- COUNTIES OF ILLINOIS -- Their Dates of Formation from the Northwest Territory, through Indiana and Illinois Territories to Statehood.
- 1790 St. Clair, April 27, Knox, June 20, and
  - 1795 Randolph, October 5, organized as counties of the Northwest Territory.
  - 1801 St. Clair, Randolph and Knox Counties redistricted as Indiana Territory.
  - 1803 Boundaries changed, March 25.
  - 1809 St. Clair and Randolph Counties organized as Illinois Territory, April 28.
  - 1812 Madison, Gallatin and Johnson Counties formed September 14.
  - 1814-1815 Boundaries readjusted, Edwards and White Counties added.
  - 1816-1817 Boundaries changed, Jackson, Pope, Monroe, Crawford and Bond added.
  - 1818 January 2, Franklin, Union and Washington formed in Illinois Territory.
  - 1818 April 18, Congress passed Bill making Illinois Territory into a State, and enacted the 4th United States Flag Law.
  - 1818 August 26 the Constitution of the State of Illinois was signed.
  - 1818 December 3, Illinois was admitted to the Federal Union when the Statehood Bill was signed into law by President James Monroe.
  - 1819 Alexander, March 4, Clark, March 22, Jefferson and Wayne, March 26, were formed as counties of the State of Illinois.
  - 1819 July 4, Flaghood Day. Under the new Flag Law passed April 18, 1818, the 21st star representing Illinois was added to the National Flag.
  - 1821. The following counties and adjoining territories were formed: Lawrence, Greene, Sangamon, Pike, Hamilton, Montgomery, and Fayette.
  - 1823 Edgar, Marion, Fulton and "Old" Morgan (included Scott and Cass) formed.
  - 1824 Clay, Clinton and Wabash counties were added.
  - 1825 Ten new counties added, many boundary changes: Calhoun, Adams, Hancock, Henry, Knox, Mercer, Peoria, Putnam, Schuyler, Warren, Sangamon, Madison and Monroe.
  - 1826 Vermilion and McDonough counties were added.
  - 1827 Shelby, Perry, Tazewell and Jo Daviess counties were added.
  - 1829-1831 Nine new counties added were Macoupin, Macon, Coles, McLean, Cook, LaSalle, Putnam, Rock Island, Effingham, Jasper and Monroe.
  - 1833-1835 Champaign and Iroquois counties were formed, with changes in Vermilion, Perry, Franklin, Morgan and Sangamon.
  - 1837-1839 Cass and Scott separated from Morgan County
  - 1859 Ford County was the last of the 102 Illinois counties to be added; however after this time there were many boundary changes.

Several families have made inquiries concerning burials in Waverly East Cemetery including Ford and Sims burials. Anyone knowing the burial site of John Austin Sims is asked to contact Mrs. Myra Martin.

Incorporation papers for the Flinn Cemetery Association have been forwarded to the Secretary of State. Flinn Cemetery is a burying ground within sight of Prentice. Persons interested in this cemetery should contact Mrs. Alice Long, Ashland ILL 62612.

Plans are underway for incorporating Little York, Conlee and Caruthers cemeteries in the Waverly area [and Hodgerson Cemetery just over the line in Sangamon].

An appeal for funds from the public has been received for the maintenance of Hartland Cemetery southeast of Nortonville. Containing 118 marked graves, the cemetery on Hart's Prairie has been maintained by Mr. & Mrs. Glenn Hutton. Hartland is about a mile south of the much larger and better known Bull Cemetery. But, dear correspondants, if you haven't received all the family history answers you need from here, I am indeed sorry to have neglected you. If any person who sent for xeroxed materials, failed to receive it -- please write back and let me know. While nothing gives me greater pleasure than to share the marvelous cemetery, marriage, census, etc. records in our collection it is not always too easy to pull it [yes, that part's easy!]--get it to a xerox machine that is not too busy, in to an envelope, and on its uncertain postal way. [The hard part is getting it filed again ready for "next flight".]

I hope that this issue of our quarterly will stir your hormones into action, as you read the names of your fellow Society members, and that you will find SOMEONE WITH A SURNAME that sounds like yours. Remember, however, not all surnames in the list are from this area. But perhaps some of them may lead you "back East", "up North", "down South", or "out West" where you didn't think you wanted to go in the first place.

Should you find a Surname Pen Pal, and there seems to be no connection, be sure to carefully file the information for future reference, as the pieces may rightfully fit into your Family Jig-Saw Puzzle some day, much to your surprise, or you will be able to exchange some very vital family history with someone who is looking for that very precious material you have in your possession, and only YOU can give it to them - to make both of you very happy.

A riddle: "What Continent do you see when you look in the mirror in the morning?" The answer: Europe -- (You're up).

I hope you're up and at it, family-historically-wise. Do not let a day go by without thinking about some of your problems, for very often your sub-conscious mind will work on it while you are asleep, and give you some fresh new idea to latch on to.

And let me give you some good advice about family stale-mates. You simply can not find "your man/woman". Don't be like a goose - be a duck. I grew up on a farm with both fowls. You can put a goose behind a fence with both ends open, and he will walk back and forth all day looking for an opening "through the fence", instead of being far-sighted enough to take off to the ends of the fence. Now a duck may waddle back and forth a short while longingly looking for that mirage of water he sees in the background, but he eventually decides to explore another way out, and goes around the obstacle into fresh territory and gleefully plunges into the water. Sometimes patience and a little more time will yield results, in the case of family history. While you are waiting for Time - work on some other phase of your research, and probably before you know it, you will accidentally come across the information you need - in an unexpected spot, or way. Well, good luck anyhow.

To find a family Bible, or written record therefrom, can be both rewarding, and frustrating. Rewards come when one discovers birth, marriage and/or death dates of a family known to be related to the researcher or client. Frustration occurs when there is no record in or about the Bible as to where the family was living at the time of the recordings, or any clues as to what town, county or state each event occurred.

Therefore, in copying records from a Bible the transcriber should make a statement as to where the Bible was found - in whose possession -- their address, and date of discovery. In addition, one should make a copy or picture of the Title page and note date of publication. Then taking the xeroxed, photostatted or copied pages to a Notary Public, one can verify the authenticity of the record, show person who copied it, address and date. This record can then be copied by other family historians with confidence, or be used as evidence for joining heritage societies, just as any other legal document. It is desirable, for further Bible identification, to xerox one or more pictures that may be in that particular issue. Sometimes the picture's date of engraving may be the only clue to approximate date of publication, especially when the title page is missing. If such page is missing, then xerox the opening plate in the New Testament, and the first pages of the Concordance or indexes as a method of fully identifying the Bible. Copying a well-worn page of Scripture originally used by former readers may create a sentimental tie to more recent relatives. Always look for newspaper clippings or obituaries which may be the most valuable part of recording the Bible's contents genealogically.

Should you find a Bible reading made years ago, giving location in someone's home and you desire to "track it down", use these hints for relocating it:

1. If name and address of owner is given (hopefully the year it was recorded), look in the City Directory for that person, or address;
2. Check death records in county of their residence for date of death and burial place; then seek obituaries in local newspapers;
3. Check Circuit Court probate records for estate administrations or Wills. If person or direct descendant is on probate index, secure a copy of the Petition for Letters of Administration. This one-sheeted document will give death date of decedent, surviving heirs, administrator(s) if he died intestate, or executor(s) if deceased had a Will. Some of these heirs may still be living.
4. If name and address of Bible owner is given, and not too many years have elapsed, inquire of neighbors if they knew of this person or their relatives. Someone related may be yet living in that particular town, and would be the most likely ones to possess the Bible. Or it may have been given to the local library.

One other suggestion for preserving these valuable Bible records for posterity -- make several copies, as advised, and donate to your genealogical society, (or societies), and to any State library where such collections may be garnered.

In the Illinois State Historical Society are hundreds of Bible Records collected by the D.A.R. members and placed in their Record Books. All of these have been indexed and available in drawers numbered 351-354. (There is a white circle with box number on each drawer in their master filing system.) These D.A.R. boxes general index on Church records, death transcriptions, Land records, Local History, Marriage Licenses, Wills, Cemeteries, etc. are numbered 354-360.

There may be family records in the manuscript division of the library. See



drawers 361-387 on filing cabinet side opposite the D.A.R. indexes. Further over to the right are Newspaper Index drawers numbered 461-468. Perhaps obituaries may be located here. Also see the several big newspaper index books for the 1860's at the check-in desk. You might find valuable newspaper references from the microfilms by looking for your favorite family names or history of an area in these huge books. Ask at the desk how to locate their relatively new collection of family histories in the vertical files.

Are you aware of the fact that single pages of the vital records were sometimes torn from the Family Bible and mailed to the Federal Government as verification of dependency status, age of pensioner, or marriage? The Revolutionary War files of the National Archives Pension and Bounty Land Records are available on microfilm. (But don't ask ME how.) One can also send proper applications for such records to the General Services Administration, but it is now a long drawn-out procedure because of the huge increase for such requests.

If there is difficulty in reading the handwritten data from a Bible, be prepared with a good light and a strong magnifying lens. Be aware of the fact that certain styles of handwriting in the 1850's, and on, made use of the English double ss (which looked like fs or f; that a capital S looked like our L, and vice versa.

Copy each page word for word, line for line. Be observant of common faults such as ink seeping through to distort the writing or figures, for blurs caused by tears falling on wet ink, for mold or mildew spots. Do not flip the pages of any old and dusty book close to your face or you will wind up with a very unpleasant case of sinusitis or dust pneumonia. Turn pages carefully and slowly.

If one person obviously did not make all entries in the Bible, handwriting habits and pen pressure will be factors in transcribing properly. That person may make S's and L's like you are used to, and you will have to reverse your thinking as to the spelling of names. If there are erasures, cross-outs or write-overs, note each one. Any notes or additions to the original record should be enclosed in (parentheses) or [brackets].

My thanks for inspiration and assists in writing this article go to Mrs. F. M.S.Bell, 2655 Taylor St., Eugene ORE 97405. She sent me a copy of her teaching charts in Researching Alternative Spellings of Names of Persons and Places. This valuable packet would be very helpful for a genealogist who is having difficulties with surname spellings and handwriting differences. Single copies of her packet are \$3.50 postpaid. Ask her for bulk rates for instructors or use by genealogical societies.

Maxine Bell's final statement on "The Family Bible" outline is timely here:

"VIII. Read the Family Bible with the same devotion as that of your ancestors."

Send a long stamped self-addressed envelope for each 4 pages.

For those persons who visit the Library, be sure to see indexes either at back of book, but sometimes after each different section.

Q. If a person dies without a will (intestate), what is the order of succession of heirs?

A. The rule of descent is as follows:

- 1) spouse, 2) descendants, 3) parents,
- 4) brother or sister, 5) descendant of brother or sister, 6) grandparent,
- 7) descendant of grandparent, or
- 8) nearest kindred.

If a person dies leaving no kindred, real estate becomes the property of the county in which it is located, under Illinois law. Personal property reverts to the county in which the person resided. ----Illinois State Bar Assn.



Perhaps our readers will remember our quotes from her book of poetry in our March 1978 *Geneal Journal*. Elsie had written her life story all in 4-line stanzas, which makes it very interesting and unique family history.

In the front of the book she says: "A book I bought for my son Perry, when a school boy and as I found it this morning [March 28, 1860] lying on my table, I thought I would try to scribble down a brief recital of the labors of my childhood, for the amusement of my grandchildren and great-grand children. In the year of Eighteen Hundred and Fifty Six, I was severely afflicted with inflammatory rheumatism, more especially in my right hand and right eye. My hand soon recovered, but my eye is still very sore, so I cannot see to work, but with a large goose quill, that makes a large black mark, I can see to write a part of my time and it is amusement for me."

LINES COMPOSED ON FAMILY CIRCLE

My grandfather came from England when he was ten years old,  
Came with his widow mother and only son, I'm told.  
In Seventeen Twenty Nine, this family crossed the sea,  
And settled near Philadelphia in this country.

And when he had grown up, about the age of twenty three,  
He married a Holland girl and raised a family.  
They were industrious and prospered, friend Quakers by profession,  
They lived in Philadelphia and had a good possession.

They had a dozen children and raised them every one,  
Among them were three daughters, the other nine were sons,  
Those all grew up and married and all had family,  
But the oldest daughter died, when she had children three.

The other eleven lived on up to good old age,  
And ten of them saw eighty before they left the stage,  
Some of them eighty-four, my father eighty five,  
Some of them saw ninety and still were yet alive.

And when those Strawns grew up, some went toward the west,  
And stopped in different states, just as they saw it best.  
Some settled in Kentucky and some in Illinois.  
Some in Indiana, and some in Iroquois.

And some there are in York state, a host in Pennsylvania,  
And lots in Ohio, Oregon and California.  
And from straight accounts that I have had of late,  
You may find some of the name in almost every state.

And if you meet a Strawn in a city, town or lawn,  
He is of the House of Jacob, that same orphan, Jacob Strawn.  
We are now becoming numerous, the family the same,  
Throughout the tribes, two thirds are sons to still bear up the name.

My parents in Ohio, settled all their children there,  
But after they were seventy, they followed them off here. [Illinois.]  
One day there came a word, there was to be a mowing,  
I thought I'd like to see it, and laid aside my sewing.

I stepped out in the meadow and there they were a going,  
Four generations in the meadow mowing,  
My father and my brother, his son and his son's son,  
Mowing in the meadow, following each other on.



There were a number more looking at the fete,  
They handled well their scythes and laid their swathes complete,  
Perhaps some of those little ones would like to know our age,  
And when their ancestors did first come on the stage.

[At this point we are going to give the "History of the Strawn Family" from a 9-page manuscript, by E.S. Armstrong 1789-1871, "A Madonna of the Trail". Call # Ill. St. Hist. Lib. -- EZG S913A.]

LANCELOT STRAWN -- Born probably in North England or Scotland. Died in Middletown Township, Buck's Co., Pa. in 1718. It seems that he was not originally a member of the Society of Friends or Quakers. His wife:-

MARY (COOPER) BUCKMAN, born Nov. 23rd 1680 Eng. arrived at Philadelphia in 1682 among the first settlers, on the "Ship Welcome". She died in 1739 or 1740 in New Jersey. Her Will however was probated in Buck's Co., Pa.

She was a birthright member of the Religious Society of Friends. They had one child, a son Jacob, who married Christiana Percell, a girl from Holland, and they had 12 children.

"Brief History of the Ancestors of Elsie Strawn as They Came to America" by Nellie McClish Thompson, Lacon, Illinois"

Lancelot Strawn came over with William Penn. Jacob Strawn, his son, was a member of the famous Vigilance Committee that served previous to, and shortly after the beginning of the Revolutionary War. Thus he was a Revolutionary soldier, contrary to his Quaker belief.

Jacob's son, Isaiah, father of Elsie, became a Revolutionary soldier at the age of 19 years and carried a buckshot in his ankle the remainder of his life. He is buried in Florid Cemetery, Florid, Putnam County, Ill. He and his wife, Rachel, are buried side by side in this beautiful little cemetery. The Daughters of the American Revolution have placed a bronze marker on his grave.

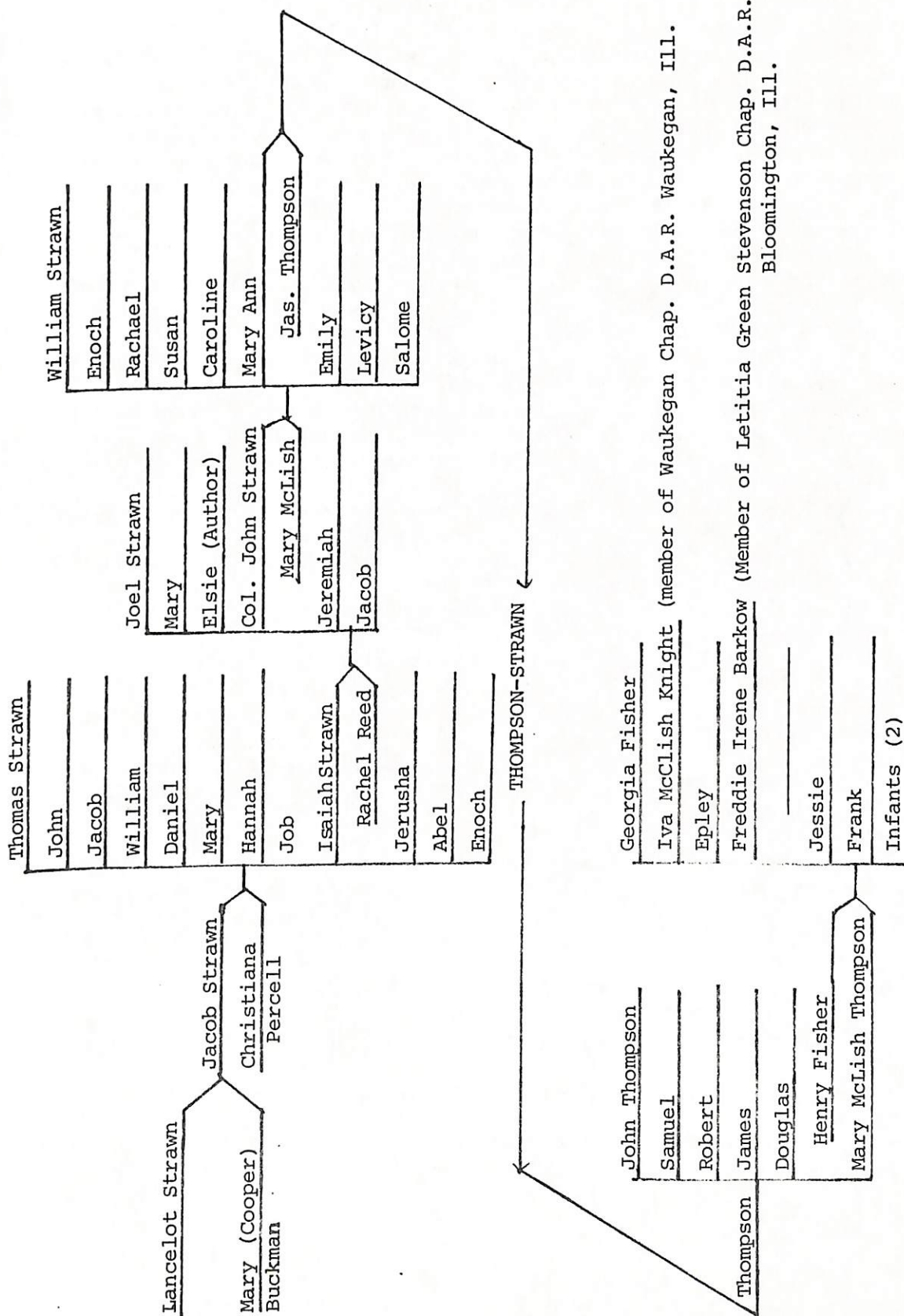
Homes of Isaiah and Rachel Strawn's children in later life:

Joel -- near Ottawa, Illinois; Mary -- remained in Ohio; Elsie -- near Ottawa, Ill.; John -- part of Putnam County (now Marshall) Ill.; Jeremiah -- Putnam County, removed to Ottawa, Ill.; Jacob -- Morgan County, near Jacksonville, Ill.

Elsie's poem "Lines Composed on Family Circle", ends with this stanza:

We should be very thankful we've been blessed with length of days,  
And to thy indulgent care, O, Lord, we would give praise,  
And when we come to die, O, may we be forgiven,  
May we be saved now and ever last a family in heaven.





This was such an interesting and new way to accomplish a Family Tree of the Strawn-Buckman family, from Ancestor to Descendants, that your Editor decided to copy it for you as an example that you might use some day. It was a part of the 9-page ms quoted, call # EZG S193a, Ill. State Hist. Library. Your Editor, Florence Hutchison, was very happy to find Elsie's original manuscript written "with quill pen" in the manuscript Division of the Library. No relatives contacted knew where it was. This is a rare hand-written family history of about 120 years ago! Will yours survive that long?



# JOSHUA ARMSTRONG'S BIBLE.

This Bible was once in the home of Mrs. Lucinda Lindsey, 759 W. Douglas, in Jacksonville. Capt. Kenneth S. Stice, 701 W. Green St., Urbana, Ill. requested that she let him copy it in September 1938. Sara John English also copied it and put on file at the Illinois State Historical Library in 1930 during her reign as D.A.R. State Librarian. This typed version will be given here.

As to who sent your Editor all of these papers, I do not presently know, as the donor's name was not on any of the papers, and their letter became separated from the rest of it. Thanks, however, are due the person who gave them to me.

Lucinda Armstrong Lindsey was a great-great-grand-daughter of the Revolutionary War soldier, Joshua Armstrong. As to how he might be related to the husband of Elsie Strawn Armstrong I have no idea. But perhaps some of our members will know of this relationship, or be interested in this soldier buried in Jerseyville. Reading from this Bible:

William Armstrong married Susan H. Oden, daughter of Thomas Oden, Esq. of Charles County, Mo., in 1819. He was a soldier of the War of 1812. They are buried in Yatesville Cemetery, near Prentice, Illinois. (In Morgan County.)

Joshua Armstrong and Sarah Moss, his wife, are buried in Richwood cemetery, Jersey Co., Ill. He was a Revolutionary War soldier, enlisted from Pennsylvania, and drew a pension. (Your Editor has 9 more pages of a sketch on this soldier's war record by Mrs. English, and other descendants.)

ILLINOIS LAW SAYS:

Q. When a spouse dies without a will and leaves an insurance policy naming the surviving spouse as beneficiary, must that person wait to receive the insurance money until the estate has been settled?

A. No. Insurance benefits are paid directly to the beneficiary just as quickly as proof of death is submitted to the insurer. Insurance policies are not considered part of the deceased's personal property and need not go through the probate court.

Q. My mother, who is in her 80's, made a will several years ago. Now she wants to make a new will to specifically add her first great-grandchild. Is she too old to have a new will written?

A. No. A person is never too old to rewrite or revise a will as long as the person is competent to make such changes. The best procedure is to make a simple addition known as a *codicil*, without the necessity of preparing a new will. Any change in the will must conform to requirements established by law.

[It is wise to have such changes accomplished by a lawyer. This might preclude a will contest at a later date.]

One can submit questions, such as the published ones above, to the Illinois State Bar Association, Illinois Bar Center, Springfield IL 62701. They will not give personal answers, but sometimes answer them in the columns of the Springfield newspapers.

Did you know that if a couple has been married for over 20 years, in Illinois, and are then divorced, that the spouse may collect Social Security benefits of the deceased person if any are forth-coming?

One should not wait for the lawyers to start probate, but immediately get a copy of the death certificate, marriage and divorce papers for evidence, and go to the nearest Social Security office for further information as to their rights.

Your Editor gave this advice to one of our members who followed through on this item and received her first check within 2 weeks after submitting the papers. Soon she will be eligible for Medicare benefits.

"Proof of death" is a certified copy of the death certificate secured for the proper fees from the County Clerk in whose county the person deceased. This may not be the county in which the person resided, nor was buried.

"Rights of an Adopted Child". A child who has been lawfully adopted has the same inheritance rights as a natural child. Similarly, the adopting parents inherit from the child as though the child were their own.

"Rights of a Stepchild". A stepchild inherits from the natural parent, but not from the stepparent unless the child has been legally adopted by the stepparent, or is mentioned in the stepparent's will.

"Children Born After a Will Is Made". A child born after a will is executed will be entitled to the same portion of the estate that the child could have claimed if the parent had died without a will.

Individuals desiring more information on probate laws in the State of Illinois may ask for Circular 1164 Illinois Wills, Joint Tenancy, Inheritance Tax, and Probate Procedure, An Agricultural Law Publication, published by the Cooperative Extension Service, University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign. One may get this pamphlet from the local Cooperative Extension Service in his county.

Plat Maps of a given County may also be secured from the Extension Service, or they can tell a person where such are available. No price can be given, as they differ from county to county. Genealogists, not familiar with deeds and land descriptions would do well to study this information in the front of these books.

Page 1: THE CHOLERA: From the *Illinois Patriot*, Jacksonville, Saturday, August 21(?), 1833. This print-out from the newspaper was kindly sent to us by Judith I. Tolivaisa, one of our Connecticut members. She is researching Peyton's Ashlock's, Redman's and McLain's, among others in Cass, Morgan, Scott and Greene Counties. We thought that they names in this article may disclose what happened to some of YOUR relatives.

"No new case of this disease has occurred in Jacksonville since our last publication. There have, indeed, been two death by Cholera, since last Saturday morning, but they were of some days standing. We have now every inducement to believe that this destroyer of human life has taken its flight, at least for a season, from this place.

"While we congratulate our friends and neighbors in view of their escape from the grasp of the Destroyer, we do not forget that there are many, very many, bleeding hearts among us--made desolate by their recent afflictions-- who have a claim upon our tenderest sympathies. We should be wanting in the common feelings of humanity, had we no inclination to weep with those who weep, at such a time as this. . . . Although many mourners are to be seen in our streets, we may, by contrasting the mortality of this place during the late visitation with the condition of Palmyra, Lexington, Paris and St. Charles, and a number of other places, see abundant cause to offer our thanksgiving to Him, who has said to the disease in this village "thus far shalt thou come, but no father."

"We believe the following is a correct list of all the deaths by Cholera, which have occurred in Jacksonville from the introduction of the disease among us, to the present time.

 Mrs. Tolivaisa says: "Probably both Daniel Payton who died 29 June 1833 and Wm. Ashlock who died 12 Oct 1833 in Sangamon, died of cholera.



It is a thrilling chapter in my life to organize a new society, or a new cemetery association. The procedures are the same, except the wording used to fit the situation. I was invited to give a lecture on genealogy to a group which met at the Staunton Library (Macoupin County), called by the Friends of the Library, whose president is Victor H. Heinemeyer, 912 West Henry St., Staunton IL 62088. Several of the persons in attendance had just finished a genealogical course at SIU, Edwardsville Campus. I will here give the procedures we used, after my talk on "Am I My Mother's and Father's Lineage Keeper", in such a way that the effort may be used by other people who are interested in starting group action. The logical name for this organization was "Staunton Area Genealogical Society." Temporary officers elected June 8, 1980 were:

Charter Membership Dues are \$5.00 per individual, except that a spouse or child may have membership @ 1.00 each, additional.

Any person desiring membership from any place is welcome to send dues, or make inquiries pertaining to family history.

All groups meeting for the first time should have a temporary secretary and chairman in mind. They should be prepared with a roll book to let each person sign who is in attendance, who should write name and address. Telephone numbers, while not obligatory, might some day be helpful. It would be wise to have a receipt book ready for dues (just in case!). After temporary officers are elected, and dues are established, the roll book should be passed again, and everyone interested in becoming a member should sign their name under the proper heading, Membership List as of \_\_\_\_\_, 1980. Then the new secretary will have this list from which to write receipts for dues paid, being assisted in these duties by the new treasurer (if present.)

Temporary chairman of meeting: "I now declare this public assembly of persons with genealogical interests duly opened for the transaction of such business as may come before it." [According to Robert's Rules of Order, Revised, mass meetings with no formally adopted rules, proceed according to common parliamentary procedures, and anyone present may vote. An announcement of public nature in the newspaper specifying that the meeting concerns genealogy (or cemetery associations), has "force equivalent to bylaws of an organized society." -- If any person present questions the legality of the situation, see Section 52.]

TC (continuing): "The purpose of this meeting is to discuss the possibility of forming a genealogical society for the mutual benefit of those persons desiring to do educational, historical and patriotic research in this area, for themselves, and for public benefit." [The underlined words are those acceptable by the Internal Revenue Service for determining, eventually, that this society is tax-exempt not-for-profit organization under 501 (c)(3) of the IRS Code of 1954, and not as a Private Foundation. The statement given above by the temporary chairman should be quoted in the first minutes.]

TC: "I now entertain a motion to form a genealogical society."  
[After such motion has been made, and seconded, the matter can be discussed by the group, and voted upon. When favorable, the next order of business is to nominate and elect (with their consent), one by one, at least 3 temporary officers -- President; Secretary and Treasurer. It would be wise for the new president to appoint some one to send in news notices, if duty not assigned to an officer. Temporary Chairman may continue through business, or turn it over to



elected temporary president, as occasion deems suitable.]

The next order of business is setting dues, and passing the roll book around again for persons desiring membership to sign. (Not all persons in attendance may wish to become members at this first meeting.) A name should be selected for the organization, questions answered as to future activities, and a date set for the next meeting, with time and place to be announced in the newspapers, and by telephoning prospective members. The secretary should be provided with names and addresses of people to whom she could write letters of invitation. Group participation in these business matters will spell "S-U-C-C-E-S-S" for the Society-in-the making.

At the Staunton meeting, the first question asked by the president-nominee was: "Do we have to become incorporated to be recognized as a not-for-profit educational organization?" My answer to her was "The St. Louis Director of the Internal Revenue Service has ruled that no organization has to be incorporated to receive this tax-exempt status." I explained that incorporation may come at a much later date, if desired by the membership, in order to receive grants for expansion or establishment of a library or museum, or that large gifts, devises, or donations may be declared tax deductible by the giver. A bulk-rate mailing privilege for at least 200 pieces of like mail requires incorporation, according to postoffice rules and regulations.

However, all organizations should file Form SS-4 with the Internal Revenue Service soon after organization. The Society will then receive a Social Security number on a card labeled "not-for-profit organization" which will, in most cases give exemption from paying Illinois taxes on most items purchased in the name of the Society; however there are some firms which may insist upon a letter from the Illinois Department of Revenue showing Illinois exemption. If this is so, please contact Mrs. Hutchison as to how to go about this procedure.

Since we are talking about taxes, let me point out that genealogical societies may publish quarterlies and news letters, and their own materials without paying Illinois sales tax on any of these items, just as long as they do not put these items in the hands of a magazine or book agency to sell - which creates competition, and thereby requires payment of sales tax. If a Society sells a reprint of a published book, then they are required to pay sales tax on items sold to persons in Illinois, but not pay sales tax on items sold to libraries or out-of-state persons. This is a complicated procedure. When one sells reprints and collects the money for the publisher, and the Society's gross annual receipts go over \$10,000, then they must file a 990 tax report with the Internal Revenue Service. This does not effect the newly-organized society because they will not be going into these services for quite some time after organizing. But they are points for future officers to be aware of, and to consider when the proper time comes.

A News-letter is the best approach to making contact with members. 4 sheets of 8 1/2 x 11 paper, printed both sides, folded in half and stapled, can be sent for 15 cents first class. Additional sheets (up to 4) costs 13 cents extra).

Because the north-western quarter of Macoupin County, in which Staunton is located, has had a history of being in different counties, I recommended that genealogists study the changes in "Counties of Illinois, Their Origin and Evolution", distributed free by the Secretary of State, Springfield IL 62756. Macoupin was part of St.Clair County 1790-1812, when it was Madison Co. till 1821. 1821-1825 it was part of Greene, then back to Madison. It was organized as Macoupin County 17 Jan 1829. Deeds, marriages and Court records will be in those counties in years specified.

On June 15, 1980 your officers started (again hopefully) a headquarters and library for the Society. We have secured Room 207 in the Dunlap Hotel, across the way from the Courthouse. We hope that it will someday expand into a regular West Central Illinois Genealogical and Historical Library in some good housing. I have thousands of cards in my home which must be put together in a filing cabinet so that we can easily find people instead of going through many indexes. But we have need of a 3x5 card index filing cabinet. The first one I am putting in there is already filled with cards. 4-drawer filing cabinets will be needed.

If any person has some county history books, census records from other states, marriage records, or anything that they have finished with, and have as excess property, we would appreciate receiving them. Send them to P.O.Box 21, and be sure to give name and address of donor. Include a list, please, so that we will have a record as to what is sent. On second thought, perhaps it would be best if you wrote us a letter and told us what you had. Perhaps we might get too many of one kind, otherwise.

Donations of money - labeled Library Fund - would be very usable. Then we could purchase books that were being published, of value in this area, and equipment as needed. This is a brand new project, and we have no idea as to "how the worm is going to turn". So if you think of us as being a novice at this business -- we are.

THE NEW "ILLINOIS RECORDS ACT", AS RECENTLY AMENDED HAS BEEN MISINTERPRETTED BY GENEALOGISTS IN THE STATE OF ILLINOIS.

The Illinois State Genealogical Society winter Quarterly, Vol.IX, No. 4, quoted an article taken from the Newsletter of the State Archives, *For The Record*. However, genealogists have misinterpreted what it said pertaining to the use of "records that are more than 75 years old," from which restrictions were removed by the recent "Illinois Records Act Amendment."

This Record Act does NOT apply to the vital records of birth, death and marriage held in the offices of the County Clerks. This Act has no effect on such records.

This Record Act DOES apply to records more than 75 years old held by the Illinois State Archives in Springfield.

The amendment which applies only to State Archival records:

1. Removes restrictions on records that are more than 75 years old.
2. Records more recent than 75 years will be open to researchers, also, provided they sign an affidavit agreeing to preserve the confidentiality of any person(s) named in the records.
3. Records, more recent than 75 years, may not be exchanged with any person, firm or corporation, unless the identity of person(s) named in the record has been removed.
4. The exception: this openness of records does not apply to any State Hospital or other State Institutional records, of any age, as recently protected by the Mental Health and Developmental Disabilities Confidentiality Act.

"Any violation of the agreement between the user and the Secretary of State is a Class A misdemeanor, which is punishable by imprisonment in a penal institution for not more than one year, or a fine not exceeding \$1000, or both."

The State Archives officials point out that this new policy regarding former restrictions does much to improve relations with researchers who desire to use resources that previously were closed to the public.

At the national level, your letters to the National Archives did some good. A new Director has been named. He appears to be well qualified for the job, and he will undoubtedly point the way to better public relations with genealogical researchers, and give much better service than has been true of the recent past.

#### HOW TO FIND ANCESTORS IN THE BLACKHAWK AND MEXICAN WARS.

This book is at the Illinois State Historical Library, and probably the Archives.

"Record of the Services of Illinois Soldiers in the Black Hawk War 1831-32, and in the Mexican War 1846-48, containing a complete roster of Commissioned Officers and Enlisted Men of both wars, taken from the official rolls on file in the War Department, Washington, D.C."

It contains an Appendix giving record of the services of the Illinois Militia Rangers and Riflemen, in protecting the frontier from the ravages of the Indians from 1810 to 1813. Prepared and published by authority of the 32nd General Assembly, by Isaac H. Elliott, Adjutant-General of the State of Illinois, 1902.

CASS COUNTY MARRIAGES, 1847-1852 IN D.A.R. RECORD BOOK, Vol. 14, 1957.

This was erroneously listed as Morgan County in the D.A.R. book. I checked this out, and found they were for Cass County, placed there by Marjorie Taylor who was then librarian for our local D.A.R. Chapter. She is from Cass County, and presently President of the Cass County Historical Society. (This book at ILL.ST.HIST.Lib.)

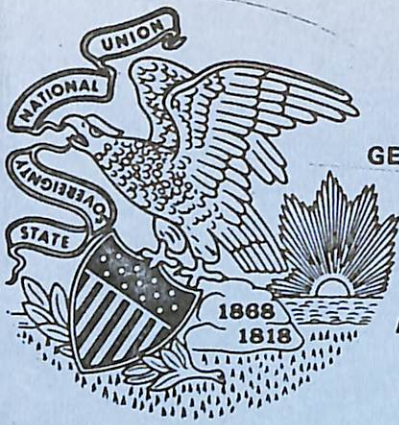
