SUBJECT: Motion to Reconfirm Findings and Determinations Under Resolution No.

2021-33 and Assembly Bill 361 for the Continuation of Virtual Meetings

#### RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the City Council make the following motion:

MOTION TO RECONFIRM THE FINDINGS AND DETERMINATIONS MADE IN RESOLUTION NO. 2021-33 AND UNDER ASSEMBLY BILL 361 FOR THE CONTINUATION OF VIRTUAL MEETINGS, WITH ACKNOWLEDGMENT THAT THE CALIFORNIA DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH HAS UPDATED THE DEFINITION OF "CLOSE CONTACT" IN REGULATION 3205 FROM BEING WITHIN 6 FEET OF ANOTHER PERSON TO SHARING THE SAME INDOOR SPACE WITH ANOTHER PERSON FOR 15 MINUTES OR MORE, WHICH FURTHER SUPPORTS THE FINDINGS.

#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

On March 17, 2020, in the face of the COVID-19 pandemic, Governor Gavin Newsom issued Executive Order N-29-20 suspending certain provisions of the Ralph M. Brown Act in order to allow for local legislative bodies to conduct their meetings completely telephonically or by other electronic means.

The provisions in the Brown Act that were suspended by the Governor's Executive Order are contained at Government Code Section 54953(b)(3) and require that when teleconferencing is used, outside of a statewide emergency, that the following occur:

- An agenda is required to be posted at all locations, including any teleconference locations
- Each teleconference location must be identified on the actual agenda
- Each teleconference location shall be accessible to the public

A quorum of the legislative body must be in the jurisdiction

With the Governor's Executive Order, the four above requirements were suspended allowing councilmembers to not have to post an agenda at their teleconference location, not have to identify their location on the meeting agenda, not have to ensure public accessibility at the teleconference location, and the legislative body did not need a quorum in the jurisdiction. As the City Council is well aware, this allowed City Council meetings to be conducted by Zoom with councilmembers, staff, and the public, all joining from remote virtual locations.

The suspension of certain provisions of the Brown Act was further extended by the Governor on June 11, 2021 by the issuance of Executive Order N-08-21 which continued to allow for complete virtual meetings until September 30, 2021.

With the expiration of the Governor's Executive Order along with the uncertainty that surrounded the Governor's potential recall, the State Legislature also took the remote meeting issue into its own hands through the adoption of Assembly Bill 361, which is explained more in depth in the Analysis section below.

On October 13, 2021 the City Council adopted Resolution No.2021-33 making findings under AB 361 that state or local officials continue to recommend social distancing measures to prevent the spread of COVID-19 and including reference in particular to Cal-OSHA regulation 3205, which recommends physical distancing in the workplace. By motion and majority vote, the City Council may renew the findings of Resolution No. 2021-33 to continue to hold virtual meetings pursuant to AB 361.

#### **ANALYSIS**

On September 16, 2021, the Governor signed AB 361, which allows legislative bodies to meet virtually provided there is a state of emergency declared by the Governor, and either:

- (1) state or local officials have imposed or recommended measures to promote social distancing; or
- (2) the legislative body determines by majority vote that meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health and safety of attendees.

The Governor by executive order signed on September 20, 2021, suspended the effective date of AB 361 to October 1, 2021. As a result, if the City desires to have virtual meetings on or after October 1, 2021, it must do so consistent with the requirements of AB 361.

AB 361 preserves many of the provisions of the earlier executive orders, including the suspension of the four teleconferencing requirements noted above, while also adding new requirements to the management of remote and teleconference public meetings in order to better achieve the levels of transparency that the Brown Act demands. Specifically, AB 361 imposes two new rules on remote public meetings:

1. Local governments and agencies hosting teleconference meetings in lieu of traditional inperson public meetings must permit direct public comment during the teleconference, and must leave open the opportunity for public comment until the comment period for a given item is closed during the ordinary course of the meeting. The opportunity to make public comment must be of a sufficient duration so as to allow actual public participation.

2. Any action by the governing body during a public teleconference meeting must occur while the agency is actively and successfully broadcasting to members of the public through a call-in option or an internet-based service option. If a technical disruption within the agency's control prevents members of the public from either viewing the meeting of the public agency, or prevents members of the public from offering public comment, the agency must cease all action on the meeting agenda until the disruption ends and the broadcast is restored. Action taken during an agency-caused disruption may be challenged as a violation of the Brown Act.

In order to continue to qualify for AB 361's waiver of in-person meeting requirements, the City Council must, within thirty (30) days of its first meeting under AB 361, and every thirty (30) days thereafter, make findings that (a) state or local officials continue to recommend measures to promote social distancing, or that (b) an in-person meeting would constitute an imminent risk to the safety of attendees.

The above conditions continue to exist at this time, and staff recommends the City Council by motion reconfirm the findings and determinations made in Resolution No. 2021-33 so that the City Council may continue to meet virtually under AB 361.

Lastly, it is important to note that AB 361 is optional. If the City Council wishes, it may meet in person. In addition, hybrid meetings are permissible where Council attends in person and the public attends remotely via Zoom.

### FISCAL IMPACT

The City Council's motion to continue with virtual meetings will maintain the status quo and no financial impact is anticipated.

### **ENVIRONMENTAL ISSUES**

The City Council's approval of a motion to reconfirm findings does not constitute a project under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) Guideline 15378(b)(5) as it constitutes an organizational or administrative activity of the government that will not result in direct or indirect physical changes in the environment. Further, virtual meetings are likely to reduce certain impacts associated with vehicular travel related to in-person public meetings.

#### RECOMMENDATION

Move to reconfirm the findings and determinations made in Resolution No. 2021-33 and under Assembly Bill 361 for the continuation of virtual meetings.

#### RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the City Council adopt:

MOTION TO ACCEPT INFORMATIONAL REPORT ON RECREATION DEPARTMENT PROGRAMS, ACTIVITIES, EVENTS, AND TRIPS FOR THE SECOND QUARTER OF 2021.

#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

In the second quarter of 2022, a total of 1,102 participants attended 49 programs. This represents a decrease of 121 participants from the second quarter of 2021. Staff attributes the decrease in participation to the continuing concerns over Covid 19 and in person interaction, and a reduction in food pantry deliveries due to reduced food provider services.

Staff estimates that 33 percent of the population had a current Colma I.D. during the second quarter of 2022.

There was a total of 37 rentals, which is an increase of 34 rental from the second quarter of 2021.

Due to COVID-19 pandemic and increase in cases, staff continues to modify all regular programing to align with health recommendations and guidelines. Staff was able to provide the community with an in-person Eggstravaganza event. Also, to enhance socialization for adults and older adults, staff safely held in-person Armchair Travel and Let's Get Crafty programs. In addition, staff hosted hybrid (in person and pick up) Senior Luncheons, to enhance socialization and provide meals to the Colma community.

As we move into fall, staff plans to offer more in-person programming depending on the state of the pandemic and case rate in San Mateo County.

#### **BACKGROUND**

### **Participation**

The Recreation Services Department offered programs, activities, events, and trips for all age groups during the past quarter. Below is a summary of participation levels by demographic:

- A total of 110 adults and seniors participated in enrichment programs. This represents an increase of 5 participants from the second quarter of 2021. Staff attributes the increase in participation to due to the modifications of in person adult and senior programs and to the increased interest in fitness programs such a Zumba, Chair yoga and Boot Camp Fitness.
- A total of 114 adults and seniors participated in trips and events. This represents a
  decrease of 35 participants from the second quarter of 2021. Staff attributes the
  decrease in participation due the cancellation of Wine and Canvas and the inability to
  offer in person trips and outings due to Covid 19.
- A total of 388 youth and teens participated in Enrichment Programs. This represents an increase of 7 participants from the second quarter of 2021. Staff attributes the increase due to the participation of in-person Summer Camp and the Summer Food Program.
- A total of 132 youths and teens participated in events and trips. This represents an
  increase of 100 participants from the second quarter of 2021. Staff attributes the
  increase due to the return of the in-person Eggstravaganza event for the community.
- A total of 254 youth, adults and seniors participated in Community Programs. This
  represents a decrease of 198 participants from the second quarter of 2021. Staff
  attributes the decrease due to the reduced frequency of the Food Pantry Delivery
  program, and break in food deliveries (no deliveries) for the month of May and June.

The attachment contains a detailed breakdown of participation by program.

The Colma Community Center was rented for 26 different events:

- Resident Rental (13 social, 1 fundraiser)
- Non-Resident Rental (3 social, 3 funeral)
- Non-Resident Non-profit (2 fundraisers, 1 social)
- In House Reservations (1 event, 2 blood drives)

The Sterling Park Recreation Center was rented for 11 different events:

• Sterling Park Resident Rental Reservations (11 social events)

### **RECOMMENDATION**

Staff recommends that the City Council make the following motion:

MOTION TO OPT-OUT AND AUTHORIZE THE CITY MANAGER TO EXECUTE AN OPT-OUT LETTER IN THE PENDING CLASS ACTION CASE OF *CITY OF LONG BEACH, ET AL. v. MONSANTO COMPANY, ET AL.*, UNITED STATES DISTRICT COURT, CENTRAL DISTRICT OF CALIFORNIA, CASE NO.: 2:16-CV-03493-FMO-AS

### **BACKGROUND AND ANALYSIS**

Plaintiffs City of Long Beach, Mayor and City Council of Baltimore, City of Berkeley, City of Chula Vista, County of Los Angeles, City of Oakland, City of Portland, Port of Portland, City of San Diego, City of San Jose, and City of Spokane filed lawsuits against Defendant, Monsanto Company, in district courts in their respective jurisdictions. In their complaints, Plaintiffs asserted that Defendant manufactured a class of industrial chemicals called polychlorinated biphenyls ("PCBs") between the 1930s and 1977 and stated various causes of action against Defendant for alleged PCB-related impairments to the environment, including to water bodies. Plaintiffs alleged that PCBs are present at sites and public properties, including in stormwater, stormwater and wastewater systems, water bodies, sediment, natural resources, fish and wildlife. Plaintiffs sought compensatory damages and injunctive and equitable relief.

On March 14, 2022, the Court entered an order certifying the class action, and specifically certifying a Nationwide Class defined to include the Town of Colma. The claims certified for class-action treatment include claims that Defendant's PCBs and PCB-containing products were defectively designed, that the risks of environmental harm associated with PCBs and PCB-containing products outweighed the benefits of their uses, that Defendant failed to warn of the risks of harm associated with PCBs and PCB-containing products, and that Plaintiffs and the Settlement Class Members suffered property damage as a result of PCB contamination.

On May 11, 2022, the City Council authorized the initiation of litigation against Monsanto opting to sue independently from any pending class action. In authorizing litigation, the City Council opted to join the County of San Mateo and other cities in the County in independently suing

Monsanto for PCB contamination. Because the City Council has opted to file an independent lawsuit, it will now need to opt out of the pending class action lawsuit. All cities that are a part of the class received notice by certified mail in late May or early June of 2022 indicating that cities could opt out or take a lump sum payment under the pending class action by doing nothing. Under the class action, the Town of Hillsborough would receive roughly \$100,008.

#### FISCAL IMPACT

The City Council's decision to opt out is not anticipated to cause any financial impact on the Town as the legal services arrangement will be on a contingency fee basis as detailed in the March 9, 2022 City Council agenda item approving the legal services agreement.

#### **ENVIRONMENTAL**

The City Council's action to opt out is not a project subject to the California Environmental Quality Act as it can be seen with certainty that the action will not have a significant effect on the environment pursuant to CEQA Guideline 15061(b)(3).

#### CONCLUSION

Staff recommends that the City Council by motion, opt out and authorize the City Manager to execute an opt out letter in the pending class action case of *City of Long Beach, et al. v. Monsanto Company, et al.* United States District Court, Central District of California - Western Division, Case No.: 2:16-cv-03493-FMO-AS

#### RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the City Council adopt the following:

RESOLUTION OVERRULING PROTESTS TO AND ADOPTING ENGINEER'S REPORT ON SEWER SERVICE CHARGES FOR FISCAL YEAR 2022-23, DIRECTING THE CITY ENGINEER TO FILE A COPY OF THE ENGINEER'S REPORT WITH THE SAN MATEO COUNTY TAX COLLECTOR, AND AUTHORIZING THE COUNTY TAX COLLECTOR TO PLACE THE CHARGES ON THE PROPERTY TAX ROLL

#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

In order to place the sewer service charges charged by the Town of Colma on the property tax roll for collection by the San Mateo County tax collector, the City Engineer must prepare a written report (the "Engineer's Report") describing each parcel of real property receiving such sewer services, and the amount of the charge for each parcel for the subject year. This public hearing is to consider any protests to the Engineer's Report for FY 2022-23. For protests to be considered, protests must be submitted prior to the close of the public hearing on July 13, 2022. Protests apply only to the parcel for which the protest is made, and the City Council must consider each protest individually and decide whether to sustain or overrule the protest as to each protested parcel. The tabulation of inquiries and protests to the sewer charges, and the recommended action are attached as Exhibit C to the Staff Report. If a majority of the owners of separate parcels subject to the sewer service charges files a protest against the Engineer's Report, the Town may not place the sewer service charges on the County tax roll and must instead collect such charges by billing customers directly. So long as no majority protest exists, the City Council may overrule any or all protests.

At the conclusion of the public hearing, if there is no majority protest, the City Council should adopt a Resolution to either: adopt the Engineer's Report as proposed, or as modified to address individual protests, and authorize the County Controller to place the charges on the property tax roll. The City Attorney can assist the City Council in adopting the resolution with or without modifications. The City Engineer is then directed to file the Engineer's Report, along with the Resolution and submit it to the County Assessor's Office who will then collect the approved sewer service charges through the property tax rolls.

#### FISCAL IMPACT

The Town will be paying out to the City of South San Francisco ("SSF") and the North San Mateo County Sanitation District ("NSMCSD" or "District") a total of \$886,592.90. After calculating the water incentive program and sewer charges for Town owned properties, the Town will be reimbursed through the County Tax Rolls \$898,045.54, leaving a net cost of \$51,878.34 to the Town for Town-wide annual sanitary sewer charges.

#### BACKGROUND

The Town of Colma contracts with the SSF District to provide sanitary sewer services to all properties in the Town. The Town assesses sewer service charges against properties within the Town at the same rate that SSF or the District charges the Town for those properties.

The Town levies an annual sewer service charge on each property that utilizes or has access to these sewer systems. Pursuant to section 5473 of the Health and Safety Code of the State of California, the Town has elected to collect the annual sewer service charges through the County of San Mateo Property Tax Rolls. Therefore, in accordance with the Health and Safety Code, the City Engineer has prepared a report describing each parcel that receives sewer service and the amount of the service charge that will be assessed against each parcel for Fiscal Year 2022-23 (the "Engineer's Report" or "Report").

As required, the Engineer's Report has been on file with the office of the City Clerk for public review and comment for at least fifteen days prior to the Public Hearing on July 13, 2021. In addition, the required notice of public hearing and the proposed sewer charges was published in the local newspaper on June 28, 2022, and July 5, 2022; a courtesy copy of the notice with individual sewer charge was mailed to all affected property owners, residents, and business owners on June 23, 2022; and a copy of the notice was posted on the three official Town bulletin boards for at least 15 days prior to the Public Hearing.

One hundred cubic feet (hcf) equals approximately 748 gallons.

### **Wastewater Collection System Charge**

The proposed wastewater collection system charge is a new component of the Town's overall wastewater charge that would be levied in addition to the charges for wastewater treatment that are currently passed through to Colma's customers based on charges levied by the City of South San Francisco or NSMCSD.

The proposed wastewater collection system charge is a usage-based charge of \$3.22 per hundred cubic feet of water consumption and would become effective starting July 1, 2022. For residential customers, the billed amount of the proposed wastewater collection system charges will be calculated based on the volume of metered water use during the winter months of January and February, typically a period of minimal outdoor irrigation, multiplied by 6. For nonresidential customers, the wastewater collection system charge will be calculated based on total annual metered water consumption. Charges for all customers would be subject to a minimum annual charge of \$38.64 that only applies when billed usage results in a lower annual

charge. The minimum annual charge helps recover a portion of the Town's fixed costs of providing service. In future years, the wastewater collection system charge would be subject to annual inflationary adjustments as described in this notice.

At the May 25<sup>th</sup> City Council Meeting, City Council approved a 4-Year Phase in program to assist residents and business to adjust to the new sanitary sewer collection charges.

- The 1<sup>st</sup> year of the program property owners will be charged 25% of the annual collection charge and the Town will subsidize the remaining 75% of the annual charge.
- The 2<sup>nd</sup> year, the property owners will be charged 50% of the annual collection charge and the Town will subsidize the remaining 50% of the annual Charge.
- The 3<sup>rd</sup> year the property owner will be charged 75% of the annual sewer charge and the Town will subsidize the remaining 25% of the annual charge.
- The 4<sup>th</sup> year the property owner will be responsible for the full collection charge.

We are currently in the 1<sup>st</sup> year of the Phase in Program.

## **Water Conservation Incentive Program**

In July 2012, City Council approved a Water Conservation Incentive Program for all sewer service customers in Town. The proposed Program would grant each sewer service user a subsidy if the customer used the same amount of water or less compared to the average of the prior three years.

On May 25, 2022, the City Council approved \$56,145.58 for Water Conservation Incentive Program for FY 2022-23. After further review of the Water Conservation Incentive Program subsidy there was a error in the calculation The authorized subsidy of \$56,145.58 that was approved at the May 25<sup>th</sup> City Council Meeting needs to be reduced to \$36,086.38.

The \$36,086.38 is representative of the total amount that will be shared for those who qualified (Eligible Customers) in the Water Conservation Incentive Program. For Eligible Customers who qualified for the Water Conservation Incentive Program, their annual sewer charge will be reduced by 10%.

# **Hearing on Engineer's Report to Consider Individual Protests**

The purpose of the hearing on the Engineer's Report is to hear individual protests to the Engineer's Report for each parcel of property within the Town of Colma subject to the sewer service charge. For example, a property owner might protest the classification for the owner's property, or another owner might claim that an error was made in the calculation of the owner's annual sanitary sewer charge. However, protests cannot serve as a protest of the sewer rates, due to the fact that the time for lodging those protests of the sewer rates was at the June 22, 2022 Proposition 218 hearing. Each affected property owner has the right to file a written protest to the Engineer's Report any time prior to the conclusion of the public hearing on the Report on July 13, 2022. If the Council decides a protest(s) is valid, the Council should sustain the protest, and direct the City Engineer to amend the Engineer's Report or remove the charge

in accordance with the Council's direction. If the Council decides that a protest is invalid, it should overrule the protest, and direct the City Engineer to file the Engineer's Report without change.

If there are any protests to the Engineer's Report submitted after the Council receives this Staff Report, the City Engineer will prepare a supplemental staff report detailing those protests. Written protests can be submitted until the close of the public hearing. If a protest is filed at the public hearing, staff will advise the Council at the meeting of their recommendation and, amend the Engineer's Report as directed by the City Council before submitting it to the County. If the attached Resolution needs to be amended to address any protests submitted at the hearing, the City Attorney will help guide the Council through that process.

If a majority of property owners submit a protest, then the Town cannot place the charges on the tax roll but must collect the charges through an invoice-and-payment process.

To date the City Engineer's Office has received no inquiries or protests. Staff will submit to City Council a copy of the Inquiry and Protest Log along with a copy of the written protest, (Exhibit C), prior to the opening of the Public Hearing for adopting the Engineer's Report on sewer service charges for FY 2022-23.

# **Assessment on County Tax Rolls**

On or before July 31, 2022, the City Engineer will send the approved or amended Engineer's Report to the County along with a Resolution requesting that the County Controller enter the amounts of the charges shown on the Report as assessments against the respective parcels on the roll for FY 2022-23.

#### **Values**

Before assessing a charge on the county tax rolls against any particular property in the Town of Colma, the City Council will have held a public hearing allowing the public to protest to the City Council the calculation of their annual sanitary sewer charge. Through this process, the City Council is being **fair** by allowing for a protest process where the Council can review and rule on each protest.

## **Sustainability Impact**

The Annual Sanitary Sewer Service Engineer's Report provides detail on the results of the Water Conservation Incentive Program. By reviewing the results of the program, City Council can make intelligent decisions regarding future funding and incentive programs to reduce domestic water usage and ensure continued sustainability.

### **Alternatives**

As to each protest against the proposed sewer service charge, the City Council can either sustain or overrule the protest for that parcel. If the City Council sustains the protest, it can modify or remove the proposed charge for that parcel. The Town may also choose to collect the sewer service charges separately from the tax roll. This option will result in increased costs for technology and staff dedicated to billing, as well as a higher risk of errors. Additionally, this

option will not allow the Town to place the sewer service charges as a lien against the subject property.

# CONCLUSION

Staff recommends the City Council adopt the attached Resolution to sustain or overrule protests to the Engineer's Report for FY 2022-23 and to adopt the Engineer's Report, to direct the City Engineer to file a copy of the Report with the County Tax Collector for collection on the San Mateo County tax rolls, and to authorize the County Tax Collector to place the charges on the property tax roll.

# RESOLUTION NO. 2022-\_\_\_ OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF COLMA

RESOLUTION OVERRULING PROTESTS TO AND ADOPTING ENGINEER'S REPORT ON SEWER SERVICE CHARGES FOR FISCAL YEAR 2022-2023,
DIRECTING THE CITY ENGINEER TO FILE A COPY OF THE ENGINEER'S REPORT WITH THE SAN MATEO COUNTY TAX COLLECTOR, AND AUTHORIZING THE COUNTY TAX COLLECTOR TO PLACE THE CHARGES ON THE PROPERTY TAX ROLL

The City Council of the Town of Colma does hereby resolve:

# 1. Background

- (a) The City Council has, by Colma Municipal Code, Chapter Three, Subchapter Seven (Section 3.07.010, et seq.), otherwise known as the Colma Sewer Service Charge Code, provided for the collection of sewer service charges for each fiscal year on the tax rolls of San Mateo County, and has directed the preparation and filing of a written report for each fiscal year containing descriptions of each parcel of real property located in Colma receiving such sewer services and facilities, and the amount of the sewer service charge for each parcel for the fiscal year, computed in conformity with the charges prescribed by ordinance.
- (b) Pursuant to Section 5473, *et seq.* of the California Health and Safety Code, the City Engineer prepared and filed a written report ("Report") with the City Clerk at least fifteen (15) days prior to July 13, 2022, which is the date set forth for the public hearing.
- (c) Notice of the filing of the Report and the public hearing thereon was published in the local newspaper on June 28, 2022, and July 5, 2022, in accordance with Health and Safety Code Section 5473.1, Government Code Section 6066, and Colma Municipal Code section 3.07.070, and posted on the Town's three official bulletin boards.
- (d) A Public Hearing on the Report was held on July 13, 2022, at which time, the City Council heard and considered all objections or protests, if any, to the Report.

# 2. Findings

The City Council finds that:

- (a) The owners of a majority of the separate parcels of property described in the Report did not file protests, and therefore the City Council is authorized to adopt the Report and to order that the charges set forth in the Report shall be collected on the tax roll of the County of San Mateo and shall constitute a lien against any parcel or parcels of land.
- (b) As such, the County Controller is authorized to place the sewer service charges on the property tax roll.
- (d) The sewer service charges were previously adopted pursuant to the Town's police powers and the authority granted under Health and Safety Code section 5470 *et seq.*, in compliance with the provisions of article XIII D, section 6 of the California Constitution.

- (b) The charges set forth in the Report, as adopted, shall be collected on the tax roll of the County of San Mateo in the manner provided by law and shall constitute a lien against each parcel or parcels of land as specified therein.
- (c) The City Engineer is directed to file with the County Controller of San Mateo County on or before the July 31, 2022 a copy of the Report upon which shall be endorsed, over the Clerk's signature, a statement that the Report has been finally adopted by the City Council of the Town of Colma.
- (d) The County Controller of San Mateo County is hereby authorized to place the charges on the property tax roll. The County Controller shall, upon receipt of the Report, enter the amounts of the charges set forth in the Report against the respective lots or parcels as they appear on the assessment roll for the fiscal year.

#### RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the City Council introduce the following:

AN ORDINANCE REPEALING COLMA MUNICIPAL CODE SUBCHAPTER 4.13 AND ADOPTING A NEW SUBCHAPTER 4.13 REGULATING THE USE OF DISPOSABLE FOOD SERVICE WARE BY FOOD FACILITIES PURSUANT TO CEQA GUIDELINE 15061(b)(3) AND 15308 TO ALIGN WITH NEW STATE MANDATES, AND WAIVE FURTHER READING OF THE ORDINANCE

## **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

The Town's Sustainable Food Service Ware Ordinance was adopted by the City Council on June 23, 2021; however due to new related state mandates adopted after June 2021 (AB 1276 and AB 1200), the ordinance needs to be amended to align with current state law. The overall purpose of the ordinance is to reduce single-use plastic foodware waste, reduce plastic waste debris flowing to waterways/stormwater pollution, and ensure that food establishments move to the use of compostable foodware. The Town is participating in a county-wide program with seventeen other jurisdictions, known as the Foodware Aware Program; this program is managed by the County's Office of Sustainability and involves County of San Mateo staff providing outreach and education to businesses, free technical assistance, and resources about where businesses can find compliant sustainable foodware products. The proposed ordinance will enable the Town to be compliant with AB 1276 and AB 1200, in addition to maintaining compliance with AB 1884.

### **FISCAL IMPACT**

The ordinance has minimal fiscal impact; although the program requires extensive education and outreach, the San Mateo County's Office of Sustainability staff completes the necessary technical assistance, monitoring, and enforcement of this program, minimizing enforcement and

compliance costs for the Town. The Town may pay slightly more for compostable foodware instead of single-use plastic foodware for Town events and Town functions.

### **BACKGROUND**

Most single-use plastic foodware items, such as cups, utensils, straws, and clamshells, are made from plastic and contribute street/waterway litter, Bay and ocean pollution, marine and other wildlife endangerment. Some plastic foodware contains perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl substances, a class of hazardous chemicals known as PFAS, which is used to make fiber-based foodware water and grease resistant. These "forever" chemicals persist in the environment and the human body, which can cause thyroid disruption, cancer, and other health risks. As was previously presented to council, over half of the litter that flows to local creeks, waterways and the Bay is from single use plastic packaging according to a recent San Mateo County study. These pervasive plastics break down into microplastics, which are consumed by microorganisms and end up in the fish that we eat, in humans that eat fish, and are the cause of wildlife and marine life mortality.

To address this issue, in 2018 the California legislature adopted AB 1884, requiring that full-service restaurants only provide single-use plastic straws upon consumer request, versus distributing them automatically without a specific request from the consumer. In October 2021, the State expanded this law by adopting AB 1276, under which food facilities must go beyond just plastic straws and require consumers to request any additional foodware accessories (utensils, stirrers, splash sticks, condiment packets). Finally, AB 1200 was also adopted in October 2021, and prohibits the sale or distribution of single-use foodware comprised of paper or other plant-based natural fiber that contain perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl substances, PFAS. The Town's existing foodware ordinance adequately addressed AB 1884 but must now be amended to also align with AB 1200 and AB 1276.

Therefore, the amended provisions have been included into the Town's Sustainable Foodware Ordinance to align with the new mandates of AB 1276 and AB 1200.

### **ANALYSIS**

The amended ordinance provisions intended to align with AB 1276 and AB 1200 are summarized below:

- 1. <u>New AB 1276 requirement</u>: Food facilities can offer single-use foodware accessories only at drive-throughs (and public airports).
  - Prior Ordinance: All food facilities may offer single use foodware accessories to consumers.
  - Suggested Amendment to Ordinance: Only food facility drive-throughs can offer accessories to consumers.
- 2. New AB 1276 requirement: Open bins/containers are not allowed for distribution of accessories. Consumers must request them from the employee and/or food facilities may have them available at refillable dispensers that dispense accessories one item at a time.

Prior Ordinance: Food facilities may distribute foodware accessories using dispensers and have them available at self-serve areas, including in open bins/containers for consumers to grab-and-go.

Suggested Amendment to Ordinance: Food facilities cannot have available accessories in open bins/containers at self-serve areas for consumers to grab-and-go, and explicitly state that dispensers can only dispense accessories one item at a time.

- 3. <u>New AB 1276 requirement</u>: Food facilities are explicitly allowed to use self-serve, refillable bulk condiment dispensers to distribute condiments.
  - Suggested Amendment to Ordinance: Explicitly allow for use of refillable bulk condiment dispensers.
- 4. New AB 1200 Requirement in Amended Ordinance: Food facilities are not allowed to use foodware products containing PFAS. AB 1200 goes into effect January 1, 2023, and supersedes the Town's 2021 Ordinance, therefore the Town's current PFAS regulation will sunset on December 31, 2022. The Town joins other jurisdictions to look to the State to assume responsibility for implementing and enforcing the new requirements starting on January 1, 2023.
- 5. <u>Delayed Enforcement Date</u>: To allow more time for education for the Town's food facilities to become aware of the new requirements in AB 1276 and AB 1200, the enforcement date is delayed to October 1, 2022.

#### **Outreach and Education to the Town's Food Facilities**

Outreach and education on these new requirements and available resources directed toward the Town's food facilities will continue through our partnership with the County Office of Sustainability (OOS). The OOS has an excellent website, free technical assistance, and resources regarding approved foodware.

Town staff will continue to partner with Republic outreach staff to educate all affected parties as to the compliant, compostable foodware options and that these compostable foodware items can be placed in the organics collection bins.

Town staff developed outreach and education materials tailored for Colma businesses and has partnered with ReThink Disposables, a non-profit group funded by the County, to provide onsite technical assistance to businesses that are considering using reusable food service ware instead of single use plastics. Organizations like ReThink Disposables will continue to meet with businesses to discuss the ordinance and provide technical assistance and resources, such as rebates, for our businesses.

#### **Council Adopted Values**

The adoption of this Ordinance to regulate single use, plastic, disposable food service ware is consistent with the Council value of *vision* and *responsibility*, because it considers the impact of the increasing amount of disposable food service ware on the existing landfills and the Bay and improves public health and the environment through the reduction of plastic pollution.

#### **Sustainability Impact**

Regulating and reducing single use plastic, plastics with PFAS, and other single use items will have a positive impact on the Town's sustainability due to an increase in waste diversion as well as the reduction in plastics and plastic pollution into the stormwater system.

#### **Alternatives**

The City Council has the option of not amending the ordinance. This is not recommended since the Town needs to revise the ordinance to meet the state mandates and to participate in the regional approach to educating business to reduce single use plastic pollution and benefit from the County's free outreach, education, monitoring, and enforcement of the ordinance.

#### CONCLUSION

Staff recommends the City Council introduce the ordinance.

AN ORDINANCE REPEALING COLMA MUNICIPAL CODE SUBCHAPTER 4.13 AND ADOPTING A NEW SUBCHAPTER 4.13 REGULATING THE USE OF DISPOSABLE FOOD SERVICE WARE BY FOOD FACILITIES PURSUANT TO CEQA GUIDELINE 15061(b)(3) AND 15308 TO ALIGN WITH NEW STATE MANDATES

The City Council of the Town of Colma does ordain as follows:

#### ARTICLE 1. SUBCHAPTER 4.13 REPEALED AND REPLACED.

Subchapter 4.13 is hereby repealed in its entirety and replaced as follows (additions are shown in underline, deletions are shown in strikethrough):

#### **Subchapter 4.13: Sustainable Food Service Ware Ordinance**

#### 4.13.010 Findings and Purpose.

- (a) The use of single-use plastic disposable food service ware has been determined to have significant impacts on the environment, including environmental contamination, litter on streets, and plastic pollution in waterways and oceans; and
- (b) Polystyrene, also known as Styrofoam, has also become a problematic environmental pollutant given its non-compostable and nearly non-reusable nature; and
- (c) Many new compostable plastic alternatives contain fluorinated chemicals that have been linked to serious health issues including some cancers and thyroid disruption. These compostable plastics do not fully degrade in a marine environment and break down into microplastics, which are consumed by microorganisms and end up in the fish that we eat; and
- (d) On February 11, 2020 the San Mateo County Board of Supervisors introduced an ordinance regulating all disposable food service ware from food vendors within the un-incorporated County and has encouraged all the Cities and Towns within the County to adopt the County ordinance by reference; and
- (e) On February 23, 2021 the County ordinance was updated with a new timeline to extend the enforcement date to March 25, 2022 due to the impacts of COVID-19; and
- (f) On October 5, 2021, AB 1276 was signed into law by Governor Gavin Newsom. AB 1276 restricts the distribution of single-use foodware accessories (e.g., utensils, straws, stirrers, condiment packets, etc.) by restaurants and other food facilities.
- (g) On October 5, 2021, AB 1200 was also signed into law by the Governor. AB 1200 mandates that no person shall distribute, sell, or offer for sale in the state any food packaging (including single-use foodware) that contains regulated perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS).

(h) The City Council of the Town of Colma does find and declare that it should regulate the use of disposable food service ware by food vendors, <u>in compliance with the State of California's</u> requirements.

#### 4.13.020 Definitions.

For purposes of this Subchapter, the following definitions apply.

- (a) "Aluminum Foil-based" means any Disposable Food Service Ware composed entirely of aluminum, including but not limited to aluminum tray liners, aluminum foil, and aluminum foil baskets.
- (b) "Compostable" means that an item or material (1) will break down, or otherwise become part of usable compost in a safe and timely manner and (2) is Natural Fiber-based or made from other materials approved by an independent third party by the County Manager or designee in collaboration with local waste processors and haulers. Compostable items may also include those that are made entirely of Natural Fiber or Natural Fiber-based items that are coated or lined with biologically based polymer, such as corn or other plant sources (e.g., compostable plastics), if certified by BPI or another independent third party approved by the County Manager or designee.

Compostable does not include items made entirely or primarily of biologically based polymer (e.g. PLA, PHA, or other compostable plastic), even if labeled or certified as compostable.

- (c) "County" means the County of San Mateo.
- (d) "Disposable" means designed to be discarded after a single or limited number of uses and not designed or manufactured for long-term multiple reuse.
- (e) "Food Service Ware" means food contact products used for serving, distributing, holding, packaging, and/or transporting Prepared Food including, but not limited to plates, cups, bowls, trays, clamshell containers, boxes, utensils, straws, lids, and food contact paper (e.g., wraps, bags, tray liners, etc.). The term "Food Service Ware" includes Food Service Ware Accessories as defined below. The term "Food Service Ware" does not include bulk dispensers for condiments.
- (f) "Food Service Ware Accessories" include Food Service Wares such as straws, stirrers, cup spill plugs, cup sleeves, condiment packets, utensils (including chopsticks), cocktail sticks/picks, toothpicks, napkins, and other similar accessory or accompanying Food Service Ware used as part of food or beverage service or packaging. Detachable lids for beverage cups and food containers are not considered a Food Service Ware Accessory.
- (g) "Food Facility" means an operation that stores, prepares, packages, serves, vends, or otherwise provides food to the public for human consumption, as defined by the California Health and Safety Code Section 113789 or successor. It includes both permanent and temporary food facilities. Public schools are exempt from the provisions of this Subchapter.
- (h) "Food Scrap Composting Method" means: (1) self-hauling of food scraps to a permitted composting facility or a transfer station that accepts food scraps that will be transferred to a

permitted composting facility for on-site compost processing, (2) food scrap compost collection service provided by a curbside hauler, or (3) on-site food scrap composting.

- (i) "Healthcare Facilities" mean places that provide healthcare to the public. Healthcare Facilities includes, but is not limited to hospitals, clinics, outpatient care centers, nursing homes, psychiatric care centers, medical offices, hospice homes, mental health and addiction treatment centers, orthopedic and other rehabilitation centers, urgent care, birth centers, etc.
- (j) "Natural Fiber/Natural Fiber-based" means a plant or animal-based, non-synthetic fiber, including but not limited to products made from paper, sugarcane, bamboo, wheat stems/stalk, hay, wood, etc.
- (k) "Non-Compostable" means not meeting the definition of Compostable set forth in this Subchapter.
- (I) "Perfluoroalkyl and Polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS)" means a class of fluorinated organic chemicals containing at least one fully fluorinated carbon atom.
- (m) <u>"Perfluoroalkyl and Polyfluoroalkyl Substances (PFAS) Restrictions" mean either of the following:</u>
  - (1) PFAS has not been intentionally added to a product or product component.
- (2) The presence of PFAS in a product or product component is below 100 parts per million, as measured in total organic fluorine.
- (n) "Polystyrene-based" means and includes expanded polystyrene, which is a thermoplastic petrochemical material utilizing a styrene monomer and processed by any number of techniques including, but not limited to fusion of polymer spheres (expandable bead polystyrene), injection molding, form molding, and extrusion-blow molding (extruded foam polystyrene). The term "polystyrene" also includes polystyrene that has been expanded or blown using a gaseous blowing agent into a solid foam (expanded polystyrene [EPS]) and clear or solid polystyrene known as oriented polystyrene.
- (o) "Prepackaged Food" means any properly labeled processed food, prepackaged to prevent any direct human contact with the food product upon distribution from the manufacturer and prepared at an approved source.
- (p) "Prepared Food" means food or beverages that undergo a cooking or food preparation technique on the Food Facility's premises for consumption by the public. Cooking or food preparation technique includes, but is not limited to the following:
- (1) Cooking methods, utilizing the application of heat, such as steaming, microwaving, simmering, boiling, broiling, grilling, frying, or roasting.
- (2) Beverage preparation, such as blending, brewing, steeping, juicing, diluting, or pouring.

(3) Food preparation techniques, such as defrosting, rinsing, washing, diluting, cutting, portioning, mixing, blending, assembling, coating, dipping, garnishing, decorating, or icing.

Prepared Food does not include raw eggs or raw, butchered meats, fish, and/or poultry sold from a butcher case, a refrigerator case, or similar retail appliance.

- (q) "Standard Condiment" means relishes, spices, sauces, confections, or seasonings that require no additional preparation and that are usually used on a food item after preparation, and includes different types such as ketchup, mustard, mayonnaise, soy sauce, hot sauce, salsa, salt, pepper, and sugar/sugar substitutes.
- (r) "Takeout Food" means Prepared Food requiring no further preparation, which is purchased to be consumed off a Prepared Food Facility's premises. Takeout Food includes Prepared Food delivered by a Food Facility or by a third-party Takeout Food Delivery Service.
- (s) "Takeout Food Delivery Service" is a service for online food ordering and delivery that delivers Prepared Food from a Food Facility to a customer. This service can be provided directly by the Food Facility or by a third-party.
- (t) <u>"Utensils" include different types of instruments used to assist the consumption of food, specifically, forks, knives, spoons, sporks, chopsticks, and tongs.</u>

#### 4.13.030 Distribution of Disposable Food Service Ware Accessories.

(a) Except as provided in Subsection (b), Food Facilities, for on-premise dining and off-premise dining (e.g., Takeout Food Delivery Service, catering off-site, etc.), shall not provide any Disposable Food Service Ware Accessories or Standard Condiment in Disposable packaging to a consumer unless the specific type of Disposable Food Service Ware Accessory (including different types of Utensils) or specific type of Standard Condiment is requested by the consumer.

No Food Facility shall provide any Disposable Food Service Ware Accessories except: (1) upon request by the consumer, (2) upon acceptance by the consumer after being offered by the Food Facility, or (3) at a self-serve area and/or a dispenser.

- (b) Food Facilities may ask a drive-through consumer if the consumer wants a specific type of Disposable Food Service Ware Accessory (including different types of Utensils), if the item is necessary for the consumer to consume Prepared Food or to prevent spills of or safely transport Prepared Food.
- (c) <u>Disposable Food Service Ware Accessories and Standard Condiment in Disposable packaging provided by Food Facilities for use by consumers shall not be bundled or packaged in a manner that prohibits a consumer from taking only the type of Disposable Food Service Ware Accessory (including different types of Utensils) or type of Standard Condiment desired without also having to take a different type of Disposable Food Service Ware Accessory or type of Standard Condiment. Food Facilities cannot distribute Disposable Utensils that are bundled or packaged together. Each type of Utensil (e.g., fork, spoon, knife, etc.) must be specifically requested by the consumer in order for a Food Facility to provide the item(s).</u>

- (d) Nothing in this Subchapter shall prohibit a Food Facility from making unwrapped Disposable Food Service Ware Accessories available to a consumer using refillable self-service dispensers that dispense different types of Disposable Food Service Ware Accessories one item at a time to allow for Disposable Food Service Ware Accessories to be obtained.
- (e) Nothing in this Subchapter shall prohibit a Food Facility from making Standard
  Condiments available to a consumer using refillable self-service dispensers to allow for Standard
  Condiments to be obtained. Food Facilities that offer Standard Condiments are encouraged to
  use bulk dispensers for the condiments rather than condiments packaged for single-use.
- (f) Takeout Food Delivery Services shall provide consumers with the option to proactively request the different types of available Disposable Food Service Ware Accessories (including different types of Utensils) and the different types of Standard Condiment from a Food Facility serving Prepared Food. The default option on the digital ordering/point-of-sale platforms of Takeout Food Delivery Services shall be that no Disposable Food Service Ware Accessories or Standard Condiment are requested.
- (g) Takeout Food Delivery Services shall provide Food Facilities the ability to tailor the digital ordering/point-of-sale platforms so that Food Facilities can customize and itemize the different types of available Disposable Food Service Ware Accessories (including different types of Utensils) and the different types of available Standard Condiments for consumers to proactively select.
- (h) If a Food Facility uses any Takeout Food Delivery Service, the Food Facility shall customize its menu with an itemized list and/or provide options of the different types of available Disposable Food Service Ware Accessories (including different types of Utensils) and the different types of available Standard Condiments for consumers to proactively select. Only those specific types of Disposable Food Service Ware Accessories (including different types of Utensils) or specific types of Standard Condiment proactively requested by the consumer shall be provided by the Food Facility. If a consumer does not request any Disposable Food Service Ware Accessories or Standard Condiment, no Disposable Food Service Ware Accessories or Standard Condiment shall be provided by the Food Facility for delivery of Prepared Food.

  Pursuant to Subsection (d), each type of Utensil (e.g., fork, spoon, knife, etc.) offered by the Food Facility shall also be listed individually, unbundled on the menu and provided by the Food Facility for delivery along with the Prepared Food only if requested by the consumer.
- (h) Takeout Food Delivery Services that utilize digital ordering/point of sale platforms, including but not limited to the internet and smart-phone, shall only offer Disposable Food Service Ware Accessories by providing clear options for customers to affirmatively request these items separate from orders for food and beverages. The default option on the digital ordering/point of sale platforms shall be that no Disposable Food Service Ware Accessories are requested. Each individual Disposable Food Service Ware Accessory (e.g., each fork, knife, condiment packet, napkin, etc.) provided with Prepared Food must be specifically requested by the customer in order for a Food Facility to provide it.

#### 4.13.040 Standards and Required Use of Disposable Food Service Ware.

(a) No Food Facility shall use Polystyrene-based Disposable Food Service Ware when providing Prepared Food.

- (b) Food Facilities shall only provide Disposable straws, stirrers, utensils, and cocktail/toothpicks (and the packaging that these individual items are wrapped in, if any) that are Compostable.
- (c) Nothing in this Subchapter shall conflict or be construed to conflict with the Americans with Disabilities Act or any other applicable law concerning the rights of individuals with disabilities. In particular, nothing in this Subchapter shall restrict, or be construed to restrict, the provision by Food Facilities of Disposable Non-Compostable straws to individuals who may request the use of Disposable Non-Compostable straws to accommodate medical needs or disabilities. Healthcare Facilities may distribute Disposable Non-Compostable straws with or without request by a patient at the discretion of the Healthcare Facility staff based on the physical or medical needs of the patient.
- (d) Food Facilities shall use Compostable items for the below Disposable Food Service Ware when providing Prepared Food:
  - (1) Plates
  - (2) Bowls (of all sizes including, but not limited to soup and salad bowls
- (3) Cups (of all sizes including, but not limited to beverage cups) and accessory cups for Standardized Condiments
  - (4) Food trays and food boats
- (5) <u>Hinged or lidded containers (e.g., clamshells), deli containers, and other</u> containers used for the sale and/or distribution of Prepared Food
- (5) Clamshells, boxes, deli containers, and other containers used for the sale and/or distribution of Prepared Food (e.g., Takeout Food, leftover "doggie containers", etc.)
- (e) Commencing on the effective date of this Chapter up until December 31, 2022, for the Compostable Disposable Food Service Ware listed in Subsection (d), Food Facilities shall use items that meet Perfluoroalkyl and Polyfluoroalkyl Substances (PFAS) Restrictions. To verify the PFAS Restrictions, Food Facilities shall use items that are certified/approved by independent third parties approved by the Office of Sustainability or designee, in collaboration with local waste processors and haulers, as needed.
- (f) For all other Disposable Food Service Ware not listed in Subsections (b) and (d), Food Facilities shall use only Disposable Food Service Ware that can be composted by the Food Scrap Composting method utilized by the Food Facility and/or accepted for recycling by the Food Facility's recycling collection service unless a feasible alternative does not exist.
- (g) The Town through the County shall maintain a list of approved Disposable Food Service Ware sources and/or references to organizations that maintain regularly updated lists of products that meet the requirements detailed in Subsections (a), (b), (d), and (e) of this Section. This information shall be made available on the County Office of Sustainability website, in person in the County Office of Sustainability, and from the Town upon request. If a product is not included on the approved lists, the Food Facility wishing to use a product as Disposable

Food Service Ware shall establish to the County Manager or designee's satisfaction that the product complies with the requirements detailed in Subsections (a), (b), (d), and (e).

#### 4.13.050 Recordkeeping and Inspection.

- (a) Food Facilities shall keep complete and accurate record or documents of the purchase of acceptable Disposable Food Service Ware evidencing compliance with this Subchapter for a minimum period of three years from the date of purchase.
- (b) The record shall be made available for inspection at no cost to the Town through the County during regular business hours by Town or County employees or Town or County-designated staff authorized to enforce this Subchapter. Unless an alternative location or method of review is mutually agreed upon, the records or documents shall be made available at the Food Facility address.
- (c) The provision of false or incomplete information, records, or documents shall be a violation of this Subchapter.

#### 4.13.060 Automatic Exemptions.

- (a) Prepackaged Food is exempt from the provisions of this Subchapter.
- (b) Polystyrene coolers and ice chests intended for reuse are exempt from the provisions of this Subchapter.
- (c) Disposable Food Service Ware that is entirely Aluminum Foil-based or recyclable glass is exempt from the provisions of this Subchapter.
- (d) If the Town through the County determines that a reasonably feasible Disposable Food Service Ware that complies with Section 4.13.040 (a), (b), (d), and (e) of this Subchapter does not exist, these items will be exempt from all or select requirements of the abovementioned provisions of this Subchapter until the County determines that a reasonably feasible alternative is available on the market for purchase. The County will have a current list of these exempted Disposable Food Service Ware made public by the Office of Sustainability.
- (e) Certain Disposable Food Service Ware Accessories for beverage orders, specifically, straws and cup sleeves, shall be exempt from Section 4.13.030 (a) and may be distributed for safety reasons without the need for a request by the consumer or an offer by the Food Facility, specifically at drive-through areas of Food Facilities. Detachable lids are not considered a Disposable Food Service Ware Accessory, so Section 4.13.030 (a) does not apply to detachable lids.
- (e) Temporary exemptions due to an emergency are automatic without the submission of a request for an exemption. An emergency is defined as a sudden, unexpected occurrence posing a clear and imminent danger that requires immediate action to prevent or mitigate the loss or impairment of life, health, property, or essential public services. Examples of an emergency include, but are not limited to natural disasters, emergencies due to the release of hazardous materials, emergencies associated with loss of power and/or water, or emergency medical response.

#### 4.13.070 Case-by-Case Consideration of Requests for Hardship Exemption.

- (a) **Grounds for an exemption.** An exemption from any of the provisions of this Subchapter may be granted by the Office of Sustainability or designee upon demonstration by a Food Facility to the satisfaction of the County that strict application of the requirements would cause undue hardship. An "undue hardship" includes, but is not limited to the following:
- (1) A situation unique to the Food Facility where a suitable alternative that conforms with the requirements detailed in Section 4.13.040 (a), (b), (d), and (e) does not exist for a specific application.
- (2) Imposing the provisions of this Subchapter would cause significant economic hardship. "Significant economic hardship" may be based on, but not limited to, demonstrating that suitable Disposable Food Service Ware is not available at a commercially reasonable price and the additional cost associated with providing the Disposable Food Service Ware is particularly burdensome to the Food Facility based on the type of operation(s) affected, the overall size of the business/operation, the number, type and location of its facilities, the impact on the overall financial resources of the Food Facility, and other factors. Reasonable added cost for a suitable item as compared to a similar item that the Food Facility can no longer use shall not by itself constitute adequate grounds to support an exemption for such item. In determining whether a significant economic hardship has been established, the County Manager or designee shall consider the following information: ability of the Food Facility to recover the additional expense by increasing its prices; the availability of tax credits and deductions; outside funding; and other options.
- (b) **Request for an exemption.** A request for an exemption from the requirements of this Subchapter shall include all information deemed necessary by the County to render a decision, including but not limited to documentation showing the factual support for the requested exemption. A request for an exemption may be approved by the County Manager or designee, in whole or in part, with or without conditions. The duration of the exemption, if granted, shall also be determined by the County Manager or designee. Information about the application process for requesting an exemption will be available on the Office of Sustainability's website and in the Office.

#### 4.13.080 Enforcement.

- (a) The County Manager or designee may enforce this Subchapter on the Town's behalf.
- (b) A violation of this Subchapter is an infraction and is also punishable by County administrative fines as set forth in San Mateo County Municipal Code Chapter 1.40.
- (c) Compliance plan.

The County of San Mateo, its officers, employees and agents are hereby authorized to enforce, on behalf of the Town of Colma, this Subchapter of the Colma Municipal Code, and any amendments thereto, within the jurisdictional boundaries of the Town of Colma. Such enforcement authority includes, without limitation, the authority to hold hearings, issue citations, or assess administrative fines for violations of this Subchapter within the geographical limits of the Town of Colma.

- (1) If requested by the County Manager or designee, a Food Facility that is in violation of any of the provisions detailed in this Subchapter shall create and submit to the Office of Sustainability or designee a compliance plan, which will include information on corrective action(s) that the Food Facility shall undertake to come into compliance. Other requested information may include, and are not limited to proposed timeline for corrective action(s), and identification of individuals responsible for ensuring compliance.
- (2) The Food Facility shall create and submit its completed compliance plan within fourteen calendar days (14) from the time of request by the County Manager or designee.
- (d) This Section shall not be interpreted to limit any otherwise available civil or administrative remedies under law.

#### **ARTICLE 2. SEVERABILITY**

If any section, subsection, subdivision, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase added by this ordinance, or any part thereof, is for any reason held to be unconstitutional or invalid or ineffective by any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity or effectiveness of the remaining portions of this ordinance or any part thereof. The City Council hereby declares that it would have passed each section, subsection, subdivision, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase thereof irrespective of the fact that any one or more subsections, subdivisions, paragraphs, sentences, clauses or phrases are declared unconstitutional, invalid or ineffective.

#### ARTICLE 3. CEQA COMPLIANCE

The City Council finds that the changes made to the Codes are exempt from environmental review requirements pursuant to Section 15061(b)(3) of the California Environmental Quality Act ("CEQA") on the grounds that it can be seen with certainty that there is no possibility that the provisions contained within the ordinance may have a significant effect on the environment. Further, the changes made to the Codes are also exempt from the requirements of CEQA pursuant to CEQA Guidelines Sections 15307 and 15308, as an action taken by regulatory agencies to assure the maintenance, restoration, enhancement of natural resources, or protection of the environment.

#### **ARTICLE 4. EFFECTIVE DATE**

This ordinance shall take effect thirty (30) days following its adoption by the City Council. However, the mandatory provisions of this Ordinance, except for Section 4.13.050(a)(1) of this Ordinance, shall only become operative and subject to enforcement on March 25, 2022 October 1, 2022.

SUBJECT: Full Time Dispatch Services / Contract Dispatch Services

#### RECOMMENDATION

This item is for study. Staff will seek questions, comments, and feedback upon conclusion of the presentation on July 13th.

#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

In February of 2021, the Colma Police Department was contacted by CALOES State 911 Branch regarding being out of compliance with Public Safety Answering Point (PSAP) regulations that mandates that a 911 dispatcher must be onsite taking 911 calls 24 hours a day 7 seven days a week. CALOES 911 could offer no explanation why this was never addressed in the past.

Staff began working various options to present to CALOES to work through the problem. Various options were presented to CALOES, all ending with negative results. Staff was left with two options: (1) outsource dispatch services; or (2) go to an in-house 24/7 dispatch service.

#### FISCAL IMPACT

Current Dispatch / Records Budget \$1,189,458

Contract Fulltime Dispatch Services \$1,043,008 Two FTE – Records Personnel

Fulltime Dispatch / Records Services \$1,624,540

1.2 FTE Dispatch Positions

The decision to go to fulltime dispatch service would be an approximate reoccurring budget increase of \$435,082. To contract dispatch services would be a decrease of approximately \$146,450.

#### **BACKGROUND**

The Town of Colma currently contracts part-time dispatch services with the South San Francisco Police Department. The Services include coverage from 12:00 am to 8:00 am 365 days a week. The service also covers 24 hour coverage for the holidays of Christmas, Thanksgiving and New Year's Day.

In February of 2021, CALOES 911 informed the Town of Colma it was not in compliance with state regulations as a fulltime PSAP. According to CALOES 911 compliance regulations, only fulltime PSAPs are eligible for funding via technology and upgrades.

Staff worked with Radio Consultant Daryl Jones of Telecommunications Engineering Associates to explore potential solutions other than going to a fulltime contract service or in house fulltime service. Below are two of the possible solutions we brought forward:

- South San Francisco would take 911 calls 24x7 and transfer to Colma's 7-digit lines
- Mirror SSF's telephones at Colma 911 calls would ring in both Colma's and South San Francisco's call center

CALOES rejected both options citing the compliance regulation, that the PSAP needed to be independent stand alone.

#### **ANALYSIS**

At the conclusion of our meetings with CALOES it was determined that we had two options: (1) contract for fulltime dispatch services; or (2) increase our dispatch services to provide coverage 24/7.

To contract fulltime, the Town of Colma would need to increase our current contract with the South San Francisco Police Department or conduct a Request for Proposal (RFP) as determined by Town of Colma purchasing regulations. Dispatch services will be moved offsite but police records would continue to be maintained by the police department. This would entail the hiring of two FTE, one Records Supervisor and one Records Technician. These positions would also cover the front counter. The decrease in staff would reduce the time the lobby would be open.

To take on dispatch responsibilities 24/7, 1.2 FTE dispatchers would need to be hired resulting in dispatch staffing of one Dispatch supervisor and four full time Dispatchers and per diem Dispatchers to cover some open shifts. The Dispatchers schedule would change to a 12-hr. shift and mirror the patrol schedule.

#### **Council Adopted Values**

The direction given is the *responsible* thing to do by taking all options in to consideration, while weighing fiscal aspects by the level of service to the community.

#### **ALTERNATIVES**

The following alternative course of action is available to the City Council:

1. Leave dispatch as it is and take on the financial responsibility of 911 technology and equipment as it is needed.

#### CONCLUSION

This item is information only at this time. However, in the near future at a subsequent meeting, staff will seek City Council direction on whether to contract out dispatch services or to keep dispatch services with the police department.
