Loving God, we bring you our thanks this day for everything that you have done for us. We thank you for those who have made a difference to our lives and encouraged us on our journey of faith. Help us to be like them in sharing our faith and making a difference to the lives of others. We ask these and all our prayers in the name of Jesus. Amen.

**A Reading from the New Testament Hebrews 12:1-2**

Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight and the sin that clings so closely, and let us run with perseverance the race that is set before us,<sup>2</sup>looking to Jesus the pioneer and perfecter of our faith, who for the sake of the joy that was set before him endured the cross, disregarding its shame, and has taken his seat at the right hand of the throne of God.

### **Today's Gospel Reading Luke 20:27-38**

27 Some Sadducees, those who say there is no resurrection, came to him<sup>28</sup>and asked him a question, 'Teacher, Moses wrote for us that if a man's brother dies, leaving a wife but no children, the man shall marry the widow and raise up children for his brother. <sup>29</sup>Now there were seven brothers; the first married, and died childless; <sup>30</sup>then the second <sup>31</sup>and the third married her, and so in the same way all seven died childless.<sup>32</sup>Finally the woman also died. <sup>33</sup>In the resurrection, therefore, whose wife will the woman be? For the seven had married her.'

34 Jesus said to them, 'Those who belong to this age marry and are given in marriage; <sup>35</sup>but those who are considered worthy of a place in that age and in the resurrection from the dead neither marry nor are given in marriage. <sup>36</sup>Indeed they cannot die any more, because they are like angels and are children of God, being children of the resurrection. <sup>37</sup>And the fact that the dead are raised Moses himself showed, in the story about the bush, where he speaks of the Lord as the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob. <sup>38</sup>Now he is God not of the dead, but of the living; for to him all of them are alive.'

### **Time to Reflect**

Our gospel reading today is not an easy one to read. It is one in which the Sadducees challenge Jesus theologically about what happens after death. In this season of remembrance as we reflect and remember all those who have gone before us it can be a challenging reading for us. The Sadducees don't believe in resurrection the passage tells us so they are seeking to trip Jesus up theologically. They think that their question will be one which he will not be able to answer but they are wrong. Jesus answers their question in two parts. First he deals with their

question surrounding marriage and the writings of Moses then he answers the question which they are hoping will trip him up which is about resurrection.

Jesus states that things will be different after death. He doesn't say that partners will not know or love each other after death but that the idea of marriage that we have on earth will not be the same in heaven. From this in this period of remembrance we can draw some comfort knowing that we will indeed be reunited with those we love in heaven even if the relationships will be different to the concepts that we understand and know here on earth.

As we remember, reflect, and give thanks during this season of remembrance for all those who have gone before us we are reminded that we will see them again one day. Many of them have had an influence and an impact on our Christian journey of faith. Those people whom you remember who inspired and influenced you in your journey of faith like those before me who influenced my faith are at God's side praising him and watching over us just as they did whilst they were still here. Who do you remember? Who showed you a little of what God is like? Who can you share a little of what God is like with? Let us as the writer of Hebrews puts it 'run the race set before us' knowing that those we love and those who have gone before us are cheering us on as we go.

During this time may we take the opportunity to give thanks not just for those who have died but those who are still with us who have and continue to have an impact on our faith journey. It is important too however to consider how we ourselves can have an impact and an influence on the faith journeys of others. Take the opportunity not just to give thanks but to think and reflect on the difference you can make for someone else as we journey together along the journey of faith.

### **A time of prayer**

Lord God, we bring before you today our concerns for the world in which we live, your world which you created and put into our care. We pray for those areas of our world where there is suffering, where there is war and violence, for those places struggling to cope due to natural or manmade disasters. Be with those working to bring relief to those who need it most. Give them the strength and courage to carry on even when they feel they can't. Help us to support others in any way that we can.

We pray for the church. In this season of remembrance remind us of those who have gone before us who have run the race set before us, who have passed to us the torch of faith that we may carry on the work that they were a part of. Remind us that they are cheering us on as we continue that race, as we continue to share our faith with others just as they did. Strengthen and support us we pray as we continue that race.

We pray for those who need our prayers at this time. We lift before you those who are struggling, those going through challenging or difficult times at the moment, those who are sick and those who care for them. Be with them all and may they know your love, care and your presence with them at this time. Give them the strength and encouragement that they need at this time.

In this season of remembrance Lord, we bring before you those who have died. We give you thanks for their lives, for the part that they may have played in our Christian journey. We know that your loving arms are wide waiting to welcome them home for their work is complete. Comfort those who mourn that they might be able to face the days ahead without those whom they have lost.

Finally Lord we pray for ourselves. We ask that you will equip and strengthen us for the race which we are a part of. Help us to continue carrying the torch of faith that others might come to know of you and your love for them. Help us to make a difference to the lives of others. May we know your presence with us now and always. We ask these and all our prayers in the name of Jesus. Amen.
