The City is conducting an important survey of Belvedere voters regarding issues that affect the quality of life in our community, including funding fire protection and emergency medical services. To ensure the anonymity and reliability of the survey results, the City has contracted with True North Research – an independent survey research firm – to conduct the survey, manage

the interviews, and summarize the results. Your responses to the survey will be completely confidential and at no time will the City see individual survey responses. If you receive an invitation to take the survey via mail, text message, email, or telephone, please take the time to complete the survey so that we have the broadest representation of community opinion possible.



### City Council Requests Improvements to Mills Act Program & Tree Ordinance

At its July 10 meeting, the City Council decided to pause Belvedere's Mills Act Program, which is intended to provide property tax relief to homeowners who actively restore and maintain

their historic properties in accordance with specified restoration standards. Among other shortcomings, our current program does not include a review of plans or proof of satisfactory restoration. The Council asked staff to develop a more precise program, including a review of homes currently in the program, and bring it back for Council consideration. And on appeal, the Council affirmed a Planning Commission decision denying a request to remove a grove of eucalyptus trees near Five Corners. The Council noted that Belvedere's tree ordinance could be improved to clarify criteria and procedures for the removal of hazardous trees. A subcommittee will be formed to recommend specific changes to the Municipal Code and appropriate policies to address this issue.



# **Housing Element Update**

The Housing Element is one of nine elements in the Belvedere General Plan. Our General Plan provides a vision for the City with a framework for how Belvedere will meet its goals for housing and the other elements, such as noise, environmental impacts and transportation. To comply with the

State's requirement for cities to revise their housing elements every eight years, Belvedere submitted the 6<sup>th</sup> Housing Element Update to the Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) in January 2023.

In its May 1 response, HCD noted that in order for our Housing Element to become fully certified, we need to expand on some sections and revise others. Although disappointing, we have begun to address each item with the help of Dyett & Bhatia, a leading California planning firm with proven results in attaining compliance by HCD. Before we resubmit Belvedere's Housing Element to HCD, we will hold public meetings to discuss proposed changes and to share the revised document with our residents. Stay tuned.



### Update on Improving Communications Between Belvedere & Residents

A key priority the City Council set for 2023 is improving communications between the City and our residents. A task force was formed in April to do this work. Since then, this team has surveyed residents, conducted focus

groups and met with City staff to better understand where improvements are needed. All agreed that the Belvedere website and newsletter should be central to any new communications approach.

We are pleased to report that new and improved versions the website and newsletter are well underway - along with some exciting work to refresh Belvedere's overall communications. After some testing and finessing over the summer, we plan to go live in September.



# **Summer Coyote Strategies**

Coyote sightings and encounters may increase during the summer. Here are some tips for how to haze a coyote you may encounter. And please report all sightings and encounters using our <u>online</u> <u>reporting form</u>.

- When driving stop and haze. Don't expect a coyote to respond to honking or flashing lights. If safe, pull over and get out of your car. Look big, make noise, and wave your arms.
- Walking without a dog haze. Stand tall and make yourself look bigger by waving your arms, a stick or article of clothing, or by snapping open a large garbage bag. Maintain eye contact and advance toward the coyote until it retreats. If it stops, keep advancing, if you feel safe. If necessary, throw a projectile in its direction.
- Walking with a dog make a safe retreat. Be sure to have your dog on a leash no longer than 6 feet. If you encounter a coyote, keep your dog close and use your voice or a prop (scare stick, shaker-can) to create distance between you and the coyote(s) as you move out of the area. Don't run.
