American Disability Act

- The primary function of the Office of Disability Services is to bring the City of Jackson into compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act. Jackson should not only meet the letter of the ADA but embrace the spirit of the Law. In that arena of thought, we have accomplished the following for this year;
- ADA will continue the partnership with the Dept. of Public Works. This collaboration is focused on utilizing Tiger Grant funding to ensure streets and sidewalks are improved to meet the requirements of the ADA and expectations of the disability community.
- Developed a partnership with the MS Dept. of Rehabilitation Services to host a Disability Awareness Conference in October.
- Participated with the Governor's Job Fair Network for persons with disabilities.
- Met with Continental Tires to discuss employment for persons with disabilities.



Early Childhood Development

- The Early Childhood Division is a preschool program that provides early educational services to children from age 8 weeks to 5 years. The program is designed to support working families which is reflected in the hours of operation (7:30am-5:30pm).
- Two locations: Westside and Mary C. Jones
- Opened Nubia's Landing to accommodate infants (and to increase revenue).
- Started afterschool programs at both sites to increase revenue.
- Started a fatherhood initiative to increase parental involvement (resulting in improved academic performance and attendance).


Senior Services (Title III CMPDD Funding)

Promotes and encourages independence and self-sufficiency among the elderly population. Provides a place of socialization resulting in decreased depression and delayed inabilities

- Home delivered meals \$124,492
- Congregate meals/Community Centers \$110,765
- Outreach/Information & Referrals \$62,028
- Transportation \$519,286
- Renewed a collaborative partnership between the City of Jackson, MDOT and the Jackson Medical Mall Foundation to continue to provide transportation services to seniors aged 60 years and older
 - Provided 44,250 Congregate Meals
 - Provided 65,250 Home Delivered Meals
 - Hosted approximately 200 participants per month
 - Provided outreach to more that 75 seniors per month
 - Provided approximately 500 united of transportation per month




Senior Services—Senior Aides

- The Senior Aides program is designed to integrate seniors back into corporate America, decrease stigma (discrimination) and increase employability among seniors.
- The program employed approximately 40 seniors FY 17-18 and will employ approximately 64 FY 18-19
- Seven people left the program as a result of obtaining long term employment

Family & Youth Services

- Family & Youth Services is designated to deliver a comprehensive array of services to enhance the stability within the City of Jackson families by offering programs and services that assist in the development of the socio-economic independence of the family unit and aid in the positive growth and development of the city youth.
- 80 youth were employed from the traditional MSYEP
- 31 youth were employed from the Apple's Coding Program
- 2 youth (single moms) were employed from United Health Care

Thalia Mara Hall

- The International Ballet Competition was held this year at Thalia Mara Hall. The competition drew 28,000 in attendance to Thalia Mara Hall and the Arts Center of Mississippi. People came from all over the world to Jackson.
- A successful Broadway and Jackson Live! Season paved the way for the upcoming season- Jackson's largest ever boasting a headliner of Les Miserables (back after 20 years).
- Town Hall meetings have been held at the Hall featuring speakers like Mayor Lumumba, Bernie Sanders and the March For Our Lives movement.

Smith Robertson Museum

- The Smith Robertson Museum and Cultural Center is proud to announce that they were awarded another \$20,000.00 Grant from the Nissan Foundation for the building of the Wright, Barber, Pittman Library. This grant was awarded in June, 2018 and will be administered by May, 2019.
- The Mississippi Humanities Council awarded the Smith Robertson Museum and Cultural Center a \$2,000.00 mini grant for, "The Mule Train: A Journey of Hope Remembered.
- The Smith Robertson Museum and Cultural Center is still working with the Mississippi Department of Employment Services by having volunteers assigned to the SRM.
- Will host the reception for the Southeastern Museum Conference (approximately 300 Museum professionals)
- Is partnering with Pearl Street Community Development Center to display their "Second Chance Quilt" exhibit.

Davis Planetarium

Currently closed due to renovations

- Received 87,000 from the Horner Foundation
- We finalized the 5 year effort to replace our 40 year old rood. In additional to this, we have secured funding for a full renovation of the 3rd floor lobby space, which will result in a complete transformation that will drastically improve our value proposition and profitability.
- We have prepared a totally new lineup of features to cover the entire 18/19 quartet rotation, revised our teacher's guide to better serve each class place in their curriculum and created supplemental educational materials to provide to students. We have also enlisted the help of educators from local colleges to participate in STEM based initiatives for summer 19.






CITY OF JACKSON DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN & CULTURAL SERVICES ORGANIZATIONAL STRUCTURE
