Very little fabric left. There remains a good selection of patterns, books, DMC floss, publications and some rulers, zippers and trims.

COLOR TOPIC: Color Blend--Look at Fabric in a Different Way by Billie Harrell.

The Best of Blended Quilts – **From the Beginning** by Marsha McCloskey and Sharon Evans Yenter introduced the trend of looking at fabrics from a different point of view.

Color of the fabric's print, flow of color and pattern interaction result in remarkable quilts. Usually start with light colors and gradually blend into darker colors.

Billie provided some fabric examples where the prints gradually blended from light to dark.

Her personal taste has changed over the years. Where she once selected creams or white she now selects neutrals like gray.

When Billie is fabric shopping, if she finds a fabric she loves, she gets a minimum of 2 yards, enough to start a project. She doesn't use fat quarters.

Her quilt examples included civil war reproduction, a Blooming Nine Patch and others with fabric selection where the color flows.

REPEAT QUILTER'S TIP

For 5" blocks or the Pizza Box block, be sure to cut off selvage from material.

JULY PROGRAM: The Quilting History in Central Mississippi Area---Ann Root

Cindy Pannier introduced our guest speaker by stating that she moved to the Jackson area after Ann Root had closed her quilt shop in Clinton, MS and had moved to be closer to family.

Ann opened her shop in 1979 with a partner. Her partner was the quilter and she was the seamstress who made garments. After going to her first Houston Quilt Show and Market, she became a converted quilter after seeing all the beautiful quilts hanging from the ceiling.

A dozen quilters met in October 1990 at Ann Root's Olde Town Stitchery Quilt Shop to discuss the possibility of forming a state quilt organization. These visionaries included Martha Ginn, Chris Dahlman, Ollie Jean Lane, Martha Skelton, Marilyn Rose, Suzanne Schutt and others. They wondered if there would be enough interest to make such an organization possible. They knew there were guilds throughout the state but they were not connected. The first gathering was held in February 1991 at the Paul B. Johnson State Park. About 180 attended. The **Mississippi Quilt**

Association was official and Martha Ginn was the first president.

In 1994 the Documentation Committee was formed to explore the possibility of conducting a statewide quilt search. From 1995-1997 quilt search days were held throughout the state. Carol Vickers, served as Chairman with Martha Skelton very involved. The project was started without funds. The quilt documentation photos became the source for the published book, *Mississippi Quilts*, featuring 127 quilts. The book was launched at the Old Capitol Museum in 2001.

Quilts often tell a story that are passed down through the family generations. Children remember the quilts they slept under and recognize fabrics in a scrap quilt.





Ann's first quilt was made for her daughter, who picked out her dress fabrics and her school colors, she was a cheerleader. It is loved to this day!

During the quilt search project, they saw quilts that were made to be warm and special quilts used only for visitors. Some wealthy wives had their slaves quilt for them.

Ann's Special Quilts with Her Stories [a] Round Wedding Ring Quilt: She saw the pattern and she wanted it and made hers with lavender background.

[b] Her Pine Block Quilt featured detailed blocks with a unique design and striking colors

[c] Her Christmas Sampler Block of the Month Quilt 2002 included additional blocks



Mississippi Quilts was dedicated to Martha Skelton. Martha was an artist and a dear friend. She traveled with her. Martha liked old quilts and Ann does too.

Another blessing is that quilters are some of the nicest people. She enjoyed her customers, local and out of town visitors. She closed her shop in 1998 after 17 years in business.

In closing, Cindy Pannier thanked Ann Root for her presentation and her contribution as a charter member of the **Mississip**-

<u>AUGUST PROGRAM</u>: Constructing Quilt of Valor Blocks by Polly Duggan

Following the "Blended Quilt" theme we will be making QOV blocks following the *Reversible Quilts* technique by Sharon Pederson, or quilt as you go.

Kits with directions have been prepared for members to take home and assemble. The kit is complete with batting and fabric strips using sew and flip method starting in the middle. Don't trim the block.

Use red thread in your bobbin.

Bring finished block to August meeting for assembly.

This technique was used when we assembled our guild quilt gifted to our adopted Katrina Quilter.

Karoline Erickson: displayed her 20" x 20" wall hanging of a tree. It is her design to include fabric selection and machine quilting.


Madeline Tindall chose stained wood as her project. She cut the strips, stained and framed it.
