COMMUNITY RESOURCE CENTERS OF TEXAS TO BEGIN NEW TRANSPORTATION VOUCHER PROGRAM

JOHNSON CITY, TEXAS – Community Resource Centers of Texas is introducing a new program to aid those with mobility needs. The Transportation Voucher Program will be used to provide free rides to people with disabilities, veterans, older adults ages 55 & up, those who are ill, and those who are experiencing financial difficulties. These rides are available for medical trips, employment reasons, education, religious and social visits, and more.

The Community Resource Center's Transportation Voucher Program will allow Riders to choose their drivers, so there is already a safe and secure connection to the Rider. Drivers can be friends, relatives, or a neighbor. The program will reimburse mileage expenses drivers incur while transporting a Rider. After each completed trip, Riders will provide drivers with a signed voucher. Drivers will then present these vouchers to the Community Resource Center for reimbursement. All drivers will be eligible to receive mileage reimbursements for each completed trip. Vouchers do not have monetary value.

This Transportation Voucher Program is scheduled to roll out July 1, 2021. If you would like more information or are interested in becoming a Rider, please email blanco@crctx.org.

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COMMUNITY RESOURCE CENTERS OF TEXAS, INC. TRANSPORTATION VOUCHER PROGRAM GUIDELINES

Bookkeeping

Community Resource Centers of Texas, Inc. will be responsible for managing the funds, Rider budget, vouchers, and reimbursement to volunteer drivers. Site Coordinators will track Riders, who drove them, date/reason for trip, voucher amount, and Rider account balance. The Site Coordinators will also collect general information on volunteer drivers.

Further, Site Coordinators will use a master voucher register for each Rider. Each master voucher register will identify Rider booklet number and will track each voucher used by number, the amount of the voucher (trip cost), date of the voucher, and the remaining amount in the Rider's account. The Rider's voucher register must match the master voucher register.

Riders

If you are interested in participating in the transportation voucher program as a Rider please contact the Site Coordinator at your Community Resource Center. The Site Coordinator will aid in providing the necessary training on how to participate in the transportation voucher program, including:

- 1) how to qualify to be a part of the transportation voucher program,
- 2) an overview of how the transportation voucher program works,
- 3) how many dollars Riders can use monthly/yearly (\$150 per Rider per year),
- 4) how the vouchers may be used (medical appointments, shopping, personal visits, church, job interviews),
- 5) who can provide a ride: a volunteer driver of your choice,
- 6) how to log vouchers in voucher register, and
- 7) how to be issued a new voucher booklet (the previous used booklet must be returned to the CRC).

The initial training provides an overview of the transportation voucher program, a demonstration of how to use the vouchers, instruction on how to book a ride, and the Community Resource Center contacts for the program. Riders will receive a voucher booklet and voucher register at this training event.

Who qualifies for the program?

- Adults 55+, veterans, and those who lack mobility due to physical or mental challenges, or those facing financial challenges.





Rides will be funded by the transportation voucher program using the provided vouchers. Existing rates per trip and mile MUST be used. *Transportation vouchers submitted for reimbursement of amounts that do not match the agreed upon rates will be audited.*

- Signed Transportation Voucher Program Guidelines form

Training Materials

- Transportation Program Guidelines
- Voucher booklets and register

Blanco County CRC will check-in with Riders to ensure the program is operating efficiently and to answer any questions.

Please note that participation in this program is a privilege, and please be judicious in your use of the funds so as not to inadvertently impact other program participants or result in the termination of the program.

The transportation vouchers are subject to random audits to ensure funds are used for allowable services and for no other purposes.

Reimbursement Rates and Procedures

The volunteer driver will be reimbursed at a rate of \$0.575 per mile (the Texas state reimbursement rate) based on the submitted voucher(s). Vouchers recording the mileage, travel time, purpose of the trip, and who used the service must be submitted to the Blanco County CRC for reimbursement. Reimbursement may take 10 to 14 business days.

Trip booking

- Rider secures their own volunteer driver.
- If you plan on including additional individuals in the ride, please inform the Community Resource Center when you schedule the ride to ensure the additional Rider is enrolled in the program. The volunteer driver will only be reimbursed for rides given to individuals enrolled in the Transportation Voucher Program.





Feedback

To provide feedback on the program please contact your county CRC.

- If inappropriate use of the vouchers is identified, Community Resource Centers will communicate with the person(s) informing them of the rules and regulations of the program. If needed following this communication, Community Resource Centers may then work with the person(s) to set up trip-by-trip voucher use or reduced future vouchers, or essential-only voucher use.
- With these guidelines in mind, Community Resource Centers has the right to not reimburse a fraudulent voucher, to remove a Rider from the program, or seek reparations based on the fraudulent claims.

Groundwater Conservation District
Groundwater Management
Professionals for Blanco County**

The Blanco Pedernales Groundwater Conservation District (District) is the local governmental agency responsible for the management of groundwater and aquifers in Blanco County. It was created in 2000 by the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality in response to a petition submitted by Blanco County residents. Blanco County voters confirm the creation of the District during an election held on January 21, 2001. The District is governed by five locally elected Directors and currently has three employees on staff.

During the past two or three months, some of the Directors and staff have noticed that Blanco County residents have been inundated with a significant amount of misleading comments, half-truths, erroneous statements, and a complete disregard of readily available and factual information about the District, its Directors and staff, and Blanco County groundwater. The comments have appeared on paid political advertising, personal and political websites and Facebook pages, public presentations, emails, letters to the editors of both Blanco County newspapers, and public comments made at other governmental meetings. It is interesting to note that the people providing all this misinformation made no effort to contact the District to obtain information about the District's Rules, policies, Groundwater Management Plan, scientific studies, cooperative programs with other agencies, or other District groundwater related activities.

That failure to communicate seems odd behavior for those who profess to have a great interest in Blanco County groundwater, but it does explain why they have had such difficulty getting their facts straight. Our District hopes to correct these errors and provide Blanco County residents with the following good solid facts on a few of the more controversial comments being tossed about regarding the GMA and DFC process, Aquifer Mining, spring flow protection, and Non Relevant Aquifers.

- **District Authority.** The District does not exist in a vacuum. It is regulated by, and must comply with, the provisions of Texas Water Code Chapter 36. This statute includes our purpose, powers, rule-making authority, public meeting and

public hearing processes, the requirement to participate in regional groundwater planning, financial, taxing, or fee authority, the creation of a groundwater management plan, elections, and other provisions.

- **GMA and DFC Information.** Chapter 36.108 requires the District to participate in a regional groundwater planning committee with other groundwater districts located in Groundwater Management Area 9 (GMA 9). The primary purpose of GMA 9 is to create a Desired Future Condition (DFC) for each relevant aquifer within GMA 9. A DFC set by GMA 9 describes the condition of the aquifer GMA 9 would expect looking forward about 50 years. The DFC must be (1) measurable, (2) achievable, and (3) reasonable; and must be approved by a two thirds majority vote of the GMA 9 committee members. When setting the DFC, GMA 9 is required to evaluate and consider certain criteria including aquifer characteristics, usage, socioeconomic impacts, balance the highest practicable production consistent with conservation, protection, and sustainability. This process repeats itself every 5 years, and we are nearing the end of the third planning cycle.

- **Spring Flow as a DFC?** Since the very beginning of the DFC process, many people have wanted GMA 9 to set a DFC based on spring flow in order to protect these "jewels" of the Texas Hill Country. To evaluate this request, GMA 9 asked the Texas Water Development Board to run a groundwater availability model with a DFC of trying to maintain 90% of the springflow recorded during the 1957 drought of record. In short, it was not achievable. In fact, it was not achievable even if all pumping was removed. In other words, no people, no wells, and no pumping! GMA 9 realized this was not going to be an option.

- **Aquifer Mining as a DFC?** Many complaints and accusations have been made about how the District and GMA 9 are destroying our groundwater resources by setting a DFC that allows "aquifer mining". Anyone making this accusation clearly does not understand the meaning of the term. Aquifer mining occurs when a person, a district, or a GMA allows pumping groundwater with no reasonable expectation of any significant recovery or recharge. An example of true aquifer mining can be found in the Texas panhandle where some districts and GCDs propose pumping the Ogallala Aquifer in such a way that they will have 50% of the aquifer

left after 50 years. Not a single member of GMA 9 wanted aquifer mining in the Texas Hill Country and it was quickly rejected as a DFC option.

- No Change in Drawdown as a DFC? GMA 9 considered a "zero" change in drawdown...in other words...keep the aquifer levels the same. Similar to trying to use spring flow as a DFC, the zero drawdown idea was not achievable except maybe for aquifers with little or no pumping demand. In those few low demand cases, it was easier to declare those as Non Relevant Aquifers.

- Aquifer Drawdown Averaging. After much discussion and dozens of groundwater model runs, GMA 9 finally settled on using the change in average aquifer levels (drawdown) as the basis of setting DFCs. The modeling indicated that GMA 9 water levels in the year 2008 closely calibrated with the Hill Country Trinity Aquifer Model used by the TWDB so 2008 was chosen as the baseline year for measuring average change in water level. GMA 9 also experimented with several drawdown scenarios... from zero drawdown to as much as 45 feet of drawdown. Much discussion between the members of the GMA 9 committee finally resulted in setting a DFC of allowing approximately 30 feet of drawdown to occur over the next 50 years on a region-wide basis. Many comments are made using the 30 feet of drawdown trying to scare and agitate Blanco County residents into thinking their well will soon have 30 feet less water in it. The scare tactics never include the "on a region-wide basis" water level averaging concept...which is a misleading half-truth. The TWDB uses the GMA 9 DFC of 30 feet to calculate drawdowns for each district...and the drawdown for Blanco County is only 19 feet! Anyone telling you that Blanco County has a DFC drawdown of 30' simply does not understand the GMA and DFC process and are probably poorly informed on other groundwater issues.

- Non Relevant Aquifers. This is probably one of the most misunderstood and confusing descriptive terms ever devised and I personally hate it with a passion! If we were only allowed to use a term like "Locally Managed Aquifer" it would be much more easily understood and a lot less a "hot button" for owners and users of Ellenburger wells. What it means is that any aquifer so designated by GMA 9 is considered Non Relevant for regional planning purposes only--repeat--only! Using the Ellenburger Aquifer in Blanco County for example. For years, Blanco County was

the only county in GMA 9 that had any producing Ellenburger wells. These wells had absolutely no effect or impact on the rest of GMA 9...thus the decision to declare it Non Relevant was an easy and rational choice

Although the Ellenburger lies very deep under Kendall County and Kerr County, the Ellenburger in Blanco County does not seem to have any direct communication with those areas. In the first planning cycle, a numerical model was run for the Ellenburger Aquifer based on a maximum drawdown of two feet. This resulted in a Modeled Available Groundwater quantity of 2,661 acre feet for Blanco County, 9 acre feet for Kendall County, and 6 acre feet for Kerr County. During the second planning cycle, the Cow Creek Groundwater Conservation District insisted on setting a DFC for the Ellenburger Aquifer in Kendall County despite the fact they had no wells producing from that aquifer. Realizing that the 9 acre feet was pretty insignificant, they decided to change the DFC to 7 feet of drawdown. This increased the MAG to 75 acre feet. Both Blanco County and Kerr County decided that a Non Relevant declaration was more appropriate in their areas. Based on the Cow Creek District DFC, some people have been convinced that the Blanco Pedernales Groundwater Conservation District is ignoring and not managing the Ellenburger Aquifer. Nothing could be farther from the truth! Not only do we have five Ellenburger Monitor Wells, but the Ellenburger Aquifer is also in our District Groundwater Management Plan (with 2,661 acre feet of MAG based on a two foot drawdown model run conducted and approved by the TWDB!), it is included in the Region K Regional Water Plan, and ultimately the State Water Plan!

I have probably provided more information than some of you need, but I wanted to get some basic information and facts out this week while it is still being a topic of conversation. I appreciate your time and interest in our groundwater resources.

If you have any question about your well, Blanco County groundwater, or hydrogeological information, I urge you contact the Blanco Pedernales Groundwater Conservation District. We are the primary source for groundwater information in Blanco County.

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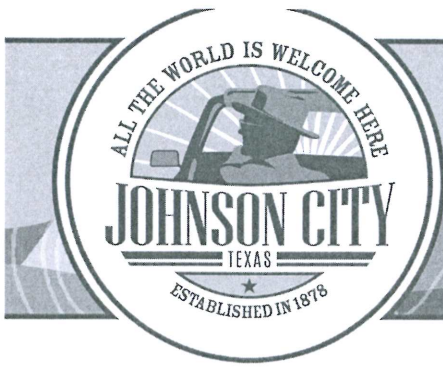
On June 5th, Sgt. Garrett Scallorn received a call in reference to a reckless driver traveling southbound on US HWY 281 into Johnson City. A witness reported following this vehicle from the Marble Falls city limits south observing very dangerous driving from the vehicle operator. Sgt. Scallorn located the vehicle parked in the Valero Gas Station parking lot in between the gas pumps. Upon contacting the driver Sgt. Scallorn developed sufficient evidence to show that the driver was impaired and should not have been operating a motor vehicle. The male subject was subsequently arrested and transported to the Blanco County Jail.

On June 11th Officer Chad Wiggins took a report of Criminal Mischief at the city softball field. It was reported that a window was broken out on the concession stand located next to the field. During this investigation three Juvenile males have been identified as possible suspects. We are currently setting up interviews with them and their guardians to come to a potential resolution of this case. It will be filed with the Blanco County Attorney's Office when complete.

We are setting up our July Court Docket, which will be July 20. We are starting to discuss opening back up with in-person hearings. Some other courts are testing out a hybrid platform this month. I'm in communication with the Victoria court clerk to hear the results. Judge and I had discussed that we like the virtual option since we have become a tourist town.
