A draft copy 38 of the minutes had been provided to the members in their packets. This agenda item 39 was tabled until the next regular Planning Commission meeting. 40 41 Approval of the Agenda 42 43 A draft agenda had been provided to the members in their packets. Hathcock moved, 44 supported by Cripps to approve the agenda as modified. 45 The motion passed unanimously. 46

## **Public Hearing - Medical Marihuana Text Amendments**

The next item on the agenda was a public hearing regarding the medical marihuana text amendments. Chairman Nagler opened the public hearing. Hudson presented the final draft text to the members. Hudson directed the members' attention to page 2. Attorney Seeber described the state and township application process. Attorney Seeber recommended removing "At the time of the application" language from Article 8, General Regulations 1b. Attorney Seeber also recommended removing paragraph "c" from the General Regulations provisions. The members agreed. Hudson turned the members' attention to page 3, paragraph "h" regarding review standards for the Planning Commission. Attorney Seeber said that this is typical language that should be included in the ordinance. Attorney Seeber said that the Planning Commission has the authority to adopt rules for special uses regarding the health, safety and general welfare of the Township. Attorney Seeber noted that the Kalamazoo Township Fire Marshal approved the highlighted provision on page 3, paragraph "d." The Planning Commission member approved these as well.

Hudson said that page 5 paragraph "iii" discusses the measurement of buffers. He provided a diagram illustrating the same. Chairman Nagler said that the buffer shall be measured from any use, not only a protected use. Hudson asked who should pay for an expert to measure the impact of odors. Attorney Seeber said that the applicant will pay and noted that funds could come out of the applicant's escrow. Hudson recommended adding "at the applicant's expense" to the draft text. The members agreed. Mitchell asked if waste management was addressed in the State's emergency administrative rules. Attorney Seeber said that the applicant should establish a waste management plan which, at a minimum, is compliant with the State's administrative rules. Seeber said that waste management plan documentation should be required and therefore the phrase would be repeated for all medical marihuana facilities approved within Kalamazoo Charter Township. The members agreed.

 A security provision for all approved facilities was added to the proposed draft ordinance. Chairman Nagler noted the recommended definitions to be included in Article 1.00, Section 1.03 are contained on page 15. On page 13, Attorney Seeber recommended deleting the word "non-conformity" and changing it to "facility." The members agreed. Attorney Seeber indicated that modifications had been made to the caretaker provisions which met with the Fire Marshal's approval. Cripps was also satisfied with these changes.

## **Public Comment**

Tom Sutton addressed the Planning Commission and asked if any environmental impact studies are required.

 Chairman Nagler said that required environmental studies are not part of the ordinance. Sutton asked if any study was done to determine the impact on the public, such as increased crime or health considerations. Mitchell said that a California white paper study was reviewed. Mitchell said that the Township's current and former police chief had provided input. Attorney Seeber said that the State law allows medical marihuana facilities and the Township is not giving an applicant any additional rights. Hathcock said that 33 other States adopted medical marihuana. Cripps said that the ordinance has a provision that will declare the ordinance null and void if municipal medical marihuana facilities are prohibited by Federal law in the future. Chairman Nagler said that the Township Board made the legislative decision to allow medical marihuana facilities and that the Planning Commission determines where it will be allowed within the Township.

Sherine Miller asked how many trails would be affected by the proposed ordinance. Mitchell said that trials are excluded from the decision of parks.

Todd Martin asked if the Kal-Haven Trial and River Valley Trial are parks. Mitchell said that there will not be medical marihuana facilities near a park and there is a 500 foot buffer.

Russ Northrup asked if there is a new zoning map available to review.

Being that there was no other public comment, Chairman Nagler closed the public hearing and the Commission members entered discussion. Cripps inquired about the possible environmental impact the medical marihuana facilities may have. Attorney Seeber said that the administrative rules do not have any requirements regarding an environmental study. Hartsough asked if any studies are required. Attorney Seeber said issues requiring some type of study typically come up after the property is sold. Cripps mentioned this is the case with mines and gravel and waste management. Chairman Nagler said that there probably is not a lot of impact on the properties and might improve the brownfield properties. Chapman inquired about the fencing and building requirements. Cripps said that the Industrial district zoning classification and the administrative rules have certain requirements. Mitchell said that an outdoor grow operation needs to be secured. Hathcock said that he likes the way the proposed ordinance is presented.

<u>Hathcock</u> moved, <u>support</u> by Hartsough, to recommend approval to of the proposed draft text for the medical marihuana facilities ordinance, with amendments to the Township Board. The motion passed <u>unanimously</u>.

**Old Business** None. **New Business** None. **Open Discussion Members of the Audience** None. Correspondence received None. Report of Township Board Representative Hathcock thanked the members of the Planning Commission for its hard work. Report of the ZBA Member Chairman Nagler reported that there was no ZBA meeting the prior month. **Comments from Planning Commission Members** Chapman asked about the status of obtaining photograph identifications for the Commission members. Chairman Nagler said that identification badges are available. Chairman Nagler thanked the members for their hard work. Hartsough thanked Mitchell. Hudson and Attorney Seeber for their hard work. Mitchell said that he hoped to get the final draft of the amended marihuana facilities ordinance to the Township Board by noon on February 9, 2018. Mitchell said that the first reading will occur on Monday, February, 12, 2018 and there will be a special meeting on February 20, 2018. Hudson said that he would type up the amendments made to the proposed draft ordinance tonight.
