Patricia was given the floor to make some comments. As Cindy has stated throughout this year, this group is easy to work with and very low maintenance. Members step forward when needed. Last year, Cindy asked members to give the board program suggested program topics for this year. Patricia would welcome program ideas. Since many of you enjoy YouTube demos and programs, please help by sharing those techniques. Thank you for this honor of serving you this coming year.

## COLOR TOPIC OBSERVATION: Personal Favorite Colors by Cindy Pannier

As Billie has stated at the conclusion of each color presentation, ignore the rules and go with your favorite colors. Cindy chose to inventory the colors used to decorate her home. Her colors are yellow, blue and green---straight off the color whee!!

## COLOR TOPIC: Transparency by Billie Harrell

Transparency is guaranteed to create an optical illusion. This technique blends two fabric colors by over-lapping to create another color effect which is a mixture of two. Using simple nine patch blocks for examples, she started with two colors that were tied together by a center unit print other than the background color. The center block print or batik pulled the units together. The group agreed that some of the center unit fabrics worked better than others. Batiks are a good source to blend different colors. You can work with different color values and designs. A vast variety of fabrics we work with could become a candidate of this technique.


OCTOBER MEETING PROJECT: Recycle some of your 5" blocks by making a $121 / 2$ block in pattern of your choice.

## REPEAT QUILTER'S TIP

## For 5" blocks or the Pizza Box block, be sure to cut off selvage from material.

## NOVEMBER MEETING--PIZZA BLOCK EXCHANGE CONCLUSION: Cindy Pannier

Plan to make time to sign your blocks using Marilyn's verified pen, Pentel Gel roller pen for fabric. It doesn't wash out. This step will let the box owner connect the blocks with the makers.
There was discussion about the block signing exercise. Some members did not want the signatures on their blocks as they were planning to gift or sell quilt to someone and didn't want them included.

## SEPTEMBER PROGRAM: Machine Quilting using your walking foot by Ann Tullos.

Ann opened with a short lesson on the history of quilting that goes back almost to the beginning of time. Some needles were found to be 30,000 years old. Needles with eyes dated back 17,000 years. 300 BC, steel was created in India and traveled to China. The Han Chinese Dynasty had steel needles.
The invention of the spinning wheel had significant impact. Buttons were created in the Middle East.
Treadle sewing machine was invented by Isaac Singer in 1850. Women formed Sewing Societies and the rest is history! Her life changing experience happened when she moved to their current home and she lost 440 feet of space in her new sewing room. She had to be creative as she cleaned up and out.

## Walking Foot Quilting Tips

Press seams open.
She uses low loft batting. Her favorite is no baste Birdie Bird batting. She also uses 80/20 batting.
If basting is necessary, i.e., a large quilt, she recommends Michael's tatting thread because it's rough and doesn't stick.
Machine should be clean, oiled and have a new needle. Fill bobbins first before starting project.
Make a sample sandwich to check thread, pressure of machine foot and actual walking stitch.
Make sure the quilt is supported using tables or the ironing board so the weight doesn't pull on machine.
Bernina has specialized feet.
Marking a pattern: she uses chalk marker, Hara marker or painter's tape. For large quilts, she plans simple designs. She uses grid paper to create and test design that she keeps in her book.
She recommends Jacquie Gering's book "Master Machine Quilting with Your Walking Foot" which includes reverse quilting.
Thread weight: Bobbin is lighter and top thread is heavier.
Her examples were displayed with more of her tips and lessons learned. Cindy Pannier shared her quilt following the 2" grid pattern.
