
THE PURPOSES OF OUR SOCIETY

The purposes for the corporation known as the Jacksonville Area Genealogical and Historical Society, according to our official Articles of Incorporation Under the General Not For Profit Corporation Act of the State of Illinois, filed the 15th Day of March 1976 are:

To preserve and perpetuate ancestral records of members and to assist each other in genealogical research for educational and patriotic purposes. To discover, collect and preserve any materials which may help to establish or illustrate the history of West Central Illinois counties. To encourage the preservation and safeguarding of municipal, county, township and state public records of historical, patriotic and educational significance.

To receive and hold gifts and devises of real and personal estate from any source for the benefit of the Society and to dispose of any real estate not needed, and to use solely for the purpose of the Society any funds derived therefrom or from gifts generally and to do all things incident to the perpetuation of the Society. All the foregoing are for carrying on the work of the Society for educational purposes as provided in Section 501 (c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. In the event of dissolution, all assets (funds and property - both real and personal) remaining after satisfaction of liabilities, will be distributed to a designated organization then exempt under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code or to the federal, state, or local government for public purposes. This does not include any articles on temporary or indefinite loan to the Jacksonville Area Genealogical and Historical Society as so designated by the owner.

THE PRESIDENT'S WANDERLINGS OF STREET OF STREET

To say the least "Pressie" sure has been busy the last two months!

April 12th my husband called from Sarasota, Florida, where he had been enjoying the spring ball games, at 8:00 a.m. and it appeared necessary for me to go down so I threw a lot of things in the car and took off at 4:30 that afternoon. I could truthfully say "that was a hot business trip", because of the weather during the day; however the nights were pretty chilly yet.

It was such a pleasure to go "shelling" on the beach - at first, but after three days of rescuing lovely shells from the poundings of the surf, I put my back out of commission, and had to spend the rest of the two weeks in great pain.

[That is why I have to "bend my brain" instead of my back.]

Fortunately I had taken our Hutchison Family History "mess of unfiled papers" along and was able to spend several days organizing the book under a new Generations system I have devised. It worked out very well, and I would like to begin teaching this system to beginners. It is logical and follows the 7-generation Pedigree Charts which most of us use anyway.

Here's a hint for interpreting the numbering system on the charts. Each generation number doubles. Therefore father 2 has father 4, grandfather 8, etc. This is a help when you get to grandmother 11, for example, and wonder where in the world is her father on the second page. That is simple - look for #22. [Thought I'd throw this in for the beginners.]

Then I was able to construct a system for determining family relationships according to civil law. This bit of research is included on pages 9 and 10 of this Journal. If any of you have suggestions for improvement, or can point out any errors in the system, I would be very happy to have your correspondence pertaining to this matter. I would like to correlate the Canon Law with this, and show an overlay of that system on this cousin lineage, but I was not able to figure out the procedure. The difference between my chart and the other is that we start at opposite ends of the generation structure - they start with Common Progenitor - and I "start with YOU", as we are always told in the beginning.

One of my pleasures was trying to do a little family research on my way back home. I was all set to use the Georgia Archives in Atlanta on Monday April 26th and went to great lengths to battle the traffic and get there attracts. After finding a place to park (no small job, that) I took all of my books bravely up to the door of the capitol, after climbing the long impressive steps, and was amazed that the doors were locked "tighter than a jug". Some passersby were not able to shed any light on the matter. Then I went up to Calhour, and found that Courthouse locked. At the library they did not know why, but called someone. It was Confederate Memorial Day!

I took off on highway 411 north to Athens, Tenn. This would have been the trail taken by my husband's great-great-grendfather Sanford Hutchison and wife Judah when they went to somewhere in Georgia, and had daughter Anna in 1804. When I came to Etowah, I stopped at an interesting-looking trading-post. Getting into a car to leave was a familiar looking figure! I called out "Beulah", and she turned around. Beulah Rainey from Clinton and I greeted each other like long lost sisters! which is the usual style when one sees a familiar face amongst all those of strangers, especially genealogists.

I stayed all night at a Motel in Athens. Next day I was in the McMitn County Courthouse, only to find that records were burned in the Civil War; but there was a fine genealogist there who came into town and assisted me with re-

search on the Cowan and Tankersley families. Fortunately someone else had inquired about these same people, so Mrs. Boyer was able to take us back another generation and provide a new grandmother's name - Charlotte Copeland - to look for in Blount County along with that of her husband Richard Tankersley.

They have published (1973) a splendid book which gives marriages and memberships for one of the early churches in Athens, Tenn. - "A History of Mars Hill Presbyterian Church". This was compiled by Reba Bayless Boyer and Budd L. Duncan on behalf of the Congregation. Rosannah Cowan was one of the founders of the Church, or early member; she was my husband's great-great-grandmother. When the recent Courthouse was built, their genealogical Society requested, and were provided with, a nice big room for their collections and meetings. In return Reba Boyer and other local genealogists answer all family history inquiries made to Courthouse officials. P.O. Box 416, Athens, TN 37303. There is a reasonable charge for extensive research in the area, and no mail is answered which does not contain a stamped addressed envelope.

I dashed over to Madisonville in Monroe County (TN) and saw the marriage records, beginning in 1843. It made my genealogical heart sick to see those poor old frail abused books uncopied and not indexed. The lady at the desk said there was no one with time enough to interpret them and make a copy. How I longed for enough time to carefully xerox the pages and bring them home to work on, but I have mountains of records here awaiting my Time, or some other Volunteer's Time. I have just xeroxed out the early indexes here in Morgan Co. for Book A 1827 - 1837, made a stencil, mimeographed and have in the back of this Journal. For one dollar anyone desiring an extra copy may order one, as we made 400 copies. I already have xeroxed Book B indexes, but they have not been typed as yet. If someone "out there" would agree to complete the marriage record for a book to publish by our Society in the future, I would xerox the materials and send to them to work on at home. It would be best to make an index card from each male on the list, then going over the female list matching the names, and putting in the dates. To complete it, then, it should have the name of the official solemnizing the vows. These things do take time, but when one can work on it at home indexing goes rather swiftly after a good system is set up. We have a person working on Scott County marriages. I have been xeroxing out the Greene County marriages placed in the Illinois State Historical Library by Lucy Ball, in order to have a copy here at home for reference. These new rules and regulations and prices here in Illinois necessitates publishing such items if we are going to have any marriage records available in the future.

Like the "Wandering Jew" which spreads its lovely leaves all over the place, with a touch of beauty in its little flowers blue, my thoughts have been wandering over all the possibilities for publishing this Geneal Journal for you. Sorry the March Issue #1 is late, but in addition to the Florida trip I have spent all last week struggling with the Internal Revenue's required Form 990 for the Society, which is equivalent to the 1040 for individuals. Then I had to correlate the two and send in the final report for the Illinois Department of Revenue. I could not file the very complicated 1023 acquiring "not-for profit" status for exemption from tax by the IRS until after we made the Balance Sheet for the 990 - so I have been going around in circles on those legal matters.

We now have copies of the 1872 Atlas-1894 Plat Map combination on hand from our second printing. See page 23. We are having a hassle with the postoffice department over what we can print, and what we can't, so no prices are being mentioned in this Journal. If you miss 'em, that's the reason. I feel close kinship to the turtle - he doesn't make any progress unless he sticks his neck out! and digs in with all four feet! Now, if I just had 4 hands to type with!

SCRAPS OF HISTORY -- THE RESULT OF INTERVIEWS WITH OLD AND PROMINENT CITIZENS OF MORGAN COUNTY

Whose Knowledge of Affairs, Past and Present, will be of Advantage to the Rising Generation.

This article which has so much of historical interest for Morgan County, was sent to our Society by Mrs. Fred H. Wiechman, 201 Nevada Street, Northfield MINN 55057. Anderson Foreman was her great-great-grandfather. The John Eads, Sr., mentioned, is her great-great-grandfather.

Since your Editor was planning to make this issue of the Jacksonville (IL) Geneal Journal concerning Church records, this article fits in beautifully for the feature because it mentions many of the early ministers in this area. We hope you enjoy it as much as we do reproducing this bit of old-time history. May many of our readers find mention of their ancestors and relatives on these pages.

Extending over a period of 55 years residence in Morgan county, Illinois, these are the results of interviews with prominent citizens.

Since interviews are all the rage and personal recollections of the old settlers of Morgan are being published as matters of interest and local history, the following is given not without some misgivings that it may fail in spicy, thrilling anecdotes and hair lifting experiences which would cause the readers to forget the hardships endured by the early settlers in reading now what to them would seem like a fairy tale, or a dream in the night.

Fifty-five years ago, on the 8th of November 1828, I arrived in Morgan county, and stopped with Mr. HUMPHREY, about a mile south of the town of Winchester, his residence being near what was then known as Rattlesnake Springs. Here I made my first acquaintance in old Morgan, embracing at that early day the territory or slips of land now known as Scott and Cass counties. In this neighborhood there were no public houses in which to worship Almighty God or "teach the young ideas how to shoot."

Two weeks after my arrival, in company with Mr. Humphrey, I visited the little village of Exeter where there were several dwelling houses, a shoe shop and a grist mill, the latter owned by Enoch C. MARCH. Being here introduced to Mr. MILLS was by him invited to settle there, but anxious to see the country, I left on the 19th of November, 1828, and reached the town (now city) of Jacksonville; put up at a tavern on the northeast corner of the public square kept by Mr. HULL and his father-in-law, BENTLEY. Soon thereafter I formed the acquaintance of nearly every one in the town.

Many of the foregoing citizens, although not intellectual giants, still there were among them some moral heroes --- good and true men, who gave tone and direction to the moral and religious sentiments of the community.

Here Brother John EADS lived, a man of great moral worth, loved and respected by all; being a preacher of the Christian denomination, was in the habit of calling on the boys in the stores and shops saying, "come, boys, this is prayer meeting night," and the boys attended the meetings out of respect for the man of God, and in that way the moral and religious sentiments of the people were built up and extended. This godly man lived to be 85 years old, and joyfully entered into rest, having been born in Snowhill, Delaware. *[See note bottom page 4.]

About that time Rev. Mr. BRITCH (a Presbyterian minister), born in Scotland, spent the greater part of his life preaching to the people and doing good as opportunity offered; traveling a circuit from Edwardsville to Galena, and when well stricken in years was found on the prairie in the northwestern part of the state, frozen to death.

Here also, Mr. DRINKWATER (a Wesleyan Methodist) devoted his life to preaching the gospel and doing good; whose example and good life were long remembered by the old settlers; having his residence in a hole on the bank of Indian Creek about a mile and a half above BABB & HORN'S mill. Afterwards for many years he lived below the mill, and on his way to the distant territory of Oregon died, and sleeps with the early pioneer preachers.

Rev. William CROW, also a preacher of the Baptist (regular) church, lived here. whom many knew and kindly remember. His life and character, striking and proverbially good, and his power and fame as a man and preacher extended far and near, and having achieved a grand, good work, at a ripe age was gathered to his fathers, and "his good works follow him."

Here too, lived the venerable Thomas WHITE (member of the Presbyterian church) whose good example and pure life were known and loved by all, and having wrought a good work in the community where he resided, departed this life, full of years and the respect of people of the county, having been born in North Carolina.

The Rev. John GREEN (a preacher of the Christian denomination), some of whose children live here, lived and spent his life, like the other old veterans of the cross, in teaching his neighbors and friends to live good and useful lives, and when, like the grain fully ripe, was gathered into God's granary above, loved and esteemed by all.

Elder Matthew ELDER, a compeer of Fathers EADS and GREEN, settled in Jersey Prairie (a strip of territory cut off from old Morgan in 1839, when Scott also became separated and formed a county), and after a long life of usefulness and kindness to his many friends and neighbors, joined the silent throng to that

bourne from whence no traveler returns!

Pausing here to drop a tear for the good old men long dead and gone to their reward, let me turn aside and mention one who sat in justice and dispensed the law in solid chunks to his neighbors — Father James DEATON, who, born in old Virginia, settled not far from Jacksonville in 1819. The first class-meeting was organized and held in his house, and it is said of him that, during 40 years as justice of the peace, he never gave judgment against any of his neighbors—being a man of peace, settled all his disputes and suits by compromise; and falling from one of his apple—trees, full of years, honors and the good—will of all, he fell asleep.

At the beginning I said there were no giants then! I forgot the venerable man of God, the Rev. Peter CARTWRIGHT—the hero of "the battle—axe and saddle—bags"—the grandest pioneer, the well—known Methodist minister and elder of the west and south. Wherever Methodism has gone, the wide world over, the fame, eccentricities and wonderful preaching of Cartwright will be known and remembered. He was to Methodism, everywhere, what Daniel Boone was to Kentucky and the great Northwest! His field of operations was the world, his great heart, pluck and unflagging zeal in his Master's cause, having reached four score years of hard—ships and self—sacrifices, battle—scarred and his soul made happy and radiant with numberless human souls borne to God by his herculean labors in the Lord's vineyard, he died as he had lived, with his face to the foe of humanity, and his faith in God and the salvation of sinners clear and unshaken.

In this county lived and died my good old friend, Thornton SHEPHERD (regular Baptist or Hardshell), who, after preaching 55 years every Sunday, told me, not long since, "that he had not, for all his services as a preacher, received so much as \$5 from any of his brethren." And yet the Lord blessed and prospered him; and having done what he could to serve and honor God, far advanced in years fell asleep, and the quaint old man and preacher will be remembered by his neighbors as faithful and true to God and humanity.

Who in Morgan will forget that good little old man eloquent, Elder Harrison W. OSBORN, with a manner so meek, a voice so gentle and loving; who, for nearly three-quarters of a century, broke to thousands in this and other states, the bread eternal of life. The compeer of the venerable and saintly Barton W. STONE (the leader and founder of the people known as "New Lights" in Kentucky), he was active in forming the union of the New Lights or followers of STONE, and Campbellites or Christians, and thus united in Jacksonville in 1831, formed one body of disciples known and called the Church of Christ, or Christian Church. He continued actively in his Master's work until a little while ago he fell asleep in Jesus, and his memory and life work none will ever forget to love and honor.

Having said so much of the dead, both good and great, what shall I say of even great men still living? Rev. Peter AKERS, LL.D., who, in his younger days, lacked only one vote of being knighted a bishop of the M. E. Church. He is the Boanerges of Methodism in the 19th century. Who shall sketch his grand life or compass his colossal intellect? Although a nonagenarian, still walks our streets, and at times the old time fire and force of 50 years ago lights up his face—flashes from his eagle eyes and rings in his stentorian voice like thunder, or the roar of Niagara! His life work is about done. What pen so trenchant, or historian so truthful shall tell of his power and usefulness, or even do justice to the grand old man, learned and eloquent, by writing his colorful life, the most remarkable in the history of Methodism in the great Northwest?

Then, too, there is the Christian statesman (if that can be), the Rev. Newton CLOUD. No man in this community stood higher in the state and church than he; Nature and grace combined to make him good and great. His wise counsel on the organic laws of church and state will live and keep his name and memory bright and honored as long as time shall last, or civil and religious government endures. Having reached that serene and honorable round in life's fair temple and Christian exaltation, he passed gently down the steeps of time, and now sleeps with the pure, noble, honored and loved of earth.

I shall speak only too briefly of my friend and neighbor, John P. WILKINSON. He was a gentleman in the highest sense; the young man's friend and the widow's hope in time of need. Few, if any, knew him but to love and praise. He has gone to his reward, and his precious memory and good deeds will follow on.

What shall I say of old Father Scott RIGGS, that good old man? He was an earnest, active Christian, and contributed to unite the two bodies of Christians in the old court house in Jacksonville in 1831. Father Riggs, octogenarian though he was, achieved much good and lived a useful life, and dying, left a grand, rich legacy, a Christian life for his children and friends to imitate and cherish.

The famous historic "deep snow" occurred in the winter of 1830-31. On the 20th of December, 1830, began sleeting and snowing and continued throughout December. Through January and February, 1831, snow fell and in many places drifted to the depth of six feet and more. The snow, on an average all over the country, was three feet deep. It was indeed a season of great hardship and suffering to men and beasts and birds throughout the country.

May 1st 1834, frost and freezing killed all vegetation, and even injured forest trees, so that they died.

In May, 1844, and all June, the great unprecedented flood came, the highest and most remarkable on record, then known to the oldest inhabitants.

In 1834, near Middle creek, in Cass county, now, but in Morgan then, a religious society of fanatics was organized, who not only believed in witchcraft, but actually made offerings of themselves, and were burned at the stake. Whereupon the lot fell to an old lady, whom the others tied and bound to the stake. When she began to burn she screamed so loud ampitiable that Mr. ELMORE, hunting near by, broke the door open with a fence rail, released the burning woman from the stake, broke up the meetings, and the grand jury of Morgan county indicted many of the members, and the religious fanatics left the country.

In 1825 the town of Jacksonville was laid out by Surveyor SHELTON and others, and while surveying the public square a colored boy, brought to the county by Thomas P. CLARK on his way to Mr. KERR'S, east of town, drove upon the square with his ox team and stopped to see what these men were doing; whereat the surveying party, never having seen a negro before in this part of the country, inquired of the boy his name, when he answered, "Andrew Jackson!" Thereupon Thomas ARNETT one of the county commissioners, exclaimed, with an oath, "We'll call this town Jacksonville!" and thus christened after a negro, accounts measurably for its people being such notable abolitions and freedom-loving citizens.

Florence Hutchison

This is the first of a series on early church records in our area. The Pleasant Grove Baptist Church of Christ probably was held in the homes of its institutors. We have not, as yet, pinpointed the section on which a church was located; however, in 1838 it united with the Manchester Church, so it would be in that vicinity. While in 1829 it was listed as being in Morgan County, it was probably located in what is now Scott County (1839).

We are in the process of indexing this book, and other church records we have recently copied, but decided to give our members the advantage of determining their ancestors by publishing the membership lists in this Journal. Contributions are acceptable towards future xeroxing of church records as we find them. These "lost" records are coming to light as we search in the area. If you know of any person who has old church records in his home, will you please let us know about them.

The Pleasant Grove Baptist Church of Christ was instituted. Saturday, September 4, 1829, by the first fifteen members listed below, on the petition, with the five other members added immediately after constitution, probably on the same day. [p. 107]

At the August meeting 1835, page 42, "3rd, P.N.Haycraft requested the church to release him from the Clerkship as he was about to leave this section of county, to which the church agree."

"4th Resolved that we appoint Br. James D. Martin to act as clerk of this church."

At the October meeting 1835, "The church met and after sermon by Brother P.N.Haycraft, proceded to business. Is enquired for the fellowship of the church - is found in peace."

(Page 43) "2nd, Opened a door for the reception of members. Brother P. N. Haycraft, Sister Haycraft, Brother Jacob Chenoeth, Sister Marry Chenoeth, and Brother Presly Chenoeth applied for letters of dismission.

3rd The church grants the same. ..."

At the November Meeting 1835, "...The church appointed Jacob V. Chenoweth and Samuel Shanklin, to visit Brethren, Richard Tetterton, Elija Ash, and Henry Day, and invite them to atend our next Church meeting, or to know of them, whether they ever intend to come any more, as it was reported, that they had said, said, that they did not intend to come any more. ..."

At the December Meeting of 1835 (page 43) "... 2nd Called for the refference from last meeting concerning Brethmen absenting themselves from Church meeting. Brother (page 44) Elijah Ash attended and gave the Church satisfaction and was retained in fellowship.

2nd Brethren Richard Tetterton, and Henry Day did not attend. Resolved that Brethren Saml Chenoweth & Miles Vertreese visit and invite them to attend our next meeting.

3rd opened a door for the reception of members and received by letter Brother Thomas Taylor.

4th He is unanimously set forward by the Church to exercise his gift in public by preaching, exhortation & prayer whereever the Lord in his providence may direct him.

5th Brother William Humphrey at his request is dismissed by letter. ..."

At the January Meeting 1836, "... 1st the reference respecting the Brethren Richard Tetterton and Henry Day was taken up, and for the sin of absenting themselves from, and refusing to travel with the church, they are both Excommunicated from the fellowship of the Church. Adjourned in order."

Added were Lucy Duncan, and Frances (Duncan) Shanklin in March, and Susana Taylor in May.

At the April meeting "2nd the Church resolve to move her place of meeting to Manchester if ther can be a house had. She appoint Brethren Martin & Tailor to se if their can be one had. ..."

At the May meeting (page 46), "with regard to moveing the place of meeting to Manchester, resolved to refer it indefinitely.

4th Brother John Barnes by Br. Miles Virtree, requested a letter of dismission which was granted.

5th The church grant Brother Thos. Tailor license to preach the gospel whereever God in his providence may direct him also anex license to solemnize the right of matrimony. Adjourned in order."

In July Elizabeth Brantley was dismissed by letter.

- -- 2nd motioned seconded and decided in the afirmative, that the rules of decorum, and Articles of Faith, of each Church be read, and a third, viz., those used by the Blue-River Association which was done;
- --4th after reading the articles of Faith it was motioned seconded and decided in the afirmative that the third be adopted; changing the term Asociation to that of Church;
- --4th motioned, seconded and decided in the afirmative, that the last Article of the Pleasant Grove Church confession be aded as an amendment;
- --5th after reading the rules of Decorum -- motioned, seconded and decided in the afirmative that the Rules formerly used by Pleasant Grove Church be adopted for the rules of this church --
- --6th motioned seconded and decided in the afirmative that the mind of the Church be taken by private balot which Asociation she will be atached to the result was twenty for Blue River one for North District after which the Constitution of Blue River As. was recd;
- --7th motioned seconded and decided in the afirmative that she send five Mesengers to the Asociation, viz., Eld. J. Bower, Brethren Thos. Tailor, John Martin, John Humphry, and Elija Ash, with \$1.00 for minutes.
- --8th motioned seconded and decided in the afirmative that the Church meet for a conference the third Saturday in every Month at 12 oclk.
- -- 9th Resolved that she memoralize the Association to change the day of ruling our meetings from Saturday to Sabath --
- -- 10th Resolved that Eld. Jacob Bower, be our Church Moderator.
- -- 11th Resolved that Br. James D. Martin, church Clerk
- --12th Resolved that the former deacons of the two churches be the Deacons of this Church, viz., Brethren John Willson, John Humphrey, and John Martin
- --13th Motioned and seconded that Eld. Jacob Bower be the pasture of this Church, which was, upon his request referred until next meeting --
- --14th motioned, seconded and decided in the afirmative that Brother Tailor prepare a friendly letter and bear the same to the North district Association to be held in Carolton in Sept. next informing that of what we have done, said leter to be presented for inspection at our next meeting.

15th opened a door for the reception of members.

FAMILY RELATIONSHIP CHART ACCORDING TO CIVIL LAW OF INHERITANCE

Mrs. Florence Hutchison

While in Florida recently, with Time on my hands, I worked out a logical formula for determining cousin relationships, following the pattern of our 7-generation Pedigree Charts. It was so simple, I wondered why such a chart had never been presented to genealogists before. It is much easier to say "He is my 9th cousin", for example, than "He is my 4th cousin 2 times removed"! And far more meaningful, genealogically.

Upon research I found that my Family Relationship Chart follows the civil law of inheritance, and the other genealogical charts, that we usually see, follow the canon law of the Mormon Church, and does not reflect the lapse of generations between distant cousins. The purpose of their charts is to make family relationships appear closer together for religious reasons. Another difference is that instead of talking about our being grandsons, we show the relationship as our grandparents, uncles or aunts, which is a more logical line of reasoning. This also follows the usual genealogical advice to beginners "Start with yourself!"

The logical approach concerns the rule of lineal and collateral descent: Family relationships increase by one number each generation.

From my chart, when one says "He is an 11th cousin, you know that there are 15 families involved. (You add 4 generations to cousin relationships). Conversely, you subtract 4 from the number of families involved, to determine the cousin relationship. See example following:

There is your common progenitor

His two sons or daughters from whom each cousin descends

The generations of Cousins: Pedigree (1) - Mine

The generations of Cousins: Pedigree (2) - Hers

Subtract the number 4

Please note, that in Pedigree (2) the generation numbers of collateral descent are reversed, since i. Gen., your grand-uncle, is closer to you than the succeeding generations of cousins.

Even though cousins in Pedigrees (1) and (2) were not in the same generation, the method of figuring would be the same; i.e., Landgrave in his v. Generation would be my 9th cousin, involving 13 families, and so on.

Female counterparts are interchangeable with male lineages.

RULE OF LINEAL AND COLLATERAL DESCENT: Family relationships increase by one number each generation.

Upper case roman numerals indicate lineal descent; lower case roman numerals indicate collateral descent from the common progenitor's child who is your uncle (or aunt).

.Procedure for determining relationships:

- 1. Set up a lineage chart for each person desired. (See example preceding page.)
- 2. Follow Person #1 of Pedigree (1) down to the generation of the common progenitor with his cousin.
- .3. Move back one generation to progenitor's two children in collateral generation i.
- 4. Move out (horizontally) to the generation represented by your cousin. The number in the square will indicate your family relationship. (See abbreviations used below:)

[#] Gen = generation; g = great, with figure; gr or gra = grand; fa = father;
mo = mother; unc = uncle; graunk or grunk = grand uncle; C = cousin, etc.

It is a pleasure to hear from "strangers-become-friends" who live in scattered areas around the United States who have ancestral ties in our area. We do not want to discourage any person from writing to us, but to encourage letters of inquiry. In this way we are able to "pull out of limbo" much family history that will be preserved for the heritage of our descendants, those whose surname became extinct with the birth of daughters, or children who died young, or single. Thus we hope to fulfill the purposes for which our Society was organized.

May I point out, however, some of the problems a genealogist faces. who receives the second letter of inquiry. Because of my multiple duties as president, editor, genealogical researcher, lecturer, etc., I can not possibly keep all materials organized and filed for ready reference. There are not enough filing spaces, nor time, so I resort to "organized confusion" tactics, in which piles of related things are together in my living room, basement, sometimes under the bed, when family comes home! Distortions occur when I have to hurriedly grab something and take off to a meeting. Naturally, some letters are necessarily put aside, until there is time for research, which takes a lot of time and thought

After a letter comes to my attention, I look immediately in easy sources, and may not find anything. The letters are usually read in open meetings, and brief announcements find their way into our news articles. Many have written back to let us know that somebody cared enough to write to them, and how thankful they are. They form nice contacts with other members of our Society.

Eventually, I pick up a few letters and dash to the courthouse or library. I scan the letters to find what the inquirer wants, and use a high-liter pen on vital data. With most queries I have to wade through a lot of wordage, find a name, more history, another name, etc. All the vital needs and questions should be concisely stated in the beginning of the letter, then relate the history. County and Circuit Court Clerks become very frustrated trying to figure out what the person wants as they wade through some of the letters.

It is relief for inquirer and researcher when some vital materials are found and sent. Here is the next big problem. The inquirer, thinking that the geneal-ologist knows all about his or her family, writes back for another item or two saying, "Will you please look up John's obituary?"

Who is John? What is his death date so that one can pinpoint it on the microfilm without wasting time? The inquirer should again make a specific request giving all necessary data for finding the information; otherwise the researcher has to go through much correspondence looking for the original letter. Personally, I am not that efficient, and have no funds to hire a secretary. Others may be more efficient office-wise than I am, and may not have this problem of retrieval, but I doubt it.

Please, genealogical inquirers, write your letters on standard size (8 x 11) typing or notebook paper so that they can be better filed. Leave left-hand margins. Send long stamped envelopes so that xeroxed materials won't have to be folded in six sections instead of three.

Make specific request in second letter, too, giving all details known about the person(s), as to date and places of birth, marriage and death, so that the researcher will not have to locate your first letter. This speeds up the process of inquiry, research and letter return. Refer to the date of your previous letter (I assume writers keep all of their correspondence properly filed) so that when letters are finally filed in the Society's cabinet under "Family History" other researchers will have no trouble following letter sequence. Please do not make us file small odd-shaped bits of paper written front and back, side to side! Inquirer, we love you! help us to help you more efficiently.

Hints for making the form above:

- 1. You could type your letter, using this form as a model.
- 2. You could spirit duplicate, or mimeo a similar form to fit your own needs. You might have two families on the same page, using same format twice.
- 3. Below the double line you could write "Data I need from your County (or rea) area)" Be specific as to whether you want birth, death, or marriage certificates from County Clerks. In the case of marriage certificates, ask if there are other papers indicating family relationships.
- 4. If you do not know charges, ask and send a stamped addressed long envelope for return. I know you think these are your public servants but let's remember they are very busy trying to keep up with current business, and genealogical requests are added burdens they are increasing rapidly.
- 5. If you know charges, send check for amount. County Clerks in Illinois now charge search fees, and keep them if the record is not found.
- 6. Our Circuit Court Clerk does not charge for a search of the index of the Closed Probate Files, but does have a charge for xeroxing materials. There is no standard, and varies from county to county. If you deem it best, send a long stamped envelope for reply. Court business is overloaded in this area.

We need genealogical inquiries which will improve the public relations area of our family history research. The trouble lies in that everybody is overworked in related fields. So we must be patient, kind and considerate.

The Courthouses are too full of offices and old records, and there is no extra space for genealogical seekers to work without imposing on the office help, in a lot of places. And yet, we must try to keep them from destroying the old records to make more room. How valuable are the services of our many genalogists who are pulling out indexes of all kinds, and publishing them to make them available at other places than the courthouses!

The 1824 Poor Book for Ottercreek, then in Greene County, Illinois, was copied and placed in the Illinois State Historical Society by some person out of the past, probably Lucy Ball, who also copied all of the early Greene County marriages that are on file in the library. Otter Creek township is now in the County of Jersey.

Your Editor is hereby reproducing parts of this Poor Book, in order to show the legal processes of placing poor or orphan children in foster homes, or selling them to some individual in the early 1800's, and the supposed legal responsibilities of the person to whom they were bound. Secondly, of course, these individuals so bound may be an ancestor to some of our members, and they would like to have this record of their whereabouts. Otherwise, dear friends, read this historical document and be very thankful that you did not come into this world as a poor boy or poor girl to be sold in bondage until you were twenty-one years of age. (Poor spelling and punctuation lacks are those of the original writer of the document, not mine! F.H.)

Elizabeth Childress was thus bound to Josiah T. Askey 24 September 1824.

Other children bound were Saryan Stout, Nancy Stout and John Stout. They were advertised and sold on the 19th day of February 1825

"order proceeded to advertise and sell the three aforesaid children as followes on the 19 day of February 1825 - we set them up at the lowest bider and Mary Carroll being the lowest bider doth agree to Keep them from the present date until the first monday in May next for the sum of 97 Dollars and fifty cents in State paper.

Because of the duplicity of legal language, the rest of the Poor Book will not be quoted here; however, the names of the children and to whom they were sent will be included briefly in case any reader of this item was related to them. There was no other genealogical materials in the remainder of the typed manuscript.

- 1. William CHILDRESS, aged 10 years 1 month 11 days as of 5 Feb. 1825, was bound over to David Gilbert.
- 2 John ROACH as of 20 April 1825 was bound to Martin Feahen.
- 3. Of the children of David Stout, deceased, his widdow Polly kept the youngest named John.
- 4. Sarah Ann Stout aged 7 years 8 months was bound to William Gilham.
- 5. Nancy Stout was bound to John McDow.
- 6. Leroy BROCK 8 years 8 months 20 days as of May 2, 1826, was bound to Josiah Cummings of Madison Co.
- 7. Squire BROCK, aged 11 years 7 months as of 20 May 1826, was bound to Ezekiel Gillham.
- 8. The overseers of the poor removed William Hanson from David Waddles, but the article did not say where he was sent. The rest of the poor book was not copied, evidently, as it is not in the library.

MILK PAINT FOR INDOOR WORK

From "Lee's Priceless Recipes" 1898

The quantity for 100 square feet:

One quart skimmed milk, 3 ounces of lime, 3 ounces of linseed or poppy oil,

1½ pounds of Spanish white or whiting; put the lime into a clean bucket, add
sufficient of the milk to slake the lime, add the oil a few drops at a time,
stirring the mixture with a flat stick till the oil is incorporated in the
mass; then add the remainder of the milk, and afterward the Spanish white or
whiting finely powdered and sifted gently over the mixture by degrees.
Curded milk will do for the purpose, but it must not be sour. One coat of
this will do for ceilings and staircases in general; 2 coats or more for new
wood. Where color is required you may used powdered umber, ochres, chromes,
greens, blues, pinks, etc. ground in milk. For particular work strain the
color through a hair sieve. [Ed thought you'd like to know!]

This incorporated cemetery is one of the finest in Morgan County, enjoying

a beautiful location and an active maintenance program financed by an endowment fund. Some of the families buried here are closely associated with the families buried in Sheppard Cemetery north of Athensville, Greene County, and in Whitlock cemetery near Nortonville. Because of the popular demand for our 1872 Atlas and 1994 Plat Map combination reprint, we have our second printing on hand presently. This lovely book, complete with indexes, and its 167 biographies, has furnished many families with history that has enabled them to build ancestral charts beyond normal expectatations, and furnishes a guide for locating the early settlers and cemeteries in this area.

Having the second Plat Map in the book, with its "Historical Directory" on pages 84, 86 & 87 gives the name, business, township, postoffice, and nativity of many people, including the year when they came to Morgan County. May we remind you that this Directory was not included in the index of that second book.

Perhaps you thought some pages were missing in the Atlas, but this occurred because some blank pages in the original were numbered, and not included in the reprint. Didn't you enjoy this book?

Leo Winters of Woodson (IL) told me that he helped widen the road east of Woodson. When they came to an old cemetery east of the garden east of the house about 1/4 mile east of Woodson, and on the south side of the road, they [Morgan County Highway Department] bulldozed and graded out several stones along the north end of a cemetery. Alpha Megginson living in Woodson at the time took 2 or 3 stones home to use for walks. Leo said the rest were taken to the west and put in the fill at the branch.

The above location was also confirmed by Howard Megginson. He said it was old, but didn't know any of the names. Leo said there were Harneys, and probably Henrys and Sheltons, as there were family ties. The legal description would be NW 1/4 NE 1/4 SE 1/4 Sec 28 T14N R10W 3rd Principal Meridian.

Leslie Rawlings told me there was a cemetery near the well southwest across the branch from Dorothy Taylor's house. There was a barn and hoghouse there. Mr. Rawlings could remember no names. I remember the barn and when lightning burned it.

Leo Winters said "No, the cemetery was south of the new barn on the east side of the branch on a little knoll between two small swags." The only name he could remember was Harney. Margaret Harney bought the land from the government 12 November 1830.

Amanda Harney died 1854. I do not remember the rest of the inscription, but she was 22-23 when she died. This stone stood just east of the road fence at the top of the rise in the road south of where Monkey Ridge (Pleasant Hill) school used to be. In the late 1960's the road fence was removed, the stone was knocked around by farm machinery, broken, and finally disappeared. I have heard that at one time there were several stones, 8 or 10, still standing in the 1930's. Rumor has the cemetery on both sides of the road a long time ago. There is a land transaction 28 January 1903 from James Baxter to William Hembrough which reads in part, "Se 1/4 of NW 1/4 Sec. 12 T13N R10W 3PM commencing 124 ft. south of NW corner, East 104 ft, West 10r feet, N 104 feet." The South 104 feet was omitted here, but included in next transaction. Book 99 page 63 Morgan County Deeds.

The Henry Cemetery west of the draw west of the center of section 1 T13N R10W 3Pm at one time was south of the property line fence. There was a fence around the cemetery, the gate on the south. The road came from the south. The information above was told to me by Leo Winters who was raised about 3/4 mile west. Unless one has been built recently, there is no fence, except the property line fence, which is on the south side of what remains of the cemetery. A bulldozer working south of the present property line fence hit the base of a tombstone. Evidence supports the theory that the line fence has been moved over the years, maybe several times, and is not in the proper location now. [It is believed that some of these burials were removed to Norton-ville.]

These names are alphabetized chronologically, as they appear on the hand-written record.

It was hard to distinguish I from J. Please consider this in studying middle initials, especially.

As to whether the names are all spelled correctly, or not, is a good question. Quite definitely these frontiersmen and women spelled their names by sound.

The BOOK A index was made many years after the marriage records were recorded. The original is in small handwriting, and nearly 150 years old. It is in a remarkable state of preservation, and has recently had its pages plasticized.

I had to do a fast job of typing these pages, with little chance for proof-reading. You can have your choice -- long lists of names to pore over, or none at all, if I have to take time to proof-read every word. My percentage of accuracy is greater than the errors, fortunately. Please take this into consideration.

While I believe that proof-reading is essential to excellent work, I am also of the opinion that the trait of perfection has kept much family history, that has been carefully garnered, from ever being published, or put into readable form. The researcher spent all of his or her time trying to be accurate, and never got the body of works published, and after life was ceased, no one else took up the pen and paste to complete the work, and it was pushed aside, or destroyed. Alas, alack! How much better to have been swift, with errors, than perfect and unpublished.

Friends, let me urge you - get that family history published NOW, and let the errors fall where they may, or the unfinished vital statistics for others to seek out. TIME waits for no man's history to be written, before it snaps him up to the eternal sleep. While you are "up there", will your good works "be down here?" Or will your garnerings, lovingly pushed under your bed, be subject to be burned as "that old Junk of dad's and mom's"? ?????
