



Cemetery work planned in Franklin

Restoration of monuments and stones in the old section of Franklin Cemetery will begin in June.

Ravaged by vandals and weather, many monuments will need resetting and foundations rebuilt. Cost of the restoration of damaged stones will be high and the cemetery board is making an appeal for assistance from people with ancestors buried in the old section, as well as those interested in the project.

Contributions should be made to the Franklin Bank or be given to any member of the board. Checks should be made to the Franklin Cemetery Restoration Fund. All money received will be used solely for restoring the

damaged stones in the old section.

Current board members are Leroy Sweet, president; Nancy Wood, secretary-treasurer; William Rees Sr., John Roach, Wayne Rolston and Harvey Smith.

On Oct. 18, 1831, John W. Burch and his wife, Peggy, conveyed a piece of land, 23 rods by 13 rods, between the old burying ground on the west and Reinbach Street on the east to the trustees of Franklin Methodist

A log cabin first stood on this ground, and about 1840, a brick church was built near the south side of the lot. This church was destroyed in 1860 by a storm, with the members then erecting a church on the north side of Franklin Village Park where the new church now

On Aug. 18, 1908, the Franklin Cemetery Association was incorporated under the general cemetery act of

Lewis Roberts, president; M.B. Keplinger, secretary-treasurer; J.P. Woods, John Votsmier, A.J. Tranbarger and Fred Burch were elected the first trustees and officers.

This first board secured title to the old cemetery and purchased an additional 5.129 acres from Alexander Van Winkle, J.M. Hart and W.J. Wyatt. The entire cemetery was surveyed and platted by John L. Smetters under the supervision of Charles W. Brown, civil engineer from Jacksonville. The cemetery was mowed free of charge to lot owners once a year in the month of May. Any lot owner could have this lot mowed during the rest of the year for \$2.

Perpetual care was provided by the association for any lot owner who invested \$100, with the income from

the investment used for that purpose.

Today, the cemetery is mowed each month, from April through September. Cost of perpetual care has tripled. Several lot owners continue to pay yearly for grave maintenance. Income from perpetual care, grave opening fees, sale of grave spaces and donations from caring people keep the association solvent, but expenses above noremal operation of the cemetery must now come from other sources.

Dear Geneal Members and Friends: Did you know that every person now living under the United States 50-star flag was born 200 years ago on May 25, 1787?

That day and the succeeding days to September 17, 1787 were the most important days of your early life! It makes no difference as to the origin of your ancestors in reference to race, color, creed, religion, wealthy land owner, indentured servant, slave, office holder, judge, farmer, or any other occupation. It makes no difference whether your ancestors were born in our United States, or came more recently to our country. All of these are quite dependent on the deliberations that transpired between the delegates of 12 states from May 25, 1787 to the finalization of a constitution on September 17, 1787. As Ben Franklin is quoted, "We have set up a Republic . . ." There was a question as to whether it would rise or fall.

But 200 years later it is a thriving republic filled with our collective ancestors from all parts of our earthly globe. Had it not been for this drafting of our Constitution you may never have realized personhood on this planet. For it was your ancestors, and mine, who flocked to a country where freedom of various natures was supposed to be secured. It was a marriage meeting ground for men and women who would otherwise never have met!

Too many of these rainbowed family members have not realized it was their responsibility also to help this Republic, with its many and ever-growing problems, to keep it a haven of freedom's refuge for their descendants. After 200 years it still depends upon our citizens as to whether this Republic shall rise or fall in the ages yet to come. Let's not let Ben Franklin and George Washington down in this respect!

As a result of that birthday 200 years ago, we set up an organization in 1972 to assist interested persons to search for their ancestral ties. In these 15 years of society-hood we have been quite successful, as it appears from the records. Of our 99 charter members, we still have 47. Our membership is probably over the 650 mark we have been quoting, now, but the figure of 40 states and Canada still holds. In this June quarterly we have listed, in our Fourth Directory of Membership for 1986-1987, 40 new members, many of whom have ordered some of our back issues of the quarterly.

Libraries are beginning to want our first issues 1972-1978, which are now out-ofprint, for permanent binding of all our issues to date.

Some of our past members have donated their quarterlies to local libraries, or friends or relatives who became interested in family researching in west central Illinois. One of our local members has donated her back issues to us so that we could fulfill the request of the St. Louis Library.

Every issue of our quarterlies has been filled with information not ordinarily available to the public, since much of the research came from remote storaged books, and unknown or unidentified cemeteries, etc. Therefore, when you have finished with them, will you please loan or donate them to some person or library who can, or will, make good use of them -- we hope.

Our own library is quickly expanding to its "upper rooms", in order to make more room for more currently used records in our small library room on the first floor at the corner of Morgan and Fayette. Mrs. Mary Frances Alkire is librarian volunteer. We wish to publicly thank those of our members who have made contributions to our "Library Fund", as having to pay \$150.00 per month, now instead of \$50.00, is going to present financial problems in our future. Our dues are too low, we know. But we feel it is important to maintain a rate to benefit those among us who are on low budgets, and to attract new members who say "but I already belong to a lot of societies".

They are persuaded then to join at the lower price in order to have their name, address and surnames being researched sent out in our monthly news items to about 7 newspapers in the area, and to have their names published in our quarterly's Directory of Membership. All new members who want to know who all are searching in our area should purchase our 1986 quarterlies @ \$10.00 per set, if they haven't already done so. Page 1: THE EVOLUTION OF THE FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES AS A NEW NATIONAL GOVERN-MENT DEVELOPED IN THE NORTH AMERICAN HEMISPHERE 1776-1960.

By Florence Hutchison, a vexillological lecturer on "The History of the Flags of the United States, and The Truth About Flagmaker Betsy Ross."

This historical article on the evolutionary procedures of statehood is written for the benefit of genealogical researchers so that they may better understand the progressions of their ancestors' migrations to new lands secured by treaty, and opened up to new settlers as they spread from East to West, from the Atlantic to the Pacific Ocean.

The map and flag illustrations were taken from The Flag of the United States:

Its History and Symbolism by James A. Moss, Colonel, United States Army (Retired),

published by The United States Flag Association, Washington D.C., second edition
1933, pages 6-12.

Col. Moss, a West Point graduate, veteran of three wars, and a noted military author was "Originator and President General of The United States Flag Association". His DEDICATION p. vii is as follows:

Since boyhood a soldier and having fought on the battlefields of three wars in defense of my own, my native land, I salute our youth of today, "Old Glory's" greatest glory, in whose hands will be the American of tomorrow, and I dedicate to them this book in the earnest hope that it will give to those who may read it a finer understanding, a deeper appreciation, of American ideals and institutions symbolized by the Flag [of the United States] which will inspire them with a determination to do their bit to leave America a greater and better America than they found.

Washington D.C., February 12, 1930. Colonel, U.S. Army (Retired)

It is in the numbers of stars in the flag of the United States that we can read the growth of our nation. As the nation grew in size by additional lands secured and given territorial then statehood rights, so have the stars in the flag increased in number, a star being added for each new State admitted into the Union.

Beginning as of a new flag law of April 18, 1818 Flaghood Day is the 4th of July following the Statehood Day, which can be a confusing factor to researchers. since the year-date is not always the same. The statehood day is usually referred to as "date of admission" to the United States legal governmental controls with state sovereignty. Flaghood day is when that state's star is officially added to the national flag with ceremonies in the new state capitol, in Washington D.C. and at Philadelphia, the site of the first national government, which always occurs the "Fourth of July following the date of admission."

At this point Mrs. Hutchison wants to clarify the common mistake of calling our national flag "The American Flag". There is no flag in our hemisphere entitled to that designation. There are about 38 national flags of equal importance in North and South America, including flags of several European nations flying over their territories and departments in our hemisphere.

Our national flag should <u>always</u> be referred to as "the flag of the United States", or the United Statesian flag, which is just as proper as Canadian, Brazilian, or Cuban flag designations. Won't you, our readers, take this revelation to heart and remember to call our beautiful stars and stripes by its rightful title?

While the first stars and stripes evolved in the latter part of May, 1776, and was in production and usage by the signing of the Declaration of Independence, it was not officially on the records of Continental Congress until June 14, 1777, with this entry:

The above is a facsimile of the original resolution passed by the Continental Congress, Saturday, June 14, 1777, adopting the Flag of the United States which had been in evidence for more than a year previously. The handwriting is that of Charles Thomson, Secretary of the Congress since its institution in 1774. Please note that the designation is "the Flag of the United States."



Above is a map indicating the claims of the thirteen United States after the Treaty of Paris was signed September 3, 1783, when our independence from Great Britain was finally acknowledged. By the end of 1783 the last British soldiers had left the country.

The State of Vermont was admitted into the Union March 4, 1791, with Kentucky entering the Union June 1, 1792. While flags with the appropriate number of stars, 14 and then 15, were undoubtedly flown to celebrate, history has lost sight of these unrecorded events. The Representatives of these two States in Congress wanted their States to be recognized on the national flag, so on January 13, 1794, Congress enacted the following law:

That from and after the first day of May, 1795, the Flag of the United States be fifteen stripes, alternate red and white; and that the union be fifteen stars, white, in a blue field.



The flag of fifteen stars and fifteen stripes was the national standard and ensign from 1795 to 1818, a total of twenty-three years. The valors of our ancestors in the War of 1812, who fought to preserve our nation, are well-known and will not be related here. "The Star Spangled Banner" written by Francis Scott Key the night of September 13-14, 1814 says it all:

And the rockets' red glare, the bombs bursting in air Gave proof through the night that our Flag was still there!

May no legislation by Congress ever be carried into law to change our national anthem from this descriptive song about an event that indeed preserved us a nation!

THE FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES FROM 1795 TO 1818 (23 YEARS)



In some Flags the stars were staggered, which traditionally became the Navy ensign. The national standards usually were arranged with the stars in square formation, when possible. Each star, or stars, addition required the ingenuity of the head of State responsible for the new design as states were added.

From the passage of the Act January 13, 1794 increasing the number of stars in the Flag to fifteen, until 1817, the following five States were admitted into the Union: Tennessee--June 1, 1796; Ohio--March 1, 1803; Louisiana--April 30, 1812; Indiana--December 11, 1816, and Mississippi--December 10, 1817.

These dates of statehood are important to ancestor-hunters, as it gives them the dates when state records and some of the earliest county land, marriage and probate records were started. By locating early county maps, one can determine in which parent county to search for their earliest records.

In order to give the five new States representation in the Flag, Congress on April 4, 1818, enacted the following law:

SECTION 1. That from and after the fourth day of July next, the Flag of the United States be thirteen horizontal stripes, alternate red and white;

that the union have twenty stars, white in a blue field.

SECTION 2. That on the admission of every State into the Union, one star be added to the union of the Flag; and that such addition shall take effect on the Fourth of July next succeeding admission.



The above is a map of the United States in 1818, when the stars in the national flag were increased to twenty. Following those five states, were Illinois--December 3, 1818; Alabama--December 14, 1819; Maine--March 15, 1820; Missouri--August 10, 1821; Arkansas--June 15, 1836; Michigan--January 26, 1837; Florida--March 3, 1845 and Texas--December 29, 1845.

In 1846 war with Mexico followed a dispute over the Texas boundary, with terms of peace being negotiated two years later, in 1848. Our flag then had 28 stars.




The above is a map of the United states at the beginning of the Mexican War. JAG&HS XV #2 June/1987 - 4 -

By the time Nicholas Trist, appointed by President James K. Polk, met with representatives of Mexico to sign the treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo on February 2, 1848, another state had been added to the Union which was Iowa--December 28, 1846.

This poses an interesting flag question. What flag was representing the United States at the signing? Did it have 28, or 29 stars? According to law, however, it should have been 28 stars since the 29th star did not go on the flag officially until July 4, 1847.

All of the Mexican War references agree on one topic: besides winning the entire Southwest for the United States, the Mexican War was a training ground for many young officers who later won distinction in the upcoming Civil War.



Your editor has a suggestion to make to family historians at this point. In compiling your family history, study the older history books for events that influenced what your ancestors did at any given period of time. The Goodwill Industries and many other establishments which gather and put up for sale these old books are good sources of illustrative historical materials with which to enhance your ancestral records and trails across the country. Library book sales are another source of from which to secure old history books at a cheap price.

Before the beginning of the Civil War five more states were added to the Union. They were Wisconsin--May 29, 1848; California--September 9, 1850; Minnesota--May 11 1858; Oregon--February 14, 1859, and Kansas January 29, 1861. Our historian whose book has provided the map and flag pictures said: "... when the Civil War started




the stars in the Flag numbered thirty—
four . . ." This is not an accurate state—
ment, because the 34th star for Kansas was
not officially added to the union until
July 4, 1861. Fort Sumter was fired upon
and surrendered by Major Anderson on April
14, 1861.


Because of the scarcity of materials and official flags no doubt many of the Union's officers continued carrying the flag of 33 stars in to battle with them for the first few years of the war, or until they were shot down or captured by the opposiing side.



The smaller map indicates the various cessions, annexations and territory gained for the United States prior to the Civil War. The larger map indicates how these acquisitions were divided in to new states and territories, and how wars and governmental laws affected the land that became settled by our ancestors. There were many trails established to the West by the ever on-going wagon trains.

This map from page 249 of Don Sharkey's school history book indicates how the trails wound their way "over hill and dale", many of them having been established during the gold rush years beginning in 1849.

During the Civil War two more states were added to the Union. West Virginia-June 20, 1863, and Nevada--October 31, 1864. General Robert E. Lee surrendered at Appomattox April 9, 1865, three months before the 36th star was added to our national flag on July 4, 1865. Therefore the flag displayed by the United States at the surrender had 35 stars in its union.

From the end of the Civil War to the outbreak of war with Spain April 9, 1898, nine more States were admitted into the Union. This indicates a tremendous increase in population and travels of our ancestors during this period of time. However, family historians now have the advantage of being able to read the census records which started in 1850 whereby they can locate their chosen family along with name of wife, children, their ages and state of birth.

A word of caution is given here pertaining to the 1850 census. If a person were aged 5 or more years, and the state is given as IA, that means Indiana, not Iowa since Iowa did not become a state until December 28, 1846. Also in reading the "sometimes poor" handwriting on the original census microfilm, Penn and Tenn can be mis-read by the transcribers and typists.

From the Civil War to the Spanish-American War eight more states were admitted to the Union, with the number of stars increasing by the same number. Nebraska--March 1, 1867 and Colorado--August 1, 1876 were the first two. But Colorado's 38th star was not added until all the 100th anniversary of the United States was over, because the 38th star became official July 4, 1877.

North Dakota--November 2, 1889 and Montana--November 8, 1889 were celebrated on July 4, 1890 by the 40-starred flag. No doubt each state capitol raised its own flag on that day. Has any history been written on this dual project? South Dakota also shared in the flag-raising since their statehood date was November 2, 1889.

Washington became a state on November 11, 1889, with Idaho joining July 3, 1890 in time to have five more stars added to the national flag on the same day--July 4, 1890, to become the 21st Flag of the United States.with its 43 stars.

AT BEGINNING OF SPANISH-AMERICAN WAR



From the surrender of Lee at Appomattox, April 9, 1865, to the declaration of war against Spain in 1898, nine more States were admitted into the Union: Nebraska, Colorado, North Dakota, South Dakota, Montana, Washington, Idaho, Wyoming, and Utah, making the number of stars in the Flag forty-five, arranged

in six horizontal rows, the odd numbered rows having eight stars each, and the even-numbered rows seven stars each.

Before the Spanish-American War began states added were Wyoming--July 10, 1890 and Utah--January 4, 1896 to create the 45-star flag flying from the masts of the ships involved in that war.


Should any of our genealogical researchers have had ancestors or collateral relatives in that war, then they can know what flag they proudly served under.

Oklahoma came in as the 46th state November 16, 1907, with New Mexico entering on January 6, 1912 followed by Arizona on February 14, of the same year to create the 48th star flag on July 4 1912. This flag served our nation and its military and naval forces for a total of 47 years.


The incoming of Alaska on January 3, 1959 created the 26th legal national flag of 49 stars on July 4, 1959.

But this flag had a short history since Hawaii entered the union on August 21, 1959 and created the 50-star flag on July 4, 1960.

Thus our 50 United States have had 27 national flags. Navy ensigns and jacks.

This old Day Book probably can be further identified on page 430 by this entry: On page 431 by: "1869--Money collected by "1869--Money collected by W. H. Leib" J. H. Stewart."

The 1870 Census, Bethel Township, family 67/68 lists John H. Stewart, age 24, Physician, wife Kate T., age 23 b. Ct.

William H. Leib, age 26, Physician, b. Il as was John H. Stewart. For the purposes of our quarterly publication, we will list the names of the persons who purchased medicine, had teeth extracted, or used services of these good rural doctors in many other ways.

Should any reader want to procure a page for their records, please list page desired. The book is in bad shape, and brittle because it is way over 100 years old, but we believe that, for an anticipated donation for our copying service, that we can supply wanted pages. These names indicate persons who lived in the area.

This old Exeter cemetery is just outside of the town about one-half mile
northwest, in Section 23 Township 13 North, Range 15 West 3rd Principal Meridian.

This reading is a composite of one copied August 26, 1928 by Mr. and Mrs. Henry W. English, of Jacksonville, Illinois, and Mrs. and Mrs. Chester Funk in more recent years. Also incorporated is the information from the "Honor Roll of Scott County, Illinois" published by the Illinois Veterans Commission in 1956.

Should any person have knowledge of date changes, name discrepancies, or any other data, please write it down and send to Mrs. Florence Hutchison, 629 South Diamond, Jacksonville, Illinois who has produced this reading from the three references given above. If there is a difference in dates between the English and Funk tombstone readings, both are given.

Since there were stones read in 1928 no longer present in later readings, and since there were soldiers in the "Honor Roll" not on either reading, all of these names will be listed alphabetically at the end of the revised Funk reading which was evidently done by recording names as they came to them in the cemetery.

EXCERPTS FROM JUDGE HENDERSON'S HISTORY.

... The first grave in this part of the <u>Sangamon country</u> [Scott County], was that of Mrs. Spencer and her child. Spencer and Cornelius Brown made an improvement where the old tannery used to be, in the south part of the present site of Winchester, in the spring of 1821. During the same year Mrs. Spencer died in childbirth, and she and her baby were buried in the "old burying-ground" south of Winchester. The second grave was that of a man by the name of Lapham, who was called "Deacon." He was buried in the Gillham burying-ground.

The first school was taught in a little log cabin that stood just southeast of where Exeter now is. The school-ma'am was Miss Jennette Wheeler, who afterward married Phineas Bronson. They had no churches in those days, but meetings were held at the houses of the settlers. The preacher enjoyed but few privileges over the laymen. He had no pulpit, but was allowed to stand behind an old-fashioned split-bottomed chair, while his congregation sat on poles or rails.

The preachers, in those days, were mostly backwoodsmen, who had no manuscript sermons, with "Firstlies", "Secondlies", and "Thirdlies", but spoke as they used their rifle -- off-hand.

Gov. Reynolds related that in the southern part of this state the girls would go barefooted until they got near the meetings, and then put on their shoes and stockings, which they had carried with them in their hands to keep them from being soiled. They had no "seconds" to use otherwise.

#GB:l=page # in "Guardians' Bonds" book. b=birthdate; d=death date; nd=no date. This early GUARDIANS' BONDS record book was found stored in the attic of the Morgan County Courthouse. Florence Hutchison has abstracted some vital statistics of importance to our family history seekers, indexed its contents for easier reference, and is hereby publishing the results in this June quarterly. This is a revised reprint of the same information published in June 1978. Since those issues are out of print at the present time, most of our members do not have access to this important estate history. Florence has searched the courthouse archives in many places looking for the original Guardianship Case Files, and cannot find any prior to 1892.

Many of these guardianships involve their heirship to deceased relatives who lived in other counties, or states. Therefore, there are no estate files on these decedents in Morgan County IL. But since the county and state is usually given, family historians then have another area in which to search for their ancestors.

It was a delight to find many birthdays listed for some of the minor heirs. The page listing heirs etc. can be purchased from the Morgan County Circuit Court Clerk, Jacksonville IL 62650 @ \$1.00 per page.

While relatives may disagree with some of these spellings, they are given as they appear in the record, and decipherable from the hand-writing of this 130-year-old (plus) book which is still in excellent condition.

Guardianship records do not always indicathat estate administration papers have been filed. There appears to be -- in these early days -- three types of legal concerns:

1. Orphan(s) in a community

2. Minor children or grandchildren whose ancestor died elsewhere

3. Children and other minor relatives whose ancestor died with an estate in Morgan County.

In the first two instances, the word No is written below the page# in the Guardiand Bonds Book 1 (GB:1).

This indicates that no further papers are available than the page number given.

These are guardianships 1851 to 1857, and we can find no file of guardianship papers in the courthouse attic prior to 1892.

As to point 3, when there is an estate administration in Morgan County, we indicated this by an asterisk following the page# in the Guardians' Bonds Book 1 (GB:1)

Therefore, for the benefit of our family historians, following this is a listing of the decedents who do have estate administrations in Morgan County by giving the name of the Decedent, Case # and name of Administrator or Executor of a Will.

Genealogists may then write to our Circuit Court Clerk for the Petition for Letters of Administration by giving the Case Number, and sending \$1.00 for each one.

If there is a Will administration, the Circuit Court Clerk will make a photocopy for

\$2.00.

Intestate--probate of a person's estate who deceased having made no known valid Will.

Most of the decedents listed in the Guardians' Bonds Book 1 (GB:1) died intestate, so there is no Will on file for them.

Usually there is a Petition for Letters of Administration in Case Files of both intestate decedents, and for those whose Will was filed.

Family historians may secure a copy of the Petition for Letters from the Circuit Court Clerk, Morgan County Courthouse, Jacksonville IL 62650 for \$1.00.

Where a Will is involved, a copy of the original Will from the state Case File will be sent for \$2.00. plus \$1.00 for the Petition for Letters.
