Visitor Center Report June 2024

In the month of June, the Johnson City Visitors Center had the following:

- 22 groups of visitors
 - Most groups were from Texas (Austin, Houston, San Antonio, Dallas, Tyler,
 Killeen, and a few locals)
 - We also had a group each from the following: Georgia; Wisconsin; Ohio;
 Germany *the group from Germany were visiting family in Fredericksburg*
 - Most groups said they were on their way to Fredericksburg and were just passing through. They asked about where the best places to eat or drink were, and if we had any museums.
 - Two groups were on their way back to Austin where they were having a family gathering, and we also had a couple staying at an Airbnb in town and asked for a walking map.
 - I also had two groups, one was a group of 10, come in to help them find a place to stay in Late August!

 - Where the boutiques in town were
 - Where the National Park Headquarters were

I got to go to the Texas Historical Commission workshop in Bandera, where I was able to meet with the City Manager and City Secretary of Boerne. I also got to speak with the Mayor of Kerrville and made some connections with other Visitor Center Specialists all over Texas.
