 **True North: Writing Project**

We used the term “true north” in this chapter as a way to understand the guiding principle that keeps us aiming toward the good. True north is a fixed point on a globe that is spinning. What is an idea, place, object, or person in your life that is so unchanging and dependable that you can look to it as your true north?

 **Make a Compass: Science Project**

 **Pinocchio: Art Project**

When Pinocchio tells lies, his wooden nose grows long. After many misadventures, Pinocchio finally learns to care for others, and then the good fairy who watches over him turns him into a real boy. Illustrate the book by drawing a double portrait of Pinocchio, first as a naughty wooden puppet and second after he becomes a humble, real boy.

 **Creation: Skit Project**

Read the first chapter of the Bible, Genesis 1. There we read that God created the world. Act out the first day’s creation of light; second of water and sky, third of dry land, seas, vegetation, plants, and trees; fourth of planetary bodies; fifth of the creatures living in the seas and the birds of the air; and sixth of land creatures and human beings. What did God

say after each of the first five days of creation? What did God say after the sixth day?
What did God do on the seventh day (see Genesis 2:1–2)? Include all of this in your skit.
