Artwork must be labeled with the student's name, and guardian's name, address, telephone number and email. Please include the grade, age, school and teacher.

Artwork Pickup

How to Make Lanterns



Materials:

- · Construction or other paper
- Paint, markers, art supplies to decorate objects
- Scissors and tape

Step 1:

Choose your paper and decorate with colors and images that reflect your selected festival.

Step 2:

Fold your piece of paper in half, lengthways, so the two long sides meet.



Step 3:

Use a pair of scissors to cut lines along the fold. Do not cut all the way across, as if you do your lantern will fall into pieces.

Step 4:

Open out your paper, and roll your lantern up so that the cuts you have made are running top to bottom

Step 5:

Fix in place with sticky tape or staplers.

Step 6:

Add a handle on the top so you can hang up your lantern.



How to Make a Mobile



Materials:

- · Clothes hanger
- String, ribbon, thread, or yarn
- Items to make objects: construction paper, magazines, or other objects
- Paint, markers, art supplies to decorate objects
- Scissors and hole puncher

Step 1:

If your clothes hanger is metal you can shape it into a circle or square if you want.

Step 2:

Create your objects with paint, markers, or whatever you have on hand to reflect the festival you have chosen

Step 3:

Use your scissors or hole puncher to make holes in the objects.

Step 4:

With yarn, string, ribbons, or thread tie your objects onto the clothes hanger at different lengths.
