SUMMARY STATEMENT AND DISCUSSION:

The City Manger wishes to receive authorization from the Council to purchase a used Vacuum Truck for water uses. The original purchase discussion took place last year during a rain event in which the City had to rent a vacuum truck for close to \$10,000 a day. These items are expensive when new and when rented. The City asked its vendors to share leads on used trucks that may be available for purchase. Owen Equipment found a 2008 truck for \$209,760 (including taxes) with 50,000 miles. New Vacuum Trucks cost close to .6M. The City secured \$100,000 from King County.

The truck will be used for cleaning storm basins, exploring areas to protect utilities, raising meter boxes, digging down to utilities, exploratory potholing, hydro excavation activities, and general storm water and water maintenance.

This purchase is 10 years delayed; the City's infrastructure has been neglected in part due to the lack of proper equipment.

RECOMMENDED ACTION: I move to direct the City Manager to purchase a used Vac Truck from Owen Equipment with a minimum of one year warranty and to include in the regular council agenda an item for CIP purchases of over \$40,000.

NOW, THEREFORE, be it resolved by the City Council of the City of Carnation as follows: SECTION

- 1. Carnation Municipal Code 15.40.110 RMHP Zone Uses is amended as indicated in Exhibit A so that only mobile home may only be occupied as a single family residence in the RHMP Zone, and that the Lessees and Primary Occupants of a mobile home in this zone must be age fifty-five or older.
- 2. If any section or part of this Ordinance is declared unlawful, the remainder of this Ordinance shall remain in full force and effect.

This ordinance shall be in force and effect from and after its passage and five (5) days following its publication by summary or posting as provided by law.

SUMMARY STATEMENT AND DISCUSSION:

The City Manager wishes to amend the number of payroll periods. In 2022, the City Manager asked the Council to authorize 26 pay periods. The Council authorized this change. In 2023, after much negotiation with DRS, the City Manager must ask the Council to authorize 12 pay periods. Staff found that DRS reporting and payments were overly complicated when using the 26 pay period model.

The second personnel policy change is to allow members of the management team to carry or bank up 120 vacation hours from year to year. Currently, the policy in the manual reflects an organization with a majority of hourly employees. With a new management team structure, salaried employees receive executive leave (2 weeks) and have fewer opportunities to take vacation due to workload.

RECOMMENDED ACTION: I move to amend the personnel manual to reflect 12 payroll periods and to allow up to 120 vacation hours to be banked each year by members of the management team.
