



The City of Carnation receives 8 cents for every 1 dollar of property taxes.

Property Taxes

This can be either commercial or residential. (A typical small city sees this at 25%)


Sales Taxes

-Economic development (attract more businesses).

- -Marketing (attract more customers)
- -Housing (import more customers) -Education (buy local or buy online)

Building Permits and Misc

-Building Permit revenue will decline as Carnation gets built out -Building permit revenues can only be used for building services.

02 The Letter.

"Growth management demands effective and honest partnerships with the State, King County, and the Puget Sound Regional Council (PSRC)."
