A pool shall not encroach into any front or side yard of a parcel. In the case of corner lots, pools shall not be constructed within the front yards of the lot. Recommended that the order be adopted.

- 18A. The Committee on Ordinance to whom was referred an order that a pedestrian crosswalk be placed where Portland St meets Beech St. A student was struck by a car as she tried to cross the street from the front of Holyoke High School Recommended that the Engineer's recommendation to not install a crosswalk be accepted.
- 18B. The Committee on Ordinance to whom was referred an order That a "No Turn On Red" sign be installed, taking effect when northbound on Resnic Blvd and merging on to Pine St. This will restrict when merges to Pine St can occur to green lights only Recommended that the order be adopted.
- 18C. The Committee on Ordinance to whom was referred an order that the city engineer review and determine if a four way stop sign(s) can be placed at Fairfield and Nonotuck Recommended that the Engineer's recommendation to not install a four way stop be accepted.

MOTIONS, ORDERS AND RESOLUTIONS

25. PUELLO -- That the DPW install a "No Parking" sign within the appropriate required feet from the intersection of Elm and Sargeant. As recommended by the city engineer, this will inform residents of the feet, parking to intersection requirement and will reduce the hazard posed by the existing blind spot.
26. PUELLO -- That the legal office give an opinion regarding the implementation of a city ordinance banning store self imposed plastic bag fees. That an additional opinion be requested on establishing maximum bag fees, not permissible to exceed.
27. PUELLO -- That the Office of Planning and Economic Development be invited to discuss the reasons behind the absence of medical marijuana providers in the city, the original intended reason for cannabis legalization. The goal of this discussion is to come up with a viable pathway to provide this service for residents so they may enjoy their tax benefits and have their medical needs fulfilled. If a plan is already underway this discussion will inform residents of their upcoming benefits.

28. PUELLO -- That the City engineer draft the feasibility and associated costs of a raised crosswalk adjacent to 401 Main Street.

32. VACON -- create an ordinance that drivers operating/altering vehicles, causing repeated backfiring (sounding like gunfire/fireworks), disturbing the peace, will be ticketed for a moving vehicle violation.
33. JOURDAIN -- That the DPW repair the fountain at Laurel Park on Laurel Street. The fountain head was damaged recently and needs to be fixed for Memorial Day opening.
34. JOURDAIN -- That the HG&E repair the lightening in Laurel Park on Laurel Street. The light in the park needs to be fixed asap and HG&E has fixed it in past and their help is needed once again.
35. JOURDAIN
VACON -- That Columbus Day holiday ordinance be changed so the holiday be known as both Columbus Day and Indigenous Peoples Day so everyone may celebrate both, one or the other, or neither if they choose according to their own conscience. This will allow the maximum amount of sensitivity to the issue.
36. JOURDAIN -- That Representative Duffy and Senator Velis (or their representatives) be invited to City Council to discuss specific legislative bills they will file on our behalf to increase our local aid and various funding formulas affecting the city. They are requested to provide us a summary list of all state financial formulas affecting Holyoke, how our current aid is calculated (i.e. strictly by population size, number of students, miles of public roads, etc) so we can understand fully what is really driving our current local aid and what we need to change to get more aid.

The current local aid model is unsustainable and Massachusetts needs to help Holyoke far more than it is currently. Councilors will also provide them with a number of suggestions for specific changes when we discuss.

37. JOURDAIN -- That all City Councilors receive their traditional gold-plated Councilor badge as another traditional sign of their office. This tradition began in 1938 and we as institution should keep it. That the Administrative Assistant facilitate the order and they should be presented by the President when they arrive.

38. MCGEE -- that the legal department review the alley way near 5 Fairfield Ave to determine if it is city property and that the DPW repair the fence and alley from its vehicles going through. See attached photo.

39. MCGEE -- that the City Council give a proclamation for city employees "employee recognition day" for all their dedicated service to the City of Holyoke during the COVID pandemic.
