Fundamental 1: Man Was Created for Dominion

Genesis 1:26 – *“And God said, Let us make man in our image, after our likeness: and let them have dominion...”*

Psalms 8:6 – *“Thou madest him to have dominion over the works of thy hands; thou hast put all things under his feet.”*

Genesis 1:28 – *“And God blessed them, and God said unto them, Be fruitful, and multiply... and have dominion...”*

From the very beginning, God’s original intent was clear: man was created for dominion. Dominion is not man’s idea—it is God’s assignment. The very first words spoken over mankind were words of blessing and rulership: *“Be fruitful, multiply, replenish the earth, subdue it, and have dominion.”* That wasn’t a suggestion; it was a mandate.

Notice that God gave man authority before He gave him work. Why? Because you cannot fulfill your assignment without understanding your dominion. Adam was placed in the garden, not as a servant under bondage, but as a king under God’s authority. He was God’s representative—a visible image of an invisible God—commissioned to extend Heaven’s rule into the earth.

Psalms 115:16 says, *“The heaven, even the heavens, are the LORD’s: but the earth hath he given to the children of men.”* The earth is man’s domain under God’s ownership. That means dominion is not arrogance—it’s stewardship. It is not ruling independently of God, but ruling under God’s authority and by His Word.

The tragedy is that too many believers today live as victims instead of rulers. They see themselves at the mercy of circumstances, instead of in charge over circumstances. But when you understand that you were created in God’s image—created to think His thoughts, speak His words, and act in His authority—you stop bowing to fear, sickness, poverty, and sin. Dominion is not about oppressing others; it is about enforcing the victory of God’s Kingdom in your life and in the earth.

When you walk in dominion, you are walking in the original blessing—one that Adam lost but Christ restored. Jesus didn’t just come to forgive your sins; He came to put you back in the position of rulership. Dominion is your birthright. You were created to live above, not beneath; to reign, not to be ruled.

Confession:

“I am made in God’s image. Dominion is my birthright. I reign in life through Christ.”

“You were never created to be a victim—you were created to reign.”

Five questions for discussion based on **Fundamental 1: Man Was Created for Dominion:**

1. How does understanding that dominion is **God's assignment, not man's idea** change the way we view authority and responsibility in our daily lives?
2. In what ways can we practice **dominion as stewardship** rather than arrogance or independence from God?
3. Why do you think God gave man **authority before work**, and how does that principle apply to the challenges we face today?
4. Many believers live as "victims instead of rulers." What are some practical steps we can take to shift from a **victim mindset to a dominion mindset** in Christ?
5. How does Jesus' restoration of dominion through His victory affect the way we approach **fear, sickness, poverty, or sin** in our personal lives?

Fundamental 2: The Fall Stole Dominion, but Christ Restored It

Romans 5:17 – “...*they which receive abundance of grace and of the gift of righteousness shall reign in life by one, Jesus Christ.*”

1 Corinthians 15:22 – “*For as in Adam all die, even so in Christ shall all be made alive.*”

Luke 10:19 – “*Behold, I give unto you power to tread on serpents and scorpions, and over all the power of the enemy...*”

When Adam disobeyed God in the Garden of Eden, something catastrophic happened—he didn’t just sin, he surrendered his dominion. The authority that God had placed in his hands was handed over to Satan. That’s why 2 Corinthians 4:4 calls Satan “*the god of this world.*” Through Adam’s failure, sin, sickness, poverty, fear, and death entered the world. Man, who was designed to reign, now lived as a slave.

But thank God, the story doesn’t end there! Jesus came as the second Adam—not just to forgive sins but to restore what was lost. Where Adam bowed to Satan, Jesus crushed him. On the cross, Jesus carried the curse, bore our sin, and took back authority. Colossians 2:15 declares: “*And having spoiled principalities and powers, he made a shew of them openly, triumphing over them in it.*” Satan was publicly stripped of his authority.

When Jesus rose from the dead, He declared in Matthew 28:18, “*All power is given unto me in heaven and in earth.*” He didn’t keep that power for Himself—He transferred it to His Church. That’s why He could say in Luke 10:19, “*Behold, I give unto you power...*” Authority was lost in Adam, but it has been fully restored in Christ.

This means that as a believer, you are not under Satan’s feet—he is under yours! You are not a victim of his attacks—you are more than a conqueror through Christ. The same Spirit that raised Jesus from the dead now lives in you, empowering you to walk in victory. Dominion lost has become dominion restored, and now you are called to reign in life.

It’s time to stop thinking like a defeated Adam and start reigning like the victorious Christ. You are no longer under the curse—you are living under the blessing! You are no longer ruled by Satan—you rule over him in the name of Jesus.

Confession:

“Through the abundance of grace and the gift of righteousness, I reign in life by Christ Jesus.”

“What Adam lost, Christ restored—and more!”

Five questions for discussion based on **Fundamental 2: The Fall Stole Dominion, but Christ Restored It:**

1. What does it mean that Adam didn't just sin but **surrendered his dominion**—and how does that help us understand the seriousness of disobedience?
2. How does the contrast between **Adam's failure** and **Christ's victory** shape our view of redemption and the cross?
3. Colossians 2:15 describes Jesus triumphing openly over Satan. How can believers today **live out that victory** in practical, everyday situations?
4. If Jesus has restored dominion to His Church, why do many Christians still struggle with a **defeated mindset**? What keeps us from walking in restored authority?
5. How does the truth that “the same Spirit that raised Jesus from the dead now lives in you” challenge the way we respond to **fear, temptation, or spiritual opposition**?

Fundamental 3: Righteousness Is the Foundation of Dominion

2 Corinthians 5:21 – “...that we might be made the righteousness of God in him.”

Romans 5:1 – “Therefore being justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ.”

Proverbs 28:1 – “The wicked flee when no man pursueth: but the righteous are bold as a lion.”

The devil's number-one weapon against believers is guilt and condemnation. He knows that if he can keep you sin-conscious, you will never be dominion-conscious. Guilt makes you weak. Condemnation makes you retreat. But righteousness makes you bold.

Here's the good news: righteousness is not something you earn—it's something you receive. The moment you were born again, you were made the righteousness of God in Christ. That means you can stand before Almighty God without fear, without shame, without a sense of inferiority. You are just as righteous in God's sight as Jesus Himself, because His righteousness has been credited to you.

Romans 5:17 says those who receive the gift of righteousness will reign in life. Righteousness is the foundation of dominion. Without it, your confidence crumbles, your prayers lose power, and your authority collapses. But when you know you are righteous, boldness rises in your spirit. You stop begging God to do something He already did, and you start enforcing your covenant rights as a son or daughter of the King.

Proverbs 28:1 says, “*The righteous are bold as a lion.*” That boldness is not arrogance—it's confidence in your covenant. It's knowing that when you speak, Heaven backs your words. It's knowing that when you resist the devil, he must flee. Righteousness gives you a new identity, a new standing, and a new authority.

This is why the enemy works overtime to remind you of your past, your failures, and your mistakes. But righteousness silences the accuser. Revelation 12:11 says, “*They overcame him by the blood of the Lamb, and by the word of their testimony.*” The blood declares you righteous, and your confession enforces it.

When you live in the revelation of righteousness, you won't run from the devil—you'll make the devil run from you.

Confession:

“I am the righteousness of God in Christ Jesus. I stand boldly in my dominion.”

“Righteousness makes you bold; guilt makes you weak.”

Five questions for discussion based on **Fundamental 3: Righteousness Is the Foundation of Dominion**:

1. Why do you think guilt and condemnation are such powerful tools of the enemy in keeping believers from walking in dominion?
2. How does understanding that righteousness is a **gift to be received, not earned** change the way we approach God in prayer and worship?
3. Proverbs 28:1 says, “The righteous are bold as a lion.” What does **righteous boldness** look like in real life, and how is it different from arrogance?
4. In what ways can knowing we are righteous in Christ help us to resist the devil and live with greater authority?
5. The enemy often reminds us of past failures. What practical steps can we take to **silence condemnation** and consistently walk in the confidence of our righteousness?

Fundamental 4: The Word of God Is the Law of Dominion

Joshua 1:8 – “...then thou shalt make thy way prosperous, and then thou shalt have good success.”

Hebrews 4:12 – “For the word of God is quick, and powerful...”

Matthew 4:4 – “Man shall not live by bread alone, but by every word that proceedeth out of the mouth of God.”

The Word of God is not optional—it is the very foundation of dominion. Dominion is impossible without the Word, because God upholds all things by the Word of His power (Hebrews 1:3). Just as natural laws govern the earth, the Word of God governs the Kingdom. The Bible is your constitution, your covenant contract, and your rule of authority.

When God told Joshua to meditate day and night, it wasn't so Joshua could collect information—it was so he could walk in rulership. Notice the promise: “*Then thou shalt make thy way prosperous, and then thou shalt have good success.*” The Word in your heart and in your mouth is what produces dominion in your life. It moves you from weakness to strength, from defeat to victory.

Hebrews 4:12 tells us that the Word is alive and powerful. That means every time you speak it, you are releasing God's authority into the earth. Jesus Himself modeled this when He defeated Satan in the wilderness. Three times, the devil attacked—and three times Jesus answered, “*It is written.*” He didn't argue. He didn't debate. He enforced the law of dominion with the Word of God.

Too many believers try to fight the enemy with feelings, opinions, or willpower. But Satan doesn't bow to feelings—he bows to the Word. That's why the Word must become more real to you than the circumstances you see. When you confess the Word, you are not begging God to move—you are enforcing what He already said. The Word settles every argument, breaks every lie, and declares the will of God into your situation.

If you want to walk in dominion, you must become Word-saturated. Fill your mind with Scripture. Speak it daily. Act on it boldly. Let it govern your thoughts, words, and decisions. The Word is not only your weapon—it's your law of dominion. Without it, you cannot rule. With it, nothing can stop you.

Confession:

“I meditate on the Word day and night. God's Word governs my life and establishes my dominion.”

“Dominion begins when God's Word rules your mouth.”

Five questions for discussion based on **Fundamental 4: The Word of God Is the Law of Dominion**:

1. Why is the Word of God described as the **“law” of dominion**, and how does that compare to natural laws that govern the earth?
2. In Joshua 1:8, God connects **meditating on the Word** with prosperity and success. What does true biblical meditation look like, and how does it lead to dominion?
3. How does Jesus’ response to Satan in the wilderness (using “It is written”) model the right way to **enforce dominion through Scripture**?
4. Why do you think many believers rely on feelings or willpower instead of the Word when facing challenges, and what are the dangers of doing so?
5. What are some practical ways we can become **Word-saturated** in our daily lives so that the Word governs our thoughts, words, and decisions?

Fundamental 5: Faith and Confession Enforce Dominion

Mark 11:23 – “...*he shall have whatsoever he saith.*”

2 Corinthians 4:13 – “...*we also believe, and therefore speak.*”

Romans 10:10 – “...*with the mouth confession is made unto salvation.*”

Faith is the hand that takes what grace has already given—but it cannot remain silent. Dominion is never passive; it is enforced by words. Jesus said in Mark 11:23 that you will have *whatsoever you saith*. Not what you wish, not what you think, but what you say. Faith without confession is incomplete.

2 Corinthians 4:13 declares, “*We believe, and therefore speak.*” Believing and speaking are the two sides of the same coin. Faith in your heart and confession with your mouth activate dominion. Even salvation itself required both—Romans 10:10 says we believe with the heart, but confession with the mouth brings possession.

This is why the devil works overtime to keep believers silent. He knows that once you start speaking God’s Word with faith, he loses his grip. Dominion does not manifest by chance—it manifests by declaration. Your words are spiritual containers; they carry either life or death, blessing or cursing. When you fill your mouth with the Word of God, you release Heaven’s authority into earth’s circumstances.

Think about Jesus in Mark 4. He didn’t silently wish the storm away—He spoke: “*Peace, be still.*” And creation obeyed. That same dominion is in you today. Your words are not empty—they are backed by Heaven. Every time you declare the Word, angels move, demons flee, and situations shift.

Confession turns dominion from a doctrine into a demonstration. The Word in your heart establishes faith, but the Word in your mouth enforces authority. Keep speaking God’s promises until they drown out doubt, fear, and symptoms. Keep declaring victory until the mountain moves. Don’t agree with the problem—agree with the Word.

Confession:

“I speak God’s Word with authority. My faith-filled words establish dominion in every area of life.”

“Dominion is voice-activated.”

Five questions for discussion based on **Fundamental 5: Faith and Confession Enforce Dominion**:

1. Why is confession necessary for faith to be complete, and how does this principle show up in both salvation and daily Christian living?
2. Mark 11:23 emphasizes that we have what we **say**, not just what we think or wish. How does this challenge the way we use our words in everyday life?
3. Why do you think the enemy works so hard to keep believers **silent**, and what are some ways we can overcome that silence with bold confession?
4. How does Jesus' example of speaking to the storm in Mark 4 illustrate the connection between **faith, words, and dominion**?
5. What are some practical steps we can take to train ourselves to consistently **speak God's Word instead of agreeing with problems**

Fundamental 6: The Spirit of God Empowers Dominion

Acts 1:8 – *“But ye shall receive power, after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you...”*

Romans 8:11 – *“...the Spirit of him that raised up Jesus from the dead dwell in you...”*

Micah 3:8 – *“But truly I am full of power by the spirit of the LORD...”*

Jesus told His disciples not to move until they received the Holy Spirit. Why? Because dominion cannot be lived in the strength of the flesh—it requires the power of the Spirit. Natural wisdom, talent, or ability can only take you so far. Dominion is not mental—it is spiritual. Dominion is not theory—it is power, demonstration, and impact.

The word *power* in Acts 1:8 is the Greek word *dunamis*—explosive, miracle-working power. It’s the same power that created the universe, the same power that split the Red Sea, the same power that raised Jesus from the dead. And now, that very same Spirit dwells in you (Romans 8:11). He doesn’t just visit—you are His temple. He doesn’t just inspire—you are filled, empowered, and anointed by Him.

Micah 3:8 declared, *“I am full of power by the spirit of the LORD.”* That wasn’t just for prophets—it’s for every believer in Christ. The Spirit equips you to heal the sick, cast out devils, preach with boldness, and demonstrate the Kingdom wherever you go. The Spirit takes dominion from being head knowledge to being a living, breathing reality.

Without the Spirit, dominion is reduced to religious talk. With the Spirit, dominion becomes a force that transforms lives, families, cities, and nations. This is why the devil fears Spirit-filled believers—because they carry miracle-working authority that cannot be stopped. When you pray in tongues, you charge your spiritual batteries. When you yield to the Spirit, you release rivers of living water. And when you walk in the Spirit, you enforce dominion with power that hell cannot resist.

The same Spirit that raised Jesus from the dead is living inside you right now. He quickens your body, strengthens your spirit, sharpens your mind, and energizes your authority. You don’t have to beg for power—you already have it. Now it’s time to walk in it.

Confession:

“I am filled with the Holy Spirit. I demonstrate dominion with power and authority.”

“The Spirit in you is greater than the opposition around you.”

Five questions for discussion based on **Fundamental 6: The Spirit of God Empowers Dominion**:

1. Why did Jesus command His disciples to **wait for the Holy Spirit** before stepping out in ministry, and what does that teach us about the source of true dominion?
2. Acts 1:8 speaks of *dunamis*—miracle-working power. How does knowing this same power dwells in you change the way you view your daily challenges and opportunities?
3. What is the difference between trying to walk in dominion through **natural ability** versus walking in the power of the Spirit?
4. How can we practically stay “charged” and sensitive to the Holy Spirit so that dominion is not just theory, but **demonstration and impact**?
5. Micah 3:8 declared, “I am full of power by the Spirit of the Lord.” What would it look like for us to **boldly confess and live** in that reality today?

Fundamental 7: Kingdom Dominion Is for the Nations

Matthew 28:18–19 – *“All power is given unto me... Go ye therefore, and teach all nations...”*

Habakkuk 2:14 – *“For the earth shall be filled with the knowledge of the glory of the LORD...”*

Revelation 5:10 – *“And hast made us... kings and priests: and we shall reign on the earth.”*

Dominion was never meant to be limited to your personal life. God’s plan was—and still is—global. From the beginning, His command to Adam was not just to survive, but to *“be fruitful, multiply, replenish the earth, and subdue it.”* (Genesis 1:28). Jesus reaffirmed this mandate in Matthew 28 when He said, *“Go ye therefore, and teach all nations.”*

This is why dominion is not just about your healing, your finances, or your family—it’s about the Kingdom of God influencing every sphere of life. The Church is not a hiding place from the world; it is the governing body sent to disciple nations. Government, education, business, arts, media, and family are all arenas where the Kingdom is meant to shine. Dominion life means bringing Heaven’s culture into earth’s systems until nations align with the will of God.

Habakkuk 2:14 gives us the vision: *“The earth shall be filled with the knowledge of the glory of the Lord, as the waters cover the sea.”* That’s global dominion. That’s the endgame of God’s plan. And how does it happen? Through Spirit-filled, Word-grounded believers who know who they are in Christ and refuse to live beneath their covenant rights.

Revelation 5:10 says we have been made kings and priests—and not just for eternity, but to *“reign on the earth.”* Dominion is not something you wait for in heaven; it’s something you walk in now. Every time you declare God’s Word in your home, pray over your city, lead someone to Christ, or stand for righteousness in your workplace, you are enforcing Kingdom dominion.

The enemy would love to reduce the Church to a powerless religious club. But the truth is, the Church is God’s embassy on the earth. Every believer is an ambassador of Heaven, sent with authority to represent the King. Dominion is not just about you being free—it’s about you setting others free, transforming nations, and filling the earth with His glory.

Confession:

“I am sent to disciple nations. I walk in Kingdom authority to bring God’s will on earth as it is in heaven.”

“Dominion is not just personal—it’s global.”

Five questions for discussion based on **Fundamental 7: Kingdom Dominion Is for the Nations**:

1. Why is it important to understand that dominion is not just **personal** but **global**, and how does that perspective shift the way we live as believers?
2. Jesus commanded His followers to “disciple nations” (Matthew 28:19). What does it practically mean for believers to influence **nations and systems** like government, business, or education?
3. Habakkuk 2:14 describes a day when “the earth shall be filled with the knowledge of the glory of the Lord.” How can individual believers contribute to this **global vision**?
4. Revelation 5:10 says we are made kings and priests to reign on earth. How can we balance the **priestly role** (worship, prayer) with the **kingly role** (authority, rulership) in our daily lives?
5. In what ways can the Church move beyond being seen as just a **religious gathering place** to truly being God’s **embassy of authority** in the world?

21 Day Dominion Confessions

Confessing dominion is vital because faith must be expressed to be effective. Believing in your heart is only part of faith—confession is the voice of faith. Until you speak what you believe, it remains inactive.

Romans 10:10 (“...with the mouth confession is made unto salvation”) and 2 Corinthians 4:13 (“...we believe, therefore we speak”) show that the same principle applies to dominion. Just as we confess Jesus to receive salvation, we also confess God’s promises to receive and walk in dominion.

Confession aligns our words with God’s Word, not with fear, defeat, or circumstances. It renews our minds, builds our faith, and sets spiritual laws in motion. Right confession builds faith—wrong confession destroys it. Continually speaking the truth of God’s Word—even in the face of challenges—helps believers hold fast to what Jesus already accomplished and silences the lies of the enemy.

Confession is not about convincing God to give dominion—it’s about agreeing with what God has already said and done through Christ.
