

The Incarnation changes everything.

At the root of the holiday season, sometimes buried beneath the well-intentioned array of lights, decorations and wrapping paper, remains the single transformational moment that we celebrate. Jesus being born ~ God entering our world

That night in Bethlehem, in a humble manger, remains so awe-inspiring, that it's difficult to imagine it ever being forgotten or overlooked during the holidays.

When does the Catholic Christmas season start and end? The Catholic Christmas season starts on the Nativity, December 25, 2023, and ends on January 8, 2023, the Sunday Mass celebration of the Epiphany.

What is the Octave of Christmas? The Octave of Christmas includes the eight days between Christmas Day and January 1, which is both the Solemnity of Mary, the Mother of God, and New Year's Day.

What are the 12 Days of Christmas, and where did they come from? The 12 Days of Christmas are the 12 days between Christmas Day and Epiphany. The "12 Days" likely had pre-Christian roots, though the term was likely adapted to fit the Church calendar in celebration of the Nativity. Tradition also holds that the Three Kings' journey to meet the baby Jesus was twelve days.

What is Epiphany? Epiphany is the celebration of the revelation of Jesus as the Son of God – here on earth with us. The feast is also known as "Three Kings Day," the day the Magi visited Jesus in Bethlehem.
