Assignments

Assignments will be given on a weekly basis. All students are expected to work on assignments regularly and to seek assistance if the problems are not understood. All work should be kept in a notebook which may be reviewed by the instructor at any time.

Method of Evaluation

 - These assignments will be online on my website the day of class and are due one week from the date assigned. These are to be submitted on hardcopy or sent by email to be prior to class starting.
- Final Exam – 25% - Real-Life Application Project and Presentation
 - As you have seen throughout this course Mathematics is used everywhere and impacts every aspect of our lives. With that in mind you will be required to complete a paper and presentation that answers the following questions.
 - What is one topic we studied in this class (if you wish to use another topic please ask me first) that you use or that impacts your daily life.
 - With that topic in mind give a brief 5-7 min explanation on how you use it or how it impacts your life.
 - In addition to the presentation a paper or PowerPoint with speaker notes must be turned in.
