CALL TO ORDER OF REGULAR MEETING

The meeting was called to order at 4:04 PM. Chair Bordon read the COVID-19 disclaimer and special instructions for Zoom webinars.

ROLL CALL

Public Works Director Zadnik took roll call.

OPEN FORUM

Chair Bordon read the guidelines on open forum procedures and called for public comment. Director Zadnik stated he received an email comment from Lorraine. He first called on John who had raised his hand and informed Lorraine that she would be next. John said his comment was pertaining to the Mallard Pointe project and that he would comment when that issue was considered on the agenda.

Lorraine read a letter that was sent to the committee about an unobtrusive fence at Tom Price Park she would like to have the Committee consider. There was no further comment from the public for the open forum session.

SCHEDULED ITEMS

1. Approve minutes of January 13, 2020, Regular Meeting.

Approved with amendments.

MOTION: Committee Member Kemnitzer made a motion to approve the minutes as modified, Committee Member Pearson seconded, and Director Zadnik took roll call.

No further comment.

2. Comments from the Chair, Jean-Marie Bordon.

Chair Bordon commented that after the last meeting she had learned of an application to build a deck on the open space behind 288 Beach Road, and that Planning had recommended to approve the plans on Consent. Chair Bordon was concerned and wrote a letter to the Planning Director Irene Borba. The letter was included in the agenda packet. She suggested considering updating the Administrative Manual to allow this Committee to have consideration on projects that involve open spaces. Planning Director Borba responded to Chair Bordon saying that City Council was changing the Administrative Manual regarding this Committee and that this item should wait until a later date for discussion.

Committee Member Kemnitzer mentioned that he reviewed the letter, maps and policy manuals and noted that this is a very complicated matter. Committee Member Kemnitzer referenced sections and 11.8 11.8.5 of the APM and concluded by stating that this Committee should have a say on projects that involve public spaces.

The was no public Comment.

3. <u>Report from Robert Zadnik, Public Works Director.</u>

The Director had a few updated for the Committee. First, Director Zadnik reviewed the budget approval process and the schedule.

He commented that the planting project on Lagoon Road is looking nice and was 95% done with the new drip irrigation installed.

The Playground was approved by Council to have the City Manager sign a contract with McNab, the lowest bidder for the project.

Chair Bordon thanked Robert for his work on the Lagoon Road project and said it set a high standard for our small parks. She then asked Director Zadnik for and update on the railings project. Zadnik responded that the project was assigned to the City Engineer, John Moe.

Chair Bordon inquired if the Department of Public Works position was filled. Director Zadnik provided an update.

Chair Bordon called for Public Comment, there was none.

Jena Watson joined via video.

OLD BUSINESS

4. Update, Discussion, and Possible Action on Centennial Park and Park Lane Improvement Projects.

Chair Bordon asked Director Zadnik to kick off this item. He pointed out that there were two surveys in the agenda packet that City Engineer John Moe performed. He introduced Gary Rasmussen from Blasen Landscape to share options for the Park Lane project. Gary shared his screen and gave a presentation on Park Lane.

Committee Member Watson had a few questions about various design elements.

Committee Member Kemnitzer gave his opinion that he liked option one.

Chair Bordon asked about a different entry area for the stairway. Gary referenced budget constraints. Committee Member Lund had comments of the view in relation to proposed railings.

Gary reviewed different options with the deeded land.

There was further discussion of the styling of the rail and stairs to optimize the view from the seated position.

Chair Bordon gave her preference for a curved stairway alternative.

Gary commented that the cost of a curved stairway is generally more expensive to construct. There was discussion of the surrounding trees and future development.

Chair Bordon called for public comment and then asked Director Zadnik if he had received any, there was none.

Chair Bordon suggested an informal vote for the two favorite concepts. There was further discussion of the designs, and the Committee voted for both curved and straight designs (utilizing the deeded triangle of land) as the preferred alternative. She then called for public comment. There was none.

There was no further comment from the Committee or the public.

NEW BUSINESS

5. Discussion and Possible Action on effect of Mallard Pointe project on Belvedere Community Park.

Chair Bordon stated she sent in a letter as a private citizen and that it would not be part of today's discussion. She reviewed the status of the submitted application that was determined incomplete by the City and the timelines surrounding that finding. She informed the Committee that further details on the city's review procedure are posted on the City's website. She reviewed the parking issues and sidewalks, demotions, and construction timelines. She stated that the Committee should discuss the impacts the project will have on Community Park. She suggested the Committee should make their recommendations to the Council.

She asked Director Zadnik if he had comments on the application and he reiterated that plans are on the website he encouraged members to review them. He recommended that the Committee concentrate on issues that would impact Community Park.

Chair Bordon called for Public Comment, Bruce Dorfman and Eric Holman gave a short presentation. John Hansen spoke as a private citizen and a representative of BRIG – Belvedere Residents for Intelligent Growth. He stated the group has about 400 members, and a sizeable number of them are concerned about safety issues on Community Road.

Jill Barnett was next to speak in Public Comment and asked if the upcoming meeting be public.

Chair Bordon then brought the item back to the Committee for discussion. She commented on the importance of parking availability for park goers and suggested the City take into consideration parking restrictions involving the Mallard Pointe project. Committee Member Lund spoke of the parking issues on Community Road as well as Park noise. Committee Member Kemnitzer stated that a lot of the construction issues are outside of the Committee purview.

Chair Bordon asked about a new committee that would address noise and parking regarding

construction projects and wanted to know if they would be addressing the Mallard Pointe and Community Park area. Director Zadnik said there was a new committee, and it addresses construction projects in general. He encouraged members to review the webpage and join the public meetings.

This item was closed.


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



A new Charter for the Parks, Open Spaces, and Lanes Committee was adopted by the City Council on March 22, 2022. It provides that one of the duties of the POSLC is to "Provide a report to staff and to the Belvedere City Council regarding the status of measures taken to address the priorities ... during the preceding fiscal year." (APM section 6.2.2(2)) "The Committee shall make its annual report on the status and progress of the City's measures to protect and improve Belvedere's Parks, Open Spaces and Lanes not later than August 30 of each year." (APM section 6.2.3)

This Report is submitted in accordance with these new provisions.

In accordance with APM section 6.2.11, the Mayor has authorized a Subcommittee, with Anne-Marie Walker and Jean Bordon as members, for the Annual August 30 Report on the Status of Priorities. The Subcommittee proposes to include the following as Priorities of the POSLC for discussion in this Report:

The POSLC has compiled studies and reports, and in collaboration with City Staff, the POSLC has and continues to see progress in all these areas. Where progress has been limited, this has been largely due to inadequate funding, insufficient available staff time, and the absence of a specifically designated Code Officer. It is noted that the City Council has not allocated any funds from the General Fund for Hawthorn Lane Stair Rebuild, Park Lane Stair and Seating Area, Lane Maintenance/Minor Repairs and Lane Design & Engineering. (FY 22/23 Budget, p.47). As indicated in the Discussion below, additional funds may be needed for these and other Priorities.

DISCUSSION

Park Lane Stair Rebuild and Seating Area – POSLC Studies, Surveys, and Plans

The wood stairs are to be replaced, a seating area is to be created on a triangle of land, which the City received in exchange for a portion of City right of way on Golden Gate Ave., and view enhancement and landscaping will also be considered. The need to replace the wood stairs was outlined in a report by the late Jan Anderson in 2015. This, as well the need for other actions at a number of lanes, were addressed by additional reports, including a Report by former member Bryan Kemnitzer in December 2021, and a Report by former Chair Jean Bordon in January 2022. The Director of Public Works and Subcommittee Members met with Garry Rasmussen of Blasen Landscape on site. A topographical survey report by Moe Engineering was completed on February 18, 2022. Five different renderings for the project were prepared by Garry Rasmussen and were considered by the Committee at its March 10, 2022 meeting. The Committee recommended that staff obtain further renderings and details on two of the five proposals. *(It is anticipated that design options and cost estimates will be presented and considered at July 14 meeting.)*

The Public Works Director and the Chair of the Committee made requests for additional funds in 2022/2023 budget for this project and these were denied. It is anticipated that additional funds will be needed to complete this project in this fiscal year. (FY 22/23 Budget, Item 9216 Park Lane Stair and Seating Area)

It is noted that no General Fund money is allocated for Park Lane, Hawthorn Lane (Centennial Park), Lane Maintenance/Minor Repairs and Lane Design & Engineering. (FY 22/22 Budget, p.47).

Lower Hawthorn Stairs/Centennial Park – POSCL Studies, Survey, View Restoration, Code Violations

The wood stairs on Lower Hawthorn Lane, sometimes more accurately identified as Middle Hawthorn Lane, are to be replaced. Additional restorative work, including public view recovery and enhancement by trimming or eliminating a 30-foot pittosporum hedge and a dangerous bay tree, amelioration for trees killed and injured by unauthorized private cutting and for the placement of an unauthorized wire fence on the western boundary, as well as landscaping and irrigation will be included in this project. The need to replace these wood stairs was also included in the 2015 Report by Jan Anderson, and the other cited reports. The Director of Public Works and Subcommittee Members met with Garry Rasmussen on site. A topographical survey report by Moe Engineering was completed on June 30, 2021. Department of Public Works staff will be instructed to proceed with steps necessary for trimming and/or removal of the Pittosporum Hedge and the Bay tree. The Planning Department is aware of the unauthorized

fence and unauthorized tree cutting. <u>(Supplement the Draft for occurrences after July 14</u> <u>Meeting.)</u>

The Public Works Director and the Chair of the Committee made requests for additional funds in 2022/2023 budget for this project. In the Budget as approved by the City Council, these increases were not included, and the prior allotment was reduced by \$5000. (Item 9217, Preliminary FY 22/23 Budget, p. 31; FY 22/23 Budget, p. 48) It is anticipated that additional funds will be needed to complete this project in this fiscal year.

Playground – Fundraising, Bench Toddler Area, Donor Recognition

The renovation of the Playground is nearing completion. This project could not have been accomplished without the tireless fundraising efforts of former member Bryan Kemnitzer and the enthusiastic support of young parents, including member Mario Valente and the Playground Taskforce.

The original plans for the renovation of the playground, as approved by the City Council and as distributed by fund raisers, included a bench in the new toddler area. For budgetary reasons, the bench was omitted from the contract as approved. The Committee continued to urge the Public Works Department to find funds. Bryan Kemnitzer has continued to raise funds. If funds become available, the bench may be added back into the project. *(Supplement if funds allocated and/or contract is supplemented.)*

The Mayor has approved a subcommittee of new Chair Jena Watson and member Kathy Pearson to organize donor recognition. Former member Bryan Kemnitzer and citizen volunteer Petey Stein are also assisting in these efforts.

Lanes Initiative – Remains a High Priority, Lost Opportunities for Private/Public Cooperation

The Lanes Initiative remains a high priority of the POSLC. It was listed as "High Priority" in a priority list by former Chair Jean Bordon, dated January 18, 2022. As was requested by the Committee, the Public Works Department was able to have this retained as Budget Item 9201 and as an Item in the Five-Year Plan, even though it was anticipated that no funds would be approved. In January 2022, the City Council approved the transfer of a Lanes Initiative Carryover of \$87,000 to the Critical Infrastructure Plan. In the Budget for 2022/2023, the City Council did not approve any funds in any year of the Five-Year Plan. (FY 22/23 Budget, p. 81) The Lanes Initiative is included in a discussion of additional projects for which funding has not been identified in a Staff Report to City Council, Preliminary Budget, May 9, 2022, pp. 9-10.

While the Committee appreciates that the Lane Initiative is still listed in the Five-Year Plan, the absence of any funding for this item results in loss of opportunities to complete lane infrastructures at the same time as private parties are obtaining approval from the Planning

Department to partially construct stairs on public lanes. One example of a missed opportunity is the still ongoing construction on Lower Woodwardia by the Owners of 270 Beach Road. The approved stair construction on Lower Woodwardia will serve the use of home's residence, but will not reach the public lands below the home. The Committee will continue to urge support for funding for the Lanes Initiative.

Artist View Project – Remains a High Priority, Ongoing Vegetation Management, Code Violations, POSLC Not a Party to Ongoing Discussions

The Artist View Project continues to be a high priority of the POSLC. It was listed as "High Priority" in a priority list by former Chair Jean Bordon, dated January 18, 2022. As was requested by the Committee, the Public Works Department was able to have this retained in the Five-Year Plan and to have the amount of \$150,000 specified for FY26/27. The Committee will continue to urge that the Artist View Project be reinstated as a currently funded project in the Budget.

The Committee continues to monitor the Artist View Site for control of vegetation and dead trees. Public Works has recently completed work on the site.

Unauthorized wire fences have been installed on both boundaries of the Artist View site by the adjacent property owners. The POSLC was not notified when an Application for Retroactive Approval of the eastern fence was submitted to the Planning Department and POSLC was not notified when this was submitted to the Planning Commission. The Planning Commission approved the Request, with directions to the Applicant to submit new plans. New plans have been submitted and these have not been referred to the POSLC for recommendations. Neither wire fence has been abated. There are ongoing negotiations between the City and property owners, which include property line issues along the shoreline. The POSLC has not been asked to make any recommendations as to these negotiations. The POSLC would request at a minimum be provided with an opportunity to comment on any structures proposed on the boundaries of Artist View.

Lane Hand Railing Installation and Repairs and Other Lane Repairs – POSLC Reports, Referred for Cost Analysis

The installation and repair of hand railings and the repair of unstable steps for safety and accessibility is a high priority of the Committee. The report of former Chair Jean Bordon, dated January 18, 2022, included the following priority categories for lanes: HIGH PRIORITY Park Lane, Hawthorn Lane, Upper Cedar Lane, Lower Woodland Lane, Lower Cedar Lane, Upper McLean Lane, Pagoda Lane, and Corinthian Lane. MEDIUM PRIORITY Lower McLean Lane, Transpac Lane, Holly Lane, and Upper Cedar Lane. The Public Works Department has referred certain lanes to Moe Engineering for cost analysis. A number of the Lanes in this list were identified by the Committee as in need of repairs as long ago as Jan Anderson's 2015 report.

Maintenance of Trees in Belvedere's Public Parks – POSLC Reports, Ongoing Maintenance

In 2018, a subcommittee headed by Member Anne-Marie Walker conducted a survey of every tree in Community Park, Centennial Park, Tom Price Park, Land Company Park, and Belvedere Way Park. The survey divided the trees into three categories on the basis of maintenance needs, and it provided detailed instructions for care and maintenance. The survey was updated in August 2020, and it was re-presented to the Committee in January 2022.

The Committee and its members have made periodic updates to the Director of Public Works on outstanding work which has not been completed. It is the Committee's understanding that the failure to complete these needed tasks is due to insufficient staff time and insufficient funds. The Director of Public Works indicated that the tree budget request for 2022/2023 would be increased to \$85,000. Unfortunately, the budget as passed by the City Council does not contain an increase from the prior amount of \$70,000, which has proven insufficient. (FY 22/23 Budget, Item 5350, p.39)

A cover memorandum, dated May 9, 2022, for the Preliminary Budget for 2022/2023 included the following: "Additional projects for which funding has not yet been identified include: "Urban Tree Maintenance Program (to evaluate all public trees and budget for annual maintenance." (Pages, 9-10) No funds were allocated for this project in the Budget for 2022/2023.

It should be anticipated that the funds allocated for trees in public spaces will be insufficient to cover necessary work.

Dead and Dying Trees on Public and Private Land; Task Force on Trees, Vegetation and Views (TVV); Continuing Work

The removal of dead and dying trees on public and private land is a high priority of the POSLC. Dead and dying trees are more than an eyesore. These are a danger to the community. These present a fire hazard. Diseases can spread from one tree to another. These trees cease to provide the benefit of carbon sequestration.

In June of 2020, the POSLC established a Task Force on Trees, Vegetation and Views (TVV). Under the leadership of member Anne-Marie Walker, a survey was conducted by volunteer residents in August/September of 2020. A full review of the TVV findings was made to the POSLC at its January 2021 meeting. The survey found 37 dead/dying trees on public and private land.

The TVV recommended increased funding for removal of dead trees and highly inflammable invasive plants.

The POSLC and its members have continued to apprise the Director of Public Works of dead and dying trees. Dead and dying trees have been removed from public property as the budget allows. The Fire Marshal has been contacted when needed to assist in obtaining removal from private property.

The acting Director of Public Works has indicated that a recommendation will be made to a summer 2022 intern to conduct a new survey of dead and dying trees on both public and private property, and assist with obtaining removal by the City or requesting the resident to remove the dead or dying tree.

As indicated above, it should be anticipated that the funds allocated for trees in public spaces will be insufficient to cover necessary work.

Vegetation Management -Task Force on Trees, Vegetation and Views (TVV), Ongoing Work

The maintenance of the plantings in all of the City's public spaces, and replacement, when necessary, is a high priority of the POSLC. This includes clearing view obstructions from the City's Lanes. The eradication of invasive species is also a high priority for the POSLC. The Survey conducted by the TVV found 88 occurrences of broom, 21 star thistles, 17 fennel areas, 21 papas grass clumps, 38 blackberry areas, and 27 Acacia trees. In response to a request from the Public Works Director, former Chair Jean Bordon provided a list dated January 18,2022, of priorities for removal view blocking vegetation and invasive species from City Lanes.

Public Works has continued to maintain vegetation, restore views on public lanes and remove invasive species as budget allows.

The TVV recommended that Planning require the removal of all invasive species as a requirement for approval of landscaping plans. Further action is required on this recommendation.

At the POSLC January 2022 meeting, the Director of Public indicated that the level of staffing was not sufficient to keep current with all vegetation management needs. Public Works had been further challenged by a staff vacancy. In June 2022, Roy DeMartini was hired to fill the Maintenance Worker vacancy, which should help, but not necessarily alleviate the staffing challenges.

The Budget as passed by City Council allocates \$46,350 for Annual Vegetation Maintenance.

This is significantly less than the FY22 Estimated Actuals of 64,440 and FY23 Recommended Budget of 66,373. (FY 22/23 Budget, Item 5335, p.39) It should be anticipated that additional funding may be necessary to achieve an acceptable level of vegetation management.

Scenic View Obstructions on Private and Public Lands – POSCL View Report, Minimal Progress on Private Property, Ongoing Work on Public Lands

Preserving and enhancing views from Public Streets and Public Lanes and Parks is a high priority of the POSLC. Preserving and enhancing views is also high priority of the General Plan.

The following are some of the many statements in the General Plan on the importance of views from public spaces: VIVISION STATEMENT "Through the implementation of the General Plan, it is the overall guiding vision of Belvedere to 'Preserve the special and unique sense of place while allowing changes that would enhance the community.'" (Vol. 1, p.1)

The General Plan recognizes that Belvedere's special and unique sense of place is largely because "..., the City of Belvedere has a physical setting that is unparalleled. Surrounded by water in nearly every direction." (Vol. 1, p.11) In a survey conducted as part of the General Plan Update, 47% of the respondents agreed that "Preserving residential scenic views" is "Extremely Important" and 36% agreed it is "Very Important"; 51% of the respondents agreed that "preservation of open spaces" is "Extremely Important" and 25% agreed it is "Very Important". (Vol. 1, pp. 33 and 112)

The General Plan Land Use Policies and Actions support preserving views. "Views from public spaces of the Bay, San Francisco, and the mountains are to be retained wherever possible." (Policy LU-1-4, p.46) "The Zoning Ordinance includes provisions for the dedication of a view site or easement." (*Actions* LU-1.4.1, p.46)

"Belvedere's environmental assets include open water surroundings, magnificent marine views from many public and private vantage points, ... Vistas of the Tiburon hills and of the Sausalito waterfront are important parts of Belvedere's environmental context." (Vol.1, p.105) "There are several vantage points in the community where residents and visitors can catch amazing views of Belvedere and the surrounding areas." (Vol.1, p.111) "From the islands, there are sweeping marine views of the surrounding Bay Area". (Vol.1, p.136) On "Belvedere Island ... the typical streetscape features scenic views, generous landscape buffers, and open expanses of naturalistic hillside and garden areas." (Vol. 1., p.136) "The open spaces that do exist in Belvedere are generally highly valued by residents." (Vol.1, p.105)

As related above, In June of 2020, the POSLC established a Task Force on Trees, Vegetation and Views (TVV). Under the leadership of member Anne-Marie Walker, a survey was conducted by volunteer residents in August/September of 2020. A full report of the TVV findings was made to POSLC at its January 2021 meeting.

At the POSLC meeting on May 13, 2021, the Trees, Vegetation and Views Taskforce (TVV) sought to involve POSLC members and Belvedere residents in direct action to restore views. In

June 2021, POSLC members Kathy Pearson and Jean Bordon, and citizen volunteer Sandy Donnell revisited sites which had been identified in the 2020 survey as having obstructed views. On June 16, 2021, Kathy Pearson and Jean Bordon met with Irene Borba, Director of Planning, and Robert Zadnik, Director of Public Works, to discuss view obstructions. Irene Borba requested a report with photographs and measurements of view obstructing vegetation. In August 2021, a report by Kathy Pearson and Jean Bordon on Scenic View Obstructions was submitted to Irene Borba and Robert Zadnik.

Public Works has been continually working on eliminating view obstructions on public lanes. Public Works is also proceeding with the necessary steps to eliminate the significant view obstructions in Centennial Park, which are posed by a 30-foot pittosporum hedge and a dangerous Bay tree, growing in the Park.

Progress on reducing or eliminating view obstructions on private property has been slow due to lack of resources and a possible misreading of Belvedere Codes.

Views from Centennial Park are also blocked by redwood trees growing on private property. The Public Works Director has referred this to the City Attorney, but the matter is on hold pending a determination on hiring a Code Enforcement Officer.

The Planning Department did verify that there are six lots on Westshore which are subject to view easements, as prescribed by the subdivision approval. At the present, there is only one lot which can be said to be in compliance, and that is 37 Westshore Road, where there is a low fence, which is approximately 3.5 feet high. There is another lot where there is at least some compliance, and that is 81 Westshore Road, where construction has now been completed and a narrow view easement currently exists. At the remaining view easements, vegetation continues to grow, and other obstructions remain.

On Belvedere Island, the Code requirement that hedges fronting the road be maintained at 6 feet is only enforced at one residence. This is at the request of a citizen.

The lack of enforcement appears to be largely due to a lack of resources in the Planning Department and the absence of a specifically dedicated Code Enforcement Officer for the City. The default Code Officer appears to be the City Manager, who has a myriad of other duties. Remedying this situation by establishing a dedicated Code Enforcement Officer is another High Priority of the POSCL.

There also appears to be a belief by some officials that the 6-foot limit does not apply to hedges which were growing at the time the Code sections were adopted. The most directly applicable Code sections are: 8.28.020(C), 8.28.090 (A), and 19.48.190. These do not contain an express direction that that the 6-foot limit does not apply to hedges which were growing at the time the Sections were adopted. The POSCL would suggest that an opinion of the City Attorney be obtained on this matter.

Control of Private Projects on Public Lands – New Charters for POSLC and Planning Commission Will Facilitate Future Collaboration The mission of the POSLC is "... to protect Belvedere's Parks, Open Spaces and Lanes and to develop Belvedere's Parks, Open Spaces, and Lanes in a manner consistent with Belvedere's General Plan and the best interests of the citizens of Belvedere." (APM section 6.2.1) It is a Policy of the General Plan to "Continue to control private use of public property." (General Plan, Policy REC 2.5) It is also a Policy of the General Plan that "The City shall not sell or release its interest in any lane." (General Plan, Policy REC-1.1)

The POSCL ability to fulfill this High Priority obligation had been severely hampered by the absence of any procedure by which the POSCL would be informed of an Application for a private project on or adjacent to public lands. The POSCL would often not learn of such projects until after approval had been recommended by staff and/or granted by the Planning Commission.

For example, it only came to the attention of then Chair Jean Bordon that an Application for a Retroactive Approval of an unauthorized wire fence on the boundary of Artist View was to be heard by the Planning Commission when by chance she saw the Agenda on the City Website right before the hearing.

This has now been remedied by the adoption by the City Council of new procedures in the new Charters for the POSLC and the Planning Commission. (APM Sections 6.2 and 6.3) Under these new procedures, staff shall notify the Chair of POSLC of any Application affecting Public Lands not less than two weeks prior to the time of the Planning Commission hearing. Other procedures provide for a conference with the Chair of the Planning Commission and an opportunity for the Chair of the POSLC to submit recommendations to the full Planning Commission.

Code Enforcement – Violations regarding Public Lands, and Violations regarding Public Views Over Private Lands Unresolved, Code Enforcement Officer Recommended.

There have been a number of Code Violations affecting public lands and views from public lands. Trees in Centennial Park were cut by the gardeners of a neighboring property on the south side, and this caused a mature Japanese Maple to die and severely impaired the appearance of a Holly Tree. An unauthorized wire fence was placed on the border of Centennial Park by the neighbor on the north. Unauthorized wire fences were placed on both sides of Artist View by the adjoining neighbors. As discussed above, some negotiations are ongoing regarding the fences at Artis View and Planning Department is aware of the violations at Centennial Park. Most view easements on Westshore Road are not enforced. The code hedge height requirement on Belvedere Island is only enforced at one residence. City staff is aware of all these violations.

POSLC has had discussions with Public Works regarding hiring a half-time or full-time Code Enforcement Officer. Public Works has been receptive to this idea. POSLC recommends hiring a Code Enforcement Officer.
