\* \* \* STATE OF MISSOURI, PULASKY COUNTY, DECEMBER THE 20th, 1839 \* \* \* (Copy of one of six letters from Welch kin in MO to their Scott County, IL kin) Dear Brothers and sisters.

I take this opertunity to let you now that we are well at this time hoping these lines may find you in the same health. Brouther Reuben is living with me, he is well and wishes to be remberd to you all. We was jest two weaks from the time we left illinois tell we go to James Haney. We found him and family all with the agar. every one of them had it. tha took it in august, he was much dissatisfid and he sold out to move back but he took a notion to tri it a little longer. I was a goin to come with him. He has moved a bout 18 miles furder and tha say his timber is scase. He is in a pararie holler. I never hav bin ther. We heard once from them since tha hav bin ther. Tha was shaking as yet amost more then ever. James Haney sed that tha was more than two thirds of the papel her was sick this fall. Ther is a heap of sickness her. I am living on a place belongs to old John Wisdom. I shell sta her and mak a crop, ther is about acers fenced and turned. I git it for doing some work on the place. I have aplace pick out wher I shal live if I sta her. It is a bout 12 miles from wher James Haney now lives. I will let you now that Moran Davis and Johny King and Jesse Brak and John Thurman and old Brak and two of his sun in laws, tha live in about 25 miles of us on brush creek. tha are very well pleased with ther country. When tha left illinois Anna had the agar. Nancy and Elizabeth was taking sick on the rod & was very bad but is gitting better. When we left illinois David Hoats was very bad. John R. King his young est child died about four or five days before we started & som of the rest was sick. A few lines to our mother brouther and sisters. We wish to be remember to them all. Nancy and Solomon had the agar in illinois but is now well and fat. We have a daughter bornd the 8 September. We call her Elizabeth. Sally wants to know where her mother is living and how she is a doin. You wrote in your letter sed that she was living with John Turner. let us no what Mat is a doin and wher he is. When you rite let us know about them ane I want you to rite me quick as you can and dont let it be long before you rite you note to me that john turner and william was coming to this county. I want to no what has turned up that tha have not come. I herd you was about to sell yor land. I think you had better find yu a place befor yo sell. I shall not parswade no boddy to move here. When ther is land it is good range and tolerbel plenty of game. I have cild three deer and a good maney turkeys. Timber is skace her, black post oke is the groath mostly som white jack oke and black oke but timber is scace. rocks a plenty. James Ewton lives about ten miles from me on the river gasknad. I live in a prararie holler. My nearest nebour is about two miles on the other side about ate miles. It is on the hardys place I ever seen. Pork is worth from four to five dollars corn is from twenty to thirthy cents per bushel wheat is from fifty to seventy five cents per bushel. There have bin three or four snows and is now a sleeting. One snow was about ten inches deep. It has been very disagreebel winter so fur. While I was riting tha fell a snow about ate inches deep. I want you to make shore to not furget to rite to me and let me no how times is with you and how you all com on. You must excuse me for my bad riting for it is a bad chansce to git enney boddy to rite a letter. when i get a letter from you I will git some boddy to rite a letter that you can read. Send your letter whar you sent yorn when you sent to James Haney. Tha ar places here to settel som very good ones if a boddy could have ther helth. I shal sta til fall and see how it will a gree with us so no more at present but remain yours.

> Hiram Welch and Sally to Ephraim Welch and Sally Brother David William landed the day we started from illinois. He was well he sed tha was a heap of sickness wher he com from.

\* \* \* OLD JACKSONVILLE, TOWNSHIPS AND THE DEATONS BY ENSLEY MOORE \* \* \* (Copied by Mary Frances Alkire, from the Thursday Journal, dated May 27, 1915)

Town people have little understanding of "metes and bounds" as understood and referred to by countrypeople. The latter will talk about each other as living on certain sections, or quarters, of half quarters, or eighties (the same as a half quarter) or forties, or twenties — all meaning the way land is measured into acres and the larger divisions.

People are often referred to as living in certain townships. By the way, how many people in Jacksonville, or larger places, know, think or care what township they live in? Yet there is such a division of the county which has its local government and school system, just as important to the inhabitants as in government of towns or cities.

An ordinary township is six miles square. In the East - New England or New York, and in some parts further West, what we call a township, is referred to as a town. This may be in a village, town or city.

At first it seemed queer to hear people of Northampton inquire of a visitor from this region, "are you going down to the village?" instead of asking if one were going "down town".

In Cook County (Chicago) this state, references is made to "the town of Lake" or "the town of Cicero" or "the town of Lake View", by the newspapers of the metropolis.

Jacksonville City is in township 15, north of range 10, west of the 3rd principal meridian, in Morgan County, Illinois. Now what section or quarter of it, does the reader imagine he or she lives in? It may not be a very important matter to be sure of, but, like many other things, it may be worth knowing. This township used to be known as Jacksonville Precinct and everybody in the township voted, on county, state and national days at the Court House. In 1876, or there abouts, Jacksonville Precinct used to be entitled to 64 delegates in the republican county convention.

A presumably veracious chronicler states that the first settlement in this township was in 1820, and goes on to say: "JOHN BRADSHAW, accompanied by COLONEL JOSEPH MORTON built a cabin east of the present City of Jacksonville, in the fall of that year. JOHN WYATT, WILLIAM YORK, WILLIAM WYATT, PRESIDENT HOMES, THOMAS WISWELL, WILLIAM C. VERY, CHRISTOPHER B. STEBBINS, MR. MYERS (who was the first postmaster in the county), CARSON and JUDGE AARON WILSON were among the first settlers."

Now, this settlement of this township is not to be confused with the first settlement in the county. That was by the KELLOGS, in 1818 and was in a township

further east, adjoining "Jacksonville Township" as it may be called.

The writer referred to above also said of this township, which is gently rolling, was originally about equally divided between timber and prairie. The timber would be first, naturally on the Mauvaisterre Creek which winds around the city from northeast, east, southeast and north, but the site of the city, previously stated in this series of papers, was open prairie, that is the original part of town. By additions it has since reached to what is Grierson's Grove on the east, Duncan's Grove on the west, and College Grove southwest.

\* \* \* \* \*

Township 15-11 west, was also settled in 1820, the northwest portion of it being settled by the DEATONS and others. That is over by the "brick school-house" and the present County Farm. The KELLOGS also had a place there awhile after their first location, east of town, in this County. This township lies about three miles north and three miles south of the Wabash Railroad and joins Jacksonville Township on the west. This term "Jacksonville Township" is not proper, but will probably be easier understood by most readers. Townships are called by their numbers. This being "15-10".

JOSEPH P. DEATON dwelt west of the County Farm in 1872. His father, JAMES, was a farmer, and a very old settler of Amelia County, Virginia, having been born and raised there. JOSEPH P. was born in that county, January 2, 1806. His parents traveled on to Botetourt County, Virginia, when he was about five years old.

They kept coming and landed presumably in St. Clair County, this state, in 1819; coming to Morgan County in 1821 (as is stated in one account; probably they got there in 1820). JOSEPH P. DEATON married MISS SARAH COOK, daughter of J. COOK, of this county. MR. COOK came here in 1826. MR. and MRS. DEATON had five children; ELIZABETH, born July 1829, married JACOB STOUT; MARSHALL, who died in 1842; THOMAS DEATON, JR., born March 26, 1833, married MARY A. CALDWELL, daughter of DAVID B. CALDWELL, February 8, 1854; MARY, married ABRAHAM LITER, and L. ANN DEATON, who died a child of five years of age.

JOSEPH P. DEATON was in the Militia at Galena when the trouble began with Black Hawk. He was in no serious engagements, but was ready to do his part, and in those days, the settlers knew that an Indian War might mean untold miseries and atrocities upon the whites. MR. DEATON was still living in 1872 and told of his early experiences with the difficulties of pioneering. He was referred to as 'SQUIRE DEATON, so he, no doubt, had been a Justice of the Peace.

The THOS. DEATON, JR. referred to was probably THOS. P. who lived latterly in or about Alexander. He was a Justice of the Peace, and a very enthusiastic republican. He was prominent for many years in the county conventions of that party.

Later on, suffering from rheumatism, he went over about Eureka Springs, MO. where he had a log cabin, and he was greatly benefitted by the kindly water. Some years ago he was here on a visit and he fairly danced a jig, on Knollenberg's Corner, in demonstrating how much good the water of Eureka had done him. He was a pleasant and kindly old gentleman.

Another DEATON was A.B. He was born in Morgan County, November 22, 1839 and died in Bloodland, MO, November 3, 1913. MR. DEATON attended the Public Schools in Morgan County and then went to LaGrange College, Indiana, where he finished his education. He was married in 1864 to MISS LENA McCARTY, of near Arenzville, Cass County, Illinois.

In an obituary notice of him, a correspondent in Literberry, said: "In writing of a young man contracting marriage at this particular time, one wonders why he was not with the boys fighting for his country. This is explained by the fact that he was incapacitated, being a victim of inflammatory rheumatism. Never the less, two of his brothers went to the front, one being killed at Reseca, GA."

Soon after his marriage in 1865, MR. DEATON took his mother and sister and went to Richardson County, Nebraska, spending ten years there, farming and teaching school. In 1875, he pioneered again this time to what is now Hodgman County, Kansas, but, at that time it was a howling wilderness, covered with buffalo and wolves. The DEATONS stayed there fourteen years and, saw a delightful farming region developed.

The DEATONS then wished a more healthful region and came back to the Ozark Mountains of Pulaský County, Missouri, where they arrived in 1889, and acquired a competency from their labors in farming in that region.

JOHN DEATON was born near here, November 4, 1848. He attended Whipple Academy, being a Phi Alpha, in 1869. He taught school in Greene and Macon Counties, and married MISS GEORGIE CUNTER, of Macon, Illinois. He farmed in Macon County until 1888 when he removed to Lyons, Rice County, Kansas. There he engaged in merchandising where he was apparently successful at last accounts.

Another DEATON was AUGUSTUS P. He was a student in Whipple Academy in 1873. He left college in the fall of the following year. He was also a Phi Alpha in college. He became an attorney, and has been away from here for some years.

\* \* \* \* \*

Eames History says: "RICHARD SHEPHERD came to the county about 1821 and in 1823 built a band-mill which was run by horse or ox power. It was located on what is now the WILLIAM TAYLOR farm, situated on Indian Creek. DEATON'S MILL was the next built."

JUDGE WILLIAM THOMAS gives SAMUEL DEATON in the list of first Justices of the Peace.

EAMES says: "The Methodist and Baptists held meetings at different places in the County in 1821. The house of JAMES DEATON was one of the places where the Methodists held their worship."

In March, 1820: "JAMES DEATON and his son, LEVI, and ROBERT JAMES pitched their tents and selected their claims. MR. DEATON and his son made their claims about four miles west, on what is now called the McCormack place, on the Meredosia road, and MR. JAMES also settled in the same neighborhood."

"The provisions brought with them by the settlers were intended to last til fall, when the corn crop was made, but it happened MR. DEATON and son exhausted their supply of corn meal and bacon about the first of June, compelling them to travel a distance of 85 miles to Edwardsville to renew their supply. The journey had to be made mostly in the night to avoid the greenhead flies of the prairie, which at this season would in daytime almost bleed a team to death. Shaping their course by the stars, and without a road or trail, they started on the trip, provisionless and hungry. Their first camping place was on Apple Creek. The country had been pretty well cleared of game by Indians, but here they were fortunate enough to kill a squirrel, which, they roasted at their camp-fire. During the next day they killed a deer, where the City of Jacksonville now stands, and thus they were enabled to reach Edwardsville in excellent time and spirits." Edwardsville is down about Alton, being the County seat of Madison.

In connection with the travels of the DEATONS the following from Eames is interesting: "Although at this time game was exceedingly scarce, having been killed out or driven away by the Indians, bees were abundant, and in the fall after the corn crop had been made, the first settlers reaped a rich harvest in honey and wax, the latter constituting at that time, in connection with furs, the circulating currency of the frontier. An average of from six to eight trees a day was considered ordinary luck by the bee hunters and the MESSRS. WYATT, who appear to have excelled in this line of woodcraft, were known to have found as many as twelve trees a day."

The cyclone of April, 1825, of which MR. A.K. BARBER told, blew the clapboard off the roof of JAMES DEATON'S house.

A Jacksonville volunteer in the Black Hawk War, said to EAMES, probably, "JAMES DEATON, who was the chief military man of this neighborhood, called out every ablebodied citizen and the first draft we had ever experienced occurred."

In another place FLORENTINE E. KELLOGG is quoted by EAMES as saying: "JAMES DEATON built a small horse-mill, to run with a raw-hide band around the spindle.

My father, I think taught the first school in the County; (this is probably wrong) we also had Sunday School at UNCLE JIMMIE DEATONS."

EAMES states further: "The first bridge in the County was built this summer (1821) over the Mauvaisterre Creek, at a place east of the City on the Springfield Road, where Rockbridge now stands, by JOSEPH MORTON, MR. LEVI DEATON and a few others."

LEVI DEATON is quoted as follows by EAMES: "The first sermon preached in the County, so far as I know, was by REV. JOHN GLANVILLE, at my father's house in 1822. A (class) was then and there organized, consisting of my father and mother and a brother named JOHNSON, and his wife. There were other DEATONS who were well known, but details of their histories are not at hand.

\* \* \* \* \*

Copied verbatim from page 62, 1872 Atlas Map of Morgan County, Illinois -- Old Settlers Section: Andreas, Lyter & Company, Publishers.

"THOMAS DEATON was born in Virginia, September 20, 1813. His father (JAMES DEATON) and family settled northeast of the present site of Jacksonville, in 1820. His children, who came with him, were: LEVI, JAMES, JR. deceased; ROBERT H., deceased; LEAH, former wife of HEZEKIAH BRIDGEMAN, of Concord (she died about 1853); MARTHA, former wife of WILLIAM GOODPASTURE (died about 1842); THOMAS, the subject of this sketch; and WILLIAM. The balance of the family are now residing in the county. JAMES DEATON erected the second grist mill in the county; the power was horses and oxen. He died April 22, 1854. THOMAS was married December 22, 1842 to MISS MATILDA UNDERWOOD. His children are all residing with their parents, except JOSEPH HENRY, in Greene County, and JOHN, in Macon County. THOMAS DEATON is one of the energetic and persevering who have labored for over a century to develop a county having less than four score souls in it when he first became one of its citizens."

\* \* \* \* \*

By him, in youth, a wild was seen
Of groves and fragrant prairies green;
In age he sees on every side
Rich cultivated fields, with pride.

Note: ENSLEY MOORE was a member of the Illinois Historical Society. He served for nearly thirty years as Vice-president of the Illinois State Historical Society to which he donated many impotant early documents, still housed (1976) in the State Historical Mueseum in Springfield. He was born in Springfield, Illinois, April 16, 1846 and died age 83 on or about January 13, 1929. He was buried in the Diamond Grove Cemetery, Morgan County, Jacksonville, Illinois.

In 1862 the little "SCOT" SAMUEL McKEAN enrolled in the 101st Illinois Volunteers. After two years of marching in bad weather and having been wounded several times, SAMUEL succumbed to the hazards of the Civil War and spent the last year in a hospital at Nashville, Tennessee. At war's end he was mustered out and returned to Morgan County, Illinois. His daughter, ELIZABETH McKEAN SPENCER, wrote that he had not known a good day of health from the end of the war until his death in 1884.

His great grandchildren, JAMES McKEAN, HELEN HICKS and PEGGY McCOY, recently decided it was time their great grandfather be honored with his Military Grave Marker. The Veterans Administration Representative at Jacksonville assisted in the application and on October 3, 1991 the Jacksonville Monument Company installed it.

The sturdy marker is a beautiful tribute to a courageous Scotchman from Dumfries, Scotland who lies peacefully in a little spot called "Bethel Cemetery" located one and one half miles southwest of Murrayville, Morgan County, Illinois in the northwest quarter of section 13, township 13 north, range 11 west of the 3rd principal meridian. It can be seen from highway 267. The cemetery is surrounded by a vast area of America which JAMES FENIMORE COOPER called the Prairie.

If you have a deceased service person in your family who does not have a Military Grave Marker, you can contact The Illinois Department of Veterans Affairs in Jacksonville, Illinois. Veterans Service Officer, RICH WOOD or Veterans Service Officer Associate, KAREN CROW will be happy to assist you. If you live in another state, contact the Department of Veteran Affairs in your area.


You must provide the following information: Name of veteran, date of enlistment or induction, branch of the military (for instance - Civil War, 101st Illinois Infantry, Company F.), date of discharge, death date and place of burial. If you do not have this information, it can be obtained from the "Adjutant General's Report" found in local libraries, your Genealogical Society Library or National and State Archives. There is no cost for the marker. It is provided by the government and will be shipped to a monument company of your choice in the locale where it is to be installed. A copy of the application should be sent to the monument company selected. Some monument companies may charge for installation.

James Willard McKean FTGC, Retired

When visiting a cemetery there is nothing more distressing than finding a loved ones' monument half buried, tilted, broken or laying on the ground. You can reset and repair the smaller stones, such as a slab stone, with the help of another person. Larger stones should be repaired and reset by a monument company.

Remember a slab stone is very fragile. Find a piece of plywood, at lest ½" thick, about the same size as the stone. Have your helper steady the stone, dig around the base, place plywood behind the stone and lay it on its back. If the stone is already down, dig on one side until you can slide the plywood under about two or three inches, now you can slide the stone on to the plywood. If the stone is face down, place the plywood on the back and with help turn the stone over on its back.

Find or purchase enough 1x4's to make a wood form at least 6" all around larger then the stone. Using the wood form as a guide, take a tile spade and dig out the center until form will set about 2" into the ground. Now, using a post hole digger, drill two holes, about 16" deep, If you do not have a post



hole digger, use your tile spade to do this, they do not need to be perfect. You are ready for concrete.

At your local hardware store, give them the size of the wood form and the two holes and they will be able to tell you the amount of dry concrete mix you need. You will need about five gallons of water and something to mix the concrete in. Use a damp mixture - fill holes and form - tamp down and level off at top of form.

With plywood behind the stone, with help, lift and set the stone in the middle of the form, remove plywood and work stone into the concrete about two inches. Have your helper steady stone while you check to see if it stands straight. With a small block of wood, float the concrete around the stone, you do not need to be a pro to do this. Hold the stone for about ten minutes. The stone is soft enough to absorb water from concrete and now will stand on its own. Let stand a couple of days and remove wood form. 
