MINUTES FRANKLIN TOWNSHIP COMMITTEE **REGULAR MEETING**

THURSDAY, MARCH 29, 2018 7:30 P.M.

The Franklin Township Committee held a regular meeting at 7:30 P.M., Thursday, March 29, 2018 at the Municipal Building. This meeting has been properly noticed in accordance with the Open Public Meetings Act.

Mayor Craig Repmann called the meeting to order and led the flag salute.

Comments from the public on agenda items:

Chip Paillex from America's Grow-A-Row located in Pittstown addressed the Committee. The program consists of volunteers to help plant and harvest produce that goes to food pantries throughout the State of New Jersey. They currently own 2 farms: one in Union Township and one in Alexandria Township. These are farmland preserved and do not have any exceptions on them. They are now purchasing Block 10 Lot 6, 38.8 acres, which is directly across from their Pittstown farm and the closing is tomorrow. Funding is critical and preservation funding will limit their liability. There may be a 5 acre exception requirement for the lot. Given the small number of acreage, this exception would put them in a negative light when applying for funding so they are asking for an exception to the requirement. The property would be solely used for agriculture.

Mayor Repmann asked if there were any educational purposes for the property and Mr. Paillex responded that anyone coming into the program would gain an education and would gain educational experience. Anything required for utilizing a building would be conducted on the property just across the road from the property being purchased. They are also going through a huge renovation for the existing building.

Deputy Mayor Burgess asked if any fundraising could be conducted on the property and Mr. Paillex responded "no". He said the building in Union Township is completely outfitted with a Morton Building and a 2nd building is being put up to keep up with the demand.

Committee Member Darocha asked if there is currently a pump or well on the property and the response was "no".

Lora Jones commented on the application for preservation and read into the record the March 29, 2018 letter from Stefanie Miller, Program Manager of the SADC. In the letter she states " 5 acres is also almost 13% of this farm's acreage and almost the entire northern field, which is 100% prime soils.

SADC staff prefers exceptions to be less than 5% of the application acreage. An exception that is more than 10% of the application is questionable and subject to denial of the application. Certainly, a smaller 1-2 acre exception area is sufficient to reserve the property the potential for a future single-family residence and area for flexibility of use, as may be permitted pursuant to applicable municipal, county, state, and federal laws and regulations, and minimize the loss of tillable, prime agricultural soils."

There was some discussion about the percentage of preserved property in the township, the need for ratables, the Master Plan review, upcoming properties for consideration for preservation.

If the exception area is too large, the SADC may deny the application.

Mr. Paillex said if the township doesn't preserve the property it would put them in somewhat of a hardship position having to take money from their operating budget.

Committee Member Koury asked Mr. Paillex to clarify the hardship. Mr. Paillex said the land would always be farmed and they could lease it out to a farmer if they had to. The hardship would be that instead of having produce going to those in need it may be outsourced to a farmer for grain. Mr. Paillex said they do not have a revenue stream and do not accept state or federal funding. If they do not get the property preserved, that is that much more money coming out of their operating budget. It's the initial purchase that would create the hardship.

The 1.8 acre exception would be agreeable to the State and the County. The cost to Franklin Township for this preservation would be about \$60,000.00.

Robert Michisk, 95 Rake Factory Road, addressed the Committee on his farmland preservation application. He commented on all of his farming activities and the benefits for preserving the farm. The property is in both Raritan and Franklin Townships.

Committee Member Koury commented on farmland preservation and said we are going to overburden the residents since he only sees budgets increasing over the next few years. He suggested that the Committee put a hold on preservation until taking a hard look at the Master Plan. Committee Member Darocha commented on the decline in new housing construction in the township. Everyone agreed on a need for a plan to combat increases in taxes in the future.

The Township Committee gave preliminary approval to the Michisk application by Resolution 2017 – 47.

At this time, Stan Prater, JCP&L, reported on their activities during storms Riley and Quinn. He commented on the number of customers affected with 60 mph wind gusts and the number of trees and poles falling. Staging sites were set up along with **bringing** in over 6,200 linemen. He also commented on working with Hunterdon County OEM and the local police. Meetings for April 5 and April 12 are being set up to discuss these recent storms to do an assessment on the response and see where improvements can be made.

Deputy Mayor Burgess asked how we can better communicate with the residents in these emergency situations. Mr. Prater would direct them to the website which they could access on their smart phones if their power and internet are down. He encouraged residents to report any power outages. The more phone calls the better the information they have.

Committee Member Darocha also commented and asked why there were so many trees down with all the improvements JCP&L has made in their trimming program. Mr. Prater said the trees coming down were outside the trim zone – such as trees off private driveways. Also, lineman cannot go up in a bucket to do repairs when winds are over 35-40 mph. It was suggested that more information go out to the residents regarding reporting outages.

Committee Member Soloway commented on the township using surplus so much over the last ten years since we had no debt. There was no bonding and the township used surplus for purchasing major items. Surplus kept going down and there is now a need to correct this. We're now at a point where we can establish a five year plan for equipment replacement.

Planet Civic: Deputy Mayor Burgess reported that the initiative is closed but she would like to send out a final email to the Committee stating the goal of the platform and closing it out. We will continue to use Planet Civic for another initiative. Any recommendations from the Committee would be appreciated. Committee Member Koury recommended a better communication plan with Javier Guardo, principal of PlanetCivic.

Finance, Insurance, IT: Repmann/Burgess

Budget: The Mayor reported that the CFO is working on the budget which will hopefully be introduced in two weeks. The CFO sent an email to the Committee members with a budget summary.

IT: Deputy Mayor Burgess handed out information to the Committee on IT. She provided past information provided to the township from ATON the current IT provider along with details on what equipment was purchased. She also reported on the township having been awarded a grant from Sustainable Jersey to do a technology review. Basically they said we needed to straighten out our Infrastructure before going forward to improve communications within the municipality and its residents. The subcommittee met with ATON late 2017 for their recommendations: upgrade wiring. This has not yet been accomplished. Backup was improved. New laptops were purchased for the police department. Quotes were obtained for the wiring but they are probably outdated by now. We need a better description of our needs for wiring in order to get more accurate quotes. Also need to plan for future IT needs and not just our current needs.

Snyder will also be present. The Mayor reported on George having been out in the field visiting seniors who may have emergency needs and providing portable generators

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where he could. Going forward the Committee would like to revisit and communicate to others what their expectations are in emergency situations.

There was also some discussion about zoning in the township. There are pre-existing three acre parcels though zoning in the township is now five and seven acre zoning. Larger lot zoning is based on the water studies being commissioned by the township in preparing the Master Plan.
