Pictured at the right is the stately Henderson monument, evidently moved from Antioch to Diamond Grove Cemetery on adjoining Lots 90 and 108 in Section L.

David Paterson Henderson and Eliza Smedley were married January 19, 1837 by Barton W. Stone B.C.C., in Morgan County. All of them lived in close vicinity to the Antioch Christian Church. This building has in recent years been moved to Ashland, and is currently still in use as a church.

To the east is another tombstone of Edwin Henderson, Civil War Veteran who died January 14, 1864, and was re-interred December 24, 1879 from Antioch.

Also moved to Diamond Grove were David's parents, James and Eleanor (White), and Mary Henderson July 5, 1877. The Diamond Grove Mortuary Records indicates re-interments from many outlying cemeteries. The picture is a good example of the many imposing monuments to be found all over this popular burial site since its opening date in 1867.

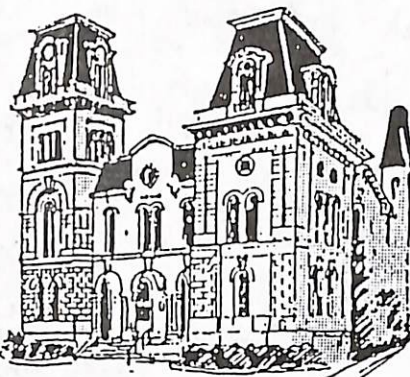

This has been poignantly brought to my attention this fall, with the sudden memory failure of my dear sweet husband of 54 years. He is a strong healthy man that has to be in a Care Center now, after serving many rural areas as a Vocational Agriculture teacher for 40 years. You will probably remember that in some past quarterly I mentioned that he had driven a car to Florida, and three-fourths of the way back with a bad heater core and carbon monoxide leak from a faulty muffler system. This started the memory problem, and a recent fall last September on a bad portion of sidewalk which evidently caused an undiagnosed head injury, creating the unexpected side effects.

All of the stories my husband might relate to his busy children are a thing of the past, since he is the last member of his family to be able to relate them. He was always going "to write them down for a book some day", but he never got around to it. He was a "pioneer" in that he rode a horse behind a covered wagon when his family moved from Ritchey, Missouri, to Belleville, Arkansas. His birthday was recognized by his mother, Anna Beatrice (Frost) Hutchison simply getting off the wagon and coming to his side to say, "Sanford, today is your 9th birthday." This fact would reveal the move to be November 3, 1916, when they reached the Arkansas line.

But what difference does knowing that fact now, have any bearing on our lives? At least I know the route his life took which led to our meeting at Oklahoma A. & M. College in 1935 when he was president of the Collegiate F.F.A, and I was president of the Collegiate 4-H Club, our meeting, and eventual marriage after we were both graduated, and qualified as vocational teachers, which shaped our lives of the future.

Perhaps some date in your family's history may be important as a guide to genealogical discoveries as to why certain individuals wound up living in various communities and following certain patterns of life style. I hope so!

And now, I wanted to let you know that under a new set of Bylaws my 18-year term as president of the Jacksonville Area Genealogical and Historical Society ended as of December 31, 1990. I have served in that capacity longer than any other family historian in Illinois.

However, I will still be Editor of the quarterly so widely known as the *Jacksonville IL Geneal Journal*, hoping to continue serving our 700 members in 40 states and Canada with indexes and items of interest to all, as usual. Under the new administration there are other volunteers who will take over the job of answering the incoming mail at P.O. Box 21. If any family researcher would like for me to answer their letters, please send them to my home address. I have many records collected in my home. Dear *GENEAL* Readers, our Friends:

My poem to the left expresses my thoughts as I prepare each issue of the *Jacksonville IL Geneal Journal*. Do I go about "fishing out" all of the historical items, and create indexes of past citizens of our west central Illinois area which I hope in some way benefits mankind, "for delight? Or, peace of mind?"

I guess it is both, because it is so thrilling to me when individuals write back and tell me how they have benefitted in some way by what I have published in the quarterly, or research sent by letter.

My fondest hopes are that each of YOU "out there" are inspired to create your family's history in



Like so many other early Morgan County settlers, David Paterson Henderson, or D Pat as he was known, migrated to Illinois from Kentucky. Born May 18th, 1810 near Lexington, he was the eldest son of James A. and Margaret (White) Henderson. Placed in school at age six, by seventeen he had earned a certificate of qualification in all branches of English education including geometry, trigonometry, engineering and surveying. He attended Cane Run Seminary in Fayette County, Kentucky and in 1830 taught school in Fayette County, thus showing an interest in education which characterized his whole life.

With his father, and several other family members, he left Kentucky the 1st of May and arrived in Jacksonville, Morgan County, Illinois on May 12th, 1831 where he served as pastor of Antioch Christian Church for a time in the 1830's. (It is interesting to note that the church had its door near the pulpit. As members entered and walked back to their seat, "no one had to turn around to see who came in late".) He married Eliza Smedley in Jacksonville in 1837. Although they had no children of their own, they did adopt an orphaned girl, Mary Johnson, from within the congregation. [They did have a son, as indicated in Diamond Grove cemetery lot records, of unknown birthdate, but aged 1y 7m 3d of Canton, Missouri, buried in one grave with Eliza Henderson when she and "David P. Henderson" were re-interred from Antioch cemetery as of February 17, 1876.] Ed. note.

Having studied the elementary principles of jurisprudence, he entered the clerk's office under Dennis Rockwell, then clerk of Morgan County. Later, without his solicitation, his fellow citizens presented him with the office of Probate Judge, which he accepted and filled for four years.

In 1841 he became partners with Barton Stone and Professor Turner in the publication of *The Statesman*, an abolitionist newspaper published "over Goltra's hat store". In later years Prof. Turner said of the paper "Even that tame little sheet was regarded as a menace to the church and the state, and a danger to the college."

Probably to further the still young and growing Christian Church, in the summer of 1848 D Pat went to Columbia, Missouri to hold a "protracted meeting". The meeting was such a success that the local congregation urged him to remain as its minister. He accepted the pastorate on one condition: that the local Christian Church leaders help him establish a college for women.

It took "grit" in the America of the 1840's to suggest higher education for women. The possibility that the female mind could comprehend such subjects as algebra had only recently been demonstrated. Nevertheless, in the intensely political situation of Central Missouri of those prewar years, Christian College was founded. He traveled extensively throughout the state delivering lectures on female education, and succeeded in raising funds to start the college on a firm financial basis. The school, now known as Columbia College, is today a coeducational institution.

It is likely that the political situation in Columbia, where even the churches divided along party lines, caused him to leave. In 1853 we find him in Canton, Missouri, again working for higher education. There, with others, he founded a coeducational institution, something unheard of in that day. He devoted himself to putting the new school on a sound financial footing by lecturing and preaching throughout northern Missouri and Illinois with gratifying success, and served as the first President of the Board of Trustees (1853-1865) of what we know today as Culver-Stockton College.

In 1855 he was called to be the Pastor of the Christian Church in Louisville, Kentucky. During his Pastorate there, without his knowledge, his name was submitted to the United States Senate, by then President James Buchanan, where he was confirmed as Consul to Carrari, Italy. Unfortunately the health of his wife prevented him from traveling to Italy and he was forced to resign the appointment.

In an 1860 letter written by him to a minister in Georgia, just after Abraham



Lincoln's first election, we see a glimpse of Lincoln that some may find surprising:  
" . . . I am personally acquainted with Mr. Lincoln - have been for a quarter of a Century. He practiced law in my court. He was an old line Clay Whig. Like Mr. Clay, he has always been, what thousands of Southerners are to this day, an Emancipationist. He looks upon Slavery as an evil to the white population, but a blessing to the black race. He is for remuneration to the masters, and a country in which to colonize the African race. He is for gradual Emancipation. These I am sure are his sentiments."

Too old for military service during the Civil War, he was nevertheless active. He served as Secretary of the United States Sanitary Commission for Kentucky (a forerunner of today's Red Cross), and as one of the hospital inspectors, as well as Secretary of the Refugee Commission.

Although deeply involved with education, he was first an evangelist and minister. After the war, using what has been described as a clear and simple message presented in a persuasive voice, he preached for many churches, traveling to such places as Chicago, St. Louis, San Francisco and Washington City (D.C.). He was called on by his friend Henry Ward Beecher to fill-in while Mr. Beecher went to Europe, thus giving him the opportunity to become friends with his sister, Harriet Beecher Stowe.

When his wife Eliza died in 1875, he brought her home to Jacksonville, to be buried in Diamond Grove Cemetery. [Our re-interment records for this cemetery indicates that she and her infant son were first in Antioch, and then in Diamond Grove as of February 17, 1876. James Henderson, his wife Eleanor and Mary were removed from Antioch cemetery as of July 5, 1877.]

David Paterson Henderson lived the remaining years of his life with his adopted daughter in Canton, Missouri, until he too died and was brought home to Jacksonville to be buried alongside the rest of his family, as of February 11, 1897.

Ray Henderson took the picture on the cover of this December 1990 quarterly, and Lloyd Summers enlarged the original for printing purposes. Ray wrote to your editor, Florence Hutchison, "You are undoubtedly aware of the Disciples of Christ Historical Society, and information available there. They have been prompt and helpful to me, and able to furnish quite a lot of data, such as who placed the bronze plaque at the base of D Pat's grave when the old stone began to show wear. ..." [Unfortunately he did not share this information with me for publication.]

Page 1 Part II: MORTUARY RECORD OF DIAMOND GROVE CEMETERY 1 Feb. 1878 -

The filing of death certificates in the State of Illinois started in 1878. However with road conditions, the village clerks farther out from the county seat did not always get the copies to the County Clerks on time, and sometimes not at all. Therefore, this record of burial dates from the City Cemetery may disclose some burials not recorded on the indexes of the county records.

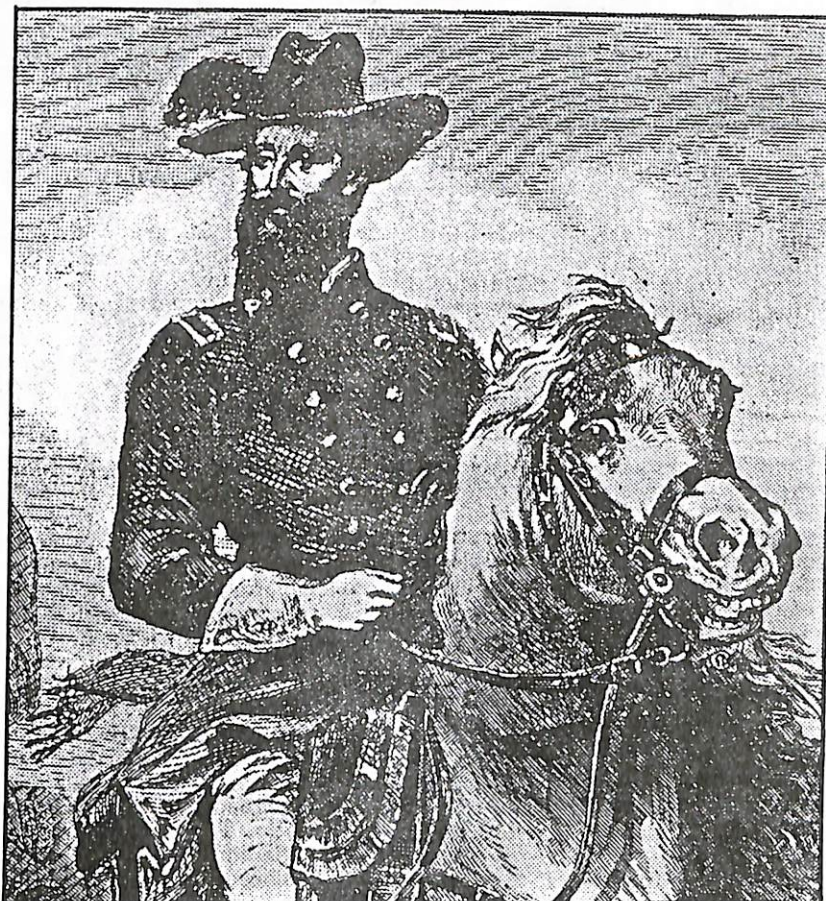
Neglected by historians and his hometown, a Civil War General finally received recognition at his gravesite in Jacksonville East Cemetery on Veteran's Day, November 11th 1990. A large crowd from many surrounding communities watched the proceedings of a well-planned schedule of events which included the 7th Illinois Memorial Cavalry, with Major Karl Luthin, Commanding. The Color Guard presentations were made by VFW Post 1379. The welcome was given by Mayor Ron Tendick, address by Lt. Col. Phil McKenna, Official Representative of the State of Illinois, eulogy by Ken Bradbury, music by the MacMurray College Wind Ensemble, and benediction by Rev. Iver Yeager, LTJG-USNR.

General Benjamin Grierson's famous raid into the Confederate states in 1863 attracted the attention of Harper's Weekly which had this sketch made of him and placed on its cover in June 1863.

Benjamin Henry Grierson was born in Pittsburg PA, July 8, 1826; removed in boyhood to Trumbull County, Ohio, and about 1850 to Jacksonville, Illinois. He was engaged for a time in teaching music, later embarking in the grain and produce business at Meredosia.

He enlisted promptly at the beginning of the Civil War, becoming Aid-de-camp to General Prentiss at Cairo, during the three-months service, later being commissioned Major of the Sixth Illinois Cavalry.

He was commissioned Colonel of the same regiment in March, 1862, and was commander of a brigade in December following.



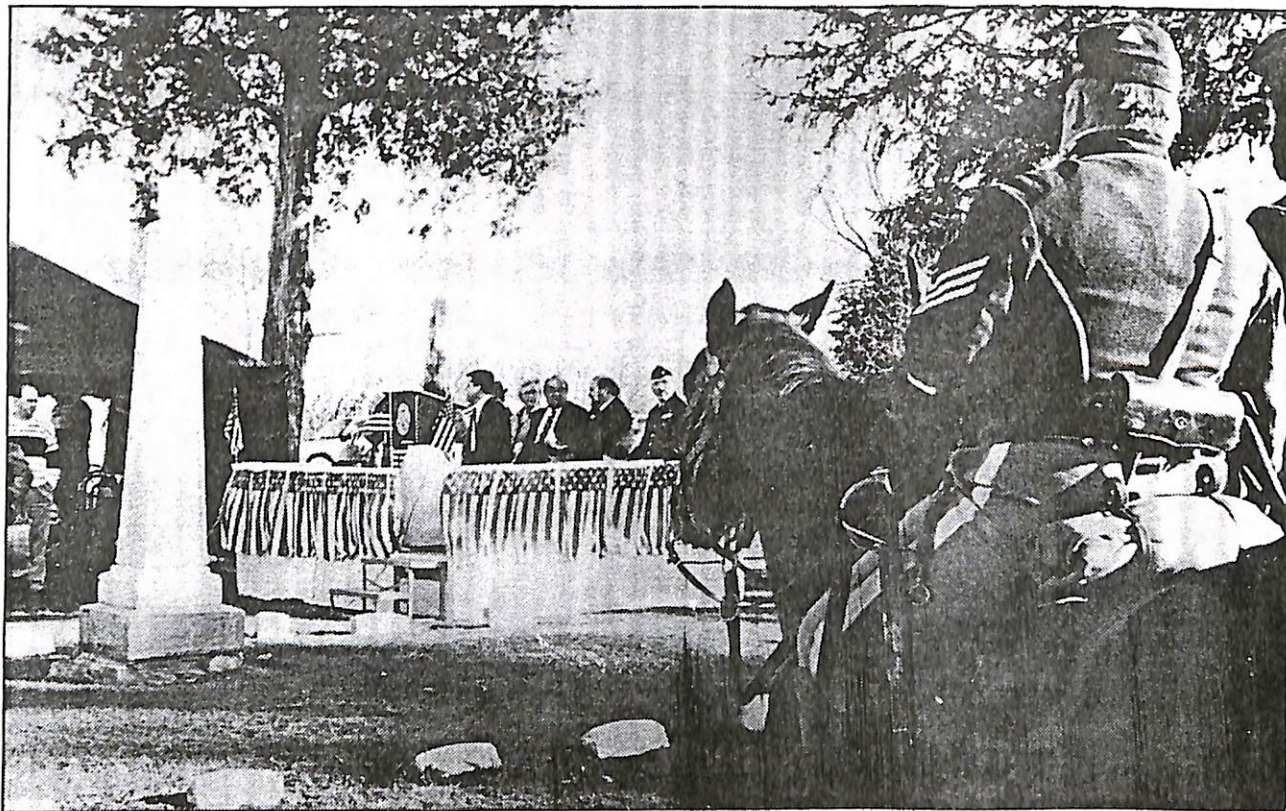
Grierson was prominent in nearly all the cavalry skirmishes between Memphis and the Tennessee river, and in April and May, 1863, led the famous raid from La Grange Tennessee, through the States of Mississippi and Louisiana to Baton Rouge, for the first time penetrating the heart of the Confederacy and causing consternation among the rebel leaders, while materially aiding General Grant's movement against Vicksburg. This was generally regarded as one of the most brilliant events of the war, and attracted the attention of the whole country.

In recognition of this service he was, on June 3, 1863, made a Brigadier-General, and May 27, 1865, a full Major-General of Volunteers. Although Grierson's war-time exploits were vital to a successful conclusion of that conflict, his efforts in the West were to be even more valuable. In 1866 he accepted the appointment of the 10th Cavalry, a command of white officers and black enlisted men. Outspokenly appreciative of the achievements of his black Buffalo Soldiers, as well as highly sympathet-



ic toward the plight of the Indians. Among Grierson's most effective efforts toward establishing a settled West, was his work with the red men themselves as a friend and peacemaker.

Throughout his years as campaigner, explorer, developer of the Trans-Pecos region, and builder of Fort Sill and other westerns forts, Ben Grierson was sustained and strengthened by his steadfast wife, Alice Kirk Grierson, and their children. Following her soldier since the hectic days of the Civil War, the valiant Alice often lived in flimsy tents and windy, lonesome army posts, as staunch a campaigner as Ben himself. Theirs is a true tale, filled with adventure, affection and courage.

The men behind the monument were Don Knott of R.R. 2, Murrayville and Ray Elliott, superintendent of the two City cemeteries. When Knott first visited Grierson's gravesite, he found the five-foot-high Grierson family tombstone deteriorating, and broken by vandals. Distressed by the stone's condition, he consulted Florence Hutchison, who referred him to Ray, who could best help him make decisions about repair procedures, which were eventually accomplished by Don and Ray.

Don Knott, a Manchester psychologist and history buff was in St. Johns Hospital in Springfield about five years ago, and was on disability leave from the State Department of Mental Health. "My wife brought me a book on General Grierson, and I started digging into his background." As he said later after the cemetery visitation, "The monument was broken up on the ground. The writing was in bad shape, and there was no indication of Grierson's military service."

Due to Don's persistent activity the military stone was finally procured and set in place. The reading is simple: "Benj H Grierson, Maj Gen, 7 Ill Cav, 6 Ill Cav, Jul 8 1826, Aug 31 1911." November 11, 1990 was a memorable celebration.

During the Civil War there were two kinds of call-ups -- one for the armed forces and one for Militiamen trained in arms and combat for state and local protection in need. Mention of Grierson's 6th Cavalry is in the Adjutant General's Report, Vol. I, 1861-66 pp 50 +. "April 1863 was engaged in the famous expedition which, under Col. B. H. Grierson, made the tour through Mississippi and Louisiana. In this expedition the Regiment traveled about 800 miles, was engaged a number of times with the enemy, destroyed a vast amount of property, and arrived safely at Baton Rouge, LA., May 2, 1863 after a continuous march of 17 days . . ."

Probably the naming of the newly-formed "Grierson Guards, Illinois State Militia" was in Jacksonville's hero's honor. The question: were these Morgan County militia volunteers involved in battle? I found a letter at the State Archives dated April 19, 1864 from G. M. McConnell to Allen C. Fuller, Adj't. Gen'l.:

*The Grierson Guard was organized at this place some eight months since under the impression that it would be armed within a short time. Repeated efforts were made to that end, all resulting in total failure. It is utterly impossible to hold men together in a military organization without pay, except they be armed. Delay and repeated disappointment in that behalf, resulted in entire loss of interest, almost universal non-attendance, and finally in practical disbandment. No meeting has been held for nearly six months . . ."*

Here's one benefit -- at least our family historians have the names of 72 men living in Morgan County from this record presented, with some vital statistics!



"By Statute (Illinois Revised Statute, Book 1, Chapter 25, Sec. 27.1(w))." The Circuit Clerk's Office may charge \$4.00 per year for a record of search per defendant. This office will perform a record search provided the request is in writing and the \$4.00 per year fee is paid in advance.

The above is quoted from a letter sent by the Circuit Clerk when they cannot find requested data from their records, because of incomplete information sent in by a person seeking documentary evidences of past court cases. The \$4.00 search fee is now being applied to genealogical inquirers who request copies of Wills, and/or Petitions for Letters of Administration, etc. from Estate probate files.

The statement \$4.00 per year is a bit confusing, and actually applies to other types of legal records than the probates required by family historians, because the clerks will be looking at an alphabetical index for the name(s) sought, and not for a certain year's record. However, if a researcher knows the year of death, then they should include that information with their request, as well as the name of the spouse, if available. There may be more than one person of the same name, and the spouse's identification would assure the right file, and avoid a double charge for sending both records.

When the right file is located and requested records copied, the clerk will charge 50 cents per page, and bill the requestor for the balance due. Some wills are only one or two pages, while others are quite lengthy.

Always ask for the Petition for Letters of Administration which is usually only one page, but is the only place where date of death is normally recorded, with names of surviving heirs. If you will send \$4.50 at time of order, then they will not have to bill you for 50 cents, where there is no will, and save you time and postage of sending the extra amount in.

You might request them to send a "Bill of Sale" if there is one in the file, since it is quite interesting to see what possessions the family had, and who bought the goods at what price. If the person had no will, they "died intestate".

This past year the Clerk's *Index of Closed Probate Files* fell apart from so much usage, and the pages were loose while waiting for a new cover. Miss Barb Baker, Circuit Court Clerk, kindly granted me permission to photocopy the Index as long as I furnished the large sheets of paper, which I gladly did. I have stored these 415 pages of probate records in three large notebooks for easy reference, and have them in my home.

I just checked and found that the records were not filed by year's date until 1953. Up to that time they were filed chronologically by number, regardless of date. The earliest records are very fragile bits and pieces of information, with no Petition for Letters in them. I do not know when that feature began. When family historians have written to me, I always check this probate index to see if the names of their ancestor or collateral relatives were probated in Morgan County, and I send the file number. Miss Baker has given me permission to copy Book A of Wills this spring. It is getting in very bad shape, and needs to be copied for protection of data.

See illustration of the *Index to Probate Files, Morgan County* next page. Where no book number is given, the person died "Intestate", and had an Administrator who settled the estate. Where "book" and "Page" is given that indicates that the will was handwritten in a big book. However, the original was filed with the rest of the papers, and that is the one the present Circuit Court Clerk will copy for you, at 50 cents per page. It was an Executor who settled that kind of an estate.

Page 1: THE SALE OF GOVERNMENT CAMELS. Incidents of the Sale.

Jacksonville, ILL., Thursday, August 27, 1863, via the *St. Louis Union*.

[Currently we have U.S. soldiers riding camels over in Saudi Arabia, as you well know. Did you ever dream that we had soldiers riding camels in the U.S.? We did!]

At ten o'clock a.m. Saturday [August 22nd] about one hundred persons collected within the Government corral, at the junction of Grand and Franklin avenues, [St. Louis] to witness the sale of the celebrated camels that were imported from the Arabiac sands at much cost to Uncle Sam. The storeship *SUPPLY* had been sent to Smyrna for the express purpose of bringing these animals to Texas, for the use of the Government.

After being used for transportation in Texas for some time, they were captured by the rebels and taken to Arkansas. In Arkansas they were recaptured by General Curtis, and sent to his farm in Iowa. From there they were sent, by order of Quartermaster General Meigs to this city [St. Louis] and sold to the highest bidder.

Mr. John Robinson, the celebrated circus manager, came here from Cincinnati to attend the sale. Mr. Mabie, proprietor of the grand menagerie, that will exhibit in our city on Monday, was also present. The balance of the crowd consisted of persons drawn thither by curiosity.

The first camel presented was "Old Moses," the patriarch of the trio. In commencing the Sale, Capt. Ford stated that the animals had been imported at an immense expense to the Government, that Uncle Sam could not now afford such luxuries, they were offered for sale by order of the Quartermaster General.

The first bid was made by Mr. Mabie of \$50. Charles M. Ellcard, Esq., thinking that one of them would be a nice addition to his collection of buffalo and elk now in pasture, bid \$100. Bidding then became quite spirited between Messrs. Older, Mabie, Robinson and Finn, until "Old Moses" was knocked down to P.A. Older for \$190.

Young "Ader Ali" was then trotted out, and an attache of the yard made him kneel and mounted the hump. "Ader Ali" then started off on a shuffling pace, and his rider had some difficulty in holding on to his high seat. He was then brought up to the water trough and bids commenced. Fifty dollars was first offered, then \$55 and \$60. Mr. Eleard then bid \$100. Mr. Robinson bid \$105. The bids run up to \$205 and Mr. John Robinson declared the purchaser. This was the finest camel of the lot. He expressed his displeasure at being exposed for sale by snapping at the bystanders, and by making a guttural sound like pulling a heavy box over a gravelled road.

Miss Cleopatra was then trotted out. This female charmer was said to be with foal. She looked very lively, and sported a very fine set of teeth. Bids started at \$50 and run up to \$115, when she was sold to P. A. Older for \$115. These animals cost the Government about \$10,000 each, and were bought when Jeff Davis was Secretary of War.

P.S. by Ed. F.H.: Since these camels cost the U.S \$30,000, and they sold for \$510, the government only lost \$29,490 on the deal! It would take a lot of camel riding to make up that loss!

\* \* \* \* \*

What's happening to all the computer records that have been collected by the billions and put in storage, especially the National Archives as presented in the newspapers, should teach a valuable lesson to our genealogists who are storing all of their family records on computer discs! Use good black pens and paper, please!

For example, my own computer in the home of my co-worker -- an "expert" set up a new "great program", but without specific instructions. All those valuable indexes are now locked in, and I may never be able to use my expensive equipment again!

# GOVERNMENT SURVEYS AND EARLY ENTRIES OF LAND IN SCOTT COUNTY, ILLINOIS, IN 1823.

The earliest surveying done by the government within the borders of Scott county was accomplished December 2, 1819, by Wharton Rector, deputy surveyor, in township 13 range 13, which is the southwest township in the county. This was just one year to a day after Illinois was admitted into the Union. The first entry of land was made August 14, 1822 by Joel Meacham who entered the E½ SE¼ Section 8 T13N R12W containing 80 acres.

We are listing the names here, with date of entry, for our family historians who might be able to trace their relatives through land transactions of 1823. Many times early settlers were buried on or near their farm. Scott was a part of Morgan county until 1839, where those records are now to be found, except for marriages from 1823 to December 6, 1827 when the first courthouse burned on the Jacksonville Square. The Deed Book, however, was in the home of the Recorder that night, and there was no court system yet set up in the area in 1823.

The "Record of Results of the Examination and the Standing of Candidates for Teachers" is rather scanty in the beginning. However any names of individuals participating in any event in that early time period can be of great interest to family historians.

In those days these are the listed "Examination In Studies required by Law". The column for these and "Average Standing" is not filled in. A list of subjects are as follows: Orthography, Reading in English, Penmanship, Arithmetic, English Grammar, Modern Geography, U. S. History, Physiology and Laws of Health, Botany, Zoology, and Natural Philosophy. No grades were recorded in this book.

The "Examination in the Higher Branches of Study" included Algebra, Geometry, Latin, and German. The next column listed "Grade or kind of Certificate or License granted". The last column listed "Date of Examination". NAT=Nativity. F=failed exam.

STAFF OFFICERS: *Roll of the Staff of the Commander-in-chief, and of the Brigadier General commanding the Brigade of Mounted Volunteers, employed in the service of the United States, by order of the Governor and commander-in-chief of the State of Illinois [John Reynolds 1830-1834], from the 13th day of June 1831 to the 2d day of July 1831, the day of disbandment at Rock Island IL 200 miles distant from the place of Rendezvous.*

There are 33 Jordan burials in Ebenezer Cemetery. What we now call the "Massey Lane" Cemetery was the burial site of "Father" John Jordan and his wife. The Jordan log cabin at the northeast corner of Brown and East State streets was the site of the first organization of a Methodist society within the present limits of Jacksonville, now known as the congregation of Centenary United Methodist Church. The names of other persons buried in Massey cemetery are unknown to us, currently. James Jordan (also known as "Father" and "John") a Pvt. Rev. War, died 9 July 1835.

By the time one reads in a past issue quarterly about a family researcher who has just the family he or she is looking for, they will hopefully write a letter, enclose an SASE, and get a return from the postoffice stating "removed--address no longer on file", or, "deceased, return to sender". Then what do you do? Readers write and let your editor of this quarterly know!

Here let me caution members about the IMPORTANT-OF MAKING ADDRESS CHANGES IN PAST ISSUES OF THEIR QUARTERLIES.

It has been your editor's practice to publish the entire membership every two years, with names, addresses and surnames being researched, for new members, in each succeeding quarterly, and former members who have sent me their change of address cards.

If you fail to write in the addresses as they change, you might some day write to the right kindred soul at the wrong house of their genealogical contents!

Sometimes a family history researcher comes up with a new idea to present, and maybe you might like to try this when listing your surnames, to show husband/wife combinations, as suggested by Jayne C. Caldwell. She requested, "Could you list them with the pairs slashed as I have done, please". Then gave these combinations.

Bridgman/May -- Chrisman/Hagler -- Ford/Chard -- Strong/Woodward -- Hart/Lee, etc.

Of course not every researcher is going to know the spouse's name to each surname they list. So, how would we go about to solve this problem?

Could we list the ones we know in that fashion, and list the unknowns as Jones/\_?, \_?/(Smith) thus indicating maiden names by putting them in the usual parentheses. Would a system of this kind help ancestral hunters?

We would not want to do away with the surname listings as we have always done them. This method would do away with alphabetizing the names for easier reading. But then, that takes away the opportunity to list one's surnames in order of most importance. No matter "which road one takes", there will be both advantages and disadvantages! \* \* \* \* \*

Please read: 1990 has been a very difficult year to correctly maintain membership records for mailing quarterlies, for several unforeseen reasons. This is the most important, and very complicated, part of the society's business.

Different volunteer officers have been setting up new card files. To coordinate all the efforts, and not have differences in data copies concerning address changes, new memberships etc. has been a problem for your editor to cope with.

Postoffice rules for bulk rate mailings are very exacting, and require strict attention to details as to state separations, and Illinois Zip coding area.

Your editor invites any of our "wonderful members out there" who did not receive their quarterlies, to please write to Florence at her home address. [See address on inside back cover.] Let her know of the deficiency, so that she can mail any missing back issues.

If it is convenient, members living in Jacksonville can pick up their missed quarterlies by going to our library at 203 South Fayette. Call first to see if the Librarian is there, at 245-5911, especially if you want to do research there at the same time.

Your editor hopes all of you find our 1991 *GENEAL JOURNALS* as rewarding as many of you found former issues informative, inspirational and of historical interest pertaining to your ancestor's place of abode, temporarily or permanently.

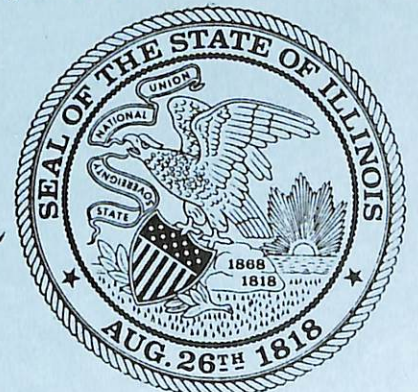
