During Lent we can pray the Sorrowful mysteries only. It is a time for us to dwell on Jesus' suffering and His death. It is a time to look at our lives and examine our lives in relation to Jesus' cross.

SORROWFUL MYSTERIES:

1 - Agony In The Garden. The thought of our sins and His coming suffering causes the agonizing Savior to sweat blood. (Luke 22:39-44).

2 - The Scourging. Jesus is stripped and unmercifully scourged until His body is one mass of bloody wounds. (Matt. 27:26).

3 - Crowning With Thorns. Jesus' claim to kingship is ridiculed by putting a crown of thorns on His head and a reed in His hand. (Matt. 27:28- 31).

4 - Carrying of The Cross. Jesus shoulders His own cross and carries it to the place of crucifixion while Mary follows Him sorrowing. (Luke 23:26-32).

5 – **Crucifixion.** Jesus is nailed to the cross and dies after three hours of agony witnessed by His Mother. (Matt. 27:33-50).

What is Mortal and Venial Sin?

Mortal Sin destroys charity in the heart of man by a grave violation of God's law; it turns man away from God... by preferring an inferior good to him. Venial sin allows charity to subsist, though it offends and wounds it. Mortal sin results in the privation of sanctifying grace, that is, of the state of grace. If it is not redeemed by repentance and God's forgiveness, it causes exclusion from Christ's kingdom and the eternal death of hell. One commits venial sin when, in a less serious matter, he does not observe the standard prescribed by the moral law, or when he disobeys the moral law in a grave matter, but without full knowledge or complete consent. Venial sin weakens charity and merits temporal punishment. Deliberate and un-repented venial sin disposes us little by little to commit mortal sin. However, venial sin does not break the covenant with God. With God's grace, it is humanly reparable. "Venial sin does not deprive the sinner of sanctifying grace, friendship with God, charity, and consequently, eternal happiness."

Why Sing Latin During at Mass During Lent?" One of the reforms of Vatican II was to replace the Latin Rite of the Catholic Church with a new Mass called the "Novus Ordo" in which the priest faces the people, and which allows modern/native languages to be used, thereby promoting "full, active and conscious" participation in the liturgy. While the entire Latin (Tridentine) Mass can only be said with a Bishop's approval, singing Mass parts in Latin is allowed. The use of Latin in the Church dates as early as 395 AD, replacing Greek. The spoken version of Church Latin, Liturgical Latin or more properly, Ecclesiastical Latin, was created during the Carolingian Renaissance under Charlemagne in the early 8th century. Ecclesiastical Latin continues to be the official language of the Catholic Church. The Church produces liturgical texts in Latin, which provide a single clear point of reference for translations into all other languages. Texts of canon law are in Latin. Pope Benedict XVI gave his unexpected resignation in Latin. The Holy See, for centuries has drafted documents in a modern language, but the authoritative text, published in the Acta Apostolicae Sedis is usually in Latin.



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
