SUBJECT: Adopt a Resolution Authorizing the Display of Rainbow Flags during the Month of

June 2023; authorize use of staff time to place flags; accept donation of flags for

lamp posts; and authorize staff to paint a rainbow crosswalk.

RECOMMENDATION

Adopt a Resolution Authorizing the Display of Rainbow Flags during the Month of June 2023; authorize use of staff time to place flags; accept donation of flags for lamp posts; and authorize staff to paint a rainbow crosswalk.

DISCUSSION

In October 2022 town resident Lori Kramer submitted a proposal requesting that the Town acknowledge Pride month in June of 2023 by installing rainbow flags on the lamp posts in the downtown corridor. The flags would recognize the LGBTQ community. The proposal was referred to the Town's Parks & Recreation Commission, which considered the item at their November 2022 meeting. At the meeting, Lori Kramer offered to pay for the production of the flags that would then be hung by the Public Works Department. PARC made a motion at the meeting to support the project, and referred it to the Town Council for further consideration.

In previous years, a single rainbow flag is hung in front of Town Hall during the month of June. There are 30 flag posts in the downtown corridor which straddles Bolinas Road and Broadway as well as Center Blvd. Flag posts have been used in previous years to display Fairfax Festival flags. The Fairfax Festival flags, which are the pastel colored flags pictured next to the rainbow flags in Attachment 2, are typically put up at the beginning of June in preparation for the festival. Since both events take place in the month of June, only one type of flag could be installed, so the rainbow flags would supersede the pastel festival flags.

Mayor Cutrano has requested that the rainbow flags be placed at Town Hall and on the lampposts, and that a rainbow crosswalk be painted. Staff believes this may be the first rainbow cross walk in Marin County.

For the rainbow crosswalk, staff recommends painting the space between the white bars of the existing crosswalk with colors to form a rainbow at the crosswalk between the Parkade and Peri's Tavern/My Thai. The design can be finalized on a staff level before June.

FISCAL IMPACT

There are 30 flag posts available in downtown Fairfax. It requires two Public Works crew members a total of four hours each to hang all the flags. The fully loaded salary and benefit rate is \$81.58 for employee #1 and \$64.91 for employee #2. The costs of the Public Works crew to hang 30 flags on the lamp post in the downtown corridor will be \$538.00.

The crosswalk selected is scheduled to receive new paint, therefore the cost of adding the colors is expected to be nominal.





PARC Commissioners in attendance: Sisi Parry-Hansen, Jacqueline Engstrom, Lisa Hillstrom. Chris Borjian. Staff in attendance: Maria Baird, Recreation & Community Services Manager, Loren Umbertis, Public Works Manager. Ohers in attendance: Whitney Bulterman, Lori Kramer

The meeting was called to order at 7:00 p.m.

The minutes of the October 10th meeting were approved.

Age Friendly Task Force Update-Jacqueline stated that gift baskets and Certificates of Recognition were hand delivered to those residents aged 90 plus in Town by the Age Friendly Task Force, Artists-in-Residents, and other volunteers.

New Business

1.Peri Park playground swing set completion— Loren Umbertis, new Public Works Director, attended the meeting to present options for the new swing set that will be installed in the park. The previous swing set had to be replaced due to issues with the wood and dry rot. Loren presented two different options in a staff report, either a metal swing set, which will last longer, or a wooden swing set which aesthetically is more similar to the other playground structures. ACTION ITEM: After considering both options, including longevity and availability, the Commission decided to go with the metal option. Chris made a motion to approve the metal swing set, which will be available in 8-10 weeks, and the preferred color is red to match the other equipment in the park; Sisi seconded, Jackie & Lisa voted in favor. Loren will proceed with the swing set, which will cost about \$13,000 for the structure, and an additional \$15,000 or so for labor and installation.

2.Rainbow Flags for Pride Month June 2023- Lori Kramer attended the meeting to request a proposal to purchase rainbow flags for the Town and have Public Works install them on the 32 lamp posts in Town. The proposal would have to ultimately have be approved by the Town Council. ACTION ITEM: PARC Commissioners supported this project. A recommendation to the Town Council was made by Sisi to support the purchase and installation of the rainbow flags on lamp posts for Pride Month in June of 2023. The issue of how to use the flags that are normally put up for the Fairfax Festival would have to be examined and see if both projects can occur in June, or whether the festival flags would even be continued to be used; Lisa seconded, Chris & Jackie voted in favor.

3. Measure A Funding-Sisi announced she attended the Measure A meeting, and the following funding allocations were made: \$30,000 to complete the Peri Park playground renovation, and \$5,000 to install a concrete pad in the Parkade parking lot for the Art in the Parkade foundation.

The meeting adjourned at 8:30 pm.

RESOLUTION 23-

A RESOLUTION OF THE TOWN COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF FAIRFAX AUTHORIZING DISPLAY OF RAINBOW FLAGS DURING THE MONTH OF JUNE 2023

WHEREAS, the Town of Fairfax has a diverse LGBTQ+ community and is committed to supporting visibility, dignity, and equity for all people in the community; and

WHEREAS, LGBTQ+ individuals encompass all races, ethnicities, religions, and social classes; and

WHEREAS, the Town of Fairfax has declared the month of June as "Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Questioning+ Pride Month" in the Town of Fairfax to inspire equity, create alliances, celebrate diversity, and establish safe environments in our schools and our community; and

WHEREAS, at their November 14, 2022, meeting, the Fairfax Parks and Recreation Commission considered and voted to support a Fairfax resident's proposal to pay for the production of 30 rainbow pride flags for the downtown corridor lamp posts and donate them to the Town, and PARC recommends the proposal to the Town Council; and

WHEREAS, Mayor Cutrano has requested flying of the Pride Flag at Town Hall and on the downtown lampposts; and

WHEREAS, the Town has a Flag Display Policy which was adopted on May 4, 2022 as per Resolution #22-28 which specifies that the Town retains control of its flagpoles and prohibits third-party requests for commemorative flag displays, only allowing for the display of commemorative flags when the request is brough forth by a Town Council member and then authorized by the Town Council as an expression of the Town's official sentiments; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED that the Town Council authorizes the display of the Rainbow LGBTQ+ Pride Flag at Fairfax Town Hall and on the 30 downtown lamp posts for the month of June 2023, ending June 30, 2023, to express the Town's support for and celebration of the Town's LGBTQ+ community and of diversity.

The foregoing resolution was duly passed and adopted at a regular meeting of the Town Council of the Town of Fairfax on the 5st day of April 2023 by the following vote, to wit:
