

Wisconsin Ranks #1 in Drug Take Back

The Wisconsin Department of Justice announced that Wisconsin ranked number one throughout the country for the most prescription medications collected during the Fall 2023 Drug Take Back. Wisconsin collected 53,122 pounds of unwanted medications this fall.



Wisconsin has collected a total of 1,202,039 pounds of unwanted medications since Drug Take Back began in 2010 under the leadership of the United States Drug Enforcement Administration. Wisconsin ranks third in the nation for the most medications collected since inception, falling only behind Texas with 1,379,669 pounds and California with 1,372,361 pounds collected. Nationwide, since inception, 17,900,351 pounds of unwanted medications have been collected during Drug Take Back events.



Pumpkin Disposal

You have 3 options for disposing of pumpkins this fall:

- 1. Place in your yard waste pile.
- 2. Place in your leaf pile.
- Bring to the pumpkin disposal carts at Village Hall now through November 30.

It is important to keep organic material, such as pumpkins, our of the waste stream.



Oak Mortality

White, red and bur oaks have been experiencing increased mortality in Wisconsin and neighboring states over the last few years.

The causes of mortality are varied, but twolined chestnut borer (TLCB) is the most common culprit. Wisconsin has switched from a period of historically wet years (2017-2020) to drought conditions that have become more severe each year (2021-2023).

For yard or other high-value oaks, simply watering them low and slow (about 1 inch per week) during the growing season often is the best option to keep them healthy and help them recover from stress events.

Mulching is another good option.

It is also important to avoid injury and ground disturbance. Certified arborists may be able to protect healthy oaks with insecticides and fungicides, but oaks with significant canopy dieback or epicormic branching (shoots rising from buds lying under the bark of a trunk, stem or branch of the tree) are unlikely to recover and should be removed if they pose a hazard.
