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
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
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Leaf Collection Begins October 21!



One of the most unique and highly valued services the City of Kettering offers residents is free curbside collection of leaves each fall. Leaves are picked up by City crews and taken to the City's leaf composting center to be converted to mulch and compost, then offered free of charge to residents each spring. The City will begin in District 1 on Monday, October 21, and will continue leaf pickup until early December. Please note that all leaves should be raked to the curb by Monday, December 2, for the final pass for fall collection.

Please remember the following tips for leaf pickup:

- Know your leaf collection district.
 Reference the above map to find your
 district or visit www.ketteringoh.
 org and enter your address in the My
 Services tab on our home page.
- Don't wait until our crews are near your district to rake leaves. As leaves begin to fall, rake piles to the edge of your lawn.

We will make several passes through each district for collection.

Call 937-296-3255 (FALL), check the Kettering website or follow us on Facebook to determine the current location of leaf pickup crews.

• Prior to collection, rake your leaves to the edge of your lawn, but not into the street where they will block traffic and cause a hazard to storm drains. Do not block storm drains or waterways.

- Do not bag your leaves.
- Make sure leaves are not under, between or around parked cars.
- Don't rake anything except leaves to the curb for pickup. Branches, sticks, grass and other yard waste clog the machinery and throw the crews off schedule. Leaf piles containing branches, grass, etc., will not be collected. You may take your tree branches and brush to the City's Yard Debris Drop-Off Center located on Woodman Center Drive or put them in your Rumpke cart for pickup on your normal trash collection day.

Help Prevent Stormwater Pollution

Leaf litter and landscape trash Too many of these nutrients cause rapid algae growth downstream in streams and lakes. Algae looks and smells bad, degrades water hazard. As algae decays, it uses up oxygen in the water leading to hypoxic regions downstream. These dead zones support fewer organisms and have been linked to massive fish kills in the Gulf of Mexico into which the Miami waste and taking advantage of curbside pickup positively impact the Miami Valley waterways and ultimately the Gulf of Mexico. The largest dead zone on record in the Gulf was the size of New Jersey, nearly completely devoid of any aquatic animal species.

Roadway and Construction Projects Underway

Many of the 2024 roadway and sidewalk construction projects are progressing nicely.

The East David Road Improvements project (Far Hills Avenue to Ackerman Boulevard) is progressing with curb repair, as well as new curb where it did not previously exist. Soon, the last missing link of sidewalk between Wilmington Pike and Far Hills Avenue will be constructed.





Paving on the Asphalt Overlay Program will soon be complete. Crews are currently on Woodman Drive, just south of Dorothy Lane.

Construction of the Miami Valley Research Bike Path is nearly complete.

The construction of a retaining wall for the West Stroop Sidewalk project (Overland Trail to Southmoor Circle NW) is over halfway complete. The sidewalk will be poured once the wall is complete. The second phase is scheduled for construction in 2025, and will run between Ridgeway Road and Stonebridge Road.





Repair of curb, sidewalk, drive approach and curb ramps are progressing in the Newcom Knolls neighborhood. Once the concrete work is complete, the streets will be resurfaced with asphalt.



Have you ridden Greater Dayton RTA's Route 28 loop in Kettering? This is one of Kettering's local partnerships to offer residents an added convenience to travel the city for errands, doctor appointments, a workout at the Kettering Recreation Complex and everything in between! Route 28 runs from 6 a.m. to 11 p.m. with a frequency of approximately 40 minutes. The route loops through parts of Kettering along Dorothy Lane to East Stroop Road, to Southern Boulevard and then back to Dorothy Lane. The route replaces the southern portion of the discontinued Route 11. Route 28 does not travel downtown to Wright Stop Plaza. Fire Prevention Week: October 6 — 12

Smoke alarms: Make them work for you!

This year's campaign strives to educate everyone about the importance of having working smoke alarms in the home.

Install

Install smoke alarms in every bedroom, outside each separate sleeping area (like a hallway) and on each level (including the basement) of the home.

Test

Test smoke alarms at least once a month by pushing the test button.

Replace

Replace all smoke alarms when they are 10 years old or stop responding when tested.



Recreational Fires

Fall is a popular time for recreational fires as the temperature begins to cool. Here is a list of rules that the State of Ohio has set for recreational fires or open burning

- The only authorized fuel source is clean dry wood. (No yard waste or rubbish material)
- If the fire is confined to an approved container such as an outdoor fireplace, barbecue pit, etc. the fire must be at least 15 feet from a structure or combustible materials.
- For an open fire not contained, the fire must be at least 25 feet from
 a structure, wood fence, neighboring structure, or combustible
 materials. Conditions that could cause a fire to spread within 25
 feet of the fire must be eliminated before ignition of a fire.
- An outdoor fire, where the fuel being burned is not contained in an outdoor fireplace, must have a fuel area of fewer than 3 feet in diameter and fewer than 2 feet in height.
- The fire must be constantly attended while burning and must be extinguished if it is not attended.
- A portable fire extinguisher with a minimum of a 4A rating, garden hose, bucket of sand, or other suitable means for extinguishing the fire must be provided.
- The fire must not create an offensive or objectionable condition that interferes with the neighboring residents' use and enjoyment of their property. If this occurs, the Fire Department is required to order the person responsible for the fire to extinguish the fire.
- The Fire Department is required to extinguish fires which create hazardous conditions.

Often complaints are received from neighbors when a recreational fire is not conducted following these rules, or when a recreational fire produces smoke that migrates off of the property and into the residence of neighboring properties. Persons with chronic breathing problems can often be affected by these conditions.

Another issue that is commonly associated with recreational fires are noise and disturbance of the neighborhood when these events extend late into the evening. These matters will be dealt with by the Kettering Police Department. Charlie Giles Retires as President of Miami Valley Research Park Association

An influential Miami Valley Research Park leader recently retired, and while he was not officially a city employee, Charlie Giles' impact on the City of Kettering has been immeasurable.

The City of Kettering has been fortunate to have Charlie Giles serve as President of the Miami Valley Research Park Association for more than 40 years. During that time he was instrumental in handling the administrative duties of the park, shaping it from what was at one time mostly undeveloped land to an economic powerhouse and home to dozens of successful and growing businesses.

Charlie Giles retirement became effective earlier this summer, and with it came the end of an era. He had a seat at the table in the 1980s when Governor Rhodes donated the land in Research Park to a consortium of colleges – in an effort to create an economic development and job creation research cluster. Over time, he helped the Research Park evolve into a renowned site for research and development.

Today, thousands of employees work in the Research Park at businesses such as Reynolds & Reynolds, Solvita, Resonetics, Life Connections, Kodak, Woolpert, Xerion Advanced Battery, Schneider Electric, Chapel Electric and various defense

contractors, as well as many other office users located in the Sixth River office buildings. The park is home to additional companies doing cutting-edge research, and it still has land available for new development.

The City of Kettering offers its appreciation to Charlie Giles for his long-standing commitment to managing the park, as well as developing the design review standards which have ensured the buildings and properties are meticulously maintained and serve as a prominent location for businesses.

The goal of the Kettering Leadership Academy (KLA) is to build a resource of community leaders on a continuing basis. Mary Beth O'Dell's tenure with the City of Kettering spanned over 22 years during which she spearheaded numerous projects that significantly enhanced the community's recreational facilities. One of her notable achievements was the transformation of the old, seldom-used tennis courts at John F. Kennedy Park into vibrant pickleball courts. Starting in 2014, through Mary Beth's leadership, the courts quickly became a beloved hub for pickleball enthusiasts.

The initial renovation turned four vacant tennis courts into six pickleball courts fostering a welcoming community of players eager to share their love for the sport. The demand for court time soon outgrew the available space prompting further developments. With the collaboration of the Pickleball Advisory Council and generous contributions from the Meyer family, the PicklePals and other donors, the facility expanded to 12 courts, now recognized as the "Polar Star" of pickleball in Southwest Ohio.

The Ceremony

The morning of June 18 was marked by a special meet-and-greet ceremony at the Meyer Pickleball Courts. Players, city officials and community members gathered to express their gratitude to Mary Beth for her years of dedicated service and her significant contributions to the development of the courts.

Mary Beth was presented with several tokens of appreciation: a framed photo from the Pickleball Advisory Council, a new pickleball, a key chain and a cooling towel. These gifts symbolized the community's deep appreciation for her vision and leadership.

Adding a fun twist to the event, Mary Beth and Mayor Peggy Lehner received their first pickleball lesson from Pickleball Court Monitor Verne Morland. The pair eagerly took to the courts, expressing interest in returning for more lessons in the future.



A Community Effort

The development and ongoing success of the Meyer Pickleball Courts have been a true community effort. Regular meetings, generous donations and collaborative planning have ensured the facility meets the needs of both novice and experienced players. The courts boast designated areas for different skill levels ensuring an inclusive and welcoming environment for all.

The partnership with Kettering Health Network, which provided a much-needed shade structure, exemplifies the community's collaborative spirit. Additionally, volunteer court monitors, many of whom are members of the Pickleball Advisory Council, play a crucial role in maintaining the smooth operation of the courts.

Continuing the Legacy

The June 18 ceremony was a heartfelt tribute to Mary Beth O'Dell's legacy. Her vision and dedication have left an indelible mark on Kettering's recreational landscape. As players gather daily at the Meyer Pickleball Courts, they do so in a space that embodies community spirit, health and friendship—values that Mary Beth championed throughout her career.

The Pickleball Advisory Council and the Kettering community look forward to building on this legacy, continuing to enhance and expand the facilities and ensuring that the Meyer Pickleball Courts remain a premier destination for pickleball enthusiasts in the region.
