



When you finish reading this issue of the JOURNAL wouldn't you like to read a Bible verse? There being no room to quote it at the end of the book, may I refer you to The Second Epistle to the Thessalonians by Paul, verses 9 through 18.

PRESSIE'S WONDERINGS

- 1. I wonder if you have an ancestor or collateral relative in Jacksonville East Cemetery? It was started as a "Public Burying Ground" at least by 1833, so it evidently contains some of the oldest burials known in this area. We can't verify it yet, but we believe that the now destructed College Hill Cemetery was started about the same time for the west part of town.
- 2. Did you know that there was once a little village of Diamond Grove? We find many deeds stating that as the grantor's location. It was shown on the earliest land surveys as being about half a mile south and a bit west of the present Diamond Grove Cemetery on the old Edwardsville road. The cemetery was started in 1867. I found the original 1867 Plat Maps for both Diamond Grove and Jacksonville East cemeteries which has been a great help in locatburial lots.
- 3. If you have relatives in the East Cemetery, you might luckily find them in either this issue of our Journal, or the next one when we print the second half of Bob Dalton's "labor of love".
- 4. Have you heard that we have undertaken a project to make an index card on each person buried in Jacksonville East and Diamond Grove too? This will be from the City Clerk's Burial cards which start about 1868; however, burials were not identified as to location until about 1886. Mrs. Newport has permitted us to xerox out the cards, and we have several people who have volunteered to make cards for each decedent listed. While there are several working on the project, I must give special credit to Bernice Massey and Margaret Farmer who have worked so diligently with me for the past 3 months in keeping up with the indexing from day to day in their spare moments. About six of us have completed at least 10,000 cards but there are twice as many yet to do We need more volunteers!
- 5. Are you one of our members or friends who is a-waiting an answer to your letter? To this your "Pressie" will have to make an apology -- for she has spent these past 3 months diligently organizing the above indexing project, and has had no time to delve into the other research -- maybe a little bit later -- keep hoping folks. How desperately we need volunteers for doing courthouse research here in Jacksonville! Everyone is "too busy", or "don't know how". Come forward, timid souls, I'll gladly teach you! Keep your letters coming though, folks. We do scan them at meetings, and put your name in the newspapers. Maybe somebody "out there" will answer you some day!
- 6. I wonder how you like my diagram of Jacksonville East Cemetery? I am trying to prepare a series to show the individual lot locations so that a person can take my future "INDEX OF BURIALS" listing name and lot number, and be able to walk directly to the spot they want. These are complicated affairs, and take lots of my time to work out. Maybe I will become accomplished as an architect yet! Our tombstone readings in this Journal do not have the lot locations because we have not progressed that far into our indexing yet; but you know in which part of the cemetery they lie -- in the east half -- the Old Part, and using my map you can circle the drives and spot the right tombstone.
- 7. Lucky Seven! Lucky for you that I have run out of space so that you can "get on with it". Hope you enjoy the contents of this Geneal Journal and will find something of value for your personal research. Happy hunting folks. Genealogically yours, Florence Hulchuse. President-Editor



"JACKSONVILLE CEMETERY" Page 1:

"Some Interesting Facts and Figures Regarding This Last Resting Place of the Dead"

This is a newspaper article found and copied by Myra Martin of Waverly. The date is unknown, but it sounds like the same person who wrote the article on the Antioch Cemetery in 1911.

As the readers of the Journal are aware, Jacksonville cemetery, formerly known as the East Cemetery, is in the northeast corner of the city and is truly a beautiful spot for the reception of the bodies of those who have answered the final summons. A Journal reporter visited the place recently and was courteously met by the sexton, George W. Ferreira, and his assistant, J. T. Owen, who answered all questions asked of them and showed their visitor about the premises.

One thing is at once noticeable. The original surveyors of the cemetery encouraged or required the lots to be graded up entirely too high, making an appearance more unsightly than would have been the case had the land benn left a level place. The spaces between require much more work in order that they may be kept clean and attractive. The new lots will not be so graded up and the alleys between them will probably be somewhat filled as time goes by.

The reporter walked all over the place carefully, noting the entire appearance and can safely say that the sacred grounds are in careful hands, reflecting credit on the worthy commissioners, sexton and assistants. There have heretofore been entirely too many driveways taking up land unnecessarily, and several of these have been closed by the commission with the sanction of the mayor and council, and by that means a great deal of land is now available for lots in desirable locations. This will be a source of revenue to the cemetery and work hardship in no direction, making less driveways to keep in order and the place look more inviting to the visitor.

There is always one sad fact inseperable from any cemetery of any age at all and that is the number of graves of persons whose surviving relatives have moved away or are unable or unwilling to care for the looks of the places of the dead. Sometimes too a whole family is dead and then there is no one to see to the graves. It would be a good thing if the commission could afford in some way to care a little for these places but as it is there are no funds available for the purpose so that here and there one sees a leaning stone or monument or a stone broken off, or loosened from the old fashioned socket and lying on the ground.

In one case a man while prosperous, bought a lot, enclosed it with a heavy stone curb adorned with stone posts and at the time made it quite attractive. At the grave of one member of his family he was able to place a good looking stone and the success left him, and he lost all he had in the world, and from being one of the leading business men of the city he became one of the poorest. The curbing is becoming dilapidated and the only things to designate the resting place of the owner and other members of the family are some small markers.

At many of the older graves marble stones were placed and these have become disintegrated with the action of the elements, showing the advisability of selecting granite or some surely durable material for headstones. Then too at present there is a law prohibiting the placing of a slab in a stone socket. So much of the dilapidation of head stones is due to placing them in stone sockets not sufficiently secure against the action of the elements. Now people are required to have a foundation extending below frost and consequently the leaving over of headstones will be far less frequent hereafter. [Ed's note: Oh boy! if he could just see them in 1976!]

Sexton Ferreira says too that the number of persons buried at public expense is gratifyingly small. Last year there were not more than a dozen or so laid invested to the time

away, many persons carrying the "graveyard insurance" which protects them in case of the death of a member of the family so insured.

The efficient commission, aided by the mayor, have placed water pipes at convenient distances about the cemetery so that with the aid of an ordinary amount of hose the whole surface, practically, of the cemetery may be watered in time of dry weather in case the city has the water for the purpose. The sexton also intends, as soon as the weather will safely permit, to paint all the seats and outside wood work of all sorts, thus making the entire premises look tidy. The drives are being graded up as fast as circumstances will permit and the canals between some of the lots are being partially filled with dirt from graves as it can be spared.

SOME INTERESTING PLACES.

Wandering through the sacred inclosure the scribe noted a number of burial places of much interest. Here it must be said that no attempt could be made to get anything approaching a complete list of the stones and spots worthy of mention, and only a few are selected at random.

One cluster of stones contain the name of a family which will long be remembered in this vicinity. The stones are old timers and marked the last resting places of several of the family of Mr. and Mrs. Elliot Stevenson. The first named was that of John William, their oldest son, who died Aug. 22, 1841. Another near by was over the grave of Eliza, wife of J.F. Barrows. She died July 29, 1344, aged 19 years and 7 months. Still another was at the grave of Emily Virginia who died May 21, 1839:

An unpretentious monument marks the last resting place of one of the gallant heroes who gave their lives for their country. It is that of the noble Matt Starr, whose memory will be kept green for many years in this vicinity. Here are the dates:

Born October 3, 1838

Enlisted as second lieutenant, October 1861, in 6th Ill. cavalry.

May 5, 1862, promoted to first lieutenant.

July 30, 1862 promoted to captain.

December 19, 1862, promoted to major.

April 3, 1863, promoted to lieutenant colonel.

Wounded in resisting the raid of Forrest August 21, 1864.

Brought home in desperate condition.

Died October 2, 1864.

The Grand Army Post [# 378] here is named for him and his memory is sacred to the hearts of many who yet remember him.

A number of wooden crosses indicate the graves of faithful members of the Roman Catholic church and several tombstones also have on them emblems of the same religious body.

The Odd Fellows recently acquired a lot [No. 535] about sixty feet square and have indicated the boundaries of the same, but have not yet done much with it, but it is understood it will have all the attention which would be expected from such a grand body.

Here is a name greatly honored; or rather two names. First was laid here the body of the sainted William C[hurchill] Posey, one of the most Godly men that ever lived in Morgan County. It is related of him that he was once a candidate for sheriff and visited a rather tough part of the county and remarked: "My

name is William C. Posey and I am a candidate for sheriff, but I would rather have the grace of God in my heart than all your votes." He died July 12, 1849, and his wife, Sarah, died April 20, 1840. He was a devoted member of the Presbyterian church, a faithful friend of Illinois college and of all good works.

One of his daughters married the late Dr. Rees, father of the wife of Rev. C. R. Morrison of this city. Another married the late James I. Barrows, so well and honorably known by a large circle of friends. Other stones in the vicinity contain the names of Barrows and Rees.

"G. A. R." [Grand Army of the Republic, Illinois Department, Jackson-ville Post. In addition to the Matt Starr Post #378, there was the small Post #687 honoring Gov. Richard Yates.]

Here is probably the most honored spot of all: [now referred to as Soldier's Field] the place set aside for the graves of soldier dead. Already quite a row of stones show what the government does for its heroes whose families are gone or fail for any reason to supply stones for the last resting places of the veterans. The activity of the late Comrade Fred G. Cocking is largely responsible for this as he worthily and unselfishly gave much time and effort to the consummation of this enterprise and succeeded in having a number of soldier dead placed where they belonged, and having suitable stones at their graves.

It is a pity that marble is used for the purpose for it suffers in this locality from the effects of time and weather, but they show the disposition of the government. A respectable monument especially adorns the spot and smaller stones mark the graves of the veteran dead, many of whom are buried there. Too much honor can never be bestowed on the memory of the grand men who risked their lives, their health, their fortunes all for their country, and it is pleasant to see such a desirable part of the cemetery devoted to the purpose of giving them respectable interment. Truly has it been said:

Their silent tents are spread
And glory guards with ceaseless round
The bivouac of the dead."

A rather imposing monument indicates the grave of Col. John J. Hardin, whose name is well nigh a household word even yet in this community. It was at the battle of Buena Vista that he lost his life and that engagement was graphically described in an excellent communication of Col. W. J. Wyatt of Franklin not long since. Col. Hardin was a prominent citizen, a leading attorney with a promising outlook but he felt called by duty to offer his services to his country and his life was the price.

We are now in the east part of the cemetery [Ed's note: the part we will hereafter refer to as "Old Plat" "O.P."] the portion which contains the older monuments and graves of those first interred. [This "Lot 32" was purchased by the City in 1833 for a "Public Burying Ground".] At first the cemetery did not extend as far west as at the present, more land having been added to it since it was originally laid out.

About this part are to be seen many stones so far gone by disintegration that the inscriptions are illegible. Others show what was mentioned at the beginning of this article; no one to care for them and consequent decay and neglect and slanting positions, or lying flat on the ground. The cemetery commission is not to be censured at all for this, and it is also gratifying to know that

at present stones are required to be so set that falling will be far less likely to take place in the future.

Here is a name with a peculiarly fragrant memory, that of Judge William Thomas. Elderly citizens can easily picture in their minds the old gentleman seated at his table, quill pen in hand, making the peculiar marks, at first so illegible but later on more easily read as one becomes accustomed to them. His spitoon was always nearby for the judge was an inveterate tobacco chewer, but one who knew his noble qualities forgot any little irregularities which he might have had. He used to enjoy telling how he "stole" through the legislature the bill for the charter of Illinois college. That was the time when the state's law-makers didn't think much of the cause of education and failed to look kindly on any enterprise which sought the spread of knowledge. The judge was in the legislature at this time the bill was pending and had to use some wise, shrewd tactics to accomplish the desired object. The judge's remains are accompanied by those of other members of the family.

Here is a grave which is redolent of olden times. The inscription on the stone says: Eliza W., wife of David Scorr, died Aug. 4, 1838, who was born in Farmington, Conn., and moved from Herkimer county, New York, in 1819 and died in 1825, aged 57 years.

The stone at the head of David Mann states that he died May 5, 1835, a long time ago. Again we come to an honored name, especially in the early annals of the land, that of William Branson. His wife was a sister of Mrs. Jonathan Neely and his son, the well known and honored Judge Nathaniel Branson of Petersburg was known and respected all over the state by thousands. Mr. Branson was a trustee of the town, mayor after it was incorporated as a city, a force in the Old School Presbyterian church, and always respected while his word was as good as gold.

David Wight was a man who went to California and made a fortune. His wife was a daughter of the late Mrs. King on South Main street and their only child is the wife of William E. Hall.

Here lies the remains of J.R. Jordan and family, a name that always will be remembered with respect and honor. This old stone tells us that Jesse Allen died Nov. 13, 1845, and his wife, Sarah, May 21, 1850. He was not so well known but was a good man.

Here are the remains of Washington Allen, the South Main street grocer, who was as honest as the day is long and in his time prominent business man of the place. He and his brother will always be remembered as upright men.

What a flood of memories cluster about the name of W.W.Happy. For a number of years he held various offices, was prominent in the Christian church and an honored citizen. In the early days he was assessor and collector for the city when that work was done separately, and his office was on the north side of the square.

An old and crumbling stone contains the quaint epitaph, "Sacred to the memory of Eliza M. Watson, consort of John Watson, died June 21, 1826. Also Martha infant daughter."

Here is a stone remarkably well preserved in shape and texture, but darkened in age. It contains the inscription, "Sacred to the memory of Philip Walker, who departed this life January 10, 1834."

Here lies the body of the veteran bricklayer and plasterer, Thomas Carson.

Among the structures in whose erection he had a hand is the bank building now occupied by the solid house of F.G.Farrell & Co. Mr. Carson's mother was one of the historic figures in the county. [Catherine Kendall Carson, midwife "present at the birth of fully three thousand children." p. 337, History of Morgan County, 1873.] The old family home was on East Morgan street, Mauvaisterre and East streets. His brother, "Judge Carson," was a character known to all around.

Here is a spot dedicated to a branch of the Pitner family: Jane, wife of Michael, James T., who was drowned, and other lie there.

Here too are many mounds with no stones at all and the names of the silent occupants are known probably on high and remind one somewhat of the rows of "unknowns" in the national cemeteries.

Another old stone, dark but otherwise in good condition, is at the head of the grave of Thomas Heslep, who departed this life Nov. 23, 1835. Another stone tells that John Foster died November 28, 1843, aged 38 years.

Next we come to a name which will always be remembered with pleasure by all who knew him, that of Michael Rapp. He was a sturdy citizen, scorning wrong and doing felt to be right at any cost. During the election of the fall of 1868 when so much bulldozing and intimidation were attempted and in many cases carried out, the evil doers found "Uncle Mike" a man they couldn't handle or intimidate. When they would try to stop a foreign-born citizen or any other on some pretext or order he would say, when satisfied he was right: "I accept his vote; arrest me if you dare." It is needless to add that he wasn't arrested.

Here lies the remains of Rev. Joel Goodrick and how much might be said of that good man. He was a burning and shining light. Near his grave are the graves of a number of the family.

The name of Rev. George Rutledge on another stone brings up the work of a Godly man loved and honored by many. Eliza A. and John E. were his children, who are near him.

John M. Ewing and wife were two most worthy souls. William D. Humphrey was a man who came to this place in 1829 and had a large part in the work of building up the place. An old stone is sacred to the memory of James Scott, who died December 25, 1837, in the Christian faith.

Here is an old and crumbling stone on which we find the name of Marion A., the only son of James M. and Eliza Porter, who died January 23, 1840. A fine granite monument marks the resting place of Col. William B. Warren and Ann D., his wife, and Margaret, their daughter. A stone with the name of Matilda Letton brings to mind an important family in this community.

Here is an unpretentious stone over the grave of William McWilliams, a native of Scotland, who died Nov. 26, 1850, aged 50 years. Here is a double marble slap one part of which is for George Hackett, born in Stratford, Apr. 11, 1793, and died Sept. 4, 1848. The other part is for Sarah, his wife, born 1792, married May 2, 1815, and died Aug. 27, 1816.

A small stone marks the grave of the well known chaplain Rev. W.J.Rutledge, while near by sleep his wife, Ida Craig, and the body of little Charlie.

Jacksonville cemetery is honored by containing probably the only resting place of a revolutionary soldier in the county. It is the late Elijah Smith, whose remains are interred here. He was a soldier through a good part of the conflict, and served in a New Jersey regiment. (End of article.)

[Joseph Jackson is another Revolutionary soldier known to be buried here. John Dawson is also listed as being here by Ill. Veterans' Commission.]

It was the privilege of our Jacksonville Area Genealogical and Historical Society to nominate "Bob" Dalton for a local service award from the Illinois State Genealogical Society, and an honor to have him presented one of the 10 awards given at the Fall Conference October 1, at Decatur. We were very happy that he and Mrs. Dalton took time off from their busy newspaper activities that evening to be given the award in person.

In order to let the rest of our Society members know about his work, we are publishing the "Qualifications of this Nominee" which we submitted to the State Honors and Awards Committee last August. It is especially appropriate to mention his achievements, because his cemetery readings of the Old Part of Jacksonville East, following, have been diligently pulled together bit by bit, day by day, over a long period of time. We are publishing half of the readings in this Journal, and will put the other half in next time (we hope).

"Robert W. Dalton is evidently one of the most indefatigable recorders of cemetery readings in this part of Illinois having sought out the old, non-existent and hard-to-locate cemeteries in Morgan County ever since 1968. He has dug out many buried tombstones in order to achieve an accurate reading, putting them back in better shape than before. He says he always asks permission to go on the land, and has had marvelous cooperation. He and his sister Dorothy enjoyed wandering through cemeteries as children admiring the unusual stones and commenting on how long some persons had been there. They always searched for new ones to explore. Bob's regret is that they did not make readings of the tombstones earlier, for many they saw then have now disappeared.

"In 1968 Bob was asked to write the Labor chapter for Morgan County - The Twentieth Century published under the auspices of the Morgan County Sesquicentennial Committee and the County Board of Commissioners. This required many days of research. One of the great labor leaders he admired was Jacob Roedersheimer whose tombstone he failed to find in Jacksonville East Cemetery. The sexton invited him to look in the records kept in the little shed on the premises. Bob was amazed at the records and realized they existed no place else. Because the records in the shed did not contain all of the data either, he was inspired to copy records from tombstones. He and his sister avidly started a joint project hoping some day to make them available to the public.

"Bob, a newspaperman all his life, started as a paper boy at age 11. At 14 he was working in the office of the Journal-Courier. He worked his way up through many jobs and is now night foreman of the JACKSONVILLE JOURNAL. He sleeps all morning, and gets up at noon. This leaves his afternoons for all of the research he has done on cemeteries all over Morgan and Greene Counties (in addition to the many other jobs and committee responsibilities he has acquired). When vital statistics are not clear he looks them up in courthouse records and on microfilms. Thus he and Dorothy have listed thousands of names in at least 80 to 90 cemeteries. He has also answered many letters of family inquiries as a genealogical researcher for our Society.

"January 26, 1972 he attended the organizational meeting of the Jacksonville Area Genealogical Society and was elected vice-president "out of the blue". Mrs. Florence Hutchison, president, learned of the cemetery readings being done by several individuals, and issued a call to bring them to the next meeting. Bob and Dorothy shared all they had completed at the time. Cemetery lists were non-existent except for those published in newspapers in 1952 when the Illinois Veteran's Commission tried to locate burials of servicemen; only cemetery names and nearby towns were given, however. Mrs. Hutchison gave Bob several maps and lists, and with much research and travel to ones he knew, he painstakingly pin-pointed the section, township and range for about 130 cemeteries in Morgan, and several in Greene County.

Page 2: Local Service Award to Robert W. Dalton

"Bob has typed carefully-researched lists of all the cemeteries he and others have read. He bound them and donated two beautiful volumes to the Jacksonville Public Library.

"Our Society is preparing to publish a Directory of cemeteries and locations, and names of families in each. By mimeographing these indexes we can produce an inexpensive volume so that hundreds of persons can be located in their burial site, and we will thus make use of the 8 years of cemetery recordings by Robert W. Dalton and his sister Dorothy Dalton Long, which are not available from other public sources. Our Society is indeed proud to present the name of Robert W. Dalton as a nominee for a Local Service Award to be presented by the Illinois State Genealogical Society at the Fall Conference."

We have been fortunate to have other recipients of the I.S.G.S. Local Service Awards.

JACKSONVILLE CEMETERY elso known as JACKSONVILLE EAST CRMETERY

The formel beginning of this cemetery took place on May 20, 1833 when A. B. Dewitt and his wife, Mary Ann, sold to George Hacket, Aylett H. Buckner, James Parkinson, Ira Davenport and Caleb Beach, being the president and trustees of the Town of Jacksonville, for \$200, to be held and kept as a public burial ground, lot 32 in Section 16 Township 15 N Range 10 V, containing 8.95 acres. The deed was not recorded until Sept. 6, 1833, when it was entered on pages 366 and 367 of Deed Book E. Subsequent purchases of land have been made over the years until the cemetery now encompasses over 20 acres of very flat land in the northeastern part of Jacksonville.

In early days the cemetery commissioners encouraged the practice of grading the lots very high, with "canals" between the graves. This proved to be unsightly and made maintenance difficult. The effects of this practice have now almost entirely disappeared, as have the hitching racks that were formerly in

place throughout the cemetery.

The cemetery was originally laid out with an excess of alleys between the lots, causing a great waste of available land. Many of these alleys have now been closed and the land sold as burial spaces. This has resulted in an inter-

mingling of rows of current burials among rows of much earlier graves.

In May of 1901 the Morgan County Board Of Commissioners adopted several rules as ordered by the state government. Among these rules were the facts that the county commissioners would allow \$15 for the burial of the body of a pauper, or \$35 for the body of an indigent soldier. In the case of a pauper who died at the Morgan County Poor House and the body was not taken away by relatives or friends, the body had to be buried in the potter's field at the poor farm by the authorities of the poor farm. The county commissioners allowed \$8 for the box and robe to be used in the burial of each pauper who was buried at the poor farm.

Until recent years individual burial lots in Jacksonville East Cemetery were not cared for by the cemetery personnel unless perpetual care arrangements had been made. This practice is no longer followed and in 1976 Jacksonville East

Cemetery is beautifully maintained.

An abrupt change in the appearance of this cemetery occurred during a 30-minute period on Friday, June 14, 1957. Weatherwise citizens agreed that it was the "blackest they had seen in years" between 8:30 and 9:00 a.m. on that day. Three-fourths of an inch of rain fell in 10 minutes, following four inches of rain that had fallen earlier in the week. Winds of 55 m.p.h. were recorded. The combination of rain-soaked earth and violent winds uprooted or severely damaged three-fourths of the trees in the cemetery. As the trees were uprooted, coffins enmeshed in the root systems were hurled to the surface. Numerous tombstones were toppled or smashed. Several days later between 75 and 100 volunteers donated equipment and labor in a massive cleanup effort. In addition to the limbs burned on the site of the cemetery, over 200 truck loads of debris were removed from the premesis. But it was not until 1975, under the direction of Superintendent Of Cemeteries Ray Lambert, that nearly every toppled tombstone in the cemetery has been re-set in its proper place, and the cemetery is indeed a beautiful and peaceful burial site.

During the summer of 1976 the new brick office, maintenance and storage building was completed near the cemetery entrance. Shortly before its scheduled dedication on Memorial Day the building was extensively damaged when leaking

gasoline was ignited by a spark, resulting in an explosion.

The tombstone readings on the following pages are from readings made in 1929 by Sara John English and in 1976 by Robert V. Dalton. It is possible that some of the readings made by Mrs. English are in the newer parts of the cemetery.

Do you have ancestors whose roots stem from Frederick County, Maryland? My friend Norma Poepl of Greenfield has loaned me two volumes of Cemetery Inscriptions from that County - 75,000 of them! The title is NAMES IN STONE by Jacob Mehrling Holdcraft. It was originally published in 1966, and has a second printing, 1972. It is distributed by The Monocacy Book Company, P.O. Box #765 Redwood City, CAL 94064.

The introduction reads "This book is a labor of love. It had to be, for when Jacob Mehrling Holdcraft began copying names and dates from Frederick County, Maryland tombstones some thirty years ago, he quite well knew his project had no commercial value. In spite of that knowledge, over the years he devoted most of his two free days a week, winter and summer, to do the work. ...It was begun 100 years too late! (because of stone obliteration with passage of Time).

This printed page was torn out of some unknown book, and was kept in the Whitlock Bible. While there was no identification as to denomination, we believe these to be the Baptist Circuit in 1882.

HISTORICAL SKETCH OF MOUNT MORIAH CHURCH

This Church was organized February 21, 1857 in a school house near the site of the present church, by Elder D.S.Miller, with the following persons as charter members: Chas. Bush, Henry Miller, Isaac Nailor, F.H. Searcey, Sarah Searcey, Elijah Bruner and Elizabeth Bruner, all of whom are still living. The following have served as Pastors in the order named, D. S. Miller, Z. Waters, J.F. Nicols, F. Hicks, C. A. Worley, Milton Davenport, Joel Turner, J. B. Clevenger, Geo. Robertson, W. J. McCollum.

The following have served as Deacons: Chas. Bush, Joseph Nighbert, Henry Miller B. F. Simms, A. H. Standefer, M. M. Grow, M. S. Moore. For trustees, Iven Wood, F. H. Searcey, Samuel Thompson, Henry Miller, W. H. Crane, John Hart, and M. S. Moore. For clerks, Henry Miller, J. B. Evans, W. B. Searcey, G. W. Cunningham, S. L. Wilson, M. S. Moore. This church first united with the Central Illinois Association, but was

lettered out and went into the organization of the Macoupin Association in 1859. The membership of this Church numbered about 100, but from removals, deaths, etc., we have become weak in numbers. In looking over the past history of the Church, we find that many good and holy influences have gone out from it. As a result of these influences, we learn that members of this Church bearing letters of dismission, with others, have organized a flourishing Church of the same name in the State of Kansas. At a meeting held by Elders Clevenger and Turner, at this place, in February, 1871, were a number of conversions, among them Brother W. J. McCollum, who in 1879 was ordained to the ministry of the Gospel. W. P. Hart, J. B. Clevenger and Isaac Hill, acting as Presbytery.

OBITUARY OF ELDER JAMES SOLOMON

Died, at his home in Bird township, on Sunday morning Aug. 28, A.M., of hemorhage of the stomach, Rev. James Solomon. Funeral services on Monday, 12 M., at Charity Baptist church, where a vast congregation assembled to respect the honored dead. A short historical sketch of the Solomon family as pioneers of the county was given, after which Elder S. B. Culp delivered a touching and appropriate sermon from "Precious in the sight of the Lord is the death of all His saints." 116th Psalm, 15th verse.

The subject of this sketch was born in Franklin county, North Carolina, July 3 1810; his parents moved to Kentucky in his early childhood, and in 1824 came with them to Morgan County, Illinois, and three years after came to "Eagle Point," where his father (Judge Lewis Solomon, sr.) lived and brought up his family and died. James Solomon, without the advantages of schools and churches, and amid the wilderness condition of things in those early times, became deeply impressed with the importance of religion and at the age of 19 made a hopeful and an intelligent profession of faith in Christ, united with the Baptist church in the Conlee neighborhood near Waverly, and in about one year began to preach and was afterward regularly ordained by the church to preach the gospel. Elder Sonomon's early ministry was greatly embarrassed by questions respecting the Atonement. The tidal wave started in the Baptist churches in the Eastern States under Judson and Rice on the question of "Missions," struck the pioneer churches of the West, raising the question of the freeness and fullness of the gospel in opposition to the sterotyped creed of predestination, and finally terminated in a division of the old Concord Baptist church near the present town of Palmyra. Elder Solomon stood firm in the fullness of the unlimited grace of God offered to a perishing world and for fifty years has been laboring with success for the extension of the kingdom of Christ on earth. He was a public spirited citizen in every sense of the word, and in every community in which he lived he left unmistaken evidence of his usefulness. He had been married three times and brought up a numerous family, most of whom have preceded him in death, but two children surviving him. His death was calm and peaceful, having cooly made all his arrangements both as to his business matters, (for he was a man of considerable property), and selecting the place of his interment and the one in the ministry to preach the sermon. His body now rests in Charity cemetery where his last labors and local efforts have long been put forth for Zion's cause in connection with his old pioneer laborers, Z. Waters and S. B. Culp.

An now standing by his last remains with his weeping wife and disconsolate children, and a surviving multitude with his three only surviving brothers in the order named: Judge Lewis Solomon, jr., near Waverly; Dempsey N., of Palmyra, and Rev. Bennett Solomon, of Chesterfield, gazing in the open casket upon the placid features of the dead brother for the last time, we say, Farewell Brother.

What is a Distant Relative? Question: What a close relative becomes after you lend him money! Answer:

A person recently said to me "There is so little difference between being a nosey person, and doing genealogical research." Perhaps this might be true with some people, but they should not dignify their actions by calling themselves genealogists! They should try to go into the courthouse and say "I am a nosey researcher and am looking up dirt on my family," and see how far they will get in looking at public records. A true genealogical researcher, whether certified or amateur, is doing legitimate search into public records to pull out the vîtal statistics of their ancestors and collateral lineages for the purposes of extending and preserving known data, and proving mouth-to-mouth family tradition. Genealogists are just as liable to prosecution for printing unfounded allegations as a newspaperman.

In the event of dissolution, all assets (funds and property, both real and personal) remaining after satisfaction of liabilities, will be distributed to a designated organization then exempt under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code or to the federal, state, or local government for public purposes. This does not include any articles on temporary or indefinite loan to the Jacksonville Area Genealogical and Historical Society as so designated by the owner.

Any person interested in the purposes of the society shall be eligible for membership. Application for membership shall be submitted with dues to the post-office box address as stated. Checks, for the sake of brevity, may be made to "Jacksonville Area G. & H. Society". Dues are payable annually as of January 1.

Junior Members receive all publications and newsletters of regular membership. This is our effort to encourage young people to start family history research.

Each member shall receive a membership card. Members paying dues late in the year will receive all publications and mailings for that year; however, a family will receive only one publication per mailing due to our increased postage rates. Members who have not paid dues by April 1 shall be automatically dropped from membership mailings. Charter members dropped for non payment of dues shall lose their charter classification unless reinstated by payment of dues for all years of inactivity.

Letters of Inquiry are read in open meetings. We publish the names sought in this area in our news notices, with name and address of seeker. This has proved to be a popular feature, and is "read far and wide", because our notices go in about 25 area newspapers. We do not currently run queries in our Geneal Journal for lack of time in their preparation. Space is more limited now with the higher postage rates, and we feel that publishing local indexes and history needs the priority of space.
