Two Knox College professors are currently working on the definitive edition of the letters and interviews on which William "Billy" Herndon based his biography of his famous law partner, Abraham Lincoln. A large number of these informants were from neighboring Menard County, and we urge any of our readers who may have information on these informants' connections to Lincoln to write or call the professors to help them along with this extremely important project.

Between 1865 and 1888, a number of people specifically from New Salem but also from other places in Menard County gave Herndon information on Lincoln. Any biographical material on the following people or suggestions about where such information may be found is important in order to reconstruct our view of Lincoln.

Dear GENEAL Members and Friends: 22 Mar 1991 [the day after the "party".]
The reception for your immediate Past President was "wonderful, wonderful". I reviewed a bit of past history, and will record it here.

"Perhaps you would like to know how this great genealogical and historical society started. Lowell Volkel, first president of the Illinois State Genealogical Society when it was organized in 1968, later worked at the State Archives, as many of you know. There was a great surge of family activity in Illinois, and by 1971 there were 20 county Genealogical Societies.

"As of December 29, 1971, I was doing research at the Archives, as I had been doing for the past 15 or more years while living in Greenfield. By August 1971 we were living in Jacksonville. Lowell said to me, "We need to start a genealogical society in Jacksonville!" The idea sounded good, so I later contacted the Illinois Power Company for use of their auditorium, and set up a meeting for Wednesday, January 26, 1972. I asked Lowell to preside at the first organizational meeting so that men would know that this was not just for ladies.

"The newspaper article I wrote stated that everyone who came, or sent a card, would be called a First-Nighter. The evening came with 50 in attendance registered in our first registration book, with 20 cards of those who could not come, making a total of 70 interested family historians the first night.

"This past 18th year we had grown to nearly 700 members in 40 states and Canada. Isn't that great? [I asked how many present were First-Nighters, and there were 10, with a total of 50 (again) in attendance at this reception. What a coincidence!] "Out of the first free election, with nominations from the floor, the first five officers elected were Florence Hutchison, president, Robert Dalton, vice-president, Emily Sievers, secretary, Gail Eck, corresponding secretary, and John Griswold,

"As of January 26, 1972 our society became the 21st in Illinois, and that is why our P.O. Box has been #21 all of these years. Since our Society address is in Directories all over the world, I hope no one ever votes to change our address, because researchers in England, Australia, or any other country can correctly send letters of inquiry to our Society, and indeed, many have written in the past who had family ties to our west central part of Illinois."

I have specialized in collecting records for not only Morgan, Cass and Scott, but Greene, Jersey, Macoupin, Calhoun (where I taught two years at Brussels), Pike and Sangamon, in particular. Mary Frances Alkire, now president and librarian of the fine library she has established at 203 South Fayette, was one of our first five committee members to make arrangements for that first meeting January 26, 1972.

And now you know. I want to take this opportunity to thank the President of the Society, the Board of Directors, and their volunteer committee members for this very lovely and rewarding reception, corsage, plaque and flowers.

I was "flabbergasted" with the size of the party, tickled pink, and very grateful to all my friends and faithful volunteers who have made these past 18 years such productive ones genealogically speaking.

Our Society is very proud of the hard work Janet Coble has, and is, putting into her Orphan Train research as State Chairman of the Illinois State Genealogical Society committee. It is probably through her efforts of showing the large numbers of orphans who came to Illinois in the first place, that influenced OTHSA to have its annual meeting in Illinois.

"To the best of our knowledge", Mary Ellen Johnson, Executive Director of OTHSA wrote in a letter to our Editor, "a gathering of Orphan Train Riders has never been held in Illinois. Only a few hundred survivors of the Orphan Trains are still living, and capable of giving first-hand accounts of their experiences. Some of these will be present at the meeting to share their stories."

A rare find

Lincoln document uncovered at local courthouse

The photograph of one page of a three-page deposition PENNED by ABRAHAM LINCOLN in 1836, while he was working as a surveyor, is shown on the cover of our March 1991 issue of the Jacksonville IL Geneal Journal for whatever interest it may be to family historians. Maybe these may be someone's ancestors who were involved in the Circuit Court case between Robert Davidson vs Isham Reavis in a Cass County land transaction. Our land records indicates 40 acres purchased by Robert B. Davidson, and 40 acres by Caroline V. Davidson in Cass.

Page 2: A RARE FIND--LINCOLN DOCUMENT UNCOVERED AT LOCAL COURTHOUSE By Greg Olson, Journal Courier Reporter

After eluding historians and autograph hounds for nearly 155 years, an Abraham Lincoln document has turned up in the dusty archives of the Morgan County Courthouse.

Early Tuesday afternoon, Mike Bonansinga of Beardstown, a research assistant with the Lincoln Legal Papers, uncovered a very rare deposition written and signed by Lincoln, who at the time was serving in the state legislature and working as a surveyor on the side. "We did not expect to find Lincoln documents," said Bill Beard, an assistant editor with Lincoln Legal Papers. He said the deposition is the first document singularly related to Lincoln that has been found during the past year-long courthouse search by the Lincoln Legal Papers staff, in several counties.

Lincoln Legal Papers is a documentary editing project which is conducting an intensive search of circuit court case files and docket books in county courthouses throughout central Illinois.

The document was authenticated Wednesday by Thomas F. Schwartz, curator of the Illinois State Historical Library's Henry Horner Lincoln collection, and James T. Hickey, the collection's former curator.

Beard, a Chandlerville native who has been with the project since its inception in 1985, said the document is an exceptional find because it pre-dates Lincoln's legal career, and is entirely in his own hand. The case deals with an 1836 dispute over land in the far northeastern corner of Morgan County (now in Cass County as of 1837), near the present-day town of Oakford.

The plaintiff in the legal proceeding, Robert Davidson, claimed that he paid \$1,400, no meager amount in 1836, for what he felt turned out to be a worthless piece of ground in the Sangamon River flood plain.

Beard said that Davidson was fooled by the property's seller and defendant in the suit, Isham Reavis, into thinking that he was buying several hundred acres of prime Illinois farmland, with a good stand of hardwood timber, and which never flooded.

Realizing that he had been duped by a shrewd business man, Davidson hired Lincoln and Matthew Lownsbury Jr. to survey the ground and determine how large the property in question actually was. Lincoln and his surveying assistant discovered the ground was nothing like what Reavis claimed — it consisted of but 19 acres, only about half of which was "first-rate timber", and during most springs, Sangamon River waters covered most of that. Armed with this evidence, Davidson filed an action in chancery in Morgan County court in the fall of 1836, suing Reavis for fraud and misrepresentation.

The case never reached trial but was settled out of court, both parties agreeing to pay their individual court costs.

Beard said the case is typical of most circuit court cases of the time. "The majority had to do with land transactions," he said. "It is a unique period in American history because of the great fluidity of land ownership."

Circuit Court Clerk Barb Baker said every effort would be made to preserve and protect the Lincoln document. Beard said state archivists would clean the document, mend tears in the paper, carefully remove sealing wax, place it in a protective covering, and return it to the courthouse.

Since February 1990, Lincoln Legal Papers staff members have collected about 20,000 documents related to Lincoln's 24-year law practice (1837-61) from four central Illinois counties -- Menard, Pike, Scott and Greene.

Beard said project workers would probably be in Morgan County for about three months. He also said "The Morgan County Courthouse is the best organized courthouse we've been in yet. The chancery, probate, common law and criminal case files are all separate." It was Court Clerk Philip Bradish and his staff who carefully separated and rearranged the jumbled records many years ago.

It is a pleasure to try to interpret an original record, with its varied and hardto-read handwriting which has brought so much happiness to our family researchers as they find record of a long sought-after ancestor. In a way, it has saved my life - at least from a longer drawn-out illness. Can you imagine that?

On Friday February 1st I was in Springfield doing research, and felt quite ill with an unusual headache and back problems. The next morning was no better, so I was preparing for a bath, and then a trip to a chiropractor. Ruth Lepper called "just in the nick of time", so to speak, before I was to get in the tub, and told me how thrilled she was to see the record of Samuel Lewis.

While standing there talking I suddenly said, "I will have to quit - I'm having a heart attack!" The next thing I knew I was in a daze, very weak and trying to pick myself up off the floor, finally made it, and had to put the phone back on the hook without remembering I had been talking to someone on the other end of the line. That was the fortunate thing, because that gave Ruth the chance to call Jane Coble to come see what was the matter with me. When the door-bell rang, I barely made it to the door to open it, then collapsed again. Needless to say, Jane called 911.

To make a long story short, thank goodness it was not a heart attack, but proved to be Salmonella poisoning, which if untreated for a long period of time can be quite devastating to one's health. I probably had ingested the offending food 7 days before. I was in the hospital four days. Fortunately I had two great roommates which helped to pass the time away, since I could not be devoting my efforts to answering genealogical inquiries, or typing for the March quarterly. Here I am on March 6th happily reading that hard-to-read handwriting again for all of you "out there". Here's hoping you find something in it that will assist with your ancestor hunting. Good luck folks! It has surely brought me good luck! deepest appreciation goes to my caring friends, Ruth Lepper and Jane Coble, for their timely action. So now it's time for me to act - in your behalf!

The following record is only the beginning of this next volume in the consecutive order of the dating system that I have been following in the Jacksonville IL Geneal Journal since Vol XVII #2 June 1989 when your editor published the first pages 5 to 17. Included was an obituary giving the history of James S. Anderson's activities as not only a furniture maker and undertaker, but a benefactor and contributor to the general welfare of Jacksonville's population at the time.

I, your editor Florence Hutchison, am so grateful for the privilege John Power has given me to photocopy these precious old and somewhat dilapidated books so that I can share them with our members "out there" and "in here" for at least 40 states and Canada. It is a thrill when someone writes back to say that here is the only record they have found to date their ancestor's death time. That makes all my efforts at interpreting the many good and bad hand-writing styles worth my while.

Page 1: WHAT HAPPENED TO THE AMBITIOUS MILITIA ENROLLMENTS IN ILLINOIS COUNTIES?

Excerpts from Report of the Adjutant General of the State of Illinois, Vol. I, "containing reports for the years 1861-66", revised by Brigadier General J. N. Reece, Adj. Gen., Springfield IL 1900. Pages 21 to 26 deals with the Militia and enrollment, which is important historical information for family historians who may have access to the data we have located and publish in our Jacksonville IL Geneal Journal.

The second and third sections of article 1, of an act entitled "An act to amend chapter 70, Revised Statutes, entitled Militia", in force May 2, 1861, provided for the enrollment of the militia of the State, and required returns to be made to the Adjutant General's office August 1, 1861, and annually thereafter.

The militia was divided into two classes -- the voluntary and the reserve units. The volunteers were to organize themselves into companies of not less than fifty nor more than one hundred members each, and "who shall have a uniform, elect officers and assemble for drill and purposes of military discipline, not less than four days in each year, and who shall be furnished with arms and equipments by the State, and be first subject to call or draft into service, at the requisition of the Gover-

The "reserve militia" was to consist of all those men "who do not so organize, and be subject to the draft". This created the need for the "military census" to be taken in each county to determine who was between the ages of 18 and 45. 1861 the enrollment was taken in most of the counties of the State. At this point in time there were 102 counties, with Ford being the last, established February 17, 1859.

Article 3 provided for the election of officers, and declared the term of service to be six years. A complete roll of the companies so organized was to be made annually by the officers of each company, and copies kept on file.

In 1861, the enrollment was taken in most of the counties of the State, as contemplated by the law, but no "corrected lists" were returned on the first of August in 1862. On that day circulars were sent to all the county clerks, notifying them to immediately forward copies of such list, if possible, and in case the assessors had failed to file them in their offices, to notify the Adjutant General of such failure. A few lists were received in August, but in most of the counties the failure was on the part of the assessors.

The United States War Department issued orders that "The Governors of the respective States will cause an enrollment to be made forthwith by the assessors of the several counties . . . to be appointed by such Governors, of all able-bodied male citizens, between the ages of eighteen and forty-five, within the respective counties, giving the name, age and occupation of each, together with remarks showing whether he is in the service of the United States, and in what capacity, and any other facts which may determine his exemption from military duty."

"All reasonable and proper expenses of such enrollment, and of the draft hereinafter provided, will be reimbursed by the United States, upon vouchers showing the detailed statement of service performed and expenses incurred, to be approved by such Governors."

This article is too long to quote in full here, but the resulting efforts to organize militia without being provided arms and other equipment necessitated the following letter to be sent to Brigadier General C. P. Buckingham in Washington:

The enrollment of the militia of the State was suspended on Governor Yates' return from Washington, on account of his being informed by the Secretary of War that no draft would probably be required in this State [Illinois]. Fiftyfive thousand volunteers have enlisted in new regiments in this State under the last two calls. Shall the enrollment be completed?"

Page 2: WHAT HAPPENED TO THE AMBITIOUS MILITIA ENROLLMENT IN ILLINOIS COUNTIES?

The problems occurred because of the extreme high prices at which arms were then held in the market. The Illinois commissioners who were appointed, visited eastern cities in the summer of 1861 to negotiate a purchase of arms contemplated by the the law and estimated volunteers. An effort was made to purchase arms for twenty regiments, but without success. They did purchase, in 1861, 999 Enfield rifles, 500 Colt's revolvers, 250 Whitney revolvers, 940 cavalry sabres, and 42 sets of artillery harness. This was issued to some of the volunteers, but fell far short of supplying arms and other necessary accoutrements to the majority of the units being activated.

The value of the Militia lists your editor is presenting in this quarterly pertains to the genealogical aspect of finding names and other data of ancestors and collateral relatives at a given location as a certain period of time. It permitted the County Assessors to appoint officers to take the enrollments in the various precincts of the 1860's. How we wish we could come upon county plat maps for that period of time! The counties must have had some sort of map at the time, else how would they be able to outline the voting precincts?

While our Hutchison family lived in Greenfield 1955-1971, before moving here to Jacksonville, Florence drove back and forth 50 miles every day to Brussels, in Calhoun County, to teach in the high school there 1957-1959. The students were all very nice, and the people living there are all hard-working closely-knit familys. They have lived, since the beginning of white civilization there, in relative isolation, because of the two rivers -- Mississippi and Illinois -- on each side. There is still only one bridge at Hardin, with only several ferry crossings at various suitable points, non-operable in the winter when the rivers are clogged with ice.

The 1876 plat map shows many "Landings" with local names, along the rivers. The precincts named, at that time, were Belleview, Carlin, Hamburg, Crater, Hardin, Gilead, Richwoods and Point. [Guess where Point is!]

If family historians are interested in research, write to the Calhoun County Historical Society, County Rd., Hardin IL 62047. "Local history, genealogy, museum".

They published "CEMETERIES OF CALHOUN COUNTY, ILLINOIS" in 1978, and then a later updated issue. As to whether copies are still available, I have no knowledge.

Florence took the 1978 book apart and arranged the cemetery names alphabetically for easier reference, Book I. Book II has the cemeteries arranged by Precinct names. We made a surname index in two parts. Our index does not fit the later issue of their Calhoun Cemetery listing. But it does serve to locate a lot of grave sites.

We also have the Mortality Schedules for the 1850 and 1860 Federal Census Records alphabetized. There are five pages. These were published in the June and December 1982 Jacksonville IL Geneal Journal.

I-also have only the index to the *Portrait and Biographical Album of Pike and Calhoun Counties*, *Illinois*, Biographical Publishing Company, Chicago, 1891, for reference. There is a copy at our Jacksonville Public Library, and the Illinois State Historical Society, in Springfield, that I know of.

Probably the reason the Military Census surnames indicates a wide range of nationalities, is because the immigrants coming up from New Orleans via the Mississippi and into the Illinois rivers stopped off at some of the numerous landings and decided to stay in the area, rather than travel further north at the time. Part of the reason also could have been that this was the southernmost part of the Bounty Land offered by the government to the veterans of previous years.

There are several ways a family historian can gain information about any of the men ages 18 to 45 who were on the Military or Militia Censuses during the Civil War. One is to consult the county histories published in the 1870's and 1880's. But please be aware that different spellings of the same name may be a factor in identifying the right individual, since some names were sound-spelled by some of the recorders.

Most of the histories have War Record sections. The Greene County War Record is on pp 481-467, in the 1879 <u>History of Greene County</u>, <u>Illinois</u>, <u>Its Past and Present</u> published by Donnelley, Gassette & Loyd, Chicago. A reproduction was offered for sale by the Greene County Historical Society, published by Unigraphic of Evansville, Indiana in 1974.

The Society also published the <u>History of Greene and Jersey Counties</u>, <u>Illinois</u>, originally printed in 1885, and reproduced by <u>Unigraphic in 1980</u>. For Greene, "The War of the Rebellion" is to be found in Chapter VIII pp 611-642. For Jersey "The War of the Union" is to be found in Chapter XVI pp 232-256.

Burial sites for soldiers of all wars up to 1956 can be found in each county's "HONOR ROLL [name of] COUNTY, STATE OF ILLINOIS" published by the Illinois Veterans' Commission 1956. If your county Veterans Association does not have one for reference, or you live out of state, your librarian can order the microfilm from the Illinois State Archives.

The HONOR ROLL pages covers all wars, giving Name, War Designation, Branch, Unit, Date of Death [if known at time of publication], and Grave Data when known, under the individual cemetery recording of veterans in any given county.

The Illinois State Archives, Springfield IL 62756, also has a card index on all the Civil War soldiers listed in the several volumes of the Adjutant General's Reports. If a researcher requests no more than one or two names at a time, the archivist can find the card, with the reference to the Adjutant General's report and finally the microfilm which will give pertinent data concerning each veteran, including color of complexion, hair, eyes, height etc. There is a modest fee for this service for which you will be billed.

Whipple Academy, a college preparatory institution, was proposed at the annual meeting of the Illinois College trustees in 1869, by Professors Rufus C. Crampton and Edward A. Tanner, and approved. Dr. Samuel L. Whipple of Jacksonville came forward and offered the College \$10,000 for the founding of the school.

By the following school year, 1869-1870, Whipple Academy started in its new building at the corner of Morgan and Kosciusko Streets with 115 students. Instruction was offered in the English branches, science, mathematics, French and German, and also Greek and Latin. Military drill, "Spencerian Penmanship", art, adrawing and surveying were also included among the ambitious announcements of the new school. [From Catalogue of 1869-1870. See pages 248/49 Illinois College A Centennial History 1829-1929 by Charles Henry Rammelkamp, Yale University Press, 1928, and other pages for history of Whipple Academy.]

In 1876 the first Whipple Academy was given over entirely to the Jacksonville Business College, and the regular Academy classes were transferred to the college building on the campus. In 1882 the present Whipple Academy building was constructed on campus. [A picture is on page 250, same book quoted above.]

MRS. ELLEN HARDIN WALWORTH Our Founder

Lightning bolts split the sky and shade trees bent low before the wind when Ellen Hardin Walworth flung open the door of her Washington, D.C. residence to admit Mary Desha and Eugenia Washington, the stormy night of August 9, 1890. It was during this passionate throe of Nature that the new society was born, and this meeting established these three, together with Mary S. Lockwood, as the Four Founders of The National Society Daughters of the American Revolution.

The beginning of the society was far from the beginning for Ellen Hardin Walworth, however. It was rather a culmination of more than a generation of endeavor for the preservation of historical spots and promotion of education, especially the study of history.

As the young daughter of a Colonel killed in the Mexican War, Ellen had been transplanted by her mother's remarriage from Kentucky to Saratoga, New York. Here she spent hours roaming over the quiet meadows, dreaming and reliving the two battles fought on September 19th and October 7th, 1777. Her own ancestor had been one of Morgan's celebrated Rifle Corps at the crucial defeat of Burgoyne, turning point of the war.

The Saratoga Battlefield continued as the focus of her interest in adulthood, and she published a scholarly monograph, complete with maps, on both the battles and the battlefield just in time for the Centennial anniversary in 1877.

Equally proficient as a persuader, authorities credit her with being the one whose determination saw the completion of the Saratoga Battle Monument in 1888. In addition, though the only woman Trustee of the Saratoga Battle Monument Association, she it was who induced private individuals to

donate markers to indicate important points on the battlefield. Except for her, authorities confess that many of these historic sites would have been lost.


She was a force in convincing others that the Saratoga Battle Ground was a special place that should be set apart. She did not live to see this accomplished, as she died in 1915, but a decade later it became a reality, and today it is known as Saratoga National Historical Park.*

In the ongoing campaign to preserve the battlefield, the Sons of the American Revolution were reinforced and supported by the Daughters and other patriotic groups.

Finally, in 1931, the Daughters of the American Revolution erected a monument to the unknown dead, the only one on the entire 2600 acres of the Park.

Each year since 1983, a memorial service sponsored by several organizations has been held on this site on the Sunday closest to October 7th. This ceremony was inspired by Mrs. Nancy Childs, Chairman of the Citizen's Advisory Committee of the Saratoga Battlefield, a person embued with Ellen's spirit of dedication.

Daughters assembled at this service, standing at attention and listening to the last haunting notes of "Taps" die away in the echoes from the autumnal landscape, can almost visualize their Founder, Ellen Hardin Walworth, standing by with a gratified smile, knowing that her crusade to keep alive the memory of those who fought and fell at Saratoga will long endure.

Deceased Was Daughter of Col. John J. Hardin and Had Written Several Books

From: Jacksonville Daily Journal, Tuesday June 29, 1915

Henry D. Day contributed the following to the Peoria Star about the death of Mrs. Walworth, daughter of Col. John J. Hardin.

The New York Herald of Thursday, June 24, 1915 contains an obituary notice of Mrs. Ellen Hardin Walworth, quite a noted lady, who died in a hospital at Washington D.C., Wednesday, June 23, 1915.

She belonged to a prominent Illinois family, and married into a prominent New York family. She was born at Jacksonville, Illinois, October 20, 1832, and was the daughter of Col. John J. Hardin, lawyer, congressman and soldier.

One of his law students was Hon. Richard Yates, war governor of Illinois, and Mr. Yates delivered his funeral oration at Jacksonville after he had been killed on the second day of the battle of Buena Vista in Mexico, February 27, 1847, while leading the final charge.

Miss Hardin was educated at one of the Jacksonville seminaries for young ladies, and was married in 1852 to Mansfield Tracy Walworth at Saratoga, New York, where she lived practically all her life. Her husband was a son of Reuben Hyde Walworth, a prominent American jurist, congressman, and twenty years chancellor of New York. His decisions and "Chancery Rules and Orders" were quite noted.

Ellen's husband, M. T. Walworth, became an author of considerable repute, chiefly in the line of fiction. He was assasinated in 1873 by a son, who was acquitted of the charge of murder on the ground of insanity.

Mrs. Ellen Hardin Walworth was herself a person of great talent and she attained much celebrity. She wrote extensively on historical subjects, among her works being "Battles of Saratoga", Battle of Buena Vista", "Life of General John J. Hardin", "History of the Hardin Family", and a number of patriotic and miscellaneous poems and essays. In 1897 she published "Parliamentary Rules". She was distinguished also as one of the three [four] founders of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution in 1890.

During the Spanish-American war she was Director-General of the Woman's National War Relief association. With supplies and nurses she was at the field hospital at Fortress Monroe to meet the first wounded brought from Santiago. She was an honorable member of the Military Surgeon's Association of America.

For six years Mrs. Walworth was principal of a young ladies school at Saragoga, and she was one of the first three women elected to membership in a school board under the New York law.

She was one of the founders of the Post Parliament club of New York. She was a life member of the American Historical association, and was a member of the New York Genealogical and Biographical society, and the New York State Historical Society, and the Society for the Advancement of Natural Science. For ten years she was president of the Shakespear club of Saratoga, and for 18 years she was a trustee of the Saratoga Historical society, and was one of the founders of the Art and Science Field club of Saratoga.

[At this point the rest of the article refers back to Henry D. Day who contributed the Walworth article to the Peoria Star, which was then published in the Jacksonville Daily Journal.]

In my boyhood, members of the Hardin family were still living in Jacksonville, Ill., their home being on West State street about a block west of the Dunlap house. I was quite well acquainted with them, and one day the boys took me on a hunting expedition several miles out into the country. They did the hunting, chiefly for prairie chickens and quail, which were then quite numerous in that vicinity, and I watched the horse, wagon and lunch.

St. Clair county actually started on Illinois land as of 1790 when a large area was known as "The Northwest Territory". In 1801 it covered most of Illinois as Indiana Territory. In 1809, as Illinois Territory, there were two counties -- St. Clair and Randolph. The county boundaries kept changing until Illinois became a state in 1818, at which time St. Clair County was down to its present area.

'A Window on the Past' well worth looking through

Since its publication last fall, Dr. Philip Decker's architectural study of Jacksonville has received rave reviews and been sold to hundreds of people interested in historic homes and the city's

rich heritage.

"A Window on the Past," which traces the development of building styles in Jackson-ville from 1833-1925, is a unique book which gives equal treatment to bot, the simple wood-frame collages, such as the one Dr. Flward A. Tanner built on Give Street, and the mammon mansions, like the house the Hook family constructed about 1890 at 1042 Wist State Street.

When the Jacksonville Hisforic District was nominated for inclusion on the National Kegister of Historic Places several years ago, architectural historian noted: "From the late Federal of Beecher Hall to the Prairie School of Spencer and Powers and beyond, the Jacksonville Historic District presents one of the most complete illustrations of Illinois' architectural history as can be found."

The majority of the 29

houses featured in Dr. Decker's book, published by the Morgan County Historical Society, are located in the College Hill section of the city, that area west of the central business district where many of the city's wealthy built their residences in the 19th and early 20th centuries.

We urge everyone interested in architecture and history to pick up a copy of this beautifully designed and wellwritten book.

About ten letters have come, and been answered to date. Some of the inquirers could find out the Admission and discharge dates and county of former residence on their ancestors or collateral relatives, which is the information I was permitted to copy through the kindness and authority of Michael Hurt, Director of the present Jacksonville Developmental Center.

Whenever a record can not be found, then if I know which county a patient came from, I send an 1876 map of the county, and names and addresses of any genealogical and/or historical society for that area. Inquirers—please send me all the information you can about your relative. See below:
