

CORE DIVISIONS





TRANSACTIONAL DIVISION

The Transactional Division provides legal advice and representation to the Mayor, Chief Administrative Officer, City Council, and City departments, as well as other City agencies, boards, and commissions.

The attorneys handle a variety of legal matters, including but not limited to real property, open meetings, open records, housing, bond and finance, ordinances, election, federally-funded programs, construction, environmental law, minority and women-owned business contracting, conflicts of interest and ethics matters, and matters relating to economic development and neighborhood revitalization. They also advise city staff on health benefits programs, life insurance, Section 125, Cafeteria Plan, general payroll tax administration, and employee benefit issues involving retired, terminated, and deceased employees. They are responsible for drafting all of the City's contracts and legal documents including tax abatement and economic development agreements; construction, architectural, and engineering services contracts; interlocal cooperation agreements; and real estate documents.







LITIGATION DIVISION

The Litigation Division handles all lawsuits in which the City of Jackson or any of its employees, elected officials, and agents are named as defendants in their official capacity. This includes all tort litigation and constitutional claims filed in federal or state court. One of the Division's primary responsibilities is to defend the City of Jackson and its employees in personal injury lawsuits. The Division also performs other tasks, to include:

- ➤ Providing representation to employees subpoenaed to testify by deposition in cases involving the City
- ➤ Providing advice to the Risk Management Division in handling complex claims, investigating claims, handling workers compensation claims, and evaluating water/sewer backup claims
- ➤ Providing advice, assistance, and filing suit, if necessary, to collect money owed to the City for property damage or bad faith denial of insurance proceeds

FY 2020-2021 BUDGET HEARING OFFICE OF CITY ATTORNEY LITIGATION

REPRESENTATIVE SAMPLE OF DISMISSED CASES AND SAVINGS

City of Jackson Water Billing Suit, Civil Action No. G-2019-782-G/2, Chancery Court of First Judicial District of Hinds County, Mississippi – Citizens brought action for third-party review process via a special master, attorneys' fees, injunction prohibiting City from issuing any "cut off" notices and from terminating any service to delinquent customers. Case dismissed in favor of City. No payout.

Nungesser Industries v. City of Jackson, No. 2018-CA-00908-COA, In the Court of Appeals of the State of Mississippi – Nungesser lacked standing to assert breach of contract because it was not a party to the subject contract. Trial court's finding that case is dismissed in favor of City is upheld. Mississippi Supreme Court denied certiorari. No payout.

Robert Rosamond v. City of Jackson - officer involved vehicle accident - dismissed. No payout.

Teris Buie v. City of Jackson and Jean Holmes v. City of Jackson – allegation that Plaintiffs were injured when they struck an uncovered manhole – both cases dismissed. No payout.

REPRESENTATIVE SAMPLE OF DISMISSED CASES AND SAVINGS CONT'D

Felton v. City of Jackson, Civil Action No. 3:18-cv-74-RHW – alleged disability discrimination in violation of ADA. U.S. Court of Appeals for the Fifth Circuit ruled that Felton failed to establish discrimination. No payout.

Charles Lung v. The City of Jackson - officer involved shooting - case dismissed - plaintiff died during litigation w/o any corroborating evidence - No payout.

Jasmine Simmons – case involved mistaken identity. MBI issued amber alert for incorrect name. JPD apprehended based on MBI mistake. Court granted summary judgment on 1983 claim as it was clearly a case of mistaken identity and no intentional deprivation of constitutional rights, and no violation of policy or established policy, custom, or practice. No payout.

Alltel Corp. d/b/a Verizon Wireless v. City of Jackson, Civil Action No. 3:19-cv-740-TSL-RHW – summary judgment granted in favor of Alltel for issuance of use permit to build telecommunications tower.

Sherion D. Berry v. City of Jackson - Allegation of Discrimination on basis of race and age after not hired within JPD

Demand: \$1,000,000

Settlement Amount: \$7,000

Savings to City: \$993,000

Butler v. City of Jackson, Civil Action No. 251-13-967CIV - City employee hit vehicle and plaintiff claims damage to himself and vehicle. Plaintiff incurred \$14,990 in medical expenses; \$14,576.25 in loss wages and \$10,634.54 in property damage, excluding salvage recovery. City paid \$15,134.54 to State Farm to settle property damage claim. Plaintiff demanded \$40,000 to settle his personal injury case. City paid \$30,000.

Savings to City: \$10,000

McCoy v. City of Jackson, Civil Action No. 19-170 – City employee hit plaintiff in a crosswalk as he was crossing street. Plaintiff's medical expenses for AMR transport, ER treatment at UMC and physical therapy at Medicomp amount to \$9,312.04 Plaintiff demanded \$40,000 to settle. City paid \$12,500.

Savings to City: \$27,500

Thompson v. City of Jackson - Excessive force, Title 42 U.S.C. Sec. 1983 claim.

Demand: \$200,000

Ferrell v. City of Jackson - City closed street for two year prior to notice.

Demand: 1,000,000

Settlement: No money, City grants use of 4 parking spaces for 5 years, equaling \$10,000 -

\$30,000 worth

Savings to City: \$970,000 - \$990,000

Sandra Harper and Dawn Harper v. City of Jackson and Stephen Harper v. City of Jackson – accident allegedly caused by traffic signal going completely out. Each Harper submitted a notice of claim for \$500,000. The case was mediated on December 5, 2019 and each of the three claims settled for \$3,500 for an aggregate of \$10,000.

Shameka Garner v. City of Jackson - City employee was driving and struck car of Shameka Garner. Garner initially demanded \$22,000 based on medical bills of \$6,898.50. Garner filed suit on January 10, 2016 and case recently settled for \$2,000.00.

Savings to the City: \$4,898.50

Liability Claim from Raymond Investments, LLC - City employee struck light pole in parking lot, destroying pole and pillar.

Identify Risk • Assess Risk • Review Controls • Implement Solution • Monitor Risk

The Risk Management Division coordinates the safety and risk management functions for the City of Jackson in order to eliminate risk resulting in financial exposure of the City. These functions include:

- > Employee safety and loss control programs;
- Contractual risk/exposure transfer;
- > Procurement of insurance and bonds to protect the City's assets;
- Claims adjusting in the areas of property, liability and workers' compensation;
- Subrogation and collection for damages to City.

RISK MANAGEMENT

SAFETY & LOSS CONTROL PROGRAMS

The Safety Coordinator and Claims Supervisor consistently conduct the following classes for City employees: Defensive Driving, Workers' Compensation Training, Workplace Managing Stress, Slip Trip and Fall, Proper Lifting and Safety Leadership Training. The Risk Manager and Safety Coordinator compile and analyze data to better assess the safety areas of concern in order to reduce liability. The Risk Management Division continually makes changes in order to operate more efficiently, making better use of the employees and resources in the division to expedite claims while cutting costs and protecting the City from liability.

Workers Compensation Defense Highlights

The City of Jackson became a self-insurer for the payment of workers compensation benefits in 1992. Approximately two (2) years ago, the City of Jackson secured coverage from a commercial carrier. Even though the City now has coverage from a commercial carrier, there are still claims which are self-insured.

Workers compensation is not a fault based system. When an employee sustains an injury during the course and scope of employment, indemnity benefits are payable if the employee is disabled from work beginning on day 6; however, if the disability is fourteen (14) days or more, the benefits are retroactive to day 1. The indemnity payment is 2/3 of the employee's average weekly wage for the 52 week period which precedes the date of injury subject to caps based on the state's average weekly wage for the year of injury. The injured employee is also entitled to medical benefits, which are unlimited.

The Office of the City Attorney receives a workers compensation file when the injured employee files a Petition to Controvert with the Mississippi Workers Compensation Commission. Absent the availability of a defense such as intoxication or the running of a limitation's period, the defensive goals are centered on limiting the City's exposure for the payment of indemnity benefits and medicals.

WORKERS COMPENSATION DEFENSE HIGHLIGHTS-CASES

The following is a list of cases in which the City's exposure for the payment of significant benefits for disability and medicals was extinguished by settlement during the period August 2019 - present:

Employee # 1 within the Public Works Department sustained an injury to the knee and was recommended for knee replacement. Employee had some pre-existing conditions and there was disputed medical evidence on whether the work related incident caused need for knee replacement. Claim resolved for \$15,000.00. Important note: City's exposure for knee replacement, physical therapy, medical, and other benefits extinguished.

Employee # 2 sustained injury to knee during law enforcement recruit training and subsequently resigned because of temporary physical restrictions. Claim was denied and no benefits paid. Claim resolved for \$9,750.00. Important note: City's exposure for indemnity and medical benefits for a person who did not complete recruit training was extinguished.

Employee # 3 - previous employee of the Department of Human and Cultural Services sustained a severe injury to dominant hand during the course of turning off a steam table. Employee had permanent functional limitations following incident but is no longer employed. Claim was resolved for \$5,000.00. Important note: City's exposure for indemnity and future medical benefits for an individual no longer employed extinguished.

Employee # 4: Employee in Public Works Department alleged that he sustained injury to knee, shoulder, and lumbar parts of body during the course and scope of employment. The initial settlement demand was \$50,000.00. Claim resolved for \$10,000.00. Important note: City's exposure for indemnity and future medicals, which would include knee replacement was extinguished.

OFFICE OF THE PROSECUTOR


The Criminal Prosecution Division is responsible for prosecuting all misdemeanor offenses that occur within the City of Jackson. Misdemeanor offenses range from traffic violations and DUI to domestic violence and simple assault. In addition to criminal violations of state law, the Criminal Prosecution Division also prosecutes violations of the City's ordinances (*i.e.* public nudity, noise control, junked vehicles, etc.).

All misdemeanor trials take place at the City of Jackson Municipal Court. Cases that are appealed from the Jackson Municipal Court are further prosecuted at the Hinds County Court and Hinds Circuit Court levels. The Criminal Prosecution Division also handles drug forfeiture cases in the Hinds County Court where property has been confiscated through arrests made by the Jackson Police Department.




