Dear Hearts and Geneal People:

'Tis the time when folks talk most of Christmas cheer, And contact folks whom they hold most dear; 'Tis my time to write this Journal for many far and near, To wish them fruitful holidays and a Happy New Year!

While I can never find time to "do" our own family history - for helping others throughout the year - with constant correspondence - 4 quarterlies to produce, and much indexing to type --- I strongly urge my readers to put their lineages in some understandable order so that they can send these charts along with their greeting cards. My sister-in-law, Vern Hutchison, a retired Librarian in Bartlesville, Oklahoma, is now avidly pursuing - and enjoying - the many contacts she has made around the U.S. as she finds other people working on similar or related lineages - Cowan, Tankersley, Gillespie, Copeland, Frost, Street, Greer, Perry, Patterson, Wright, and a passle of Walkers from Tennessee. She sent her first lineage chart along with her annual Christmas letter. This truly binds the thoughts of family members together a lot more than a signed card can ever do. One does not need to limit this act to Christmas - there's Easter - birthdays - other holidays - and just "plain any-time."

One of the problems with most published Lineage Charts, however, is the immense amount of information one tries to squeeze on one sheet of paper! All the vital data for 31 people is on one page! I have developed a lineage chart that contains only the Paternal Lineage of 17 people on one page, with the other 17 on the Maternal Lineage chart, plus 2 more generations on the back. (However, I recommend that if one makes photocopies of these, that they leave the back blank for special notes). This gives twice as much space for recording the vital data.

I am enclosing two samples, with this Journal, showing only Paternal and Maternal lines on one sheet. However, my original charts are 5 generations one side, for Mother, with gens.6 & 7 on the other side; likewise for father. Since this kind of a chart has never been published before, and I cannot produce them in quantity for sale, I will, as a "public service", send 2 maternal and 2 paternal charts to those who request it. Please provide a LONG stamped self-addressed envelope, and an extra stamp (or two), or a small donation which will help to defray printing and handling costs. Remember, all your officers are volunteers who use their own funds for gas and other expenses in trying to serve the purposes of genealogical help for members and friends of our "Mutual Admiration Society." Then you can photo copy as many copies as you need for your own use, locally. If any publishing house wants to copy this "design", that's okay with me. Our Society does not have the funds nor facilities to become a publishing house!

At this point, I want^tlet you know how thankful we are, and deeply grateful for, the services John Mattes, owner of the J.& J. Printers "snug as a bug-in-a-rug" in his little quonset hut out at 1002 North West Street, just off Walnut. His phone is 243-4731 in case you want to ask about prices for printing any family history at a reasonable price. After printing the 40 pages of our quarterly he permits us to collate the 500 quarterlies using his facilities. Then he carries them to the postoffice for "us ladies" whose backs will not permit carrying the heavy load which has to be sorted and placed ever so carefully in two postoffice mail bags for bulk rate mail. I am so grateful to "our Lucille Trawford" who so faithfully keeps the mailing list of our 450 members around the world, and who hand-addresses all of those quarterly back covers. Jane Coble is one of the fastest collaters you ever saw, with Helen Sayre following right behind her. Thanks a million, girls!

Now your part, dear reader, is to send us your 1981 dues to us immediately before you forget - so that when we are ready for the next mailing your name will
be on the back cover of our Bulk-rate mail at about 6 cents, instead of on a Third
Class cover @ 48 cents per Journal. If you fail to send us your change of address,
we are out another 63 cents for its return, plus 48 cents for remailing it--a total

Page 1: THE MORGAN COUNTY COURTHOUSE - - SEAT OF COUNTY GOVERNMENT, AND JUSTICE.

While the Courthouse is not included in the Jacksonville Historic District, The President of the Historic Sites Committee, John Power, has filed the papers with the Illinois Department of Conservation nominating this Seat of Justice as a candidate for the National Register of Historic Places. It is appropriate to tell of some of its 112-year history in this quarterly. Your Editor has long admired the picture in the 1872 "Atlas of Morgan County, Illinois", and has placed it on the cover for all to see.

This third Morgan County Courthouse building (actually the 5th legal site of County business) and the 5th State Capitol building of Illinois were authorized to be constructed in the same year - after the Civil War, and in preparation for celebrating the 50th anniversary of Illinois Statehood -- 1818-1868.

There are 3 dates in that year that institutes cause for recognition state wide: 1. April 18 (of 1818) when the Illinois Territorial Bill was passed; 2. August 26, 1818 when the adoption and official signing of the first Illinois Constitution legalized statehood; and 3. December 3, 1818 when President Monroe signed the Statehood Bill confirming that Illinois was the 21st state admitted to the Sisterhood of States.

The 21st star, however, did not go on the National Flag until the next July 4th, 1819, according to the 3rd National Flag Law passed on April 18, 1818, the same day the Illinois Territorial Bill was passed in Congress. For more details on flag history as it pertains to the 50 States, see article in this quarterly pertaining to Admission of States to the Union.

January 31, 1823 started Morgan as an official County, but it also contained Cass and Scott Counties up to 1837 and 1839, respectively. The details of organization and county establishment are adequately related in the 1878 "History of Morgan County, Illinois" by Donnelley, Loyd & Co., Publishers. [We still have a few copies of this Unigraphic Reprint for sale @ \$25.00 plus \$1.50 postage.] The county development is well told in this book pp. 252-266, along with a list of County Officers from 1823-1877.


The first <u>legal</u> site of court business started "on the 3rd Monday in March 1823, when an election was held at the house of James G. Swinerton" about 6 miles southwest of the present city of Jacksonville. The second site of legal business acitivities was at a place called "Olmstead's Mounds", 2 miles further west. The third site was on the northwest corner of the Jacksonville Square which was laid out March 10, 1825. A two-story frame courthouse was built, 30 x 40 feet square, and placed on round blocks. It cost about \$450. In the summer of 1825 the few records of the County were brought from Olmstead's Mound. On the night of December 6, 1827, this building and all its contents was destroyed by fire, except the Deed Record Book which Dennis Rockwell, Recorder, had taken to his house to work on.

On March 22, 1828, at a special meeting of the 3 County Commissioners a new Courthouse was planned, of brick, 50 feet x 40 feet wide, two story, with an observational tower on top from which one could look out the windows in all 4 directions. The Courthouse was accepted Sept. 8, 1830, total cost being about \$4,000.00. This building remained in use until it was superseded by the present commodius structure of Joliet limestone (5th site, 3rd courthouse) completed in 1868, 50th anniversary of Illinois Statehood.

It was said of this beautiful building "its towers rising above a monumental masonry block, the Morgan County Court House peers over Jacksonville and the fertile prairie surrounding the city of Jacksonville and boldly announces itself as the seat of county government and justice."

The readers of our Society's Quarterlies will probably remember reading "your Editor is looking for Justice in Morgan County." The 8-foot solid pine wood carving of a gilded Justice, complete with Sword and Scales, can be seen in the early pictures of the courthouse, as in the cover picture, from our 1872 Atlas.

The postcard pictured here, loaned to us by Margaret Allen, indicates Justice to be minus both sword and scales, not surprising considering the many tornadic winds that come this way each spring. Note also that the fence around the yard is gone. This iron grill work was removed, and now graces the front part of Jacksonville East Cemetery along Myrtle Street.

This picture, ca 1903, indicates that Drexel building site was vacant - probably construction started. We are trying to pinpoint a date when remodeling was accomplished.

At a later date, maybe 1926, the Mansard roofs of the two front towers, originally of polychromed slate, were replaced with asphalt shingles, and some of the bulls-eye windows and ornamentation and cresting atop the tower roofs were removed, or covered over.

At this time Justice was probably removed, and the dome and pedestal altered to its present construction as the new red roofing was installed.

It was in 1926 when the public's gallery was removed from the Courtroom, 2nd floor, and the large high-ceilinged room remodeled to its present interior, whereby the Judge's Bench is in the South in-

stead of the North. Your Editor has been looking in every nook and cranny of the building from basement to top hoping to find the remnants of Justice. There is only one more exciting place to look — in a closed room built in the East Tower, which evidently was a cloak-room off the public gallery. When the gallery was removed and the space made into the east wall of the courtroom, it left this room completely enclosed on all 4 sides, as our architects found when your Editor was helping them to find the 1926 remodeling plat maps "up in the attic" while preparing the jail site plans last Spring.

Several of "us avid historians", including John Power and Bob Dalton, are considering taking an electric drill up through a crawl space in the ceiling of the men's rest room (where the stairs used to be), to drill 2 holes - one for putting a flashlight into, and the other for eyeing the enclosure.

Maybe - just maybe - the remains of Justice, which was originally carved by two men who carved ship's heads at Mistic Seaport in the 1860's, may have been put in this room locked in for posterity ? ??

This would be the historic thrill of a lifetime - to find Justice still IS in Morgan County!

The history of our past is the molding of our present, and the making of our future.

Page 1: THE OLD MASSEY LANE CEMETERY, Burial Place of "Father" Jordan and Wife.

James Jordan, Private in the Revolutionary War, died July 9, 1835. He was buried in the Massey Lane Cemetery, which was located at the southwest corner of the intersection of Mound Road and Massey Lane in Jacksonville. Some historians have called him "Father John Jordan". That seems to be untrue. His name was James, and he had a son named John. Ensley Moore, a member of the Illinois State Historical Society and an affluent writer, had the following article in the Jacksonville Daily Journal November 16, 1916.

James Jordan was three things: a Christian, a patriot and a Methodist. This James Jordan was known as "Father Jordan," because of his early settlement, and of his relation to the Methodist church of Jacksonville, as it was in his log house, standing where Passavant Hospital now is, on East State street, that the first Methodist church of this place was organized.

[At this point he describes his accompanying sketch which is impossible for us to duplicate from the microfilm version.]

In their historical accounts of the region, both Chas. M. Eames and Dr. W. F. Short refer to Mr. Jordan as John. That was not his name, it was JAMES Jordan. Mr. James Jordan was born Nov. 15, 1755, and Mary, his wife, was born March 30, 1756. They presumably came from Virginia to South Carolina, for the first definite record of the family is at Union, S.C., about 80 miles from Charleston, where their son John R. is known to have been born. From the Palmetto state the Jordans came to Golconda, Pope county, Illinois, where they remained a short time, and then went to near St. Charles, Mo. The family came from there to Jacksonville in 1822.

Mr. and Mrs. Jordan were the parents of Jane, born 1784(?); Jas. M., born 1785; Mary, 1787; Sarah, 1790; Catharine, 1793; John R. 1794; Elizabeth, 1797, and William Scott Jordan, 1803.

Father James Jordan died July 9, 1835, and Mary, his wife, died May 2, 1832. Mr. Jordan served in the Revolutionary War, as his pension certificate, dated May 19, 1835, and signed by C. A. Harris, acting Sec. of War, shows. This document is now possessed by W. H. Jordan, grandson of "Father Jordan", generally known as "Tip" Jordan.

Father Jordan had a double log cabin on the Hardin-Passavant Lot, as his residence here in 1822, and in it, Eames says: "The statement is undisputed that the first Morgan county church was organized in 1822 by a few persons who held their meetings for worship in this famous large log cabin of 'Father' Jordan."

"Uncle" Johnnie Jordan, as he was familiarly called, was born in South Carolina, as above stated, and came west with his parents. During the time they lived in Missouri the War of 1812 came on, and the Indians became very troublesome and dangerous, so Mr. Jordan, then a youth, enlisted in a company under Daniel Boone, the great Kentuckian, who had come to live in Missouri. They served under a Gen. Howard, and crossed into Illinois and built a fort at Peoria. They then returned to Missouri and built a fort on Buffalo Creek, near the present town of Louisiana - now defended by the residence there of Champ Clark. During this war an uncle and cousin of Mr. Jordan, both civilians, were killed by the Indians. Mr. Jordan became sick, owing to the hardships and exposures, and did not re-enlist at the end of his term. Shortly after, his company

up the Mississippi, and were fired upon by British, where Quincy now is, Mr. Jordan's brother being killed. After the war Mr. Jordan moved back to Buffalo Creek and returned to farming, which has been the family pursuit.

Mr. [John R.] Jordan was 3 times married, and was the father of Richard T., James M., Helen S., (Mrs. Pickens and Mrs. Knox), and Wm. F., who died in infancy. James M. Pickens was a son of Helen S.

John R. Jordan lived at his house on North West Street, opposite the old City Mill where the Creamery now is, from 1838 until his death in 1887, at which time he was 93 years of age. [In Jacksonville East Lot 18 row B-4west side.]

William Scott Jordan, third son, and youngest child of "Father" Jordan, was born in St. Clair county, Illinois, near the old Shilph church, the first place of regular Methodist preaching in Illinois, May 10, 1803. He came to this place with his father in 1822, to the Hardin Lot.

W. S. Jordan was married Nov. 2, 1830, to Miss Eliza Hill, who was born in Philadelphia, Pa., Jan. 18, 1807. They were the parents of James, Robert, John Fletcher, Mary F., Henry B(?), William Harrison, Sarah Jane, Eliza Ellen, George Hardin and Charles Watson Jordan.

John Fletcher married Cynthia A. Williamson; James married Emeling Frances Falconer, Henry Bascom married Mary Alice Bridgman. He enlisted in the 115th Reg't. Ill. Vols., and died in a hospital at Nashville, Tenn., March 5, 1863. Thomas A. Craig married Eliza Ellen Jordan.

Wm. Harrison Jordan married Mary Grund, of Beardstown; George Hardin Jordan married Elizabeth Angel; Edmund Blackburn married Sarah Jane Jordan; and Charles Watson Jordan married Mary Brownell. Robert and Mary Jordan died young.

William Scott Jordan died Nov. 17, 1878, and Eliza (Hill) Jordan, his wife, died August 26, 1890. W.S.Jordan served in the Black Hawk War, as his father had done in the conflict of 1775-1781.

Six grandsons of "Father" Jordan served in the Civil War: Richard, son of John R., in an Oregon regiment; Henry B. who gave his life in the 115th Illinois; Wm. Harrison in Co. G., First Mo. Cav; and George Hardin in the 145th Ill. Besides these, two Thomas boys went from Rock River, Illinois. Surely this record of the family in four wars ought to attest its patriotism and self sacrifice.

Mrs. Wm. S. Jordan was a great church man, serving 42 years as Superintendent of a Sabbath school. He was also a member of the first "class" formed in the Methodist church of Jacksonville. [This church is now known as the Centenary Methodist Church, on East State Street.]

Away back yonder the Jordans were, some at least, Democrats. Some were Whigs. But all who survived became Republicans, and they took interest in politics as they had in the church.

The Wm. Scott Jordan family mostly lived north of Jacksonville, in the Ebenezer neighborhood. [He, his wife, and many other Jordans are buried there.]

In cholera times Wm. S. and John R. were undismayed, and in the early visit of that terrible scourge they went out among the suffering and took care of them when many fled from the danger. Wm. S. also, notably, took care of a virulent and fatal case of erysipelas, well known of in his neighborhood. The Jordans were of value to the communities in which they were placed.

Among the best known of the present generation of this family is William Harrison Jordan. He has had much to do in Republican party matters, and has carried the standard of the party in this county. He is a genial and attractive man, and as stated above, he has served his country on the tented field. He endured the severities of "critter soldier" service in South West Missouri, until he was disabled, in the line of service, and had to come home, being a sufferer to a greater or less extent ever since. He is getting along toward the Sunset Land, but his face is bright, his voice cheery, and he is following The Great Leader, as his people have done for so long.

AN UNMARKED GRAVE. There used to be a country burying-ground, out at the corner of the Mound Road and what is known as "Lover's Lane" - at the southwest corner. There "Father" James Jordan, and his wife were laid, and there their dust

lies, unmarked and unknown as to location, until the last Great Day.

Another Article in some newspaper of 17 February 1899 gives us a little more insight into the Massey Lane Cemetery. This was a letter to the "Editor Journal" by C. B. Barton, which evidently referred to an earlier letter of controversy between Dr. Prince and a Mrs. Vail, daughter of "Mother" Carson, a well-known figure in Jacksonville's early days.

. . . An instance in her life [of Mother Carson] illustrates the qualities of her mind and heart. In 1860 and on I was acquainted with a minister then preaching in Shipman, Macoupin county. He inquired of me about his brother, Dr. Sayer, if I knew where he was buried.

I told him he died before there was any public burying ground here and was probably buried on the Mound road, where interments were mostly made at that time. He afterward told me he had been to Jacksonville to find his brother's grave. He said "I inquired for some old citizen who would most probably know where it was, and was directed to John Henry. He went with me to the cluster of graves on the Mound road, but could not identify my brother's. But said there was a woman down town that could do it if any body could. So he drove me back to town and found Mother Carson who said she could show me just where he was buried.

"Mr. Henry took her into his conveyance with us and returned to the place where the remains were deposited. We opened a gap in the rail fence, and passed through. She went direct without hesitation or examination to the spot distinguished by no other marks than what time had wrought. I procured the help of an undertaker and beneath that sod we found the remains of my brother and took them to the East cemetery for re-interment."

This incident shows that Mrs. Carson had an intimate friendship with one of the best men of the town, too strong for death to sunder; and a mind of clear observation, which connected with such a heart must have treasured up much that was profitable to others. She had a large experience in the service she rendered and that experience in the early days was unquestionably sought for by the learned men. . . [How sad that we do not have Mother Carson around now to tell us who the rest of the early settlers were that had burials there. I wonder, since Isaac Fort Roe's body was removed from some unnamed place, to an honored spot in Diamond Grove, if the Massey Lane Cemetery was not his first abode. F.H.]

NANCY MATTINGLY, A BRAVE PIONEER WOMAN By Myra N. Martin

Nancy Mattingly, a native of Washington County, Kentucky, was left a widow with 520 children. She later married Reuben Bird, and in the fall of 1824 they came to Morgan County, Illinois settling on Government land. Mr. Bird died in 1826 and Nancy was left with four children.

Mrs. Bird at once set to work at her loom to save sufficient money, aside from that required in the support of her family, to pay the indebtedness on the Government land on which she lived. Many of the old settlers can testify to her deftness and celerity in weaving, and in less than a year, she had \$70 in cash stowed away in a teapot which was placed on a high shelf in the cabin. Nearly all the land in that vicinity of Arcadia was then entered. [Her claim was in Section 9 Township 16 North Range 10 West Third Principal Meridian.] Mrs. Bird was so highly respected that she was allowed to hold a squatter's claim. In the fall of 1827, however, prospectors desirous of securing lands, informed her that they had selected the tract on which she lived. After they refused to come to terms for the improvements made on the place, and resisted her many entreaties not to disturb her, she informed them that but \$30 yet remained of the sum required to clear the tract, and they agreed to allow her one more day to secure that amount.

It was then late in the evening, and it was a difficult matter to borrow money on short notice. The case seemed hopeless, particularly, as, even if successful in securing the money, a quick trip must be made to the Springfield Land District office to perfect the deed transaction. Mrs. Bird, however, was not discouraged. She had an arduous journey before her and dark clouds covered the sky, but she set about her preparations with determination. Telling her son, Shelton, who was 10 years old, to bring "Old Black" she hurriedly made her preparations for the trip. "Old Black" was a noble animal, being nearly 18 hands high, and very muscular. After the darkness of night settled down, Mrs. Bird, riding her faithful steed, started for the head of Indian Creek, a distance of 12 miles, to borrow the required \$30 from a friend. Although it rained continuously, she succeeded in reaching the point without mishap and obtained the money.

Early next morning, she started for Springfield on "Old Black". The roads were very heavy, but noon found her at Spring Creek, 3 miles west of Springfield. The storm of the previous night had swollen the stream and washed away the bridge, leaving but one stringer. Nothing daunted, Mrs. Bird took the bridle rein, intending to walk over on the only remaining piece of timber and let "Old Black" swim across. Instead of swimming, however, the horse walked on the same timber, both performing the feat in safety. Soon afterward Mrs. Bird arrived at the Land Office, and on counting over the money a counterfeit dollar was found! Mrs. Bird borrowed a dollar from Mr. Enos, the Receiver, to make up the deficit. After partaking of his hospitality - which was very limited, as the whole family cooked, worked and slept in the same room - started for home. As she was leaving the Land Office she noticed the man coming in who planned to file on her land.

Mrs. Bird lived to see her children grown up and comfortably situated, and to do many acts of kindness and benevolence, not only for her own family, but for her neighbors. She died in 1856, universally beloved and lamented, at the age of 73 years.

Shelton J. Mattingly, her son, lived on the same old farm, and as of the biography written for 1872 Atlas of Morgan County, p.55, he had lived on the same farm 48 years. A view of his farmstead is shown on p. 120.

Page 1: THE OLD SETTLERS" ASSOCIATION OF MORGAN, CASS AND SCOTT COUNTIES, ILLINOIS. From History of Morgan County, Illinois, Chicago: Donnelley, Loyd & Co. Publishers, 1878, pages 319-330

The following history of the Association, with its list of members, was prepared by the Secretary, Mr. Timothy Chamberlain. The society is one of the best organized in the Western States. Mr. Chamberlain has taken great pains in keeping the records of its meetings, and the list of its members, in an exceedingly neat and systematic manner in a book prepared by him expressly for this purpose:

[Does ANYone know where this Minute Book may now (1980) be located? Wouldn't this be a great historical find? Ed.]

At a Fourth of July celebration at Arcadia in 1869, there were found to be a large number of the early settlers of the county, and the conversation naturally turning to things and events of the past, and a desire having been expressed by many of the aged persons present to meet their friends of early days, it was decided among them that a call should be issued in the papers, and all invited to be present at a picnic.

The following appeared in the JACKSONVILLE JOURNAL of September 2, 1869:

OLD SETTLERS' MEETING. -- A meeting of the old settlers of Morgan County will be held at Arcadia, Thursday, September 9th, in D.G. Henderson's grove, at which time Judge William Thomas, J.T. Jones, and M.P. Ayres will speak. Other speakers are expected, and without doubt the picnic, for such it is to be, will be an occasion of great interest. It is desired that all those, residing in the territory, which in 1830 was embraced in Morgan County, should be present and participate in the exercises. Old settlers are particularly invited.

The first regular meeting of the old settlers of Morgan, Cass and Scott was held in the grove near Arcadia, on Thursday, September 9th, 1869. Pioneers from all parts of these counties were on hand at an early hour. The exercises were opened with prayer by Rev. Joel Goodrick. Hon. Joseph Morton, Capt. Yaples, Judge Whitlake, Bradley Thompson, M.P.Ayres, and others, made remarks appropriate to the occasion. A letter was read from Judge William Thomas, apologizing for and explaining his absence. Mr. Charles Cox was First Marshal of the day, and Mr. John M. Wilson assistant. Dr. John Craig was Secretary. Not less than 500 persons were present. An ode was sung, composed by Major George M. McConnell, of Jacksonville. The following resolution, offered by Mr. M. P. Ayres, was unanimously adopted:

"Resolved, That we cherish tenderly the recollection of the names of our honored dead, the early pioneers of our county, and we realize that though dead, yet through their works they still speak, and we trust we may imitate their virtues, and show by our works our appreciation of the toils and trials endured in our behalf."

It was intended that a resular association should be organized, so that hereafter annual meetings might be held, and every valuable act concerning the history of the county be preserved. However, the time was so fully occupied with other matters, that such an organization could not be effected, and a meeting was called for August 25, 1870, which met in Henderson's grove, near Arcadia, and after listening to speeches from Hon. Newton Cloud, Rev. N. P. Heath, Major G. M. McConnel, senator Richard Yates, and others, a society was organized. A constitution was presented and read by Judge Wm. Thomas, and after being slightly amended, was adopted. According to its previsions all can become members who were in this region previous to the deep snow of 1830 and 1831.

An ode was sung, composed by Mrs. J.R. Bailey, entitled the "Pioneer," tune of "E. Pluribus Unum." Some slight amendments have since been made to the constitution, one of which admits embers to the society who settled here previous to 1840.

The present officers of the society are: [1878] president, Wm. Thomas; vice-presidents, Elliott Stevenson, Wm. Lindsey, and Jesse Henry; secretary, Timothy Chamberlain; treasurer, John Robertson; chaplain, Rev. Wm. Gallaher; marshal, Charles Sample; finance committee, Bazzill Davenport, John A. Wright, John Tureman; executive committee, Huram Reeve, John Bergen, Joseph Morton, Keeling Berry, Samuel Brockman.

There is no charge made, and all who have been in the limits of old Morgan previous to 1840, have frequently been invited to sign the constitution, or send their names to the secretary. Yet there are a great many persons who have neglected to attend to this matter, and their names therefore do not appear in the following list of members:

DO YOU HAVE ANY TOMBSTONE, BIBLE, OR FAMILY READINGS TO SEND US FOR ARCADIA CEMETERY? Please send them, if you do. We have tried for at least 4 years to get someone to read this large cemetery. Doris Wankel and her daughter Kay Patterson have very kindly sent us a part of it that they read. We need the material for several families who are working on their history. Myra Martin and Reuben Bates have worked on some of it this fall.

We are indebted to the efforts of Mr. and Mrs. Merril Stewart and Mr. & Mrs. Darrell Stewart, of Waverly, for cleaning off the north part of the Arcadia cemetery where they uncovered several buried tombstones of their ancestors, and for then restoring the Henderson-McFadden Cemetery a little further east from there. Our Morgan County Cemetery Advisory Board has had tremendous influence in getting groups, or persons, interested in restoring the older abandoned burial grounds of their ancestors. As most of my readers know, I published all of the legal knowhow of organizing Cemetery Associations in our September 1980 Quarterly.

Member Cauthen has sent us several items on early families in Jacksonville, in cluding newspapers, one of which gives M.F.Dunlap's history upon retirement from the Ayres Bank. There are early pictures of some individuals identified, some not. He found these at an auction in Florida. One of the newspapers contains the entire speech of Wm. Jennings Bryan. One of the reasons Bryan attended Illinois College was because some of these people were his relatives.

We are grateful to our member Reta Martin Borg, 3129 S. 5th, Springfield Il. for acquiring this reading of Ebenezer, or Martin's Prairie, Cemetery from the files of Margaret L. Spencer Admire and typing it for use in our Quarterly. We always welcome readings made in earlier days, from family members, as some of the stones readable then, are not now present, or are weathered so badly as to be illegible.

Next, we will present research by Bob Dalton on the Spencer family members who were known to be buried in this same cemetery, in view of the fact that we have several Spencer family researchers. Let it be here known that there are many Spencers in Greene County who were probably not related.

Page 5: Continuation of Ebenezer (Martin's Prairie) Cemetery.

To the Margaret Admire cemetery reading we wish to add this important Spencer research which was contributed to our Society by Robert Dalton, 27 February 1970.

Also known as Martin's Prairie Cemetery, Ebenezer is in the eastern part of the Roodhouse Township. To reach this well-kept rural cemetery, drive east from Roodhouse on County Road 2 for about five miles. At a church building, turn north for about one and one-fourth miles. The cemetery, containing an acre or more of ground, is on the east side of a curve in the road. There are many burials here, and the cemetery is used for current interments. Its location is in Section 12, Township 12 North, Range 11 West, Third Principal Meridian, Greene County, Illinois. SMITH, John, a veteran, was born 19 Nov 1816, and died 4 Feb 1879. No marker -

from family records. An inquirer for this grave was Mrs. Hal Lovelace, 643 Fairmont Place, Hillsboro IL 62049. John is listed in the IVC Honor Roll as Civ Pvt Army, Co. E 101 Ill Inf, d. 4 Feb 1879.

SMITH, Deniza b. 7 Oct 1817 - no death date

SPENCER, Elisha d. 10 Nov 1883, age 100. Listed in IVC Honor Roll as being in the Mexican War. Dalton related: Much information is available about Elisha Spencer, much of it conflicting. Although his tombstone shows him to be aged 100 years, it is true that he was careless with what age he gave at any time. On August 9, 1877 he said in a sworn statement that he was 91 years of age. A lengthy search has failed to show the names of his parents. He married Nancy Hupp August 1811 in Harrison Co., Ind. In 1819 they moved to Lawrence Co., Ill., and in 1826 moved to Greene County. In 1855 he married Mrs. Margaret (Morton) Depew at Athensville. In a sworn statement in 1871 he claimed her name was Margaret Redmon, but in 1877 he swore her name was Margaret Depew. He made claims for a pension for serving in Capt. Stephen Spencer's company at the Battle of Tippacanoe, Indiana. However, the pension was rejected as Elisha's name didn't appear on the muster rolls of that company. He also swore that he served in Capt. Thomas Berry's company in the War of 1812 and was honorably discharged June 1811 as a second bugler, but his name wasn't on the muster rolls of that company. Elisha was a member of the Richwoods Baptist Church (also known as Eastern United) for the last 20 years of his life. For more information about this man check the index files at the White Hall Library, or write to the Military Service Records (NNCC), National Archives (GSA), Washington, DC 20408. SPENCER, Nancy d. 4 Jan 1855 age 80ys, wife Elisha Spencer. She was born in Kentucky. On her marriage record in Harrison Co. In., James Hupp swore that Nancy was of lawful age. Her children were James R., Ellen (Mrs. Andrew Downs), Sarah (Mrs. Martin Smith), Major, William, Elijah and Polly Spencer.

SPENCER, Major b. 22 June 1824 died 22 May 1897. He was born in Lawrence Co. III. For biography see page 599 "History of Morgan County, Illinois" 1878. Children of Major and Nancy J. (Duncan) Spencer were Lucy A., Elizabeth T., Sarah

J., Henry M., Infant, Major L., Greenup, Maria O. and Philip F.

SPENCER, Nancy J. b. 29 Jan 1828 d. 3 June 1901, wife Major Spencer. They were married 20 Feb 1844. She was daughter of Greenup and Tomison Duncan.

SPENCER, John 1837-1923, was a son of William and Parthenia (Totten) Spencer. Wm. was a brother of Elisha Spencer. See pages 117 and 118 "History of Greene and Jersey Counties, Illinois" 1885. His wife was Margaret Ann(Baines) 1842-1898.

TYPES OF RECORDS THAT CAN BE ORDERED WITH THIS FORM

PENSION APPLICATION FILES based on United States (not State) service before World War I. Pension or bounty-land warrant application files usually include an official statement of the veteran's military or naval service, as well as information of a personal nature. Pensions based on military service for the Confederate States of America were authorized by some Southern States but not by the Federal Government until 1959. Inquiries about State pensions should be addressed to the State archives or equivalent agency at the capital of the veteran's State of residence after the war.

BOUNTY-LAND WARRANT APPLICATION FILES based on United States (not State) service before 1856. In addition to service, data, these files usually give the veteran's age and place of residence at the time the application was made.

States Army (officers who served before June 30, 1917; enlisted men who served before October 31, 1912); Navy (officers and enlisted men who served before 1896); and Confederate armed forces (1861-65). We cannot provide photocopies of files for veterans whose service terminated less than 75 years ago; however, we are usually able to provide certain information from the files. Military service records rarely contain family information. The record of an individual's service in any one organization is entirely separate from the record of the service in another organization. We are ordinarily unable to accurately establish the identity of individuals of the same name who served in different organizations. If you know that an individual served in more than one organization and you desire copies of the military service record, submit a separate form for the service record in each organization.

When we indicate that we have numerous files for veterans of the same name given, we suggest that you visit the National Archives and examine the various files, or hire a professional researcher to examine the file for you. As a matter of policy, the National Archives does not perform research for individuals; therefore, we are unable to make a file-by-file check to see if the information in the numerous files matches the information you have provided.

TABLE OF ADMISSION OF STATES TO THE UNION, AND AUTHORIZED FLAGS OF THE UNITED STATES. By Mrs. Florence Hutchison, Vexillologist.

After spending over 20 years in Flag History research, and as a lecturer on the flags of the United States to schools and men's and women's organizations on many occasions, and at the annual meetings of the North American Vexillological* Association, Mrs. Hutchison is now devoting time and energy to convincing genealogists that they should consider flag history and heraldry as an integral part of their family history research. Flags have played an important part in the life of every man or woman who ever came to U.S. soil. All immigrants "came over" on a ship that was protected by and sailing under the national flag of their ruling monarch or governmental power, both at the Port of Embarkation, and the Port of Entry on what was foreign soil to them. What flag was present on that new land to greet and protect them until they could apply for Naturalization papers and denounce their allegiance to the European power?

If a genealogist knew the date of arrival in the U.S., then from this "Table of Admission of States to the Union", they could determine under what flag they pioneered in a new country. The colonists of the various nations - English, Dutch, French, Spanish, Swedish, and others, came under a strange new flag of 13 stars and stripes as of July 4, 1776. The number of stars changed by law as the states grew in number because our ancestors pushed ever inward from East to West on this continent. Our pioneers created new lands and many more inhabitants on the soil they tilled, until a populated area desired law, order, protection and statehood.

Hence, this form is presented here so that our family historians who may find old flags among their possessions, handmade by loving hands of long ago, will know which state the various star clusters represents. Many flag enthusiasts made a flag to put up over their town or state capitol on "Flaghood Day", even though it might not be the legal flag authorized by national law. Sometimes 2 or more states came into the July 4th celebration at the same time. The National Flag reflected the entrance of all of the states, and not the individual ones — because of the costs of producing so many flags, in the first place.

There is a difference, then, between a legal national flag and a flag of stars and stripes created by citizens of a given state. We might call the latter "the first legal state flag," because it reflected the order of Ratification, or Admission to the Union, and was the first flag created in its honor of joining the sisterhood of States. At a much later period of time, goaded much by the Daughters of the American Revolution, Governors or Secretaries of State had laws passed which created what was then called the legal State Flag. Its design usually portrayed the Great Seal or other designs which reflected some peculiar quality or product of the particular state for which it was created. Many of the state flags incorporated the number of stars as represented their order of admission into the Union.

Wouldn't it be great if we could persuade some flag printing or stamp company to produce a set of authentic foreign and U.S. flags, stamp-size, so that we could past them into our family history books and see at a glance which period or periods of history our ancestors lived in as regarded their state of citizenship?

^{*} Vexillology is the scientific, scholarly and educational study of flag history and symbolism. The word "vexil" means flag.

On the chart, the first number will be the States Order of Ratification of the Constitution of the United States, as it applies to the First Thirteen, and order of admission by law of the succeeding states.

The Flag Law of 1818 set the pattern for all flags to come. The star was to be added for State(s) the first Fourth of July following signing of the Statehood Bill by the President of the United States.


