

Editorial #1, by Mrs. Florence Hutchison, Editor

Greetings to you all out there. Here it is, another 3 months, another Quarterly; (in lieu of the old saying "another day, another dollar.") With all of the births and deaths your Ed has "dug up" out of the old dusty record books, there should be something of interest for nearly everybody who had relatives come to these parts.

One of my favorite indexes, accomplished by Mrs. Lloyd Hymes, was the "Record of Examination of Applicants for Graduation From Common School Course." But the space ran out so that we have to postpone publishing it. The record, found in Mr. Keller's County Office, records 8th graders from 1895 thru 1888, skipping 1899-1903. Then it takes up 1904 thru 1908.

These sheets, xeroxed and certified by his office, can be used as proof of birth in some cases, and Mr. Keller has had several people who have made use of them in times past. Here is a sample entry so that you will know what they contain:

As to why the skip of 5 years, we do not know. Evidently someone in office at that time misplaced the record. Jane Coble, working very hard on school records, has been going through the old books, so we may come upon it some day, but I doubt it.

Another book I found was the original Commissions book started in 1827 listing the elected county officers and who gave them the oath of office. Virginia Gordon has indexed that for us, but, too, must be left out at this time.

I have been processing 32 years of birth and death certificates found in the Waverly Archives. And now we know why it has been hard to find birth certificates in Morgan County. There is a possibility the same thing may have happened in other counties.

Around 1941-43, because of Social Security regulations, many people filed delayed birth certificates. If they couldn't come to the county seat they filed it with their local city or road district supervisor who saw to it that they came to the County Clerk's office. At that time the certs were filed by filing date, and put on the index that way.

About the middle of 1943, or earlier, WPA workers were given the job of re-filing birth certificates to the <u>date of birth</u>, and placed in books labeled for that year. The program closed before the work was finished, and for 35 years the index has not been changed to the proper entries. If a person knew the date of birth, the book for that year was searched. For those people who did not know it, the name was on the index, but there was absolutely no way of tracking the certificate to the right year, unless by accident. There are a hundred or so Waverly certificates with delayed filing in this category and I am trying to make the proper entry on the index, by permission of the clerk.

How I wish we could afford a part-time secretary to handle these details. I have so many index cards waiting to be properly filed, and so much typing of records that needs to be done. But I feel that it is more important to keep collecting records and indexing, than keeping up with the filing. The records may not be available later, and the cards will be waiting.

Would anybody know the value of this copper coin? The obverse has an unbearded Lincoln with the words "Abraham Lincoln, Republican Candidate 1860". The reverse has the traditional eagle-shield, arrows and olive branch centered with the words "Liberty, Union and Equality" and 3 stars in the exergue. (Now my heraldry students should know what that means!)

Our Society is preparing to order a second reprint of the HISTORY OF MORGAN COUNTY, ILLINOIS published by Donnelley, Loyd & Co., in 1878. Those of you who want copies had better order early. Think of buying them now for Christmas gifts in December.

Because of popular demand, the Board of Directors of the Jacksonville Area Genealogical and Historical Society has voted to have a second limited printing of the 1878 HISTORY OF MORGAN COUNTY, ILLINOIS. This book, an exact copy of the original edition published by Donnelly, Loyd & Company in 1878, will include a surname index of 16,000 entries which makes it more useful.

Anyone interested in securing a copy of this earliest well-known history of Morgan County is urged to reserve their copy now by sending a check for \$25.00, each, to the Jacksonville Area Gen. & Hist. Soc., P.O. Box 21, Jacksonville, Illinois 62651. We need to have the reservations in order to know how many books to order printed by Unigraphic, Inc. We expect the books to be available in the fall.

For the benefit of new members of our Society, and friends not familiar with its contents, we would like to add a few words of the importance of this history book:

Jacksonville was one of the key cities to which early day settlers, ethnic groups, educators, business men, farmers, and other travellers came as a starting point for living in East Central Illinois. The History of Morgan County, Illinois is filled with names of ancestors for many surrounding communities.

The surname index of 16,000 entries, prepared by the Winnetka Public Library Project Group, will be included at no extra charge.

The book contains an early map of Morgan County, a picture of its beautiful 1868 Courthouse, the history of the county, a biographical directory of its citizens and where they lived, some portraits of early settlers, and many other items of interest.

The Morgan County War Record of 31 pages lists hundreds of citizens participating in the Civil War.

The reprint, by Unigraphic, Inc., will be the same size book and print as the original 1878 edition. It will be bound in a hard library binding of durable buckram.

Trying to conserve space and have more room for words, and trying to put important messages on the right-hand side creates conflicts for editors. You will note one page near back of this Quarterly entitled "Lucy Ball Notebooks:. There were 2 books left in the bottom of a filing cabinet Dr. Beams purchased when Lucy's things were sold after her death a year or so ago. (She is the one who typed the Greene County Marriages and put them in the State Historical Library several years ago.) The hand-written work books of family history were given to me. I sent them to one of our members who has made this surname index, and is now in the process of typing ditto masters so that people interested in these names may take advantage of Lucy's family-digging. Anybody wanting a copy of this record in the future should write to us, and when the printing is accomplished we can advise of the cost.

Lucy Ball's extensive research papers were sent to the Public Library in Knox-ville, Tennessee. The freight company repacked them in Springfield and probably messed up their orderliness. Whether or not the library has them for public viewing, or not, we do not know. If anybody writes to the library, will you please apprise us of your findings?

I have taken my two big books of Greene County Marriages (1828-1870) to Lincoln Library. They copied them for their Sangamon Valley Genealogical Collection. I am intending to put a copy in our Courthouse soon. A copy is also at the Jacksonville Public Library, and the State Historical Library.

Mabel Sheffer has accomplished the reading of the 1850 Greene County Census, and we are in the process of indexing and proof-reading it. She gave me a copy of the Mortality Schedule for Greene, Calhoun and Cass and I was intending to put it in this quarterly, but ran out of space. Sorry folks.

We have xeroxed all 3 volumes of Bob Dalton's Cemetery readings on file at the Public Library, and are in the process of indexing those.

We have finished all cards on all burials in the west half of Jacksonville East, but they are not alphabetized as yet. Margaret Farmer has just finished the cards on burials in East view Addition. So, we are "up to our ears" in cards! Now you probably know why your letters haven't been answered so promptly.

It was my pleasure to be speaker at St. Clair County Genealogical Society's first anniversary dinner on June 3rd. The topic: "Am I My Father's and Mother's Lineage Keeper". Enclosed in this Quarterly are my newly developed lineage charts pertaining to it. Should you want the complete envelope of materials, we would appreciate your sending a two-dollar donation to cover costs of paper, printing and postage. Eileen Cunningham of Carrollton went to the meeting with me. One of my Vexillological friends furnished me with tiny Betsy Ross pins so I thought that they were appropriate to give to the genealogists in memory of Flag Day. Next day we stopped in Litchfield to assist the Montgomery County Genealogical Society in completing their organization. They took in \$105 in Charter Memberships that afternoon, and are well on their way to becoming a thriving useful Society. Mrs. Lynn Reener is temporary Chairman.


I have developed several leaflets of information, and a resolution designed to start a society. If anybody is interested in starting, even a small community society, I would be happy to give assistance in the procedures.

# THE SOCIETY OF THE CINCINNATI IN THE STATE OF VIRGINIA

#### ESTABLISHMENT 1776

Major-General Henry Knox, Washington's Chief of Artillery, in a conversation with Adams as early as 1776, expressed a "wish for some ribbon to wear in his hat or in his button-hole, to be transmitted to his descendants as a badge and proof that he had fought in defense of their liberties. He spoke in such precise terms as showed that he had revolved it in his mind before" (Jefferson's Diary: March 16, 1788).



FIRST MEETING OF THE VIRGINIA CINCINNATI OCTOBER 6TH, 1783

A FTER the institution of the Society of the Cincinnati at Newburgh-on-the-Hudson on May 13th, 1783, the officers returned to their several States and organized State Societies of the Cincinnati. The Virginia Society was formed at the Town House at Fredericksburg on October 6th, 1783, under the presidency of Brigadier-General George Weedon. That evening at 5 P.M. the members dined together for the first time, at the Rising Sun Tavern. This sketch represents the members gathering at the historic tavern. —(Drawing by Col. John Rodgers Meigs Taylor, U. S. A. of the Virginia Cincinnati).

An index of the "ORIGINAL ROLL OF THE VIRGINIA CINCINNATI (now in the Manuscripts Division, Library of Congress, Washington)" is given here because their names are common to West Central Illinois families and may be the ancestors for our genealogical researchers in this area. Perhaps they never considered writing to the Military Records Division, Virginia Archives, Richmond, Virginia 23219. for such information. As to whether they have certain forms to be filled out, I do not presently know, having had no experience in writing for information of this nature.

Page2: The Society of the Cincinnati in the State of Virginia.

While at Newberry Library a couple of years ago I xeroxed this roll of officers <sup>1</sup> and "List of Virginia Revolutionary Officers Eligible to be Represented in the Society of the Cincinnati in the State of Virginia"<sup>2</sup>, compiled by Col. John Rodgers Meigs Taylor.

The original officers on the roll signed this oath:

We the Subscribers, Officers of the American Army, do hereby voluntarily become parties to the aforegoing Institution and do bind ourselves to observe and be governed by the principles therein contained, for the performance thereof we do firmly pledge to each other our sacred Honor.

One book given as reference in the text is "The History of Virginia's Navy of the Revolution" by Robert Armistead Stewart. Another, "Historical Register of Officers of the Contenental Army. April 1775 to December 1783." Francis B. Heitman. Perhaps our researchers can request that copies of these books be obtained on loan by the local librarian.

For those who have not had occasion to study the history of this organization, we offer the following:

The Society of the Cincinnatti was a fraternal organization of Continental Army officers formed to promote friendship, insure the perpetuation of liberty and justice, and assist members and their families should the need arise. The society was named for the Roman military leader Cincinnatus (519 B.C.-?) who left his plow to save Rome from the invading Aequians. After the Roman victory, he returned to his farm, ready to serve his country again if needed.

In choosing this name, the veterans of the Revolutionary war indicated their intention to follow this course of action. The Society's constitution, adopted at Baron von Steuben's home, provided for hereditary membership to pass through the eldest male descendant of the more than 2,000 original members. George Washington was the first elected president-general of the society, remaining in office until he died. He was succeeded by Alexander Hamilton. Accused of being undemocratic by Thomas Jefferson, and of trying to create "a race of hereditary patricians or nobility," the society's general council attempted to remove the hereditary aspect of membership, but the state organizations failed to ratify the change. The Society continues to exist in the 1960's essentially as a service organization.

Is there "somebody out there" who can tell us if the hereditary data is available to us, and where we might find it?

FACTS PERTAINING TO ILLINOIS VITAL RECORDS: BIRTH, DEATH AND MARRIAGE

#### 1. Marriage records (and divorce):

- a. Application made in County where married, from beginning of County Records
- b. Return of marriage certificate by minister required, recorded, and filed
  - 1) Sometimes record says: 1.g. = license granted; no marriage certificate on file
  - 2) This may not indicate that marriage did not occur, always. Perhaps bad weather, or death or removal to another place of the officiate may have been a reason the certificate did not make it back to the County Clerk's office; or it may have been misfiled, or lost
  - 3) Some marriages took place by publishing "banns" for three weeks in the local church, and minister did not get certificate filed, except noted in his personal book, and/or church record
- c. By State Law, names of parents and other data was recorded on a Marriage Register in each county as of the latter part of 1877, but usually as of 1 January 1878.
- d. Since 1 January 1962, a copy of each marriage license application and certificate of divorce is on record with the State Office of Vital Records, where a statewide index is maintained, alphabetically by name of husband and maiden name of wife.
  - For \$3.00 fee, State Office will search indexes and verify whether a
    particular marriage has been recorded, and where, or a divorce has been
    granted.
  - 2) Copies of marriage records are available only from County Clerk's office
  - 3) Copies of divorce decrees are available only from Circuit Court Clerk

#### 2. Birth and Death Certificates:

- a. Certified copies of birth and death records may be issued to those persons qualified to receive them upon payment of \$3.00 fee required by State Law.
- b. Make application to County Clerk's office where event occurred
- c. In some counties, in the outlying towns, the Local Registrar also maintains a file of those records.
- d. Please make application on standard forms, if available, or make your letter brief, to the point with specific names and as much information as you have, and in outline form. Never ask County Clerks to search indexes for surnames.
- e. While most county officers hold to the \$3.00 fee, some clerk's charge more as a local policy.
- f. The original of any birth or death certificate, filed after 1 January 1916, is on file in the Office of Vital Records, where a statewide index is maintained.
- g. Birth or death certificates are available both from the State Office, or the County Clerk's office in the county where event occurred. Fee is retained even if certificate is not on file.
- h. Death certificates are filed in county where death occurred, not in county of residence.

We found this earliest Guardians' Bonds Book stored in the attic of the Courthouse, have abstracted some vital statistics of importance to our family history seekers, indexed its contents for easier reference, and placed it on file with the Circuit Court Clerk. These birthdates can be used as legal proof, when desired, by securing a xerox copy of the page and having it certified by the Circuit Court Clerk for \$1.00. By mail, Wills from the Probate files represented by Case numbers, may be secured for \$2.00 each. A Petition for Letters of Administration is included in most Case files, and a copy secured for \$1.00. This gives date of death and surviving heirs, thereby making it valuable research data. Make checks payable to the Circuit Court Clerk, and send all correspondence to his office here in Jacksonville, Illinois 62650.

Please note: All of these cases are intestate administrations -- there are no Wills on file. In many cases the decedent's name does not appear on the Index of Closed Probate Files, for some reason. When a person died elsewhere, his estate was undoubtedly administered in that county, which we specify when it was listed in the Guardian's Book I. Perhaps some of these guardianships were made for purposes other than for estate administration.

Page 1: DEATH DATES ABSTRACTED FROM ADMINISTRATORS' BONDS BOOK III (AB:III) (24 July 1849 to 28 January 1861, Morgan County, Illinois)

The death dates abstracted from this old book found in the Courthouse Archives is an indication of the type of genealogical data that can be made available when some researcher spends enough time and energy to copy out the record and retrieve it from "limbo".

There are 2 pages, facing each other, which is devoted to each decedent. The left hand page gave names of Bondsmen, penal sum of so many dollars value as bond, witnessing of hands and seals, and date; also, name of deceased, administrator, with legal language pertaining to his performance of duties.

The right hand page gives name of decedent, his death date (if known on that day of court), and signatures of Judge, Administrator, Clerk, and Bondsmen.

The following abstracts gives page numbers in above-mentioned book, the second page being the one with the death date; also the Case Number has been looked up in the Closed Probate Files Index and listed as "Case#". We did not find all such numbers. Perhaps this was due to misspelling of name, or the case was not completed, or another county or state was involved.

Genealogists, please remember that these are intestate administrations in Probate Court, and no Wills are involved in any of these cases. There is a possibility that each File Case listed may contain a Petition for Letters of Administration which also gives death date and surviving heirs. No heirs are listed in the book quoted above, as was true with the Guardians' Bonds Book heretofore quoted.

[Please note: To save space, only the right-hand page number with death date included will be listed. CASE# comes from Closed Probate Files Index.]

from December 7, 1827 until then, were removed to the new, and present, beautiful Courthouse. The older records were stored in an attic room. The preservation of such books is in itself a miracle. While the old heavy spines have dropped off, with their identifying wording, and the leather bindings now give of ample brown dust, the pages and ink are all in excellent condition, and just as readable today as then — if one has the practiced eye for interpreting the letter formations peculiar to that day and time.

My next task will be to locate the match-mates of these Bonds books which contain information for those persons who died with a Will on record. It will be labeled Executors Bonds. The Bonds book for 2 June 1841 to 18 March 1846 lists administrators and bondsmen, but does not give date of death for decedent. So not all old books we locate will present the proof of death or birth date that we are seeking.

The common idea among genealogists is that "proof" is some kind of an absolute factor - that the use of the word establishes a certainty which can never be refuted by any other person. To say "John Williams is the father of Elizabeth Williams and I have proof", might be questioned by someone else, if you have not set down some tangible evidence in legible fashion, and logical order when compiling your family history.

Many people make assumptions as to family relationships. This is a very necessary thought process in order to make new discoveries. But assumptions are not fact until proved by what might be called "hard evidence", or establishment of your belief by an examination of the many factors you should be aware of, and set down on Family Record Sheets as progress in research is achieved.

In his book, The Nature of Proof, Erwin P. Bettinghausl defines proof as "the process of using evidence to secure belief in an idea or statement." Thus we see that proof is only as good as the evidence used. To say that you have "proved your lineage to a Revolutionary ancestor merely means that you have used evidence to establish your belief that the lineage is correct. There can be many a slip between Person #1 on the Lineage Register and the Revolutionary ancestor because of name likenesses.

Besides evidence, the other key word in the definition of proof is belief, quoted from Bettinghaus, as "any simple proposition that an individual can attest to." Belief being a subjective thing, a type of individual judgement, depends upon the reliability of the person stating his or her belief.

Can you prove who your parents are? That is, can you present evidence to secure belief that John and Mary are your parents? "Certainly," you say, and proceed to list the following factors:

- "1. I've always knownit, and so has everyone else.
- 2. My parents have called me son or daughter all my life.
- 3. I lived with John and Mary ever since I can remember.
- 4. My birth certificate says they're my parents.
- 5. I look like my dad. "

These are circumstantial pieces of evidence which leads one to believe that John and Mary are indeed your parents. There are factors of belief here which might not be the truth, however. Maybe there was an adoption. Maybe your parents took you in as a baby from a relative who deceased. Nutrition and family habits may have a lot to do with looking alike. Even dogs are known to resemble their owners! A second birth certificate, in the case of adoption, would say that these parents were yours. Are they really your parents?

As insecure as doubts make us feel, we must learn to live with uncertainty. The validity of any pedigree connection between generations is merely a probability. Let us theorize mathematically. Assuming that the probability of information in each link of a pedigree is correct to 90%, an accumulated error over 10 generations would lower the probability that all connections are correct to only 35%. Another way of saying the same thing is that there is a 65% likelihood that the man you believe to be your 8th great grandfather really isn't.

Let this startling theory make us more careful to set down our evidence as we find it, and document its source immediately. Do not let this be an as sumption in mind only, and thereby unreadable by others who might be seeking family history along the same lines.

Let us consider how to make more effective use of Lineage Charts and Family Record sheets containing the vital statistics most family historians collect so avidly, and stop with.

There are several factors or steps to establish proper beliefs:

- A. Statement of possible parentage.
- B. Establishment of identity by vital statistics, known parentage and marriage relationships.
- C. Listing and documentation of evidence.
- D. Footnoting references.
- E. Drawing inferences and conclusions.
- F. Establishing belief from examination of all of these factors.

There are certain sources of information which must be considered that have been listed on our Father's and Mother's Lineage charts, and here repeated, with additions, so that their numerical system can be used as a guide for indicating proof and sources from various types of records.

SOURCES OF INFORMATION: Circle number, as(2)or(3), or underline as 2, 3, etc. Put beside date of birth, marriage, death, name, or location as applicable.

- 1. Courthouse records
- 2. Cemetery
- 3. Bible records in home of ---
- 4. Letters home of ---
- 5. Church records
- 6. School "
- 7. Service "
- 8. News items and obits
- 9. Census records

- a. Federal census b. State Census c. Mortality Schedules.
- 10. County Histories
- 11. Family Histories
  - a. published
  - b. private collections (state where)
- 12. Reference books used as guides to research techniques and location of relevant data
- 13. Maps collected, or sources consulted

The following example is given so that the reader can learn how to detect hidden assumptions and better understand the nature of proof in genealogy.

- A. STATEMENT: John Williams was the father of Elizabeth (Williams) Wilson.
- B. ESTABLISHMENT OF IDENTITY:
  - 1. Elizabeth Williams
    - a. Born 26 August 1820, in Tennessee
    - b. Died 23 June 1900 in Douglas County, Missouri
  - 2. Married 28 December 1827 in Marion County, Tennessee to Bartlett J. Wilson.
- C. EVIDENCE:
  - 1. Elizabeth Williams' name appears on a list of 8 apparent siblings with birthdates given on old handwritten record on a sheet apparently torn from a bible. 3 [A superior numeral, as 3, indicates footnote number at bottom of page, or end of article. (3) or 3 indicates source of information on lineage charts.]
  - 2. Bartlett J. Wilson's family is listed in the 1840 census two lines from John Williams' family.4 [9 on "Sources".]
  - 3. Deeds show that the estate of John Williams was divided into seven parts at his death. Two of the names on the list mentioned in #1 are shown to be heirs of John Williams, namely Lydia and Isaac.5

- 4. Age groupings in the 1830 and 1840 census, Marion County, Tenn., of John Williams' family match the list of #1.6
- 5. Bartlett J. Wilson married Elizabeth Williams at the home of John Williams. Traditionally, couples were married in the home of the bride's father. 7
- 6. A granddaughter and contemporary of Elizabeth Williams named some brothers and sisters of Elizabeth which matched the list in #1, as well as one of the names given in #3.8
- D. AN INFERENCE:
  - 1. From #3: Isaac Williams was the son of John Williams.
  - 2. From #6: Elizabeth Williams was the sister of Isaac Williams.
  - 3. Conclusion: Elizabeth was the daughter of John Williams.
- E. THE BELIEF WHICH RESULTS: John Williams was the father of Elizabeth (Williams) Wilson. [But there is no proof of date of her marriage to Bartlett J. Wilson, nor information on her mother, so this part of the investigation would have to be continued.]

Identification is the use of facts to establish, with high probability, the identity or uniqueness of a specific person, fott-printing of babies, and finger-printing of adults being one method. Vital statistics (birth, death and marriage data) label a person as unique in history - one of a kind. Banks ask for name, birthdate, birth place, and mother's maiden name because it is almost impossible for two people to have this same data applying to them. Notice here the importance attached to the maiden name!

These show some of the reasons genealogists search for vital statistics so avidly, laying curiosity and gossip aside. But few historians make full use of their data beyond recording it on a chart or family record. The fewer facts known about a person, the greater the likelihood that he or she can be confused with someone else in the same area with a similar name. Middle names, or middle initials may one day make the big difference in proof as to an ancestor's identification. Be sure to include as much of them, and nicknames, as possible.

Closely observe old records for spelling. Duplicate if possible, or record in some fashion, footnoting and referencing as much as possible. There is no sader experience than getting home with a lot of deeds and no book or page reference, nor county of origin. A word of caution about spellings — I and J, in many handwritten records, look alike because the loop for J was placed above the line as was the I. In combination with the old English double s (), Jesse comes out lepse, and James as Ianus sometimes.

In the proof given above it was assumed that the dates and places listed for identification were correct, and that all was relevant. Belief in this case leads to action—thewriter will continue search for the wife of John, and husband of Elizabeth. [Footnotes for these items will be presented next, as though they would come at the end of a chapter, instead of on lower part of each page.]

#### FOOTNOTE NOTES FROM KATE' TURABIAN'S MANUAL

Footnotes of reference and content have four main uses:1

- 1. To cite the authority for statements in text -- specific facts or opinions, as well as exact quotations.
- 2. To make cross-references.

\*

- 3. To make incidental comments upon, to amplify, or to qualify discussion—in short, to provide a place for material which the writer considers worthwhile, or relevant to include, but which, for various reasons, cannot be introduced in the text or on the chart.
- 4. To make acknowledgments as to source of information.

Footnote numbers, or "superior numerals": [For extensive rules see below.]

- 1. The place in the text at which footnote is introduced should be marked with an arabic numeral placed slightly above the line.
- 2. Do not put a period after it, or embellish it with parentheses, etc.
- 3. The numeral follows a punctuation mark, except the dash.
- 4. A footnote number follows the passage to which it refers.
- 5. Footnote number, follow one another in numerical order, starting with 1.
- 6. Numbering may start over on each page, or at beginning of each chapter.
- 7. They may be at the foot of the page upon which references appear.
- 8. Separate text and footnotes with an unbroken line 20 spaces in length, beginning at left-hand margin on the first line beneath the text.
- 9. Indent the first line of each footnote the same number of spaces as the paragraph indention in the text.
- 10. Tyep the footnotes single space, but use double space between individual notes.
- 11. Place numeral slightly above the line. There should be no punctuation after the numeral, and no extra space between it and the first word of the note.

All genealogists are advised to secure a copy of the Turabian Manual and use its format, style and abbreviations in order to standardize lineage charts to acceptable and recognizable works worthy of all their hard labors, search, and research. Especially study bibliography techniques pp. 125-158. Note differences in presenting footnote and constructing bibliographical entries. Get newest edition, as Miss Turabian has simplified many things in more recent books. These can be had in paper back.

Page 1: AM I MY FATHER'S AND MOTHER'S LINEAGE KEEPER? and, POINTS TO REMEMBER WHEN RECORDING FAMILY HISTORY ON CHARTS: DY Mrs. Florence Hutchison.

At the mention of a separate lineage chart for Fathers and Mothers the average genealogist will take a brief look at Hutchison's New-Method and say "it looks just like the rest of them," or "it looks too complicated," or "I don't understand it."

But wait -- take some closer looks to learn of its advantages:

- 1. Only half as many people to deal with on page 1 -- all are related to each other.
- 2. Set up 2 notebooks -- 1 for father's lineage, and 1 for mother's.
- 3. The page of each chart is just as full as standard charts, but you have an important Key by which to prove from whence came each date and location.
- 4. There is a 6-generation INDEX on the back for easy reference to extended lineage charts on other pages.
- 5. An extended name line. And please study instructions for including maiden names properly so that they will be instantly recognizable as such.

Points to remember when compiling Father's and Mother's Lineage Charts shown on pages 23-26. (The extended charts to six generations havebeen omitted in this book, but samples available from Lineage Packet referred to later.

- 1. Whom do I start with on a genealogical chart?
  - a. Person #1 yourself, or any other person for whom it is constructed.
  - b. A beginner should start with him/herself as #1 for experience.
  - c. Beginners should be concerned only with setting down birth and death dates until more experience is gained in collecting family history and dealing with family prejudices. Caution: striving to secure marriage dates from living relatives, sometimes a very sensitive matter, may alienate affections and dry up important genealogical history sources.
- 2. How do I record names on the two lines provided on these lineage charts?
  - a. Name in normal order. as John H. Jones, Mary A. Smith, or Mary A. (Smith);
  - b. Parentheses around maiden names, or leave blank, i.e., (\_\_\_\_\_)
  - C. Surnames in CAPS for easy reading, as

JONES, H., John, Mary A. (SMITH) JONES, etc.

d. On the charts they would look like this:

JONES (SMITH) JONES Or, JONES

John Henry Mary Ann Mary A. (SMITH)

e. Or, like this:

John HenryMary Annor, Mary Ann (Smith)Jones[Smith] Jones

- f. Sit down some day and practice writing your names in the various ways, select your favorite style, and be consistent in using that method.
- 3. How does one identify husband/wife teams on lineage charts?
  - a. All EVEN numbers belong to MEN.
  - b. All ODD " " WIVES.

Ex.: Even number + 1 = a wife; or, Odd number - 1 = her husband.

- 4. How does one identify the parents of any given person on the chart?
  a. To find the father of any person: double his/her number.
  - Ex.: Person #4's father is #8;

Add 1 to #8 = #9, his mother.

- b. A woman's father is also double her number;
  - Ex.: Wife #9's father is #18;

Add 1 to #18 = #19, her mother.

c. Remember the constant "Double the chart number for a person's father; rule: "Add 1 for his/her mother.

- Page 2: Am I My Father's and Mother's Lineage Keeper?
  - 5. How are generations indicated?
    - a. Generations are indicated by uppercase Roman numerals, as I, II, III, etc.

Ex.: GEN. I Person #1, as head or wife of first family record.

GEN. II His/her parents.

GEN. III His/her grandparents, etc.

- b. Sub-generations are indicated by lowercase Roman numerals, as i, iii, iv.
  - Ex.: gen. i Person #1 as head or wife on first family record sheet.
    - gen. ii His/her children on family record sheet.

gen. iii His/her grandchildren.

gen. iv His/her great-grandchildren, etc.

- c. Mark generations at top page of family record sheets for identification: Ex.: GEN I:i or, GEN III:iv, etc.
- 6. What are common abbreviations used for vital statistics?
  - a. There are several, but no matter what you adopt, be consistent.
  - b. Make a key for abbreviations as you use them, and place on back of charts for other to follow.
  - c. Our designations are simplified for space-saving,
  - d. Use lower case letters, particularly on tombstones readings, to avoid confusion with initials used in lieu for given names.

Ex: b = born; d - died; m = marriage date.

w = where (location as to city, state & county) Kane Ill Greene Co.

bd = burial date (which differs from death date)

b'd = buried in \_\_\_ cemetery; cem = cemetery.

p = place; p.b. = place born, ect., as used in some charts.

- e. Avoid a pageful of periods after abbreviations, when possible. Many rules of English have to be broken by genealogists in order to be practical.
- 7. What are common abbreviations for family relationships?
  - a. mo = mother; fa = father; dau = daughter; par = parents; inf = infant.
    wi = wife; hu = husband; rel = relict (widow); con = consort (spouse)
  - b. grfa = grandfather; grmo grandmother.
    - G = Great; Ggrfa = Great-grandfather; GGgrfa = Great-great-grandfather.
  - c. A simpler form for multiple generations is 2Ggrfa= " " "
- 8. What is the importance of the compiler's name on charts?
  - a. While it may be tedious and time-consuming, always put name and address of compiler on each family record sheet or lineage chart.
  - b. Include date(s) chart was made.
  - c. Importance: someone may isolate a record, xerox it, and later wonder where it came from. They may want to write for more information, or to share their findings with the writer.
  - d. One may use name stickers for this task, but place them at different places on the sheet so that there won't be a buildup of paper in one spot.
  - e. A name stamper would be most desirable, and easy to use.

More and greater genealogical studies are being produced, or reprinted from older works all the time. That was the advantage and purpose of heraldic devices and symbols - to maintain a log of family history. Mr. G. L. Moison of Leesburg, Va., has just sent me a fascinating 1964 reprint of "The Royal House of Britain An Enduring Dynasty" by The Rev. W. M. H. Milner, London: The Covenant Publishing Co., 6 Buckingham Gate, S.W.I. (1902).

3. Sabtah 6.\*Nimrod

A 1-page chart shows the present Queen Elizabeth II's descent from Zarah and Pharez Judah through the Kings of Ireland and Scotland. A large genealogical chart is inserted in the back. If any of you can relate back to the Kings or Queens of England, then you can easily find the way back to Noah, thence to Adam.

Someone gave me a xerox copy, 10 pages, of "Book of Adam", printed by the Wayside Press, Mendota, Ill., for Harold King Bowen, Osceola, Mo., nd. Whether one accepts any genealogy as proof, depends upon his own thoughts on the subject and experience. This Bowen history traces his family through David I King of Scotland (d.1153) and Henry I King of France (1008-1060). My major interest is in tracing the heraldic devices and flags through history, rather than people - at this point. Mr. Moison is also working on a similar project. Did the Lion of Scotland, and now the dual symbol with the Unicorn of ancient England descend from the Lion of Judah? Is this a fulfillment of Psalm 89?
