

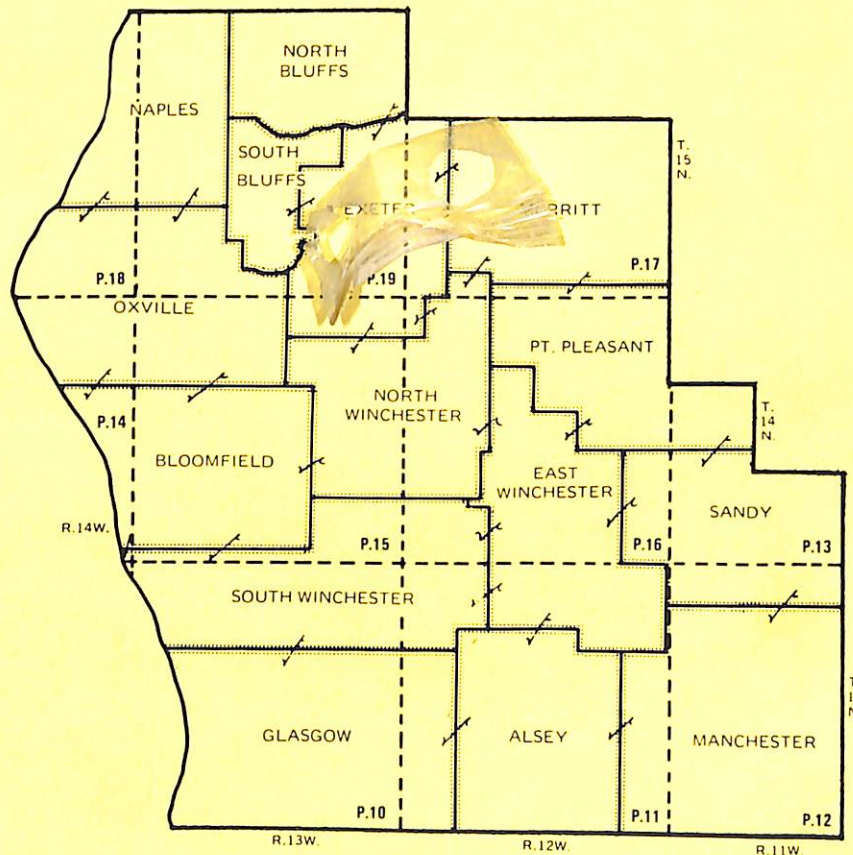

FROM OUR HOUSE(S) TO YOUR HOUSE(S)

Dear Friends and Geneal People:

26 September 1979

If I could only remember all of the wonderful things and good advice I think about sending you during the intervening few weeks between quarterlies, this message would be worth while reading. I make many notes to myself, which soon become lost in the daily shuffle of genealogical materials from hither to yon as I try to make room, for a new project I am always starting, or some family members who dare to venture home occasionally. [My daughter and family from Iran is home at last! I felt like a little tree in a forest with all of my tall grandsons around me in August. In case you are uninformed, I have 5 children and 8 grandchildren.]

Please understand, my friends, that it is almost impossible to keep up with all letters, articles, etc. that make their way to my kitchen table. [I push them back far enough to eat at least once a day!] I do not intentionally bypass letters of inquiry, but with increasing numbers arriving as the years go by, YOUR letter may become inundated during periods of my intense research and preparation for the ever ongoing quarterlies.

If you have not received some materials you requested to be xeroxed, please write and let me know. Here again, I may go to a xerox machine, only to find it inoperable that day. I intend to go back another day, but in the meantime the press of other matters, and trying to keep other members busy with materials to be indexed permits a lapse of memory as to my original intent.

If you make a second [or third] request, please state what it is that you desire, as I cannot always readily locate past correspondence - try as I might to keep things properly filed. I imagine that this happens to all public-spirited genealogists who volunteer to assist others with their family history problems in a given area. [I think I hear a few Amen's out there.]

Believe me, if some larger state or national genealogical society - with a long mailing list of subscribers - does not try - and in the very near future - to teach would-be family historians inexperienced in making proper application for legal records, how to write County and Court Clerks in brief form with specific requests, public records will all soon be closed. While genealogists are frustrated with long waits - they should be on the other receiving end for awhile. The clerks receive numerous letters telling of early history of the family in great depth. The deputy has to read through a lot of unnecessary wording to find out what the writer wants researched. Those people who send in their requests on properly worded forms can get prompt attention - but the others are bypassed for lack of reading time.

Let me present a good hint to those who have this problem of deciphering requests. Have a pink [or green, yellow or blue] *HI-LITER Felt Tip Marker* for highlighting reading material without blotting it out. Then the name sought will stand out for easy reference. One glance at the letter will tell one what is to be researched.

And who can do without *Liquid Paper Correction Fluid* for blotting out writing or typing mistakes? Some precautions: Put lid back on immediately after using! Always shake well before using. Keep thinned down with a few drops of solvent. The least expensive is *Energine Cleaning Fluid, Fireproof*. While it also removes grease spots from your ties and dress fronts, etc., it also copesectically keeps the Liquid Paper fluid fluent! But I will bet that you can't get it to go into the bottle without my telling you the little secret. Right? Take the top off, and with a sharp knife remove the plastic cap left in the bottle. Pour in a few drops of solvent put all items back in place, shake well, and use much longer. Keep repeating, as liquid becomes thicker. With LP now \$1.25 we can't afford to waste it.

One member wrote that I had more good advice per square inch in my quarterly than a national genealogical society. So I have to live up to my reputation. Who needs so much white space? Love and best wishes to all, from your Geneal Editor.

Who is interested in Scott County history? (Illinois, that is.) Probably every family historian whose forbears came to west central Illinois. Why? Because their people undoubtedly traveled in or across its bluffs, prairies and valleys at some time in their early peregrinations. [I like that word because it sounds so official, but had to look it up to be sure it involved travel. While it refers to "foreign travel", that is exactly what our early comers were doing - entering a new strange land just wrested from thousands of years of Indian occupation.] Many of these pioneers built their houses on huge mounds of earth little dreaming of the dead civilization that lay beneath them. They probably picked up many axe-heads and battering stones, and by adding handles fastened with hide strips made good use of the native productions. I wonder -- did any of them make use of the grinding stones to make cornmeal?

If persons reading this article want to look further into the history of this area they should send for a copy of Scott County Bicentennial Book published jointly by *The Bluffs Times* and *The Winchester Times* in the summer of 1976. The letter can be addressed to either newspaper - at the same towns- sending \$4.00 per copy, plus \$1.00 for postage and handling.

Because this valuable reference is not indexed, nor has a Table of Contents, I am including here a brief outline of subjects covered, which can be copied out and used for those persons who are fortunate enough to have a copy.

DO YOU REMEMBER the old recipes which used hog lard rendered at home winters after the hog killing? Following is Chris Munze's Oatmeal Cookie Recipe (donated by Hester Benton for the Scott County History book, p. 311.) I wonder if it would taste as good with modern cooking oils, and baked in an electric oven?

Chris Munze came to Winchester in 1885 and opened a bakery and grocery store which he operated for many years. He was born in Germany and came to America in 1873. He was most famous for his ice cream and baked goods, as these cookies:

2 c. sugar	1/2 c. sweet milk	2 c. rolled oats
1 c. lard	1 full tablespoon soda	1 lb. raisins (ground)
2 small eggs	4 c. flour	pinch of salt

Cream sugar and lard. Add eggs and mix well. Add milk and dry ingredients, ground raisins and mix well. Dough will be stiff. Roll in small balls in palm of hand. Place on cookie sheet and press flat. Bake at 350 degrees until light brown or until done.

Then when I mentioned this to my husband he wondered if I were going out to the kitchen to bake cookies to put in my new cookie jar. Waverly had a very successful Fall Festival the 14th and 15th, and I drew a large mouse-design cookie jar which Myra and Guy delivered to my house the other day. Actually, I'm kept too busy "cooking-up" Quarterlies for our genealogical friends to worry about heating up the oven. But these memories stirred up the good old cornbread our mothers used to bake using "cracklings" which were a by-product of the lard-making process. That is now quite a lost art, in most sections of the country. And that is one area that I am thankful for - I do not have to follow in my mother's footsteps for this part of our livelihood.

Carlton Cemetery is located 2.5 miles northwest of Alsey, in Scott County. The location is somewhat inaccessible by car. There is a dirt road leading to the cemetery from the main road, but it is rough and on a farmer's fenced property. "Walking in would be your best bet." So says Robert and Sharon Dobson, of Murrayville, who provided our genealogical society with a reading made 7 June 1977. We also acquired a reading made by someone else, on the same cemetery, from Mrs. Loreita Ballard who is County Clerk in Winchester.

Mrs. Florence Hutchison has combined these two readings and has found several differences in date readings, which is to be expected from old stones. It is rather universal that each person who looks at a stone may in some way determine that the lettering on a tombstone reads one way, while another looking at it with shadows at a different angle, and with differing sense of vision may see it another way. It is sometimes difficult to verify the correct date, by another party, without either checking a death certificate, a census record for age, a marriage record for names and initials, or seeing the actual stone themselves. Mrs. Hutchison has tried all, except the latter method, on this as well as the other cemeteries indexed with this one. Most of the older stones are the only record of births and deaths since no death certificates were filed in Illinois, by law, until 1878. Many of the later deaths had no certificate on file in Winchester, as is true in Morgan. This can be due to the fact that the doctors in outlying districts did not find time to send such certificates to the County Clerk, local persons handled deaths for themselves, and received permission only from the sexton, or the person deceased in another county where the burial certificate lies.

The Dobson's continued their description by saying:

Most of the monuments are in fair to good condition, however we feel many are missing and many more graves are marked with large rocks and stones. The cemetery is cared for once each year by descendants and members of the local 4H Club. A picnic is usually held after the clean-up. Yellow Iris and Peonies decorate the grounds, and it is quite pretty when the flowers are in bloom.

Marvin and Natalie Wahl visited Carlton Cemetery in 1977 and sent us a list of their relatives there. We told this at one of our meetings, and Mr. and Mrs. Dobson located it and accomplished a reading for us. Mr. and Mrs. Wahl were back in Jacksonville recently and left a copy of their family's "History of the Wahl, Lewis, Bollmann, and Stoner Families. They comment: "This small book [38 pages] is an attempt to document the family history collected over a ten year period. . . . Various dates and places were obtained from discussions, census records, tombstones and a family Bible. If there are any mistakes or some of the newer children omitted, please let us know. The book starts with our direct parents and grandparents. Next are pictures of relatives. Then, stories of early family origins. The main body consists of family group sheets, arranged alphabetically, to give dates and places. The last part consists of cousins, excluding children who died as infants." Their address 558 Cypress, Sunnyvale, CALIF 94086.

Clear tombstone pictures can verify genealogical data, and correct common errors made by transcribers or typists of cemetery readings, thereby saving a lot of time in research and doubt. Instant camera productions may be costly (50c to \$1 each shot) but may save miles of travel that, lately, costs much more per mile for operational expenses. (Be sure to have a good flashlight along -- or plenty of flash-bulbs -- to shed light in shaded areas while taking such pictures. And don't forget to make a good focus-setting.)

An example of this picture-importance was best expressed by one of our members who speculated that two men buried side by side in Glasgow cemetery were father and son. Our reading, however, showed

Jessey McMahan 1843-1857

George McMahan 1849-1868

This would indicate, by ages, brothers, perhaps. The lady and her husband visited the cemetery and came home with a good clear picture which took away all doubt. Bob Dalton received a letter from her, with picture, and wrote your Editor:

"I have seen a very fine photo of the tombstones and the reading should be

Jessey McMahan 1813-1857

George McMahan 1849-1868."

Trying to distinguish weathered number 4's on tombstones probably presents one of the most difficult decisions a transcriber faces. A good picture may show the intervening distance. In early days the stonecutters used a deep vertical line, with the < in lighter vein. The latter weathers out, leaving only the vertical marking. A reader must then measure the distance between the 8 and in order to detect the missing angle lines 4.

A transcriber should have a ruler handy when reading tombstones, in order to measure widths of letters and figures, comparing the distance between them. A little care at the cemetery may save your car on the road.

Be especially careful to detect differences between B & R, C & G, E & F, E & L, I & J, M & W, V & Y.

Other reasons tombstone pictures are important -- the stone may some day disappear for some reason, stolen, or toppled over in a severe storm, or help relatives coming at a later time to more easily find the beloved spot.

Also take a picture of the cemetery entrance, particularly if its name appears on a sign. Include the relative or interested person who is doing the checking. Put name and location of cemetery, especially the county and state, in some fashion, in connection with the picture. If you write on back of pictures, use a pencil - not a pen that will leak ink through to the front. Write at bottom - not at top where heads or vital information appears on front.

One can fasten pictures to a sheet of typing paper by laying it on the desired spot, and marking down about 1/2 inch from each corner. With a sharp knife make slits from dot to dot for each of the four corners, and insert picture after typing in the desired information on the page. I suggest you get a ream of 24-pound good bond paper. It is expensive, but very lasting and about as acid-free as one can get. After the pages are set as desired for final placement, one can secure them by putting a piece of Scotch Magic Transparent Tape on the back side where the points are inserted.

Now we hope Jessey and George can sleep peacefully knowing that their descendants and friends care about when they were born and buried, and that we are tracing their ancestry for perpetual earthly records.

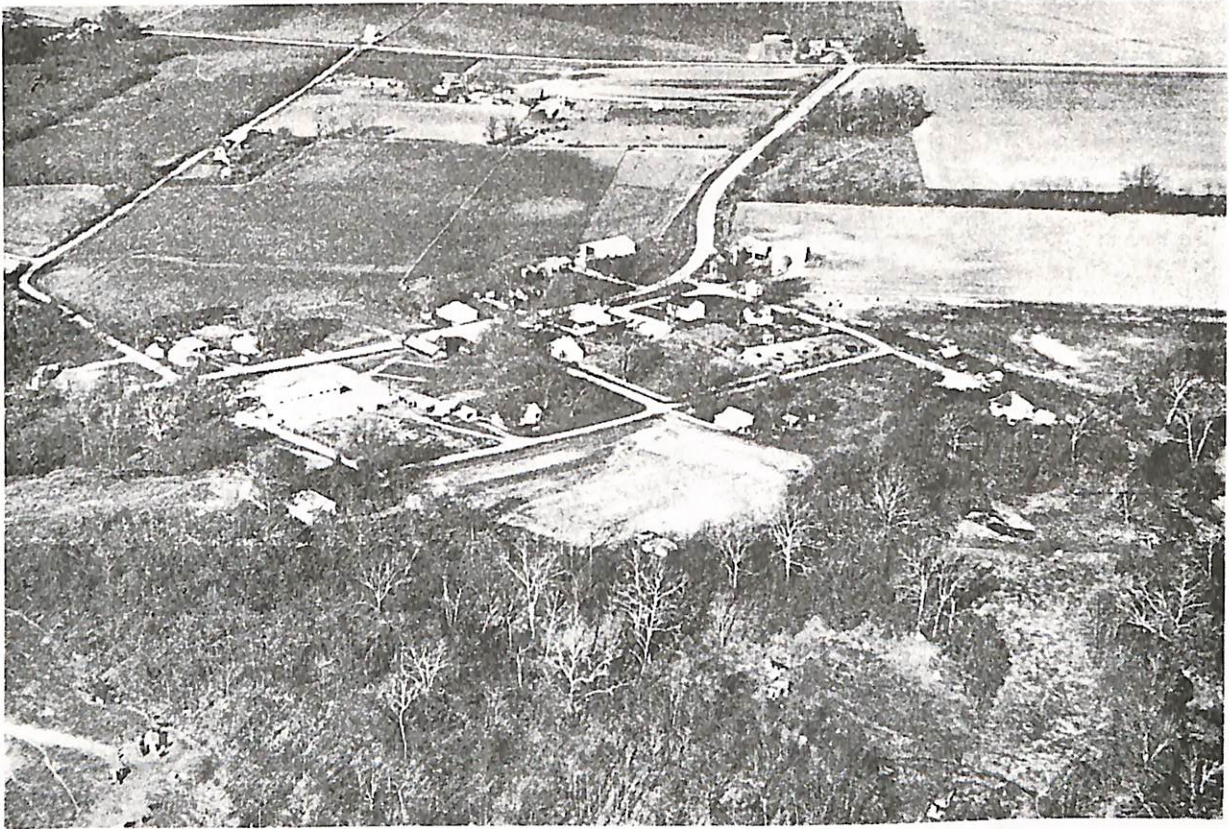

HISTORY OF OXVILLE



Oxville is the sixth of the living towns in Scott County in chronological order. It is the only town in the United States with the name of Oxville.

Oxville was laid out by Daniel Pike and Newman S. Havens. It was surveyed by William Clark, the deputy surveyor of Morgan County, on March 25, 1837.

In the original plat there are one hundred one lots, each seventy-five feet wide by one hundred fifty feet long, except lot one in block seven. It was designed as a site for a schoolhouse.

There was a public square three hundred feet by three hundred feet. In view of later history, it is said that was large enough for Oxville.

The original plat was acknowledged before Absalom Peak, the Justice of the Peace, and recorded on page 439 of Book M in Morgan County.

Oxville is situated partly on the west half of the northwest quarter of Section 32 in Township 15 and partly on the east half of the Northeast quarter of Section 32 in Township 15. Both of these pieces of land was entered by Reuben Lamb on November 14, 1823.

Broad Street and Second Street ran at angles with each other, both 75 feet wide. All others were 65 feet wide.

Pike's addition-the only addition made to Oxville was laid out by Daniel Pike, one of the proprietors of the original town. It was surveyed by William Clark on April 20, 1837, only 26 days after the original town was surveyed.

There must have been a large demand for lots because of such an early addition. The plat of this addition was acknowledged before Samuel Brooks, the Justice of the Peace, on May 11, 1837. It was recorded on pages 471 and 472 in book M in Morgan County.

In the addition there were forty-eight lots, each seventy-five feet by one hundred fifty feet. The streets were sixty-five

feet wide, except Broad Street, which is a continuation of the Broad Street in the original plat.

The addition is situated on the northwest quarter of the southwest quarter of Section thirty-three in Township fifteen. It was entered by Daniel Pike on May 16, 1836.

Oxville is situated on the Phillip's Ferry Road. It is said that before introduction of railroads this road was a great thoroughfare traveled much by prospectors and immigrants going west and returning again.

In those days, it was a place of some prominence and had prospects of becoming a considerable town. Somewhere along the line something failed. For quite a while Oxville has been at a stand-still.

There was business enough in and travel enough to and through it in the pioneer days to demand a hotel, and one was built by Daniel Pike. It was a two-story house large enough to meet the needs of the people.

In the second story there was a commodious hall for balls that were at that time well patronized. Empty glass bottles, open and mouth down, were built in the ceiling to aid the music. Later the house was owned by Jackson Carpenter.

Upon the banks of the Mauvaisterre in the northeast part of town, Haven's mill stood in the early days. A dam was built across the creek to collect water to furnish power for the mill.

Just below the mill a bridge was built over the creek and a public highway crossed there. It ran northeast to Apple Pie Ridge, intersecting the Exeter and Naples road.

On February 16, 1839, the act was approved, creating Scott County. The General Assembly also passed an act declaring the Mauvaisterre a navigable stream from its confluence with the Illinois River up to the Oxville bridge. The bridge mentioned as the upper limit of the legal navigability of the Mauvaisterre was the bridge at Haven's Mill.

Between it and the river there was then no other bridge across that creek. It is said that the state spent \$2000. removing driftwood and other obstructions from the declared navigable portion of the stream.

It is also said that Havens built a flat-boat in the creek below his milldam. Then he loaded it with grain or flour or both and succeeded in navigating the stream from there to the river. This was the extent of the navigation of the Mauvaisterre.

After Haven's water propelled mill disappeared, a steam mill was built upon the level ground in the northwest part of the village. It was operated by Jackson Carpenter and William Crinion, under the firm name of Carpenter and Crinion. Owing to the introduction of new methods and irresistible competition of larger establishments, it proved unprofitable. It was abandoned and disappeared.

Some of the sturdy early settlers or worthy citizens were Daniel Pike and Newman S. Havens, the ones who laid it out and helped it become what it was in its better days; John White, James Morrison, Robert Husband, Captain James Sawyers, Uriah Stewart, Richard Sears, and Jacob Martin. Of a later generation are John K. White, Daniel White, John W. Green, Henry Jeffords, Charles Weaver, and Jackson Carpenter.

The natural site of Oxville is situated partly on high bluffs and partly in the adjacent valley. If the goddess of fortune had favored it, a populous and thriving town might now crown the beautiful heights and spread out over the fertile valley.

The people of Oxville supported a Methodist Episcopal Church and an efficient public school. The land for the church was donated to Oxville in 1843 by Mr. Bernie Green of Bluffs, Mrs. Robert Husband built the church. At one time it was discussed of moving the church, but Mr. Richard Sears got up a petition to keep it in Oxville. The Board of Education members were Zeb Parker, George York and Herman Hobrock.

On January 25, 1903, the businessmen were as follows:

Jackson Carpenter - dry goods, groceries, etc.
Fritz Kilver - general merchandising
William F. Freesen - Justice of Peace
Alfred York - blacksmithing
John D. Little - Constable

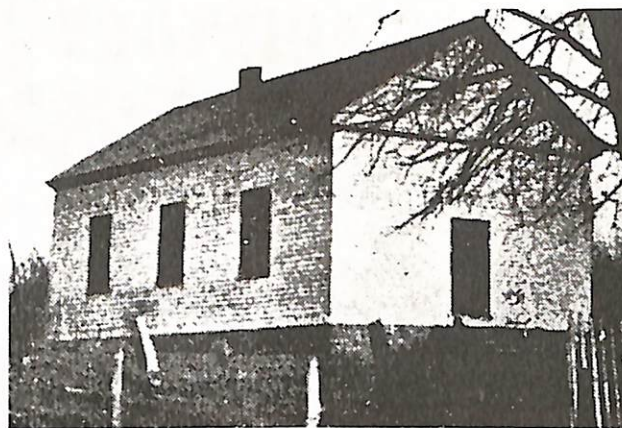
The village of Oxville has not yet disappeared, but it is a lot smaller. The population is now approximately thirty-seven. Now the school children go to Bluffs because there is no school in Oxville. The mill and milldam have disappeared. Now, about the only business in Oxville is the Vance and June Kesterson store. Most of the people in and around Oxville, farm. A Methodist church is still in Oxville.

HISTORY OF THE OXVILLE CHURCH

For nearly one hundred twenty years, the Oxville Methodist Church has withstood the forces of nature and the forces of man to serve its purpose as the meeting place for many generations of the Christians of the Oxville community. It is probable that, until the building of the present church, the people of the area met in an old log church where the Bluffdale schoolhouse now stands. It was probably a Union Church serving the needs of all the protestants in the community.

From somewhat doubtful records, we find that the land on which the building stands was given the church in 1843, on hundred twenty five year ago. Mr. Bernie Green of Bluffs was the donor of it. Mr. Green was the father of Mr. John Green who lived north and east of the Oxville bridge.

Mr. Robert Husband, the grandfather of Mrs. Ora (Husband) Likes, built the church. He was an excellent carpenter, wood carver, and cabinet maker. He also carved the pulpit and the chancel which once stood in front of the pulpit.

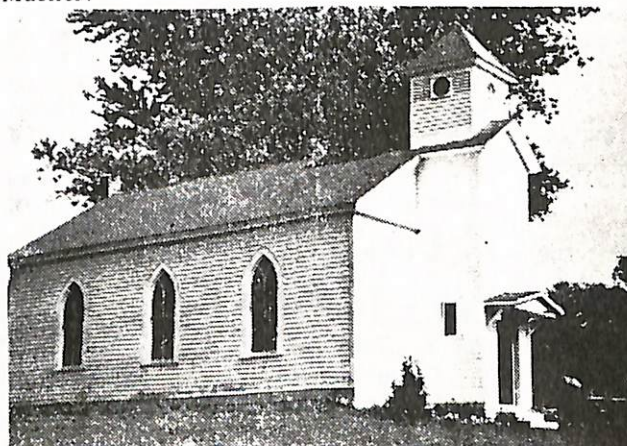


There was, at one time, talk of moving the church to the crossroads west of Oxville on the Phillips Ferry road, but Mr. Richard Sears got up a petition to keep it at Oxville.

For several years after the church was built it may have continued to be a union or community church. But we know from some treasured newspaper clippings belonging to Mrs. Letha Hart Davis, that as early as 1857 the Oxville church was a Methodist Episcopal Church. "James W. Wills was united with the M. E. Church in Oxville in 1857". "Hanna Wills Parks was united with the M. E. Church in Oxville in 1867. The minister at that time was Rev. John W. McGlaughlin."

There have been a number of funerals and revival meetings in the Oxville Church. A good Epworth League was organized in about 1912 and remained active until 1934. The Ladies Aid has been active since 1932. And with the able help of good Sunday School Superintendents, the Sunday School and Church have held together over the years. In times past the attendance has been more than 100.

As far as we know, the first real wedding in the church was in 1954 when Marjorie West and Darrell Hart were united in the Oxville Church. The only other wedding we know of was in March of 1960, when Patricia Likes married Delbert Mueller.



In 1945, the church was redecorated inside and out and was dedicated at that time. In 1962 the church was again redecorated inside and out and had a rededication.

One of the important aspects of the history of any church is that history which is being made at the present time.

Sunday School and Church is held every Sunday morning with Church at 9:30 a.m. with Rev. Joseph Wartick as Pastor, and Sunday School at 10:30, Mrs. Frances Lawshe, Superintendent.

The Ladies Aid is still active and holds regular meetings and undertakes many projects.

In 1927 Sara John English copied all the grave stones that could be read, except large stones face down, abandoned in an area with stock running over them. We reproduce herewith her reading which is probably the only record of these early people. We do not know the location, except in the vicinity of Oxville.

WHO HAS LEGAL TITLE TO CEMETERY LOTS?

Recently one of my new-found friends wanted to locate the grave of her father who died when she was about 9 years old. From cemetery records in my possession* I found the location and took her out to Diamond Grove. Her mother was buried on another lot with her second husband. There were 3 vacant spaces on the father's lot, and I helped secure these for herself and 2 children by reason of legal heirship, and filing notice with the City Clerk's office. This lady was profoundly happy to place Memorial-Day flowers on her father's grave for the first time since his death 56 years ago!

This brings up a question of vital importance -- who has legal title to vacant cemetery lots, when the original grantee is deceased and buried there?

Transactions of this nature requires a knowledge of State Law and rights of inheritance. I suggest that family historians acquire a copy of the pamphlet (In Illinois) *Illinois Wills, Joint Tenancy, Inheritance Tax, and Probate Procedure*, "An Agricultural Law Publication" circular 1164, by C. Allen Bock and Donald L. Uchtmann, 1979, issued by the Cooperative Extension Service, College of Agriculture, University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign. One may be secured from your County Extension Agent, or by writing the University. These are free pamphlets.

One of the important items to read is "Descent of Property by Illinois Law when there is no Will", page 1. These principles would apply, in my opinion, to cemetery lot inheritors from long-deceased relatives. While the rest of the pamphlet is of general interest pertaining to Wills, joint tenancy, inheritance tax laws, and out-of-state real property, genealogists would probably be wise to read "Probate of an Illinois Estate" pages 12 through 14.

Deeds are "forever", or until passed on by another deed to the property by a legal heir. In my opinion, vacant cemetery spaces may be reclaimed by descendants of the original purchaser, even in the absence of a lost deed paper. That is why the use of the local sexton's records, or official clerk, is so important. He is the one to make the determination. The next most important item is to have such deed recorded in the County Clerk's office so that there is official record for others to note, as need be.

Should you wonder if a person is buried on a space, try using a strong metal-finder. There are usually metal holders on the outside of a buried casket that will "zing" (?) as one passes the instrument over the surface. You can practically outline a casket in this manner.

A long metal rod to use as a probe may also be helpful, especially to locate fallen tombstones that have been covered over with Time, soil, grass, weeds and/or sprouts. Of course probing after a rain has thoroughly wet the soil helps to insert it into the ground much easier.

One lady said to me: "After seeing the condition of that old Sandridge Cemetery where my husband's ancient relatives are buried, I'd just as soon be cremated and have my ashes spread over a mountain top!" Won't her great-great-grandchildren be disappointed in not finding her gravesite at some time in the future? Which brings up the thought - we all owe a great debt of gratitude to those brave souls who go out and bring us in all of these cemetery readings we are publishing in this quarterly.

*The City Clerk has permitted me to xerox all lot cards on the two city cemeteries from which I am gradually compiling listings, several of which have been published in this Quarterly. I was also fortunate to find the original plat maps of Diamond Grove and Jacksonville East in the County Clerk's deed books, which makes it relatively easy to pinpoint gravesites.

"SO LONG AS YOU BOTH SHALL LIVE"

To review the marriage vows occasionally is sometimes a good idea. With various religions the wording may differ, but the thoughts expressed and the final consummations are all the same, at least in the eyes of man, if not God. As to the latter what human is fit to judge? The following ceremony was found attached to a black memorandum book put out by an insurance company in the early 40's which made it appear quite official. It was probably used many times by some impressive looking Justice of the Peace in performing the legal rites of marriage.

INTRODUCTION.

A Marriage Contract is the most important and solemn act of your entire lives, and therefore must be entered into with due consideration of its importance and responsibility. Reverence well becomes this symbol of unity and love.

Having impressed upon you the great weight and importance of the step you are about to take, I will now proceed with the solemn rites of matrimony.

Dearly Beloved, we are gathered together here in the sight of God, and in the face of this company, to join together this Man and this Woman in holy matrimony; which is an honorable estate, instituted of God, signifying unto us the mystical union that is betwixt Christ and his Church; which holy estate Christ adorned and beautified with his presence and first miracle that he wrought in Cana of Galilee, and is commended of Saint Paul to be honorable among all men; and therefore is not by any to be entered into unadvisedly or lightly; but reverently, discreetly, advisedly, soberly, and in the fear of God. Into this holy estate these two persons present come now to be joined.

If any man can show just cause, why they may not lawfully be joined together, let him now speak, or else hereafter forever hold his peace.

THE RING.

You may place the wedding ring on the bride's finger.

The wedding ring has neither a beginning nor an ending. It is a symbol of endless faith and trust. May it ever remind both of you of the solemn vows you have this day taken, and keep you steadfast and faithful unto the end.

(Where they have no ring)

You may join hands.

As you join hands, may you always go hand in hand together through life, loving and trusting each other.

Now, having made satisfactory answers to all questions put to you, and having solemnly promised before God to love, honor, comfort and cherish each other, so long as you both shall live, NOW, THEREFORE, by virtue of the power invested in me by the Constitution and Laws of the State of Illinois, and in accordance with the Ordinance of God, I now pronounce you Man and Wife.

WHERE IS SANDRIDGE?

One of our society members has been seeking the Sandridge Cemetery in vain. The other day I located it with the help of Mrs. Drummond in the Scott County Clerk's office. The church is northwest of Glasgow, with unkempt cemetery near by. If any person has tombstone readings we would appreciate receiving a copy, as it probably contains many important persons of "the old days". History of this area is given in the Bicentennial Book pages 272,273. A bit of Neva Cumby Boester's story will be given here.

I was born in the house built by my grandfather. He built the house in 1882 of rough oak lumber. The original home had four rooms, a large porch across the south side, and a shed kitchen on the back. Also long gone are two other landmarks; the M.Z.Sweet home a little to the north and east of the James Hardin home and the Fletcher home south and east of Hardins. These houses were made of logs and rough oak lumber. . . .

Just north of our house on the west side of the road was a two roomed house made of slabs with a shed kitchen. In one of these rooms was the country store owned by John McGinnis. His chief items were tobacco, coal-oil, coffee, and flour. . . .

The sorghum mill was west and across the road from the Alfred Rhodes home. Both press and cookers were under one large roof. Everyone raised a patch of cane in the fall the leaves were stripped off, the stalks cut, and taken to the mill for the juice to be made into sorghum molasses. The stalks of cane were pressed between rollers propelled by a mule hitched to a long pole and driven in a circular path. At the end of a long day the poor old mule was at the same point where he started his day. Although he had walked many miles; (as far as the mule was concerned), he had accomplished nothing. The juice from the press ran into vats which fed the juice into the cooking pans. As the process of cooking continued from pan to pan, the last pan gave the finished product, Sorghum molasses. Constant stirring kept the workers busy for the juice must not scorch. . . .

On the site of Lida Andrews home was the J.M.Crabtree's country store. He carried a supply of everything needed in those days. Cheese came in big circular flat cakes and was cut by a cleaver. Lunches of canned sardines, cheese and crackers were served. The crackers were about three inches square and half as thick as one's finger. They came in large wooden boxes. If one bought a can of sardines costing 5 cents, and 5 cents worth of cheese, grandfather gave he or she enough crackers to eat with them; and at that, he made a profit. . . . The original Sandridge School house was a one room log building with a fireplace. Split logs were used for seats and there were no desks. When first built the building was used for both school and church. The Sandridge Church at its present site was built in 1894.

. . . The idea of laying out Williamsport was that Big Sandy would eventually be navigable from the Illinois River up to this point. This was vain hope. The little village of Williamsport (laid out in 1825) was vacated and a ghost town by 1869.

Between Glasgow and Alsey was another village called Morgantown laid out in 1835. It contained 48 lots. The names of the streets were Washington, Jefferson, Madison and Jackson. This town had a little log school house with one window and no glass pane; paper was pasted over the opening to admit the rays of light and keep out rain and snow. The benches were split logs with flat sides up. This was the Morgantown School. Morgantown paid no taxes which was one dollar per lot; the state took over the town and by 1850 Morgantown ceased to exist. . . .

So, today Sandridge survives as the name of a little country church by the wayside, with cemetery of many unknowns lying peacefully nearby.

In lieu of a standard system of death registration throughout the U.S., the federal government adopted the use of the Mortality Schedule to aid in the compilation of certain cause of death and health statistics. This schedule listed only those people who died within the year prior to the beginning of the census enumeration. For 1850 deaths occurring between 1 June 1849 and 31 May 1850 were listed.

There are 11 columns headed as follows. [Since there were no blacks or slaves in Scott County, columns 4&5 will be omitted in our reading given.]

4. Color (White, black or mulatto)

6. Married or widowed (m= married; w= widowed)
7. Place of Birth, naming the state, territory, or country
8. Month in which Person died
9. Profession, Occupation, or Trade
10. Disease, or cause of death
11. Number of Days ill.

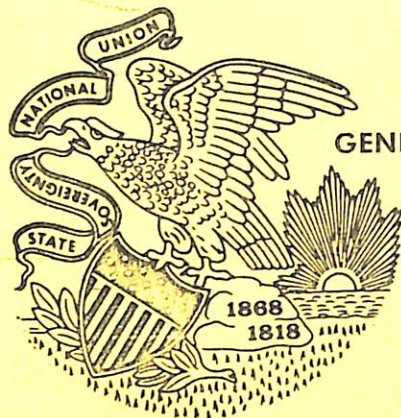
