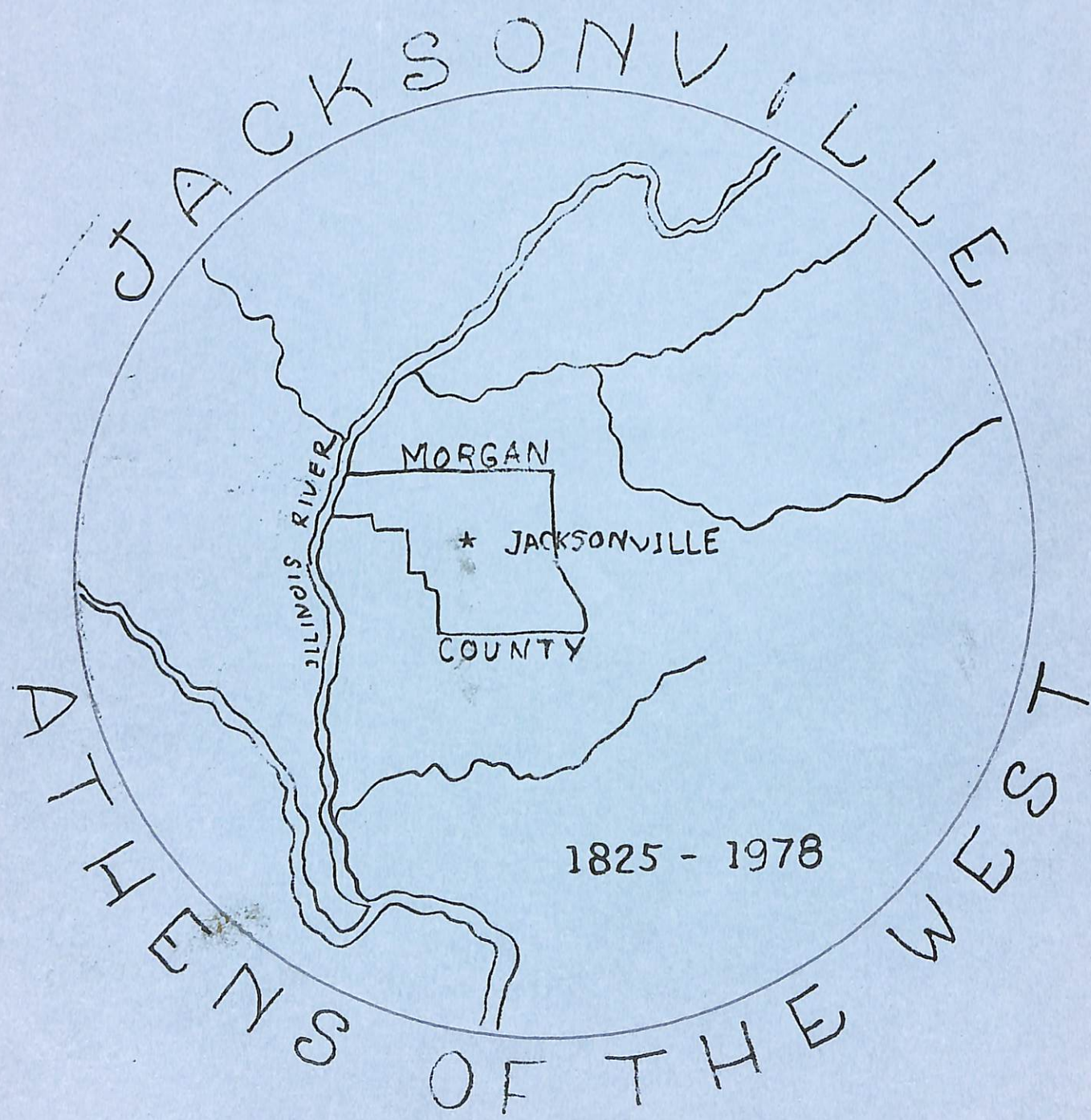

Each Member may file his or her own Surname Index Cards with our Society. These assist us to locate other genealogists working the same family, and to get them together for mutual benefit.

REGULAR MEETINGS: 4th Thursday night, 7:30 p.m. Illinois Power Auditorium on West Lafayette Avenue. We do not meet in July. Our November meeting is usually the Thursday following Thanksgiving. Our annual election of officers is at the January meeting.

Your Officers and Board Members appreciate your support as indicated by your nice letters, and membership applications. This is our only way to pay for the ever-increasing costs of publishing our Quarterly, the *Jacksonville Il Geneal Journal*, which contains hundreds of names from Courthouse records, cemeteries, churches, census indexes, and other materials from several counties in our area including Cass, Greene, Morgan, Scott, etc. Most of these records have never been published before, nor available for public use otherwise.

LETTERS OF INQUIRY are read in open meetings. We publish names sought in this area in our news notices, with name and address of seeker. This has proved to be a popular feature, and is "read far and wide", because our notices reach about 10 area newspapers.

Many of our records have been placed on file with the Jacksonville Public Library, the Illinois State Historical Library, The State Archives, and the Lincoln Library in Springfield. For Morgan, Greene and Cass Cemetery records see Bob Dalton's 3 volumes on Morgan, and Crumrin's book on Cass at the Public Library.

We urge you to copy your family records, get them in readable shape as soon as possible, and file with a library and/or genealogical society. Were you to suddenly be thrust on the Other Side of Life, what would you leave behind for all of your efforts? A lot of unintelligible scribbling? or an orderly family history booklet that others could pick up, add to, and work on with pleasure instead of puzzlement.

Divide your maternal and paternal lineages so as to avoid confusion of names, and putting families together who are not related, except for the #1 Person. These can be more efficiently filed in Society records.

If you wish to receive your current Membership Card would you be kind enough to enclose a self-addressed stamped envelope [SASE]? And, please, make them LONG ones when requesting genealogical materials so that they won't have to be folded so much.

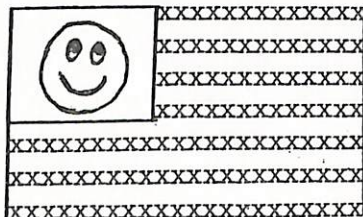

JACKSONVILLE, ILLINOIS, "ATHENS OF THE WEST", AND "DIAMOND GROVE COUNTRY"

Have you ever wondered why Jacksonville was termed "The Athens of the West"? I did, and started looking for detailed answers. Able assistance was given by Harry Heusted from the Jacksonville Public Library when he located the Centennial Ode brochure, a program presented at the Chautauqua of August 26, 1925.

The Ode, written by David W. Reid, provides a conversation between *History* and *Pallas Athena*. May you enjoy reading this beautiful high-flown language of former days given on other pages in this quarterly.

It is always a popular practice to quote the dictionary. "Athens, city-state and cultural center of Ancient Greece; a city regarded as a center of culture and intellectual achievement [Boston has often been called the *Athens of America*]."

Before continuing, *Athenaeum* needs clarification since that was the name of Dr. W. D. Sanders' school for young ladies organized in Jacksonville by 1864. This history and picture of the school will be found in the 1878 History of Morgan County, pages 394-396. The dictionary defines "athenaeum as a school in ancient Rome for the study of the arts; also a temple where poets read their works. Athena was a major Greek deity, goddess of war, fertility, arts and wisdom. 2: a building or a room in which books, periodicals and newspapers are kept for use: reading room, library."

Pardon my ignorance, but all of these things I did not know prior to consulting the dictionary and my ever useful *Ency. Brit.* I was delighted to learn that the Boston *Athenaeum* has George Washington's library housed there. Perhaps that will assist my research some day.

Harry Heusted also located a book which gives early Morgan County history: "Barton Warren Stone, Pathfinder of Christian Union, *A Story of His Life and Times*" by Charles Crossfield Ware, 1932: The Bethany Press, St. Louis, Missouri. Page 203 reads:

Lexington has long been called "Athens of the West." First and last it has had many schools. Transylvania Seminary, later fashioned into a university was first. The university got off to a slow start. It was hampered by clashes of religious jealousy with community pride. During the first eighteen years of the nineteenth century it graduated but twenty-two. Horace Holley came to preside, however, in 1818, and there were 558 to receive their diplomas during the 9 years he remained.

The state [Kentucky] had not worked out a public school system. It was the day of the private high school. About 1815 [Barton] Stone opened his school in Lexington. . . . They "taught the English Grammar, Latin, Greek and some of the sciences." Stone said the attendance at his school was much better than that at Transylvania. His school was supported by the affluent.

I will quote extensively from Ware's Stone history as it applies to Morgan County, but first want to distinguish between two areas with the appellation "Diamond Grove". The present Diamond Grove Cemetery in the Southeast Quarter of Section 30, Township 15 North, Range 10 West of the Third Principal Meridian on Lincoln Avenue in southwest Jacksonville, was labeled such by its first settler Isaac Fort Roe. Referring to the map on the cover of our March 1978 quarterly this cemetery is on Map #11. A small town called Diamond Grove started around Roe, one of the businesses being the blacksmith shop of Isaac Reeve and his sons.

The Diamond Grove Baptist Church and nearby cemetery, established by Daniel D. Holmes, is in Section 2, Township 14 North, Range 10 West, 3 PM, and is on Map

#7. Barton W. Stone owned land just to the north of this area, and called it the Diamond Grove Prairie. This was open land between the Mauvaisterre and Sandy Creeks which evidently extended eastward from the grove of trees called Diamond Grove by Roe as he viewed the ice-covered trees shining like diamonds in the sun on January 23, 1820. Here he selected a place of residence, and in February built a log cabin and became one of the first three settlers in the county. For further reference to this read "Past and Present" p. 267 forward in the 1878 Morgan County History by Donnelley Loyd & Co.

Pages 322 and 324 of Ware's history on Barton W. Stone relates:

It was four o'clock on Saturday morning, November 9, 1844 . . . when Father Stone's hour had come. He reclined his head on his son's shoulder. The silver cord was loosed. His day was done.

There was no railroad out of Hannibal. The sorrowing relatives and friends followed a wagon which bore Stone's body back to the locust grove west of his cabin home on Diamond Grove Prairie. There he was buried. The farm was sold in January, 1846, when his body was removed to the cemetery of Antioch Christian Church, 7 miles east of Jacksonville on the old Springfield trail. Then in the spring of 1847 Kentucky friends by an irresistible sentiment removed finally his dust to Cane Ridge. There by all the canons of taste and of the fitness of things it will remain.

The chapter XIX on "Blue-Grass Pivot" reveals a lot of names of men who were baptized and ordained by Barton W. Stone and his associates who spread out to all the neighboring states south, west and north and may be of interest to genealogists looking for family roots. Here are representative paragraphs:

To Illinois came William Kinkade while it was yet a territory. He came from Lexington, Kentucky, where he had lived in the home of Barton Stone. Kinkade located in Lawrence County, and was a member of the Illinois convention which adopted a constitution for admission to the Union . . .

To Illinois also came D. Pat Henderson from Fayette County, Kentucky. Stone had baptized Henderson in the North Elkhorn, at Prewitt's Mill, on July 5, 1832.

About this time a host of Kentucky Christian leaders went thither, among whom were William Davenport, James E. Robeson, John England, Harrison W. Osborne, Josephus Hewitt, William Trabue Major, James A Lindsey, and Hughes Bowles.

In 1832, Stone visited Jacksonville, Illinois. His purposes were to evangelize, to seek location for a new home, and to establish a Christian college. Associated with him was T. F. Johnson, whose wife was a relative of Stone. He was persuaded to remain at Georgetown, [however] where shortly Bacon College was launched.

Stone, in the fall of 1832, with the assistance of Harrison W. Osborne and Josephus Hewitt, held meetings in Lawrenceville, Jacksonville, Carrollton, Rushville, Springfield, and other places. He reported: "We think a glorious ingathering of souls into the Kingdom has commenced in that country. . . ."

For interesting reference to the history of Morgan County refer to Chapter XX "Diamond Grove and Evening Star" which we quote in part:

Central Illinois with its vast expanse of fertile prairie land was the home of the Kickapoo Indians. They ceded it to the federal government on July 30, 1819, for a half-cent per acre. Yielding to a civilization in which

they could become no integral part, they sold their ancestral estate for a song The first white man's home south of Jacksonville was erected in February, 1820, by Isaac Fort Roe, an agent of the New York Emigration Society. He called it Diamond Grove. Settlement after this was accelerated. Early in 1823 Morgan County was established [from territory attached to Greene County, never Sangamon.] Founders of the county called it, "The Diamond Grove Country."

Jacksonville was the county seat. The plat of its site was recorded April 26, 1825. When Stone removed there in September 1834, it was "hardly more than a crowded village on the outposts of civilized Illinois." With its 1800 people it was the largest town in the state.

A settler from New England, Jonathan Baldwin Turner, then a professor in Illinois College, said: "You cannot find a village east of the Hudson, of the same number of inhabitants, possessing so many men of literary eminence and moral worth, nor a community of greater refinement in taste and manners."

Julian Monsen Sturtevant, one of the *Yale Band*, wrote: "I am glad to remember that Jacksonville did not have its origin in the horse race, gambling hell or other rascality. It was in the Church. Clear back to the beginning of the town there was a religious atmosphere. This town has always been a sort of Jerusalem where great things were to be done for the Christian cause."

There were five churches: Methodist, Presbyterian, Christian, Episcopalian, and Congregational. The last named group had arisen to corporate life in 1833 out of the heresy trial of Edward Beecher, Julian M. Sturtevant, and William Kirby. Beecher was the first and Sturtevant the second president of Illinois College, a local Congregational institution, which had opened 4 years before Stone's coming.

The community had its press agent in John Mason Peck and his able writer-associate, John Russell of Bluffdale, in Greene County. In his *Gazetteer*, published in Jacksonville, in 1834, he declared: "Emigration, attended with industry and enterprise, in a few fleeting years, has changed a region that we have seen in all the wildness of uncultivated nature, into smiling villages and luxuriant fields and rendered it the happy abode of intelligence and virtue.

"Morgan County is in the advance of other counties in those enterprises which tend to form habits of virtue, and ennoble the deathless mind. It has a vigorous Bible society, with branches in several settlements; a Sunday school union, with about 70 Sabbath schools. An equal number of common schools are taught a portion of the year during the week. Temperance societies exert an influence in many settlements." No wonder the county seat, Jacksonville, was called "The Athens of the West." Fifteen years later, in the rush for gold, California attained to the rainbow title of "Far West".

The settler had come for the fertile land. Peck's words in 1831 had gone straight to the prospective pioneer's heart when he said: "Morgan County is well proportioned into timber and prairie, tolerably well-watered and contains the finest tract of farming land around Jacksonville, I have ever seen. Improved farms in the populous parts of the county sell from 8 to 15 dollars per acre."

"The most aristocratic dwelling" in Jacksonville in 1830 was described as "a two-roomed log house, with the upper floored so that the little children slept there. This upper room was reached by a ladder on the outside and at night a candle was thrust up through a knot hole in the floor for them to light their candle by. Through the chinks in the logs the wind and rain drifted in and snow in

winter." Was the log house, still situated in 1978 at the corner of Douglas and West Streets, preserved for us as an example of this early history? I hope that this can someday become an historic site for the City of Jacksonville.

Ware's history continues, page 304:

There came in the inflow some celebrated figures, Peter Cartwright had located at Pleasant Plains, 20 miles from Jacksonville, while Abraham Lincoln was 35 miles from Jacksonville at New Salem. Stephen A. Douglas began his residence in 1834. The epic of emancipation was to have its most important rhetorical unfoldment in that arena. A southern atmosphere prevailed. Brilliant Kentuckians had come. Such were Herndon of Greensburg, Duncan of Paris, Hardin of Frankfort, and Yates of Warsaw; the last 3 became Congressmen, and the first a law partner of Lincoln.

The first public building of brick in Morgan County was the second courthouse at Jacksonville, completed in September, 1830. It replaced the log structure which burned December 6, 1827. It stood on the southwest quarter of the public square. In this Barton Stone often preached. Here he led in the Illinois union of Christians and Reformers in October, 1832, and here the united church worshiped until the completion of their own building in 1836 at the northeast corner of Main and North Streets. It was "a large brick, 35 x 42 feet."

After coming to Illinois Stone gave much time to preaching tours. It is assumed that he lived at his Jacksonville property two blocks south of the public square. His daughter, Mary R., married Lloyd P. Hallack on July 30, 1835. On May 12, 1838 he sold Hallack his three city lots. It is supposed that Stone then retired to his homestead on the farm "four miles to the southeast," where he had "three eighties" located on Diamond Grove Prairie, near the site of the Diamond Grove Baptist Church, in a locust grove on a sort of plateau near a small stream, tributary to the South Fork of Mauvaisterre Creek. He had an elaborately-constructed "double log cabin" covered with clapboards. The two cabins were annexed by a continuous roof sheltering a driveway. There were attics for additional sleeping rooms. Perhaps an extra cabin, a log granary, and a stable completed the housing equipment. A private roadway ran directly north a short distance to the Vandalia-Jacksonville road.

Stone brought with him to Jacksonville *The Christian Messenger*. Eleven preachers receiving these papers were Phillip Coffman, Henry H. Cyrus, Matthew Elder, James Green, John Green, James V. Hedenberg, Peter Hedenberg, David Pat Henderson, Josephus Hewitt, John T. Jones, and Harrison W. Osborne. This reference came from Frank J. Heintz, *Newspapers and Periodicals in the Lincoln-Douglas Country, 1831-1832*, pp. 54-68.

Your Editor has just checked the microfilm of *The Jacksonville Daily Journal* for August 26, 1925 and there was not one reference to the birthday of the City! As a matter of interest, just prior to this time, there was a large picture of Alvin C York, famed World War I hero who addressed the Chautauqua, and an article. He had relatives he visited in Greene County, some of them around White Hall. The York's had come to this area from Dyersburg, Tenn.

There was another great pageant given at the Institutional Program at the Jacksonville State Hospital on August 30-31 of the Centennial Year. We hope you enjoy reading the Centennial Ode "Jacksonville, The Athens of the West" which somewhat explains my original historical question "Why Athens?"

A MACOUPIN COUNTY CEMETERY RECORD

"This record was copied from an old paper found in the Bible of Albert E. Morris, now in the possession of Mrs. K.B.Vancil of Springfield, Ill. Land mentioned is about 2 miles east of Chesterfield, Ill. [This was a D.A.R. record collected several years ago.]

The names on the reverse side of this paper was given by the late Huriah Smith to A. E. Morris as his recollection of deceased parties having been buried in graves near west side of the northeast quarter of Section 6 T.9N R8W 3PM previous to 1866. Property later owned by Richard Morris, then by Albert Morris.

Huriah Smith told A. E. Morris the following"

John Raffurty, Thomas Weeks, Thomas Squires, Betsy Keller, Ben Utterback, Rezin Gudgell. He entered NE $\frac{1}{4}$ Sec. 6 T.9N R.8W August 15, 1836 = 177+ acres.

Hannah Raffurty, James Raffurty 1 child, John Lumpkin 1 child, _____ Cleaves, a single person.

Parties of his recollection were buried near west line of NE $\frac{1}{4}$ of Sec. 6 on the Morris farm before west line established.

By Albert E. Morris

Also: Hariet Raffurty Rhoads, as known by Ellen L. Goddell Brown."

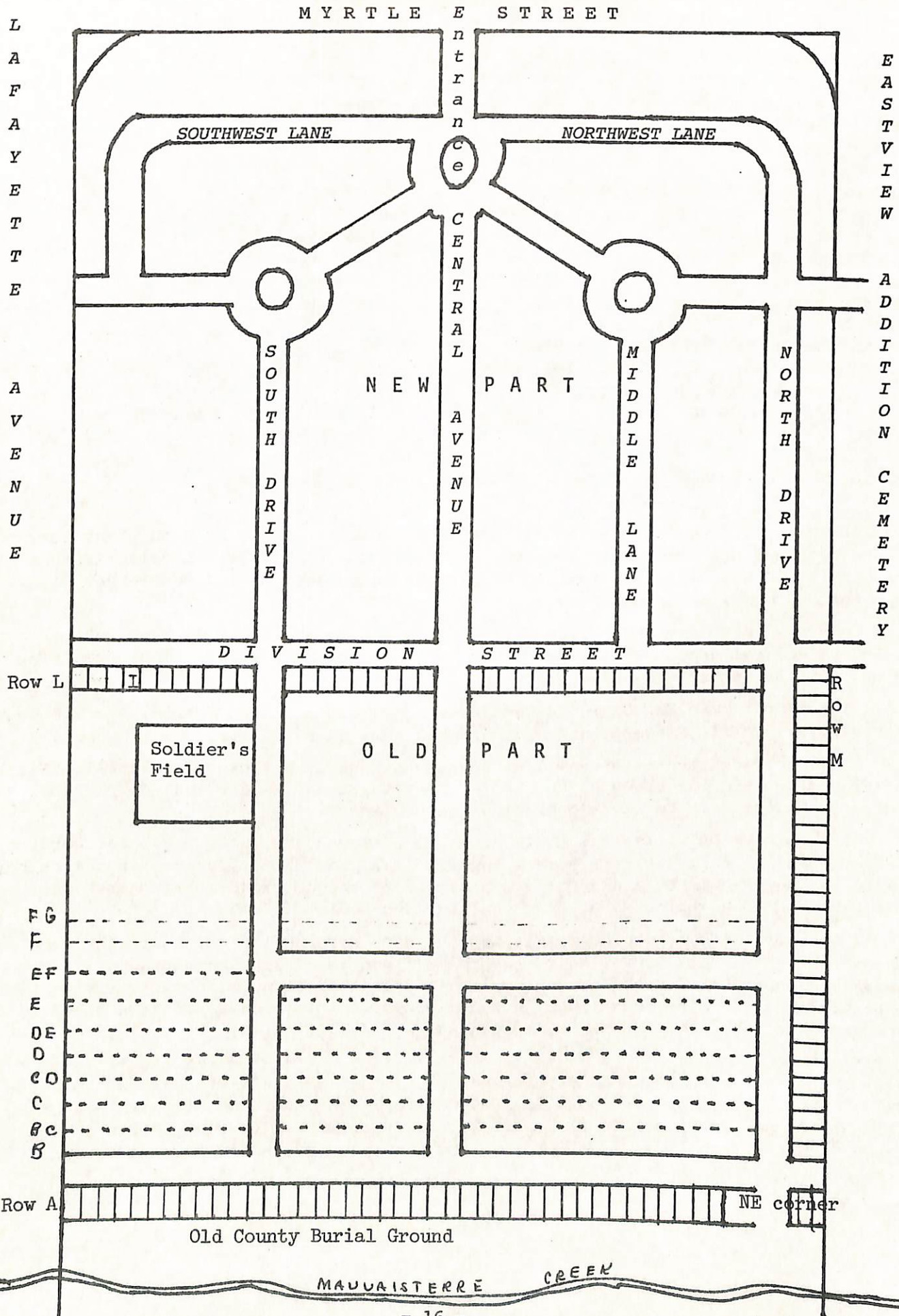

Regular rows (S-N), indicated by alphabet, are 2 lots side by side, listed as east (e) side, or west (w) side. These double rows comprise the oldest part of the cemetery started in 1833.

NO RECORDS indicates burials prior to the City Records started in 1868.

Do not assume such lots to be vacant. There may be tombstones, or only grass where impermanent monuments once were. That is why the original owners are listed - no doubt their families lie beneath the unmarked sod.

DATE given is burial date, not death, normally 1 to 3 days after decease.

* = Serviceman; + = Minister; sb = stillborn; inf = infant; chi = child.

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In conversation with Myra N. Martin, able President of the Waverly Genealogical Society, your editor gleaned a good hint to pass on, since some of us aren't quite so young anymore, and may have trouble negotiating stairs at various times.

PUBLIC BURYING GROUND #1 -- DIRECTORY OF BURIALS, Jacksonville East Cemetery (OP)

A record book for locations of graves evidently was not maintained, except by the Sexton, or has been lost with changes of administration prior to April 1886.

A chronological list of burials started in 1868 as Record Book I, and was kept until 1888. We have an alphabetical listing of these that was made by Doris Sanford in 1975.

We found a note in the book saying that the Public Burying Ground was marked in April 1886 with a stone. We have not yet located this area on the cemetery grounds. Perhaps next spring we can find it. ????

For now, we have to be satisfied with a listing by burial #, and an alphabetical index. This series of burials evidently ended with the last grave as #211, 20 November 1904, on burial Card #26.

At least this list separates out a lot of burials on "Unplatted Grounds" elsewhere in the cemetery.

FEES FOR LEGAL RECORDS IN MORGAN COUNTY, ILLINOIS

[Other genealogists should investigate fees charged in their County and make up a similar statement for persons living away from their area so that getting information by mail becomes less complicated for family historians and custodians of public records.]

Estate administrations in Morgan County number in the thousands which have been probated since establishment of County Court in 1823. Morgan, Scott and Cass were a part of Greene County in 1821 -- never Sangamon.

Morgan's first log courthouse on the Square was destroyed by fire December 6, 1827. All legal records start as of December 7th, except Deeds. The deed book 1823-27 was in the home of the Recorder, Dennis Rockwell that night. The first 180 marriages recorded in Morgan (1823-27) were lost, however.

For copies of Wills and other legal court records, address the Circuit Court Clerk, Morgan County Courthouse, Jacksonville ILL 62650.

Fees established by the Court lists law documents at 50 cents per page, with a minimum fee of \$1.00, plus \$1.00 for certification. However, by mail, a xerox copy of the original Will in the Case Files (Number to be found in Probate Index Book), is \$2.00. A xerox copy of the Petition for Letters of Administration is \$1.00 per copy. This names the death date of decedent, and surviving heirs known at time of filing for Letters. Copies of inheritance tax papers filed did not start until 1893, but are a rich source of information for persons deceased after that date. Here, the price would be @ 50¢ per page.

For birth, marriage and death certificates address the County Clerk. The fee charged is \$3.00 each. Deeds are 50 cents per page.

Genealogists should get in the habit of applying business procedures to their business of seeking family history. Make letters to officials brief, to the point, in outline form if possible, and LEGIBLE. Use standard size paper for letters (8 1/2 x 11) - not small note papers - and LONG envelopes to avoid so much folding. Be courteous--officials are humans who respond to kindness as we all do.
* * * * *

Zion Lutheran Church, which until about 1972, was Mt. Zion Methodist Church. Directly north of the cemetery is a man-made pond. Mt. Zion Cemetery is in the Northeast Quarter of Section 9 in Township 15 North, Range 11 West, Third Principal Meridian.

In 1972 our Society had a communication from Helen Regan Plummer, 3909 Mary Ellen St. N.E., Albuquerque NM 87111 pertaining to the Nelson Grossman's, her mother's grandparents. They came from Connecticut to Morgan County about 1834. Her grandmother was Mary M. Grossman, who married John T. Larkin of Brown County. Her mother was Mary M. (Weldon) Grossman.

Helen thought her people were buried near Point Church, but this reading above gives evidence that this cemetery belongs with the Mt. Zion Church. She copied this inscription from Nelson's stone, a lovely tribute:

Dearest Father, thou hast left us, How thy loss we deeply feel;
 But ('tis?) God that hath bereft us, He can all our sorrow heal.
 Yet again we hope to meet thee When the day of life is fled,
 Then in heaven with goy to greet thee, Where no farewell tear is shed.
