Mayor Larsen welcomed everyone.

The Pledge of Allegiance was held.

Hugh King spoke briefly of how the Village began. In 1899, the Maidstone Fire District was formed and the territorial boundaries are mostly the same for the Village today, with the later addition of Georgica. As the Maidstone Fire District was so well received, incorporation of the village was pursued. The first vote on 1917 was very close but lost. On September 25, 1920 people went to Clinton Academy to vote on incorporation — it passed 66 to 57. The first leader was called the President. There was one Trustee, a Treasurer, a Collector, Clerk and Superintendent of Highways. In order for the incorporation to be put to a vote, a petition had to be submitted. The 19th amendment to the Constitution was added in August of 1920. The vote to incorporate in September would have been the 1st time women voted in East Hampton.

The Trustees gave Hugh King questions to answer, or research and present answers at the next meeting.

Mayor Larsen's question: "What village landmarks are named after or dedicated to past Mayors?" Mr. King could only name Bannister Park. Mayor Larsen noted the EMS Building is dedicated to Ken Wessberg. Mr. King will research for more. Mayor Larsen also asked Mr. King if he knew how Medway, a small street off Church Street, was named. It was named after a river near Maidstone, England.

Trustee Graham's question: "When did the Maidstone Club go from 36-hole golf course to a 27?" Mr. King will research, and noted Rattray's "Fifty Years of The Maidstone Club" and Averill Geus' "Another Fifty Years of The Maidstone Club" as good references.

Trustee Brown's question: "What year was Herrick Park gifted to the Village, and please provide some information on the family." Mr. and Mrs. Harry Herrick, residents of Pudding Hill had donated it to the Neighborhood Association, who eventually gave it to the Village.

Trustee Melendez's question: Can you provide history of the seal of the Village? The Lion is the symbol of Maidstone, the line symbolized the Medway River in England. Mr. Kind said he'll research the significance of the three dots.

POLICE PROMOTIONS

Many members of Jeffrey Erickson's family and members of the Village Police Department and Public Safety Dispatchers were present for his promotion to Lieutenant. Chief Michael Tracy presented his badge, noted that since his joining the department in 1991, Lt. Erickson was DARE officer in 2003 and introduced a School Safety Program to the department. In 2006 he was promoted to 2006 and has received several awards.

Members of Sean Christian's family were also present for his promotion to Police Sergeant. Sgt. Christian's been a member of the Village's Police Department since 2003. In 2019 he performed CPR helping save a life in a combined effort, and was the 2020 Kiwanis Club Police Officer of the Year.

INTERSECTION OF COLLINS AVENUE & ACCABONAC ROAD

Chief Tracey briefly spoke of the issues of the intersection of Collins Avenue & Accabonac Road. Currently the two stops and the yield at the location cause confusion and the traffic to back up. David Collins has discussed the problem with the Town Highway Superintendent Steve Lynch and Chief Tracey. It was generally agreed that making the intersection a three-way stop would improve the traffic flow and off-season would be the best time to test it. Trustee Brown would like Consulting Engineer Drew Bennett do perform a traffic study and a public hearing be held.
