### *Garbage & Recycling Pick Up*

Garbage is collected weekly, recycling is collected bi-weekly. Carts must be out at the edge of the road by 7am on collection day. Residents must use Village provided carts and must be 3 feet from other carts or structures. Material on top of or next to the bin will not be collected. Residents may pay for a callback for carts not out on time.

### *Garbage, Recycling, Yard Waste Carts*

Additional carts may be rented or purchased for an additional fee. Only additional garbage carts have a yearly fee that must be paid. Replacement carts may be purchased for a fee.

### *Special Pick Ups*

Special pick ups are available the first and third Thursday of each month. A service request and payment must be made by the day prior. Items must be out curbside, by 7am on the day of collection. Contractor-generated waste is not eligible for special pick ups. Items not eligible for collection must be removed within 3 days of receiving notice. After 3 days, the Village will remove at the owners' expense.

### *Dumpster/ Port-o-Potty Permits*

Whether there for a single day or 60 days, a permit must be acquired for port-o-potties, PODS, bagsters, or dumpsters located on a property. The permit and fee is submitted to Village Hall. May not be located on the street, must be in driveway. Port-o-potties must be at least 15ft from any property line.

### *Dogs on Leashes*

Whenever not on the premises of its owner, dogs must be attached to a leash not more than 6 feet in static length or 20 feet in retractable length.

### *Rummage/ Estate Sales*

All rummage, estate, and garage sales require a permit. The permit and fee are submitted to Village Hall. Signs advertising the sale are not allowed without a permit and payment of a fee. Permission must be obtained from property owners for the placement of signs.

### *Elections*

The only polling location is at Village Hall (9075 N Regent Road). On Election Day, polls are open from 7am to 8pm. In person absentee voting is held at Village Hall 2 weeks prior to any election.

### *Drug Take Back Program*

Prescriptions can be dropped off at the Police Department lobby (9075 N Regent Road) in the prescription drug drop box. The Police Department does not accept any illegal drugs or sharps.

### *Household Hazardous Waste*

Certain household wastes are not acceptable for pick up or disposal in the garbage bin. Proper disposal is required of these materials. MMSD provides household hazardous waste collection. Locations and times can be found on their website under hazardous waste collection.

### *Recreational Vehicle Storage*

A recreational vehicle, trailer, or boat less than 35 feet, that is owned by the property owner, may be parked unenclosed on any paved area/driveway from April 15-October 31 if it has been issued a permit by the Police Department. The recreational vehicle or trailer must comply with all setbacks, be shielded from view, and may not impact traffic.

Snowmobiles on trailers may be parked unenclosed on any paved area/driveway from November 1-April 15 if it is in use during this period and not just stored.

### *Village Hall Recycling Center*

Located in the Village Hall lobby (9075 N Regent Road), individuals may recycle plastic bags, ink cartridges, cell phones, eyeglasses, and paper for shredding. The paper is shredded off-site by a 3rd party.

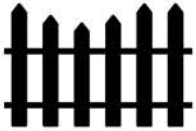
### *Painting Required*

All buildings shall have their exterior kept in a neat and attractive appearance. Painting and repainting is required as necessary to maintain the same.

### *Fence Maintenance*

Fences, architectural screening devices, walls, driveway gates, and arbors must be kept in a structurally sound condition. Standards and requirements are enforced by the building inspector or their designee.

### *Signs*

Temporary signs need a permit, fee, and are valid for not more than 15 days per calendar quarter (unless an extension is granted). Signs are not allowed in the Village right-of-way.

Deteriorated, unsightly signs shall be removed by the property owner. Upon being notified of such violation, it must either be removed or repaired within two days.

### *House Numbers*

All buildings shall have the numbers of their address clearly visible on both sides of their mailbox or post. Additionally, 3-inch numbers must be affixed to the front of the building in a contrasting color.

### *Overnight Parking/ Parking Regulations*

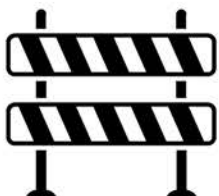
No vehicle can be parked on any street or alley in the Village unless they have been given permission by the Police Department. There shall not be more cars than the number of licensed drivers residing at the residence parked unenclosed. All vehicles are required to display a current license plate, even if they are not used often.

### *Downspout Discharge*

Any water outfall cannot negatively impact Village infrastructure or utilities, public safety, or neighboring properties. Residents have 10 days to implement corrective action once notified.

### *Block Parties/ Barricades*

To request barricades for a block party, the special event permit must be filled out and submitted along with any fees. A myBlue Sector Officer may be requested. Requests shall be made at least a week in advance.

### *Grass, Dirt, and Other Wrong Materials in Collections*

Grass clippings and dirt/ soil are not accepted in yard waste pick up. Plastic bags and other items like hoses can tangle recycling machines and are prohibited in recycling carts. Recycling carts that contain prohibited items may be tagged and not picked up.

### *Snow & Ice Removal*

It is not the Village's policy to provide "bare pavement" driving conditions at all times and locations during the winter season. Plowing begins when accumulation reaches ~3 inches. Residents may not place snow into the street or their neighbor's property.

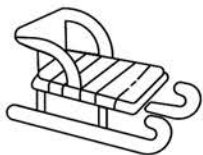

### *Fire Hydrants*

Properties with fire hydrants located on them are responsible for clearing snow around them so that the Fire Department can access them.

### *Mount Bayside*

Once there is snow on the hill, individuals will start showing up with their sleds! Individuals may park in the sled hill parking lot (located to the West of the hill). Cars may not park along Fairy Chasm Road or Regent Road.

### *Damaged Mailboxes*

Mailboxes accidentally damaged by a snowplow and damage to lawns from the Village snowplows, will be repaired or replaced by DPW with a standardized mailbox set forth by the Village. Only damage caused from Village vehicles will be repaired by the Village. Applicable to properties not on the Mailbox Inventory created in Autumn.

### *Vacant Premises*

Buildings unoccupied for over 60 days. Registration is required for all vacant premises. The owner is responsible for paying the annual fee. Due on anniversary date of registration.

### *Holiday Tree Collection*

In early January, our DPW crews will do a holiday tree collection. Typically, we will offer two collections where residents may leave their holiday tree (bare, not in a plastic bag) by the road and our crews will pick it up. As with all pick ups, they must be out before 7am the day of the collection.

### *Property Tax Bills*

Property tax bills are mailed to residents by mid-December of each year. Property tax payments may be paid online (service fees apply), by mail (9075 N Regent Rd), in-person, or at the drop box at Village Hall.

The first installment or the full amount is due by January 31. The second and third installments are due by March 31 and May 31, respectively.

### *Do Not Solicit List*

The Do Not Solicit List is a list of addresses, maintained by the Police Department, where individuals who are going door to door are not permitted to sell products or services. Valid for 2 years.

### *Dog and Cat Licenses*

March is the deadline for pet-owners to renew their dog and cat licenses for the year without an additional fee. While they may renew it later in the year at an increased rate, the license expires on March 31. Rabies vaccination information is required for renewal.

### *Weight Limits on Roads*

Seasonal weight limits are imposed to prevent injury to roadways. Weight limits typically go into effect in March and are lifted in April, but decisions are weather dependent. Certain roads are designated as heavy traffic routes and are exempt. The exempt portions include Regent Road from Fairy Chasm Road to the south and Fairy Chasm Road from Lake Drive to the west.

### *Mulch - Purchase & Delivery*

Mulch is recycled from the yard waste the Village collects. Mulch is available for free (a pile is placed at the sled hill parking lot by entering off Fairy Chasm) or can be delivered for a fee within a 5 mile radius of the Village.

### *Yard Waste Collections*

### *Grass/ Yard Maintenance*

Trees, shrubs, and other plantings must be maintained to create a neat and attractive appearance. Yards must be free of noxious weeds. Grass and weeds may never exceed 5" in height.

Clean Up Day is held in April, Recycling Days are held on the third Saturday of the month from March through November. The collection guide, produced annually, contains the most updated list of accepted items.

### *Adopt-A-Tree Program*

The Village partners with homeowners for the purchase and installation of trees on their property. By purchasing trees in bulk, the Village can pass the saving on to the homeowners and increase the number of trees in the Village. Owners either select a public tree, to be planted in the right-of-way, or a private tree they can plant anywhere on the property. Public trees are planted, staked, and watered.

### *Drainage/ Culverts*

The Village utilizes a ditch and culvert operation for stormwater. All rainwater is diverted towards outlets which ultimately lead into Lake Michigan. While some communities have combined stormwater and sanitary sewer systems, Bayside's are completely separate. Residents are responsible for the maintenance and replacement of driveway culverts. A culvert permit is required prior to beginning culvert repair/replacement work.

Water in culverts and ditches is normal.

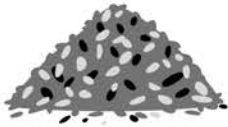

### *Dead/ Dangerous Trees*

Living or dead trees, limbs, or shrubs that present a risk of harm to neighbors, neighboring property, or the public at large are required to be removed or cut. Once an owner receives notice, they have 45 days to address the issue; a 30 day extension is available but the request must be made in writing to the Village Manger.

### *Pavilion Usage/ Bathrooms*

The bathrooms at Ellsworth Park are open during summer months. Usage of the pavilion is first come first served unless a rental is made.

### *Home Assessments*

The Village contracts with Accurate Appraisal. A yearly revaluation, based on the January 1 value, seeks to maintain 100% of fair market value. Annual notice is sent to impacted homeowners. Property owners have a chance to speak with the Assessor regarding valuations at Open Book. If property owners want to contest valuations, they may do so at the Board of Review. Once values are set, there is not an opportunity to contest an assessment until the following year.

### *Fires & Fireworks*

Small bonfires are allowed if confined by a control device designed for such use (ex. fire pit or outdoor fireplace). Must be located more than 25 feet from nearest building, accessory structure, fence, deck, or other combustible surface. Must have readily usable extinguishing equipment (ex. hose, buckets of water).

Fireworks are not permitted in the Village except for sparklers, paper caps, and toy snakes.

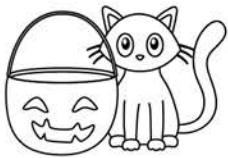

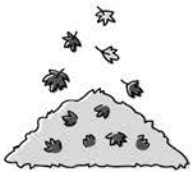

### *Yard Waste/ Leaf Collection*

Collections occur bi-weekly throughout the Spring, Summer, and Autumn. Only 1 pile per household is allowed and may not be larger than 10'x5'x5'. Contractor generated waste is not collected by the Village.

1 leaf pile per property. Leaves should not be bagged, in the road, drainage ditch, or near catch basin grates. Piles may only be leaves.

### *Crack Sealing*

Annually, the DPW crews crack seal the roads. Crack sealing is the process of filling cracks or gaps in the road with tar to prevent water from infiltrating and expediting the deterioration of the road. Once the cracks are sealed, the crews place 1-ply toilet paper over it to prevent tar from sticking to shoes or tires and allows immediate access to the pavement.

### *Mailbox Inventory*

The Village inspects mailboxes to determine if they are straight, stable, and sturdy. If a mailbox is not repaired prior to the winter snow season, and snow from a plow knocks it over, the Village will not replace that mailbox.
