A Message to the Community from Mayor Goddard



CalTrans has parked a digital sign at the corner of Bolinas Road and Cascade Drive. Throughout the course of the last 6 months, the sign

has displayed a variety of messages which I read every day on my way home. The first message was "Be Covid Safe, Wear A Face Covering". The messages are universal reminders. They are not meant to spark debate. This initial message was to remind us that face coverings are mandated by law, and to help us protect ourselves while respecting and protecting one another. Over the last month, the PG&E digital sign board has added a series of messages. We were catapulted into an early, and what is projected to be an extended fire season. California is battling record breaking numbers of massive Wildfires. Climate chaos is accelerating and we are living in the hottest year on record.

The digital display has added "Air & Heat Advisory" & "High fire Danger". As we navigate the barrage of messages and heed their warnings, we are testing our adaptability. I continue to have faith that together we will emerge more resilient.

As I entered Cascade Canyon on my bike last week, I was cognizant that I am experiencing digital sign, (and digital everything) fatigue, and that the frightening messages are taking a toll on my psyche. Much to my delight, the digital sign had added a message. "Relax Be Nice" I felt my shoulders drop away from my ears, my grip on my handlebars loosen and I imagined blue sky peeking through the smoke laden air where on previous trips home I had felt claustrophobic. I rode up Cascade Drive smiling and waving at neighbors. I arrived home, gathered my family together, and calmly pulled out my FIREsafe Marin Wildfire Evacuation Checklist. This is certainly the time to stay calm and prepare and there are excellent resources to tap into to learn what steps to take. Firesafemarin.org is a one-stop shop and a great place to start.

Fairfax continues to make progress on disaster preparedness and there is more coordinated and committed volunteerism than we have ever seen. There have been proactive steps taken by the Town over the years, such as expanding curbside pick-up for increased numbers of Chipper Days, and funding the first Fairfax goat grazing program in 2019, but the work ahead is daunting. Thanks to emerging neighborhood leadership, our progress has significantly accelerated. We are deeply grateful.

To name a few of the ongoing programs:

- 9 Fairfax neighborhoods have achieved Firewise USA status and are actively organizing, planning and educating their communities.
- We are in the process of listing all Firewise neighborhoods and a contact on the Town Website so that you will be able to connect with your Firewise Steering Committee and get involved. (coming soon)
- · We have hired a Coordinator for the growing number of

Neighborhood Response Groups (NRGs) who's purpose is to plan and prepare to respond to potential disasters beyond just fire. The success of NRGs in other parts of Marin especially Central Marin is based on the social cohesion of neighbors in order to help look out for one another and our families when or if disaster strikes.

We are moving in the right direction, but when it starts to feel overwhelming, I encourage everyone to glance at the digital sign.

Fairfax Community-Friendly Evacuation Maps are Now Available Online!

Disaster preparedness is important for all of us in Fairfax. The very recent fires in West Marin, the North Bay and the South Bay, are yet another reminder that we all need to prepare, as a Town and as individuals. In 2019 the Citizen's Disaster Council (CDC) was convened by then-mayor Barbara Coler. Per Town Code, the CDC consists of the current mayor, vice mayor, emergency responders (fire/police) and other key groups. The CDC updated our Town's Emergency Operations Plan and Evacuation Maps used by our fire and police. In addition, then-mayor Coler also called for Community-Friendly Evacuation Maps as requested by many Fairfaxians, so that each of us in the community can find our *own* way out of our neighborhoods in a disaster.

Thank you all for your patience waiting for these maps. They are posted on the Town's website on the **Emergency Planning** page. Special thanks to Todd and Michael, and Professor Jaenichen. Now let's all get our "to go" bags ready, our disaster plans in place and download our zone maps!

Firesafe Marin - Fairfax Evac Maps

Outdoor Seating Area in the Mono Parking Lot

The Town, in partnership with the Fairfax Chamber of Commerce, will be closing the lower half the Mono Parking Lot from Friday afternoon through Sunday. The closed portion of the lot (nearest to

Bolinas Rd.) will have tables and chairs for patrons of downtown restaurants to use. The Chamber will have someone available to disinfect the tables and chairs between uses. A special thanks to resident John Bela and his volunteers for painting the parking lot to make it more inviting to sit and eat. The paint is temporary and does not affect the striping in the parking lot. Customers can still access the Mono Parking Lot from the Bank St. entrance. This is a pilot program and, depending on the demand, the Town and Chamber will continue to close this portion of the Mono lot for subsequent weekends during COVID-19.



Residential Rental Assistance Program

The Town Council recently established a Residential Rental Assistance Program to assist extremely low-income Fairfax renters whose household incomes were adversely affected by COVID-19. The program is administered by St. Vincent de Paul and Ritter Center. If you are in need of assistance, please call **415-454-3303 X11** and leave a message. Calls will be returned in the order received. They will inform applicants of the program requirements. Funds are limited and provided on a first-come, first-served basis.

Update for Marin County: Confirmation of State Tier 2 (COVID-19) Status

Marin County has successfully appealed to the <u>California</u>

<u>Department of Public Health</u> (CDPH) to move into Tier 2 in the state's COVID-19 response framework. Moving from Tier 1, or


"widespread" COVID-19 community risk status, to the Tier 2 "substantial" risk category allowed more businesses to reopen on Tuesday, September 15.

A <u>Marin County Public Health graphic</u> lays out a clear picture of what the different tiers mean to each business sector. A full list of changes to business sector guidelines will be updated to the <u>Marin Recovers website</u> soon. All open businesses must complete a COVID-19 <u>Site-Specific Protection Plan</u> prior to reopening. Guidance for the plan also is found on the Marin Recovers website.

Follow the latest COVID-19 surveillance figures in Marin County on the <u>Marin County Department of Health and Human</u>
<u>Services</u> website. <u>Register online</u> to receive a daily COVID-19 update from Marin HHS.

When in doubt, take the stricter route!

Counties will change tiers based on COVID-19 transmission data changes. Marin County orders may differ from California state orders, when that's the case follow the stricter set of rules.

Email for Reporting Shelter-in-Place (SIP) Violations

The Town has created an on-line process for reporting SIP violations by businesses.

The email address is: **sipviolations@townoffairfax.org**.

In the email, we ask that you include the business name, address, and as much detail as possible regarding the perceived health order violation. Town staff will follow-up with the businesses regarding the violations. Our goal is to gain compliance by informing and educating businesses of the need to follow shelter-in-place (SIP) orders. All businesses will be given a grace period to comply before additional follow-up actions are taken by staff.

Fairfax Climate Action Plan Survey

The Town of Fairfax is updating its 2014 Climate Action Plan and Climate Action Committee needs your input to develop effective measures that will substantially reduce greenhouse gas emissions. In March of 2019, the Town Council passed a Climate Emergency Resolution and set a target of zero emissions by 2030, going beyond State reduction targets.

After receiving community feedback, the Fairfax Climate Action Committee will bring a first draft of the 2030 Climate Action Plan to the Council and then post it for further public comment. Hopefully, a final version will come before the Council by the end of this year.
