phi Alpha, Kappa Alpha Psi was organized on a predominantly white campus. Organized on the campus of Indiana University in 1911as Kappa Alpha Nu, the fraternity found itself embroiled in racial unrest early on. One of its initiates, Frank Myron Summers, was a track star who endure racial taunts as he excelled in Track and Field. Often called "that Kappa Alpha Nig", he continued to excel in all races despite the epithets. The fraternity decided to change its name to Kappa Alpha Psi as a result and has remained steadfast in its pursuit of education and excellence.

With the establishment of a sorority on the campus of Howard University and the existence of Chapters of Alpha Phi Alpha and Kappa Alpha Psi on the campus, other groups of men and women were inspired to organize fraternities and sororities of their own for similar purposes. Omega Psi Phi was organized in 1911 and, within ten years, three additional organizations would follow. Delta Sigma Theta was organized as a sorority in 1913, Phi Beta Sigma was organized as a fraternity in 1914 and Zeta Phi Beta was organized as a sorority in 1920.

Sigma Gamma Rho became the first BGLO sorority to be organized on a predominantly white campus. Founded in 1922, Sigma Gamma Rho was formed on the campus of Butler University. Its initial membership consisted of talented women of distinction who worked together to ensure mutual success in the educational arena. Like the aforementioned organizations, it remains in tact to this day and age as a pillar of society.

It is important to note that each fraternity and sorority leveraged one another for their genesis and forward movement. The relationship between each is apparent as their modes of organization and expansion are almost identical. Each organized itself and adopted the Chapter system to identify Chapter logistics. Each utilized a similar hierarchy in leadership structure and

mode of operation. Each made it a point to collaborate with one another to maintain regularity. These relationships, the common structure and common bonds of mutual improvement became a basis upon which a formal organization was created in 1930 to maintain the bond. As such, they came together in 1930 to form the National Pan-Hellenic Council (NPHC) which remains in existence to this date.

The NPHC welcomed lota Phi Theta fraternity into its ranks in the 1960s. Founded on the campus of Morgan State University, an HBCU, lota Phi Theta was actually born from the Civil Rights Movement. Many of its initial founders bonded well with the ideals promoted by the Black Panther Party including self-reliance and strength in unity. These concepts drew men of likemind together on the campus to found the fraternity in 1963.

Many stellar African American citizens throughout history have had a direct linkage to BGLOs and have also attested to the fact that the organizations helped them to complete their collegiate educational requirements and post collegiate requisites. The bonds of brotherhood and sisterhood run deep as attested by the likes of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., Jesse Jackson Sr., W.E.B. DuBois, Carter G. Woodson, George Washington Carver, Rosa Parks and many others. Their examples help to drive the next generation of young men and women into the ranks of the future but should also help to promote the same ideals that were promoted at their starts.

Like Prince Hall Freemasonry, the focus of these organizations has always been mutual improvement. While BGLOs have focused on this ideal on college campuses and in the various corporate arenas, Prince Hall Freemasonry and the Order of the Eastern Star helped to maintain this same focus on the homefront. Together, this common bond has helped to sustain the state of the African American community despite the struggles of race relations in America. If properly maintained, they ALL can serve along the same lines in the future.

In 2007, he joined the Robert A. Lower Court No. 24, Junior Craft which was rechartered by Past Grand Master Otis Cromartie to fall under the mentorship of Jachin Lodge No. 133. In 2009, Devonte, was appointed "Grand Junior Craft Master" which is equivalent to the title of Grand Master for the Order. He is also a member of the Prince Hall Junior Heroines. In 2007, Devonte attended a Prince Hall Americanism Day Program and admired Knights Templar uniform, disciplinary actions, and their strict commands. His mind was made up to become a "Knights Templar". Brother Ricky Matthews, Universal Lodge No. 65, and grandfather to Devonte told him, first, he had to become a Master Mason. Devonte's response was, "I'll Do That".

It was obvious that Devonte did his home work because the qualifications are that he must be 18 years of age or older, be of good moral character, and a believer in the existence of

the Supreme Being, which is God. Well, on September 24, 2017, Devonte turned 18 years of age. Sister Matthews told the Grand Historian that by the end of April 2018, the Grand Master would administer the First and Second Degrees to Devonte and send him to Boston to participate in a Special Ceremony for 15 Fellow Craft to be raised to the Sublime Degree of a Master Mason. The Ceremony is a "Re-opening Ceremony A Celebration of Prince Hall, On April 28, 2018, 18 year old, Brother Matthews made history. He was made a Master Mason in the same manner and manor (Castle Island, Boston Harbor) as Prince Hall was over two hundred forty years ago.

If so, he will join the ranks of other Grand Masters from Jachin Lodge, namely, Willie B. Evans and Dwayne A. Smith. MORGAN CONTINUED...smoke and cool the air. A series of tubes were used to draw clean air off the lowest level. The tubes could extend to smoke being hotter than the air around it, rise, and by drawing air from the ground, the "Safety Smoke Hood" provided the



user with a way to perform emergency respiration. In 1912, Mr. Morgan received a U.S. Patent for his invention of the "Safety Smoke Hood Device".

Mr. Morgan's invention of the Safety Smoke Hood Device, became national when the Cleveland Newspaper reported he led a heroic rescue mission on July 24, 1916, that saved the lives of several workers after a tunnel explosion trapped them within a water intake tunnel 50 feet beneath Lake Erie. Mr. Morgan, and Frank Morgan, his brother, also an inventor, along with two volunteers entered the tunnel armed with the respiratory breathing device and rescued the entrapped workers. After the heroic rescue, the G.A. Morgan Company received numerous order request from Fire Department's all over the country. The International Association of Fire Fighters awarded Mr. Morgan a gold medal for his invention and made him an honorary member as well. invention of the "Smoke Hood Device" was featured on the television show. "Inventions that Shook the World".

By 1917 during World War I, the breathing device invented by Mr. Morgan was refined to carry its own air supply making it a gas mask. "The Safety Hood Device" was re-named, the "Gas Mask" and was the Standard Equipment in the U.S. Army.

The first American made automobiles

were introduced just before the turn of the 20th Century. Pedestrians, bicycles, animal drawn wagons and motor vehicles all had to share the same roads. Starting in 1913, to deal with the growing problems of traffic accidents, a number of versions of traffic signaling devices began to be developed.

It was reported that Garrett Morgan who lived in the City of Cleveland was the first African American to own an automobile. After

witnessing a serious accident at an intersection, he realized the need to control the flow of traffic through a traffic management device. In 1922, he invented the Electric Automatic Traffic Signal Light, a traffic control device having a third warning. The traffic signal device was a T-shaped pole unit that featured three positions: Stop, Go, and an All-Direction Stop Position. The "Third Position" halted traffic in all directions to allow pedestrians to cross the street safely. During the same year of 1922, he, filed for a U.S. Patent for his invention, which was granted in 1923. In the later years, Mr. Morgan sold his rights to the traffic signal light to the General Electric Corporation. Shortly before Mr. Morgan's death in 1963, he was awarded a citation for his invention of

In conclusion, we, applaud Mr. Garrett Morgan, an African American Inventor for his contribution to the world through his profound inventions of the Gas Mask and the Traffic Signal Light. We, as Prince Hall Masons are even more prouder because Brother Garrett Morgan is a Prince Hall Mason.


