Holiday Cheer Starts Here: Celebrate the Holiday Season Responsibly
National "Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over" Enforcement Campaign Begins

Desert Hot Springs – The holiday season can be dangerous for people on the roads. In December 2022 alone, 1,062 people were killed in the U.S. in alcohol-impaired-driving crashes, according to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration. The Desert Hot Springs Police Department wants to remind the public of the dangers of driving impaired and to celebrate the holiday season responsibly by not driving under the influence.

Now through New Year's Day, Desert Hot Springs Police will have additional officers on patrol looking for drivers suspected of being under the influence of alcohol and/or drugs, as well as other traffic violations. The high-visibility enforcement effort is part of a national campaign, *Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over*, with the goal of stopping suspected impaired drivers who put others at risk.

"During the holiday season, we see families and loved ones coming together to celebrate, and our goal is to make sure everyone gets home safely," said Chief Jim Henson. "Impaired driving isn't just dangerous; it's illegal. Let's make this a joyful and safe holiday season for everyone on the road. We urge people to act responsibly and plan a sober ride home."

Desert Hot Springs Police encourages everyone to stay in for the night or have a "go safely" game plan by scheduling a ride or designating a sober driver if you plan to consume alcohol.
