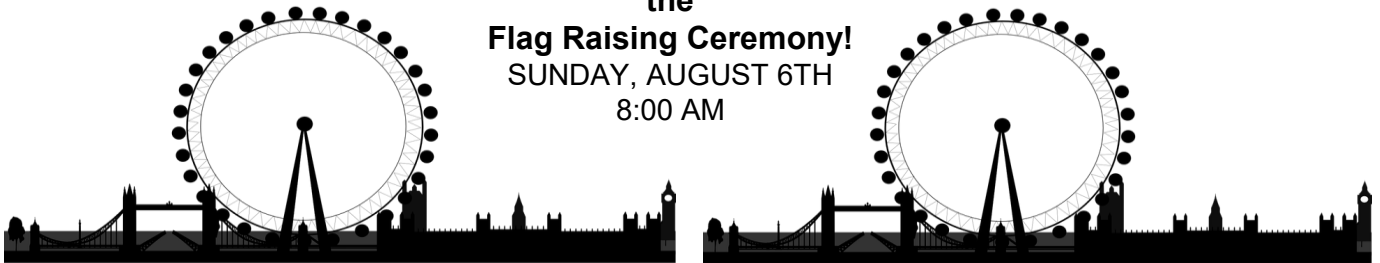

•**GOLF CARTS...**Golf carts, ATVs, etc. **may not be used** during the Fair unless **PRE-APPROVED**. Contact the Fair Office **before July 1st** for an application and information.

• **INDEPENDENT EXHIBITORS...**Will be required to follow barn rules that will be posted in every barn and will be directly responsible to the Superintendents of that Department – see Rules and Regulations- **DUTIES OF EXHIBITORS**.

• **RAFFLE & FUNDRAISING RULE...**All raffles, auctions or sales held on the grounds fair week must be registered with the Fair Office a minimum of 30 days prior to the Fair so that they may be approved by the board of directors. See Exhibitor's Rules & Regulations for the complete rule.

Each year, approximately 250 trophies and awards, sponsored by individuals and businesses throughout the area, are awarded to outstanding exhibitors at the Shiawassee County Fair. You are encouraging the pursuit of excellence in the youth of the county, and we would like to express our sincere appreciation.

Rules & Regulations

The Board of Directors welcomes all qualified exhibitors to participate in the annual Shiawassee County Fair. The following rules and regulations will be enforced in order to provide a uniform, educational and positive experience for all exhibitors.

Anyone using deception, including presenting a false address, in entering an animal or still exhibit shall be penalized the amount of their premiums and shall be barred from exhibiting for the period of two (2) years, not to include the year the deception took place. If deception is alleged, the exhibitor implicated and his or her parent/guardian will be notified and given an opportunity to clarify the actions in question, prior to the issuance of a decision. The chain of command in "Complaint and Appeal Procedures" shall be followed.

OPEN CLASS EXHIBITOR RESIDENCE RULES

Open Class Livestock Exhibitors shall be limited to Shiawassee County residents or (real estate) property owners only. EXCEPTION: Youth exhibitors (**Cloverbuds, 4-H, FFA and/or Independents**) who qualify to exhibit in youth classes may show in Open classes. (see Residency Rule)

A) Residents must have a valid proof of Shiawassee County Residency and may be asked to appear before the Residency Committee with proof of said residency as specified by the Committee at that time.

B) A non-resident of Shiawassee County who is eligible to show in the Open and/or Youth Divisions of the Shiawassee County Fair due to the ownership of property within Shiawassee County may be asked to appear before the Residency Committee with proof of legal ownership (as specified by the Committee at that time) to verify eligibility.

AGE REQUIREMENTS: All ages as of January 1

1. Your age as of January 1 should be used for the entire year.
2. Youth entering educational & demonstration projects must be 8-19 years of age.
3. Exhibitors who have been determined to be eligible for special education services by the local school district must be 8-26 years of age.
4. Youth Exhibitors – 8-21 years of age.
5. Livestock – Open Livestock Exhibitors must be 6 years of age or older.
6. Exhibit Building:
 - **Youth Dept. Exhibitors** – 8-21 years of age.
 - **Open Dept. Exhibitors** must be 5 years of age or older.
 - **Open Dept. Youth Exhibitors** – 5-15 years of age (Open classes that specify 'Youth').
 - **Open Dept. Adult Exhibitors** – 16 years of age and older (Open classes that specify 'Adult').
7. Cloverbuds – Exhibitors defined by age of 5-7 years old.

OUT-OF-COUNTY RULES

As of 2023 the Shiawassee County Fair will allow non-residents to exhibit in the Stills Exhibit Building ONLY. Residents of outlying counties are welcome to enter their projects regardless of age, also do not have to belong to an FFA Chapter or 4-H Club but may show as an Independent exhibitor.

YOUTH CLASS EXHIBITOR RESIDENCE RULES

Youth Class Departments are open to **all youth residents** of Shiawassee County who are 4-H Club members, FFA Chapter members or who choose to show as an Independent, and other youth exhibitors as specified in the guidelines:

- A. Non-resident youth who own property (real estate) in Shiawassee County, or who are the children of parents/legal guardians who own (real estate) property (not to include leased land) in Shiawassee County. Non-resident property owners are required to provide proof of ownership in the form of a recorded deed in their name or a property tax receipt on property recorded in their name.
- B. Non-resident youth enrolled for a minimum of one semester (immediately preceding the Fair) in Byron, Chesaning, Corunna, Durand, Laingsburg, Morrice, Owosso, Ovid-Elsie, New Lothrop or Perry Schools, or private or parochial schools within the above district's boundaries, known as the "Green Zone". Home schooled students must reside within the (Green Zone) school district's boundaries.
- C. Any youth, not a resident of Shiawassee County, who was living outside approved school districts, who showed at 2003 Shiawassee County Fair, and who has shown continuously since 2003. Also, any other youth members of their immediate family (brothers, sisters, stepbrothers, stepsisters, half-brothers, half-sisters, adopted brothers and adopted sisters) who must show continuously after their initial year of showing.
- D. Any youth exhibitor who has been properly qualified and shown a minimum of 2 years continuously at the Shiawassee County Fair, may continue to show at the Shiawassee County Fair if they move out of the area leaving a qualified school district, listed in rule B, or age out of 4-H, before they reach the age of 21, at which time they must meet the requirements for adult or Open Class Exhibitor. Exhibitors who have moved but will be entering exhibits in the Fair under this rule will be required to provide verification of having exhibited at the Shiawassee County Fair the prior 2 years.
- E. Youth exhibitors living with guardians other than parents or stepparents must be prepared to show documentation of the legal guardianship of the adult in the home in which they reside.
- F. Exhibitors must legally reside in the above defined areas at a minimum from the time their entries are submitted through fair week.
- G. Any Private School, Parochial School and/or Home School Student who resides in any school district located in Shiawassee County, and the Ovid-Elsie School District, or the Chesaning Community School District.

Rules & Regulations

GENERAL RULES

All in county entries are due on or before
Thursday, **June 15, 2023**, at 5 p.m.
Out of County Entries ONLY Are due July 1st.
Late entries will not be accepted for anyone.

INFORMATION FOR PICKING UP ENTRY TAGS, ONLY FOR EXHIBIT BUILDING EXHIBITORS, WILL BE POSTED ON FACEBOOK AND OUR WEBSITE www.ShiawasseeFair.com

- 1.The judge shall determine if an exhibit will receive a premium if there is no competition.
 - 2.Stained or soiled articles shall not be accepted.
 - 3.Exhibitors in each department shall adhere to all rules and regulations.
 - 4.All departments are open to non-professionals except where specified.
 - 5.All exhibits must be in place by the time designated in each department.
 - 6.Exhibit building hours for the week are 10am to 10pm Sunday - Saturday.
- When an exhibitor is presenting their exhibit to a judge for evaluation, the wearing of any clothing with obscenities, tobacco, alcohol or drug information will not be allowed.

- All exhibits must be in place by the time designated in its DEPARTMENT. In the exhibit building only one entry per exhibitor per class shall be accepted.

• After September 15 each year the fair reserves the right to dispose of exhibits left unclaimed at the fairgrounds.

- Ribbons or entry tags have no value as to payment of premiums. Premiums are paid from the records of the judge's book.

- All Exhibit Building articles must have been made within the two years and must be the work of the exhibitor.

RELEASE FOR AUDIO, VIDEO, WEBSITE, FILM AND PHOTOGRAPHS

By entering and/or attending the Shiawassee County Fair all exhibitors and/or visitors authorize the fair officials to use voice recordings or photo images taken on the grounds for educational or promotional programs, in any form or manner, without payment of fees, and release any claims for violation of rights of privacy and publicity, in perpetuity.

LIABILITY

The Shiawassee County Agricultural Society (SCAS) assumes no liability for loss or damage to any property (including animals and/or individuals) of the exhibitor due to fire, tornado, weather conditions or other causes beyond the control of the SCAS. The Exhibitor herein agrees to cover by insurance all goods and property brought to or upon the grounds of the SCAS. The exhibitor further agrees to hold and save said SCAS harmless from suit or civil action in case of damage or loss of any kind or character to said property, or from suit or civil action to recover damage or loss to other persons or property brought to or upon the grounds of the SCAS, said loss or damage occurring as a result of, or in connection with the operation and conduct of the privilege.

RAFFLE AND FUNDRAISING POLICY

The sale of raffle tickets, auctions or similar events on the Fairgrounds during fair week must be approved by the Fair Board. Requests must be received by the Fair Office at least one (1) month prior to the event to allow the Board to review the request. Raffles and/or sales may be held only by clubs, exhibitors or vendors who have paid for either commercial or exhibit space.

A RAFFLE, SALE AUCTION, ETC., MUST:

1. Submit a sample of advertising copy for the event for approval by the Fair Board.
2. Confine solicitation to the area designated by the Fair Board; under no circumstances shall soliciting be "at random" throughout the Fairgrounds.
3. Be limited to one per barn/area at any given time. If two or more groups would like to hold an event in the same specified barn/area, they may agree to split the event/sale time, each using the specified area for an agreed upon period of time.

If a complaint is received related to the raffle, sale or auction, a Fair Board representative will give a verbal warning to the group. If a second complaint is received, the group will be asked to discontinue the event.

PRIVACY POLICY

Private and/or personal information entrusted to the Shiawassee County Fair Office shall be placed in a secure, locked file when stored, and held in a locked room when in use by office staff. Computer records will use encoded Social Security numbers and will at no time be available to the public. When the information is no longer required for use in the office, or for use should an audit be ordered, it will be destroyed (burned) on the premises.

Rules & Regulations

DUTIES OF EXHIBITORS

Barn rules will be posted in all barns (livestock and still exhibits) and will apply to all exhibitors, including: 4-H, FFA, Independent, Cloverbud and Open exhibitors. Exhibitors are expected to follow the posted rules and will be responsible to the Superintendents of that barn if rules are ignored. Failure to comply may result in withholding exhibitor's premiums or dismissal of the exhibit from the Fair. Exhibitors refusing or failing to exhibit livestock when so requested by the Superintendent in charge shall be penalized the amount of their premiums at the direction of the Superintendent.

RELEASE OF EXHIBITS

All still exhibits, animals, tack, decorations and displays must remain in place and not removed until designated time as explained and posted in each specie barn.

Any exhibitor violating the Release of Exhibits Rules will forfeit their total premiums from the current year's Fair and will be put on probation. A second violation will result in the exhibitor being prohibited from exhibiting at the fair.

An exhibitor helping someone else will also be considered in violation of the rule.

• **NEW FOR 2023 Still Exhibits may be released on Saturday Aug 12, from 9pm – 11pm or shall be released 9:00 a.m. – 1:00 p.m., Sunday morning. See Departments for release times and dates.**

• **ALL EXHIBITORS ARE ASKED TO HELP CLEAN THE GROUNDS ON SUNDAY MORNING AT 9 AM. PLEASE REPORT TO THE EAST END OF THE MAIN ARENA.**

• Monday evening (August 14) at 6:00 will be a work bee to get ready for the following weekend's horse show.

ELECTRIC LIGHTS & POWER

Electric lights and power may be arranged for in any building or for outside exhibits on the grounds by applying to the Fair office seven (7) days prior to fair. Such current, labor and material shall be paid for by the applying exhibitor or party in excess of one 110v outlet.

CHAIN OF COMMAND FOR EXHIBITORS, VOLUNTEERS & GUESTS

Do you have a question, concern, observation or maybe a good idea that you would like to bring to someone's attention? The following is the "chain of command" that will allow your voice to be heard.

1. First level for question, concern or discussion is with a club leader.
2. If not satisfied, second level is the appropriate Barn Superintendent.
3. If not yet satisfied, the third level is the General Superintendent, either Livestock (Mike Oliver or Jim Ritter) or Exhibit Building (Karen Erwin).
4. If your voice has not been heard to your satisfaction through the above channels, the Executive Committee of the Board of Directors will be glad to talk with you. They may choose to direct your question or concern to the full Board of Directors. Any Director or the Fair's Office Manager will be glad to schedule an appointment for you.

COMPLAINT & APPEAL PROCEDURES

All complaints regarding the possible disqualification of an animal or exhibitor due to eligibility must be in writing from an exhibitor or parent. These must be received by the species superintendent 18 hours before the start of the applicable show or shows. Person having claims against the association must present said claims in writing, to the Fair Office by the close of Fair, in order that they may be examined at the first meeting of the Board of Directors. The procedure is as follows:

R 285.811.10 Complaints and appeal.

1. Any exhibitor may file a complaint regarding any of the following:
 - a. Conflict of interest of the judge.
 - b. Disqualification of an exhibit or exhibitor.
 - c. Exhibitor, group leader, or superintendent behavior.
 - d. Eligibility of the exhibit.
2. The APPEALS PROCESS is as follows:
 - a. In accordance to the annual appropriation act, exhibitors are allowed to file a written complaint within 10 days after the end of the fair or exposition.
 - b. The fair will define the steps for board review, investigation and issuing of findings and recommendations for action on the complaint.
 - c. Notify the exhibitor filing the complaint that he or she may make an appeal to the department (MDA) within 45 days of filing the initial complaint if the exhibitor is not satisfied with the association's action.
3. The department shall have 60 days after the receipt of any appropriately filed appeal to investigate the complaint and shall issue a finding of the fact and notice of department (MDA) action and any recommended actions for the association. For specific Shiawassee County Fair procedure, see below.

Rules & Regulations

SHIAWASSEE COUNTY FAIR APPEAL PROCESS

- 1) First complaint to be reviewed by the Department Superintendent.
- 2) If not resolved, complaint to be reviewed by the appropriate General Supt. (Exhibit Bldg – Karen Erwin; Livestock Area – Jim Ritter and Mike Oliver).
- 3) If not yet resolved, complaint to be reviewed by the Fair Board at the first meeting following the Fair (the complainant must call and arrange to be put on the agenda for the meeting) or within 10 days, whichever is first. A meeting of the Executive Committee will be called, if necessary.

MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

•CAMPING RULES & REGULATIONS ARE AVAILABLE AT THE FAIR OFFICE UPON REQUEST. Only available for County Resident livestock exhibitors.

•NO BICYCLES, MOTORCYCLES, ROLLERBLADES, OR SKATEBOARDS PERMITTED ON THE FAIRGROUNDS.

•**NO ANIMALS ALLOWED ON THE GROUNDS OTHER THAN THOSE BEING EXHIBITED & SERVICE ANIMALS.** This Fair complies with state and local health regulations as well as federal ADA regulations. *Service Animals* means any animal trained to do work or perform tasks for the benefit of an individual with a disability. Pets providing emotional support, well-being, comfort or companionship are not recognized as service animals under ADA regulations. (Exceptions: A request must be filed with the Fair Board prior to opening day of fair. All health papers must be available as required for that species.)

•**GOLF CARTS, ATVS, ETC. ARE NOT ALLOWED ON THE GROUNDS FAIR WEEK EXCEPT BY SPECIAL PERMISSION.** Applications for special permission must be made through the Fair Office by July 1. If approved, units must provide proof of liability and property Insurance and display special identification for Fair week.

July 1, 2023 AT 5:00pm**

NO LATE ENTRIES WILL BE ACCEPTED.

****2. All Premium Checks will be mailed by September**

1. **Note: They must be cashed within 90 days.** (Uncashed checks are not automatically donated back to the Fair. By law, the Fair Office must locate any uncashed checks and resolve them. PLEASE CASH YOUR CHECK OR DONATE IT BACK TO THE FAIR. If you choose to donate your premiums back to the Fair, please sign the check and return it to the Fair Office with a note of explanation. Thank you!)

3. Exhibitor's family passes are available \$30.00 per pass.

4. Youth and Open Exhibitor barn fees must be included with each individual exhibitor's entry form. They are NOT to be collected by clubs or chapters.

5. A Grandstand Entertainment Package is available, good for admittance every night. Available at the fair office, the adult ticket is \$50.00, the child's (age 6-12) is \$25.00, with not limit on the number purchased.

YOUTH SHOW GENERAL RULES

Any exhibitor in the Youth Show has permission to enter in open classes by making his/her entry and abiding by the open class rules. (Open Exhibitors in animal classes must be 6 yrs. of age by January 1st of the fair/exposition year). Livestock entered in the open class must be registered animals (with the exception of the sheep department, see department rules for details.)

All exhibits except livestock, must be labeled with the exhibitor's number, name, and address. Premiums shall be awarded to exhibits on a group system of "A", "B", "C", unless otherwise specified. Livestock exhibitors must have their exhibitor number when in the show ring. Ribbons shall be given for each placing in all classes.

If in the opinion of the judge, an exhibit does not merit a blue ribbon or an "A" group rating, the judge has the privilege of starting with the ribbon or rating he or she decides is appropriate.

AT THE SHIAWASSEE COUNTY FAIRGROUNDS**

Copies of these rules may be obtained through the Fair Office or through the Michigan State Department of Agriculture.

The Shiawassee County Agricultural Society management reserves to its Board of Directors the final and absolute right to interpret these rules and regulations and arbitrarily settle all matters connected with the Fair. **It further reserves the right to withdraw all or part of the premium offerings in all departments should an emergency exist, and circumstances demand it.**

Fair book subject to corrections and/or printing errors. Any fees charged are not refundable.

EXHIBITOR'S GUIDE CHANGE PROCESS

Suggested changes for next year's Exhibitor's Guide must be submitted to department superintendents and/or general superintendents prior to **October 1st**. This includes the nomination of new superintendents for the following year. Only superintendents or general superintendents may submit to the Fair Board. Change requests are submitted for consideration at the October Fair Board meeting.
