

Dear Friends,

Normally Focus begins with a pastoral letter from our minister, Rev Rachel Moss, but unfortunately Rachel is currently unwell. We send her our love and best wishes for a speedy recovery.

As editor, I have been pondering how to fill this thought provoking space. An article I read recently about friendships came to mind. A survey has apparently revealed that by the time we reach our seventies, the average person has only four friends. Experience shows that friendships may come and go during the journey of life, through parenting, our work and interests, but in retirement our number of friends may decline.

Real friendship is something very precious, especially in these days of social media when hundreds of Facebook 'Friends' appear to abound. The question is how do we define true friendship?

On 7th June I will be celebrating the Diamond Wedding Anniversary of my friend Pat and her husband Frank. Pat is my oldest friend. We first met when I was 17 and had just left school. Pat was teaching at the Burton School of Art and Craft in Waterloo Street and my first job was working in the Art School office. This friendship of 60 years has stood the test of time, having shared the many twists and turns of life.

Some of you may be fortunate to still have friends from school days who you remain in contact with. Sometimes our friends move away and popping in for a chat or meeting up is not so easy. I have two close friends who no longer live locally but we regularly indulge in lengthy conversations on the phone sharing our news and worries.

More recently formed friendships are significant too. In 2011, having been retired for three years, life was looking good with the arrival of our first grandson William in February and news of another grandchild due in October. In August, however, I was diagnosed with breast cancer and underwent a mastectomy in September, followed by several months of treatment.

At this time I had not been attending church on a regular basis, but had been kept in touch with what was happening at St Thomas's by the regular receipt of the Focus magazine, which popped through my letterbox via Sheila Fern, someone I had known since my Sunday School days at Victoria Street Methodist Church. Sheila wrote to me post-surgery, sending best wishes and telling me that she would be praying for me and my recovery. She continued to do so throughout my treatment and the further reconstruction surgery I underwent in 2013. For this operation I had to go to the Queen Elizabeth Hospital in Birmingham and I was particularly anxious about it. Throughout this period, I was conscious of some inner strength which enabled me to remain strangely calm and positive about my situation. This was quite remarkable given I had always been somewhat anxious and squeamish about illness and definitely about hospitals!

Following my initial surgery and period of recovery, in early 2012 I decided to go along to the local Breast Care Support Group, meeting monthly at the Breast Care Unit at Queens Hospital, Burton. The group was for anyone who had been diagnosed with breast cancer and who were at various stages in their treatment. Importantly, over a cup of tea it was an opportunity to chat and share experiences and concerns. Specialist nurses were always on hand to offer help and support. By 2014 I found myself on the committee of the group, by now meeting at Burton Library. From that time four of us remain on the committee, not only survivors of breast cancer but also most definitely firm friends.

Throughout this period of recovery, I had begun to attend church more frequently, sitting on the back row alongside Sheila. Although sadly Sheila passed away in December 2014, I firmly believe her prayers and support helped me through this difficult time and ultimately helped me renew and strengthen my faith and return to regular worship.

Nothing's more important than true friendship. As we grow older, we may only have a small number, but nothing gives comfort like a true friend.

Pentecost, also called Whit Sunday, Whitsunday or Whitsun, is a Christian celebration which takes place on the 50th day after Easter Day. Since its date depends on the date of Easter, Pentecost is a "moveable feast". It commemorates the descent of the Holy Spirit upon the Apostles of Jesus while they were in Jerusalem celebrating the Jewish festival of Shavuot which is called the "Festival of Weeks" as described in the Acts of the Apostles (Acts 2:1–31).

In Judaism, Shavuot is a harvest festival that is celebrated seven weeks and one day after the first day of Passover in Deuteronomy 16:9. The Festival of Weeks is also known as the Feast of Harvest in Exodus 23:16 and the Day of First Fruits in Numbers 28:26. In Exodus 34:22, it is called the "first fruits of the wheat harvest. The events of Acts Chapter 2 are set against the backdrop of the celebration of Pentecost in Jerusalem. The author begins by noting that the disciples of Jesus "were all together in one place" on the "day of Pentecost". There is a "mighty rushing wind" (wind is a common symbol for the Holy Spirit) and "tongues as of fire" appear. The gathered disciples were "filled with the Holy Spirit, and began to speak in other tongues as the Spirit gave them utterance"

The typical image of Pentecost in the West is that of the disciples with flames resting on the crowns of their heads.



Occasionally, parting clouds suggesting the action of the "mighty wind";

rays of light and the Dove are also depicted. We even have part of the symbolism in the Methodist Church symbol.



Many Christian denominations provide a special liturgy for this holy celebration.

From the early days of Western Christianity, Pentecost became one of the days set aside to celebrate Baptism. It is thought that the term Whit Sunday derives from the custom of the newly baptized wearing white clothing, and from the white vestments worn by the clergy in English liturgical uses.

Monday after Pentecost is a legal holiday in many European, African and Caribbean countries.



Trinity Sunday is the first Sunday after Pentecost in the

Western Christian calendar, and Trinity Sunday celebrates the Christian doctrine of the Trinity, the three Persons of God: The Father, The Son, and The Holy Spirit.



Trinity Sunday is celebrated in all the Western churches: Latin Catholic, Anglican, Lutheran, Presbyterian, United Church of Christ, and Methodist.

In the early Church, no special Office or day was assigned for the Holy Trinity. However, Pope John XXII (1316–1334) ordered the feast for the entire Church on the first Sunday after Pentecost and since it was after the first great Pentecost that the doctrine of the Trinity was proclaimed to the world, the feast becomingly follows that of Pentecost.

In traditional Methodist usage, The Book of Worship for Church and Home (1965) provides the following Collects for Trinity Sunday:

"Almighty and everlasting God, who hast given unto us thy servants grace, by the confession of a true faith, to acknowledge the glory of the eternal Trinity, and in the power of the divine majesty to worship the unity: We beseech thee to keep us steadfast in this faith and evermore defend us from all adversities who livest and reignest, one God, world without end. Amen."

"Almighty and everlasting God, who hast revealed thyself as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, and dost ever live and reign in the perfect unity of love: Grant that we may always hold firmly and joyfully to this faith, and, living in praise of thy divine majesty, may finally be one in thee; who art three persons in one God, world without end. Amen."

Trinity Sunday is the Sunday following Pentecost, and eight weeks after Easter Sunday. The earliest possible date is 17th May (as in 1818 and 2285). The latest possible date is 20th June (as in 1943 and 2038). This year it is towards the latter end of these dates on June 15th.

- **5.** Using a small palette knife or the back of a spoon, spread a thin layer of the whipped cream on the bottom of the lined pan. Cover as much of the cream as possible with a layer of wafers, filling any gaps with broken wafers.
- **6.** Continue layering whipped cream and wafers until you run out or reach the top of the tin, ending with a layer of wafers. Gently cover the surface with cling film and refrigerate (or freeze) for at least 6 to 8 hours, or preferably overnight.
- **7.** Remove the cake from the refrigerator prior to serving and peel off the cling film. Place a serving plate over the tin and invert the cake onto the plate. Carefully remove the tin and cling film lining.
- **8.** Lightly dust with cocoa powder, if using. Cut the cake into slices with a long-serrated knife and serve. The cake will keep, lightly wrapped with cling film, in the refrigerator for up to 3 days.

180g Penne Pasta
1 x banana shallot

2 handfuls of frozen petit pois
Zest and juice of half a lemon

- 1. Place salmon fillets on a sheet of greased foil and season with salt and pepper. Cook in oven 180° for 10 minutes

RECIPE CORNER

Chocolate-Cranberry Freezer Cake

Cranberry and chocolate make a wonderful combination. Here, a jammy, vanilla-scented cranberry compote is folded into stiffly whipped cream and layered with crispy chocolate wafer biscuits, an ideal summer dessert.

Preparation time: 15 minutes. Cooking time: 15 minutes. Serves: 8 (or 10 if giving what I call mean portions, but then I'm greedy).

Ingredients:

250grm Cranberries, (fresh or frozen)
100grm Granulated Sugar
125ml Water
1 tbsp plus 1 tsp Vanilla Extract
500ml Double Cream
60grm Icing Sugar
40 2-inch crispy Chocolate Wafer Biscuits.
Cocoa Powder, for dusting (optional)

Instructions:

- **1.** Cook the cranberries, granulated sugar, and water in a medium saucepan over medium-high heat until the mixture boils. Reduce the heat to medium-low and simmer until most of the cranberries have burst and the liquid has reduced, about 10 minutes.
- **2.** Off the heat, add 1 tablespoon of the vanilla extract and stir to combine. Let cool to room temperature before using. To speed up the cooling, transfer the compote to a small bowl and refrigerate.
- **3.** Line a 9-by-3-inch loaf tin with cling film so that it hangs slightly over the sides of the pan.
- **4.** Using a handheld or stand mixer fitted with the whisk attachment, beat the cream, icing sugar, and the remaining 1 teaspoon of vanilla extract on medium-high speed until stiff peaks form. With a rubber spatula, gently fold the cooled compote into the cream.

Tilley also has plans for a future one, possibly in 2026, which again will be fun, and community led and will feature the 'Burton Bollards' – watch this space or should I say keep your eye on the bollards in Burton!

WEDNESDAY GROUP Burton Trails by Tilley Bancroft

It was a lovely sunny Springtime afternoon when we met on Wednesday 9th April. I opened the meeting with notices about our future events and advertised the VE Day Tea at church on Saturday 3rd May. Our opening poem was entitled 'Daffodils' which reflected the gifts of Spring, counting our blessings and thanking God for the beauty of the Spring.

I then introduced Tilley Bancroft who had come to talk to us about the Burton Trails. Her enthusiasm shone through from the very beginning of her talk. It was obvious that Tilley wanted to make the most of Burton's rich heritage and bring together businesses, schools, community groups and artists. Her initial idea in 2018 was having a swan sculpture trail and planning began. Sadly, the project was thwarted by the pandemic and it was uncertain whether the event could take place. With determination and a lot of support the team carried on getting ready to put their plan into action. In the summer of 2020 Burton had the 'Swans Art Trail'. We all remembered the 25 swan sculptures that were placed around the town. I know that I enjoyed taking my grandchildren around the trail and taking photographs of them by each swan. They enjoyed following the trail and the joy of ticking off each swan on the map as we found them. Tilley passed round a beautiful, illustrated book she had produced entitled 'Burton Swans Art Trail 2020'. All the swans were remarkable, and she drew our attention to certain ones. The 'Graffiti Me' one, which they thought may be a risk because of what people might write, contained a thought-provoking poem:

No one owns the water
No one owns the land
No one owns the ocean
No one owns the sand
These are given by our mother
The planet provides for free
Only by the hands of the greedy
Does earth require a fee

The children enjoyed the swan with Lego on and made their own designs on it. I think this involved providing a lot of Lego! The children also enjoyed looking at themselves in the 'Mirror Swan'. Outside Sainsbury's was the 'Carousel Swan' designed by Heather Horsley. Heather is a talented Burton artist and is a direct descendant of Albert and Sid Howell, the talented father and son artists, who worked for Orton and Spooner. Wednesday Group members will remember Elaine Pritchard's interesting talk about the history of Orton and Spooner in Burton and the making of the carousel horses. Tilley also designed her own swan entitled "Duet" which was sponsored by The Brewhouse Arts Centre. She and her team certainly brought happiness to the town. After being kept inside during lockdown families could get out and about following the trail in the fresh air. The project also raised money for the Burton and District YMCA.

Two years later in 2022, Tilley and her team had worked incredibly hard again to bring the community together to produce a trail of 'Carousel Horses' which ran for 10 weeks. The Carousel Horses were chosen to pay tribute to the Burton firm Orton and Spooner and their designing of Carousel Horses. In autumn 2022 the horses were auctioned to raise money for Burton and District MIND, the mental health charity.

In summer 2024 another trail appeared in Burton. This time the theme was "Barrels", showcasing artwork and heritage. This trail was Burton's first fully 3D sculpture trail featuring 14 giant barrels painted by local artists. It celebrated the importance of brewing in the town. The trail welcomed over 30,000 visitors and was a real success, adding more than £600,000 to the local economy through additional spending in cafes, restaurants and shops. Each of the 14-barrel sculptures were hand painted by artists with designs including local people, landmarks, hops, bees, biscuits and even outer space! These sculptures too were auctioned off at the end of the event.

Tilley is certainly an inspirational lady who has created, along with her supporters, three amazing Burton Trails.
