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MAP DIVISIONS, BY STATE LAW, OF WEST CENTRAL ILLINOIS 1821-1839.

Family historians should carefully read these notes which apply to the maps on the cover of our quarterly, in order to know how the counties were formed as the state became populated.

One point in this article is to say that Morgan County, as we know it today, was never a part of Sangamon county EXCEPT for a small portion of land north of Indian Creek to Cavanaugh Bluff in Section 16, Township 16 North, Range 9 West of the Third Principal Meridian. The 3PM is the eastern border of Sangamon, with "Old Morgan" on the west.

It is from the Third Principal Meridian (shown with black line running North and South) that deeds are described by Ranges of 6-mile townships to the west of the Meridian. The Base Line describes the townships as being on the North, or South of it.

See map #13 where the dark line is between Cass and Morgan. This was Indian Creek, then called Balance, or Negro, which emptied in the Illinois River in Cass county. It started in the northeast quarter of sec. 1-16-9, where Cass, Morgan and Sangamon conjoin, swerved southwesterly of Literberry and Arcadia, the northwesterly above Concord to Arrenzville, and thus on to the Illinois River.

The Law of 30 January 1821 describes the division between Morgan and Sangamon thusly: "Thence through the middle of the prairie dividing the waters of the Sangamon and Mauvaise Terre . . .".

The importance of this specific history of county line changes from 1821 to 1845 concerns those researchers desiring to locate early land records. From 1821 to January 28, 1823, all Cass, Scott and Morgan county land above Indian Creek, would have deeds recorded in Sangamon. Those for Scott and the larger part of Morgan would be in Greene county until 1823.

From January 28, 1823 to March 3, 1837 deeds for Morgan, Cass and Scott would be in Morgan county, as well as the names on the 1830 Federal Census, and the 1835 State Census, as shown in Map #15 for 1824.

Cass (minus its present lower 3-mile strip) was formed March 3, 1837. So, deeds for Morgan and Scott and said 3-mile strip, would be in Morgan county 1837-1839.

Scott County was formed February 16, 1839, so all land records, thereafter, would be in that county, as well as marriages, and court proceedings. Births and deaths were not recorded anywhere in Illinois until 1878, by State Law.

Deeds for the Morgan 3-mile strip, the lower half of Township 17 North, started in Cass County February 16, 1845. See map #22 1839.

Since marriage records begin in all counties when the county was formed, one has to know such date of formation. However, the first frame courthouse in Morgan burned December 6, 1827, so all such records begin next day. The deed book was safe because it was at the home of the Recorder that night.

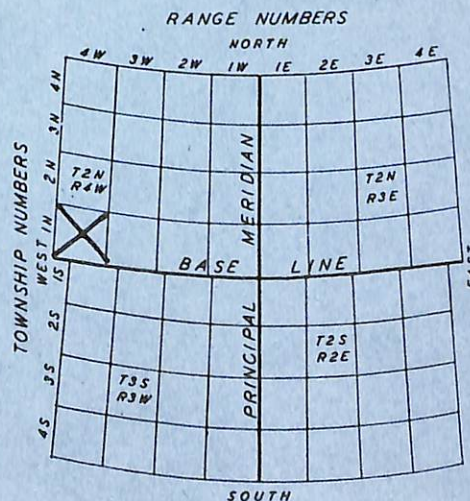
DIAGRAM SHOWING HOW SECTIONS ARE

Did you ever wonder "how and why am I here?" The above date is the 110th anniversary of my dear mother's birth. Because a Nancy Melissa was born on that date in Porter County, Indiana, in 1872, to Otho William and Nancy Melissa (Coppernoll) Baker, I eventually became a reality. Grandfather Baker was a Civil War soldier who was *not* killed in the fracas. Another great-great-grandfather, John Coppernoll of New York, survived the Revolutionary War, and his son of the same name came out of the War of 1812. Mulling over these historical events makes one aware of the importance of national events which has shaped one's life, time and place of birth. In family history the "where's" are most important, and I urge all of our avid genealogists to be sure to record the town, county and state of each event in their ancestor's lives--especially lineage charts.

On a beautiful autumnal afternoon the 1st of November, 1869, a large concourse of people gathered to witness the dedication of Diamond Grove Cemetery. On reaching the cemetery, the company gathered about a fine monument standing near [the old] entrance. It was of white Italian Marble, with a square base of about 3 feet in diameter, with pedestal and a shaft surmounted with a wreath to make a total of thirteen feet in height. Its historic inscriptions at once explain the fact that the cemetery itself bears the same name given it by the first pioneers of the county as they settled on this particular piece of land to found the first log-cabin village named "Diamond Grove." It was the spectacle of snow-covered ground with the sun shining on the icy trees making the whole appear to be a fantasy land of diamonds, which Isaac Fort Roe promptly chose as his new home site, in January 1820. Now his body, removed from some unknown cemetery, had come back to his beloved land.

The Daily Journal, Monday Morning, September 6th, 1869 gives this account of the forthcoming event. [The dedication ceremony was in the newspaper Tuesday November 2nd, 1869.]

AN OLD SETTLER.

Mr. Editor:--The county of Morgan has agreed to pay for removing the remains of Mr. Isaac Fort Roe, (the first settler and first person who died in the county) to the Diamond Grove Cemetery, and placing a monument on the grave. The city of Jacksonville has agreed to devote a suitable lot. On the 12th of October, 1819, an emigration society, organized in the city of New York, appointed Mr. Roe, David Berdan and George Nixson committee to explore the western states and select homesteads for its members.

They left the city on the 15th of October, crossed the Wabash at Vincennes on the 26th of December. Arrived at St. Louis January 1st, 1820, passed and named Diamond Grove, January 23d, in which Mr. Roe selected a place of residence, and in February he built the first log cabin in the county, in which he resided until his death, October 12, 1821, aged forty-eight years. If you or any of your readers should think proper to make any suggestions in regard to the inscription on the monument, they will be gladly recorded and properly considered. Wm. Thomas, of the Committee.

From the *Journal Courier*, Jacksonville, Ill., May 15, 1977 p. 41 we can find a good picture of the Isaac Fort Roe monument, and some of the history of the establishment of Diamond Grove Cemetery.

Diamond Grove cemetery, which includes 40 acres of land, was purchased by the city from James and Elizabeth Dunlap, July 11, 1861, for \$3,000. The purchase was made early in the sixties when the town trustees were Ralph Reynolds, Charles H. Howard, Elizur Wolcott, James H. Lurton and Isaac J. Ketcham.

Mr. Reynolds was the president of the board and when the matter of purchasing ground for a [third] cemetery came up his was the vote which decided the matter affirmatively. [The others were Jacksonville East, and College Hill cemeteries.] There was a good deal of opposition to the movement for a new cemetery, the objectors claiming that the city could not afford to make

the purchase.

The original plan for the cemetery was obtained by Elizur Wolcott from persons in Philadelphia, and with this plan as a guide and a survey made by Mr. L. M. Olmstead, the cemetery was laid off by Mr. Reynolds personally. It was he who planned the drives and walks, and fixed the place of entrance. He also contracted with Captain Henry to have the hedge fence built, the price for the work to be 50 cents a rod.

Later the house for the sexton was built, the contract being let to a Mr. Rawlings. [The Diamond Grove plat map in Deed Book pp. lends disagreement to the above statement, because it is signatured by Rufus C. Crampton, City Surveyor.

When the land was first acquired it was so heavily wooded that a good many trees had to be cut down and then there were many stumps which needed uprooting. The trustees from the first took an active interest in the beautifying of the grounds and it early became the custom for many persons to visit the spot Sunday afternoon during the spring and summer months. So far as known Diamond Grove cemetery was never formally dedicated, but in November 1869, the monument to Isaac Fort Roe was dedicated.

Lots 320 and 322 were set aside by the City Trustees for Isaac F. Rowe. In the meantime a burial is listed on 322 of Samuel Leonard Chapin, son of Dr. Chapin, at State Hospital, 16 Nov 1896. Lots 319 and 321 were given to the Reeve families, Hiram Reeve, age 87 years, being the first burial of an old settler 25 June 1893.

* * * * *

We will now turn our attention to listing the earliest known settlers as found in the *HISTORICAL ENCYCLOPEDIA OF ILLINOIS*, Morgan County edition, 1906, pages 645-647. Please remember that "Old Morgan County" contained Cass county from 1823 until 1837, the northern 3-mile strip until 1845 when it was ceded to Cass; also Scott county was not formed until 1839. All census records in the period 1823-1835 will be labeled "Morgan County", but will include citizens in Cass and Scott. The Morgan Territory was a part of Greene county 1821-1823.

Page 638 is this tale about the village of Diamond Grove:

WIND STORM OF 1821--During the spring of 1821 a storm occurred in which a tree was blown down upon the roof of the cabin of Mr. James B. Crain. The roof was crushed in, and Jehu Reeve was killed. Mrs. [Martha Reeve] Crain was badly injured. One of her arms was broken and one shoulder was put out of place. The broken arm was set by a Mr. Stephen Langworthy, but his limited medical and surgical knowledge did not enable him to discover that the shoulder was out of place, and in consequence Mrs. Crain remained ever afterward a cripple. She was a daughter of Mr. Isaac Reeve, Sr., and was the only white woman in the settlement during the first summer. It is also claimed that she was the mother of the first white child born in the county.

[This family is buried in Lots 440 and 441, row L, Jacksonville East Cemetery.] It has been related to your Editor that David Prince's first log cabin home was on the spot where the large gray Prince monument stands today, in section H, lots 188 and 189 in Diamond Grove.

Page 645, of the Encyclopedia, relates: "The present existing sources of information respecting the early settlers of Morgan County and the date of their settlement are so meager, and in some cases conflicting, so that it is now impossible to procure the names of all, and fix the date of settlement. It is deeply regretted that a *complete* roster of that grand pioneer army is not now available. . . ."

Page 645, Encyclopedia quoted, "The earliest white settler of whom we have any account . . . was Mr. Eli Cox. He settled in the eastern part of what is now Cass County, in 1816, stopping at a grove at the head of a creek, which since has been known as Cox's Grove and Cox's Creek. At that early date there was not supposedly a white man in all this part of the State. The United States Government had not even stretched a surveyor's chain over the land; neither section nor township had been laid off. Mr. Cox staked out a claim, and after remaining on it for a time left it, but returned in 1819, built a cabin, commenced permanent improvements and lived there till his death, in 1880 or 1890. . . ."

"In the year 1818, Seymour Kellogg, who had been a soldier in the War of 1812, came from New York to Illinois. In the fall of 1819 his brother Elisha arrived. The brothers located near the head of the Mauvaisterre Creek. Also, there was Florentine E. Kellogg, James Deaton, Sr., Murray McConnel, John R. Harney and Mrs. Edward Harney.

"In January 1820, three explorers from New York State, David Berdan, George Nixon and Isaac Fort Roe arrived. David Berdan was the father of the late Judge James Berdan. Mr. Roe settled at Diamond Grove, and gave it that name. He also built the first hewed log cabin in the county. Mr. Roe and Mr. Jedediah Webster built a small hand mill there. . . ."

At this point your Editor discovered why the early land records of the above individuals did not appear on Morgan 1836 tax record of Patentees. Then came this important discovery to relate to genealogical inquirers.

- Any person coming to "Old Morgan" in 1819, 1820 would be in Madison County.
- Persons coming to "Old Morgan" in 1821, 1822 would be in Greene County.
- Persons coming to "Old Morgan" after January 31, 1823 would be in Morgan.
- Land records for the northern part of Cass begins March 3, 1837.
- Land records for Scott County begins February 16, 1839.
- Land records for the lower 3-mile strip of Cass begins in 1845, formerly in Morgan.

Therefore, the early village of Diamond Grove, established January 20, 1820, by Isaac Fort. Rowe was then in Greene County!

METEOROLOGICAL EVENTS--The latitude in which Morgan County is situated seems to be peculiarly liable to frequent and violent meteorological conditions. Its longitudinal position, also, in the valley between the great mountain ranges, east and west, is favorable to sudden and extreme climatic fluctuations. That fact is confirmed by the following list of such events, given in the chronological order of their occurrence. Ibid., p.638

DRY SEASON OF 1820--The season of 1820 was remarkably dry, no considerable fall of rain occurring between April of that year and the same date of the following year. Nevertheless a good crop of corn and other field products--owing to the richness of the soil and the heavy dews--was grown, affording a sufficient, though scanty, support to the early settlers. Ibid., p.638.

Following the above articles in the Encyclopedia, are those outstanding episodes of other unusual weather conditions:

Cyclones of April 1825; The Deep Snow, 1820-31; Shooting Stars, fall of 1833; The Sudden Freeze, January 28, 1873 in which the temperature fell to 40 degrees below zero. Hiram Reeve remembered that the day was warm and showery during the afternoon. Near two o'clock in the afternoon it grew dark, as if a rain storm was coming, and in an instant, the strong wind, with an icy blast, came and all was frozen. He found raccoons, opossums and other animals frozen to death. Between two o'clock p.m. and nine o'clock a.m. the next day the ice had frozen six inches thick.

Daniel L. Clarke says that, on the morning following the sudden freeze of the previous afternoon, he rode his horse across Indian Creek on the ice, and had him in the stable before sunrise, and that the ice was then one foot thick.

Other interesting items concerned the *Little Indian Cyclone, May 1845*. It destroyed a log stable in Morgan County, the Old Walnut Grove schoolhouse near Princeton [now Cass County], and the cabin of Mr. Thomas Beard. Its indescribably violent and resistless force leveled the dense forest of large trees in its path as it followed the Little Indian Creek. Its path through the timber could be seen for many years afterward.

Snow Storm, February 1855; Cyclone, May 1855 and Cyclone of April 15, 1856; Cyclone May 29 1859; Warm Winter 1877; Cyclone May 7, 1880; Great Sleet Storm of 1883 along with the *Greasy Prairie and Litterberry Cucclones May 18, 1883*. [The latter two cyclones are extensively described on pages 642-644. Unfortunately no names of families it affected are related; however, there are probably newspaper accounts.]

INDEX: ARCADIA CEMETERY, KNOWN BURIALS WITH NO TOMBSTONE MARKERS.

Did you know that the early name for the village of Arcadia was New Lexington? If a family historian has a record that his/her ancestors were "buried at New Lexington", then they would have been in the north, or "old part", of the Arcadia cemetery. Many of the stones were pitched under a tree, when the cemetery encroached on land wanted for corn planting.

The index to the Arcadia Cemetery tombstone readings done in 1981 by Mrs. Merrill Stewart, Mrs. Shirley Stewart Aleguas, Mrs. Darrel Stewart, and Miss Gail Ann Caruthers, was published in our June 1981, *Jacksonville IL Geneal Journal*. The following names are known burials gleaned from other sources, such as death certificates, obituaries and family records.

Should any of our readers have other burials not listed in either of these two indexes, would they please send the information to our Society for adding to this record.

While Morgan County proper was never in Sangamon County territory, that small portion of land north of Indian Creek was, which included Cass County prior to 1821. Therefore, land purchased that early at New Lexington may we in Sangamon County deeds. We do not know this for sure. From "Illinois Place Names" we find that the Arcadia postoffice was established 3 October 1831.

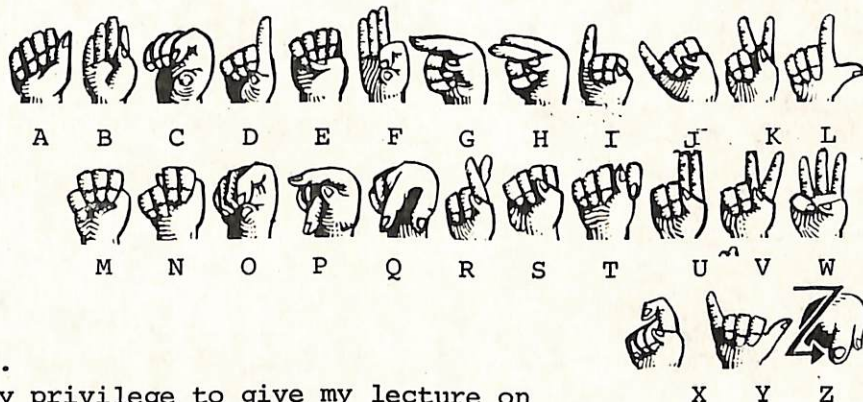

IMPORTANT NOTES PERTAINING TO ADDRESS CHANGES, ETC.

HOUSTON, TEXAS:--who are you? You sent a postcard to Linda Venrick of Virden offering to share GREENWOOD family history. But you sent no name or address! Did you put on a name sticker? If so, it must have dropped off. All we have is the postmark.

o----Memo to our readers: Always put your name and address *clearly* on letters and postcards. Avoid unusual local abbreviations. Your editor had a hard time trying to figure out one city name, especially because the postmark was garbled too badly to read.

oo---Please be kind and put your name and address on your letters, as the envelopes sometimes become separated from the letter.

ooo---Put your name and address on all lineage charts, along with the date, so that we will know to whom the family belongs, and where to file it properly.

ABOUT MOVING FROM PLACE TO PLACE! If you know you are moving, or have moved, *PLEASE*, send us your address correction immediately!

In order to see that our members get their quarterlies, note that on the back of each one we have the statement:

Return postage guaranteed, [this costs us 71 cents for each quarterly returned.]

Address correction requested. [this costs us 25 cents for each address change.]

To remail the quarterly to you costs us 71 cents

Our total cost for one quarterly is then \$1.67

Sometimes a member writes back to say he/she had paid dues, but did not have a certain quarterly, or quarterlies for that year. We appreciate your writing to tell us, and we gladly send the one requested. Evidently some quarterlies are lost by the postal department, and do not come back by return postage.

There have been some rare occasions when a member wrote back to say they had not received such and such a quarterly, only to find later they had misplaced the original. But they were kind enough to return the replacement we sent.

Which brings up a point about "precious writing", a term used in creative writing classes. That is material of limited readership published in small quantities, which includes family histories. Our society quarterlies have been limited to approximately 500 copies for the past 3 years. While it now appeals to a wider readership in the United States due to our part of West Central Illinois having been an early major travel route from the East to the West coast, copies in genealogical departments of most libraries are thus of limited availability because our readers are individuals. Few libraries subscribe to our publication because of their limited funds, or, having no knowledge of our production.

I always urge our readers to get out all their back issues and go over them carefully again, for two reasons: 1) you might find some family information you now need; 2) if you find a small amount of needed material, then perhaps it can be photocopied, 3) if you don't want the quarterlies "around in your way", then we hope you will share the copies with local genealogists or societies. If that is not possible, perhaps you can donate them to some library; but make sure, first, that the librarian *does* want them, and will file them properly for public access in a genealogical section of the library.

Myra Martin has looked up all the Hart marriages and all the Jones marriages in Morgan County, and has generously shared them with our Society. We will share them with you, if interested. There are 5 pages for JONES, and 5 for HART. We owe a great deal of thanks to Myra who is constantly searching and setting down so much family history, and preserving the Waverly community heritage.

Many of our readers have purchased our publication *"THE BARRENS" OF SCOTT COUNTY, ILLINOIS*, an historical family history essay, by Thomas Bowman Gibbs, June 1924, edited and typed by Florence Hutchison, June 1981, [\$5.00 for the booklet same size and style as our quarterlies.]

Most of the Yorkshire, England, families settled in the southeast portion of Scott County, known as "the barrens". Mainly it is the land lying between Big and Little Sandy Creeks, with its low growth of oak, hickory and hazel brush [in the 1830's.]

In *THE EMIGRANTS HAND-BOOK, The State of Illinois with notices of The Valley of the Mississippi*, published 1842 in London, by Dyer, 24 Paternoster Row, etc. we find a description of this geological phenomenon.

"A description of country called "barrens," or "oak openings," prevails to some extent in Illinois. This term is used in the west to designate a species of land which partakes, as it were, at once of the character of the forest and prairie. The surface is generally dry and more uneven than the prairies, and is covered with scattered oaks, interspersed at times with pine, hickory, and other forest trees, mostly of stunted and dwarfish size, but which spring from a rich vegetable soil, admirably adapted to the purposes of agriculture. They rise from a grassy turf, seldom encumbered with brushwood, but not unfrequently broken by jungles of rich and gaudy flowering plants and of dwarf sumach.

"Among the oak openings you find some of the most lovely landscapes of the west, and travel for miles and miles through varied park scenery of natural growth, with all the diversity of gently swelling hill and dale; here trees grouped or standing single, and there arranged in long avenues, as though by human hands, with strips of open meadow between.

"Sometimes the openings are interspersed with numerous clear lakes, and with this addition become enchantingly beautiful. But few of these reservoirs having apparent inlet and outlet, they are fed by subterraneous springs, or the rains, and lose their surplus waters by evaporation.

"In the early settlements of Kentucky, much of the country below and south of Green River presented a dwarfish and stunted growth of timber, scattered over the surface, or collected in clumps, with hazel and shrubbery intermixed. This appearance led the first explorers to the inference that the soil itself must be poor, to produce so scanty a growth of timber, and they gave the name of "barrens" to the whole tract of country. It has since been ascertained that this land is amongst the most productive soil in the state. Therefore, a person need not hesitate to settle in the barrens. These tracts are almost invariably healthful; they possess a greater abundance of pure springs of water, and the soil is better adapted for all kinds of produce, and all descriptions of seasons, wet and dry, than the deeper and richer mould of the bottoms and prairies."

Now you know why the Yorkshire chose to live on this seemingly "less desirable" land in the 1830's. We published the index of names in our June 1981 quarterly of the *Jacksonville IL Geneal Journal*, 2 pages of surnames.
