# CITIZEN POLICE ACADEMY



The Citizen Police Academy is an awareness program designed to increase the information flow between the police department and the public. Participants get firsthand knowledge on how the department functions. There are classes on patrol functions, drug awareness, K9, traffic enforcement, criminal investigations, evidence collection, firearm safety and more. This forum provides a means to increase public awareness and support for the police department throughout the community.

## K9 AWARDS

The 2017 K9 Unit consisted of Ptl. B. Wright and K9 Fuse (Single Purpose Narcotic), Ptl. A. Disalvo and K9 Nash (Dual Purpose Patrol & Narcotic) and Ptl. D. Maloney and K9 Jax (Dual Purpose Patrol & Narcotic). The K9s were deployed 357 times, resulting in 319 charges, of which 245 were narcotics related and 104 were felony charges. They also found 12 guns and won numerous awards in 2017 including:



**Ptl. Wright and K9 Fuse:** USPCA 4th in nation for Narcotics Detection

**Ptl. Maloney and K9 Jax:** USPCA 8th in nation for Narcotics Detection, USPCA Region 5 Catch of the Quarter (Patrol) for 1st and 3rd quarters, Find of the Month (Narcotics) in April and Find of the Quarter for 2nd quarter

**Ptl. Disalvo and K9 Nash:** USPCA Region 5 Catch of the Month (Patrol) in July

## COMMUNITY OUTREACH



**Shop with Cops** is held in early December. This is a cooperative effort with schools, local businesses and volunteers to provide Christmas presents for children in need. Families are invited to eat dinner and shop with a police officer. This builds positive interactions between children and police.

**Children's Hospital Visit** is held in the spring. Officers and a dispatcher dress up like Super Heroes and a Princess and visit sick children. During the visit, children have their picture taken and are given a goody bag to help make their hospital stay easier.

**National Night Out** is held annually the first Tuesday in August. National Night Out is a nationwide event where police departments join local businesses and the community in a night out against crime. 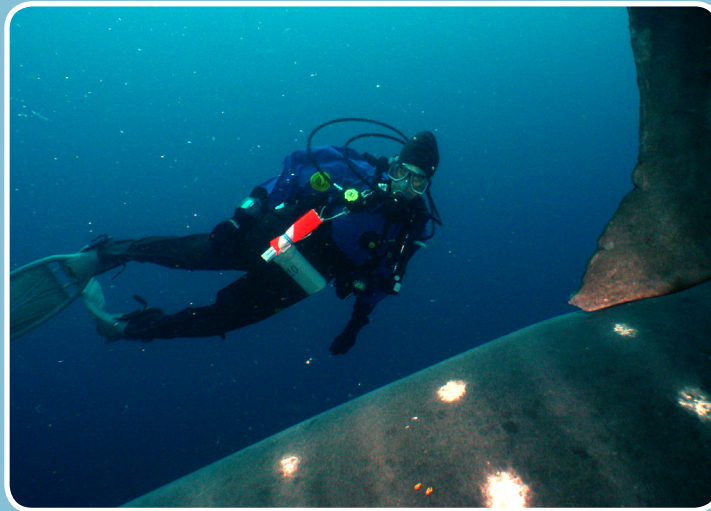

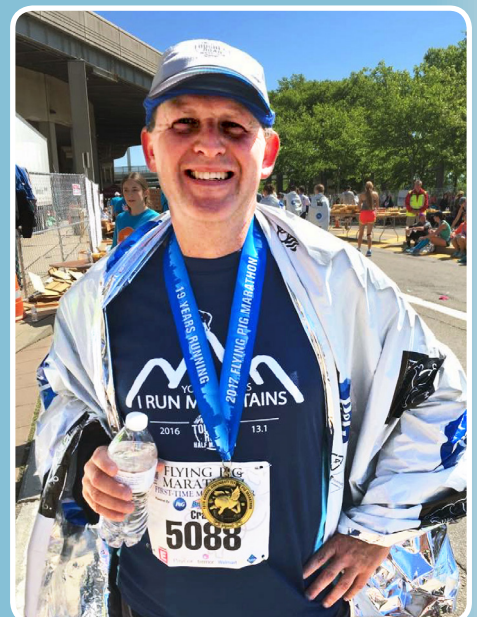
of internationally recognized scientists, Naval commanders, photographers and film makers.

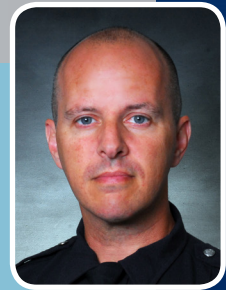


## CRAIG MOORE

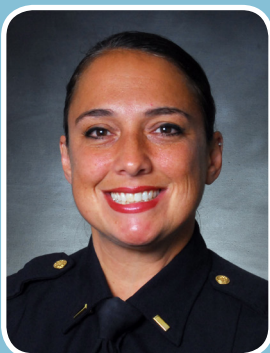
# OPERATIONS DIVISION

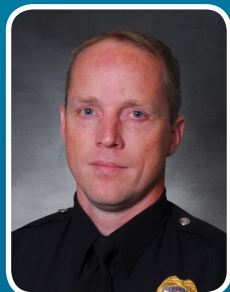

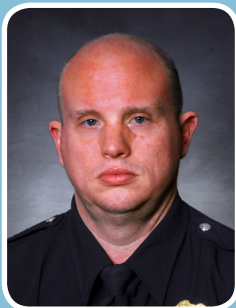

## DISPATCH CENTER

The Communications Center consists of 13 full-time dispatchers and one part-time dispatcher who are cross trained to dispatch for Police, Fire and EMS. Last year, they answered 18,263 emergency (911) calls and 80,252 non-emergency calls.

## COURT

The Kettering Police Department provides security for Kettering Municipal Court. The Uniformed Deputy Bailiffs and Court Security Officers are responsible for maintaining security within the court building.

## JAIL

The jail is a five-day facility that processes incoming arrests and provides housing and prisoner care until the initial court appearance. The jail is staffed by four full-time and two part-time jailers. The Kettering Jail operates in compliance with state and national standards at an exemplary professional level.

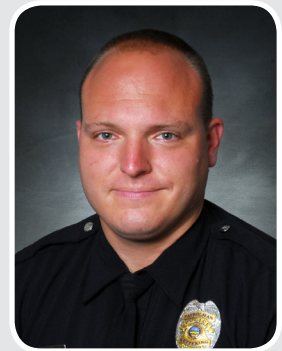

### Hiring Process

#### ENTRY LEVEL TEST

- Job posting
- Recruitment
- Civil Service Exam
- Panel/Oral board interviews
  - Top candidates based on the number of open positions, plus 9, as established by civil service commission.
- Background packets submitted and take pre-conditional polygraph
- Full backgrounds started
- Executive staff interviews
- Conditional offer
- Post-conditional polygraph
- Psychological evaluation
- Physical/Drug Screen (Physical Fitness Test for candidates attending academy)
- Final offer

#### LATERAL ENTRY OR CIVILIAN EMPLOYEE

- Job posting and recruitment
- Panel/Oral board interviews – determines ranking of candidates
  - Top candidates based on the number of open positions, plus 9, as established by civil service commission.
- After Panel/Oral Board interviews, the process is the same as an entry level.

## OFFICE OF THE CHIEF

### PROFESSIONAL STANDARDS

The function of Professional Standards is to ensure that the integrity of the Kettering Police Department is maintained through an internal system where objectivity, fairness, and justice are assured by intensive and impartial investigation and review. The Professional Standards Unit is currently overseen by Sgt. Jeff Perkins.

These investigations are to clear the innocent, establish guilt of wrongdoers, and facilitate fair, suitable, and consistent disciplinary action.

### ACCREDITATION

Professional Standards is also responsible for administration and supervision of Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies (CALEA) requirements. CALEA ensures that the Kettering Police Department is in compliance with over 484 standards. Jean Ruppert is the Accreditation Manager.

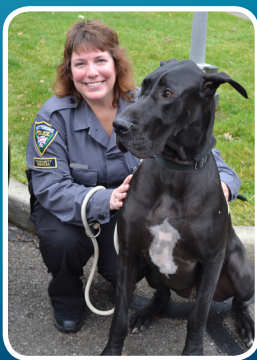

Duties of executive support staff include: preparing payroll and maintaining time and leave records; maintaining departmental personnel files; preparing vouchers, requisitions and purchase orders, as well as keeping records of supplies. The executive support staff also assists in budget and other financial record preparation; prepares official documents related to the operation of the Kettering Police Department; schedules travel and training; maintains calendars and makes appointments for supervisors.

## COMMUNITY RELATIONS

The Community Relations Section is led by Lt. M. Gabrielson. This section is pivotal to the community outreach programs of the Kettering Police Department. It maintains three School Resource Officers, in cooperation with the Kettering City School District, who act as liaisons with the Kettering City Schools. Additionally, one officer acts as the department's Public Information Officer and is responsible for interaction with and dissemination of information to local media outlets. Our Community Services Officer, a civilian position, addresses animal issues within Kettering.

## COMMUNITY SERVICE SPECIALIST



Shelly Davis, Community Service Specialist, is responsible for educating the citizens about the animal ordinances and laws and to find amicable solutions when issues arise.



## KETTERING SAFE SENIOR PROGRAM

Kettering Safe Senior Program (KSSP) provides first responders a safe and secure way to maintain information on citizens who are in need of emergency services due to certain medical conditions including: Alzheimer's, dementia, Down syndrome, autism or other conditions that are potentially disabling.



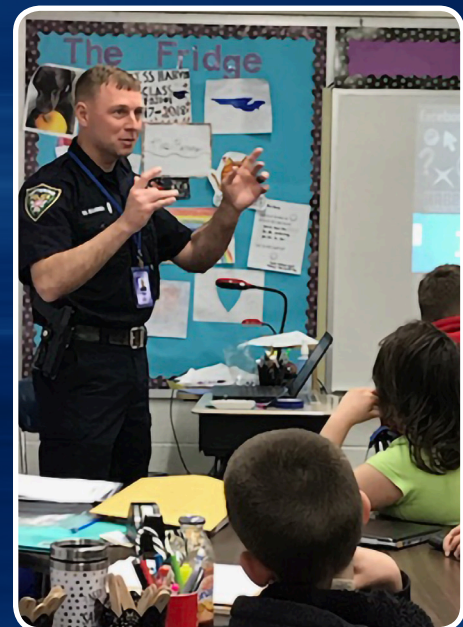

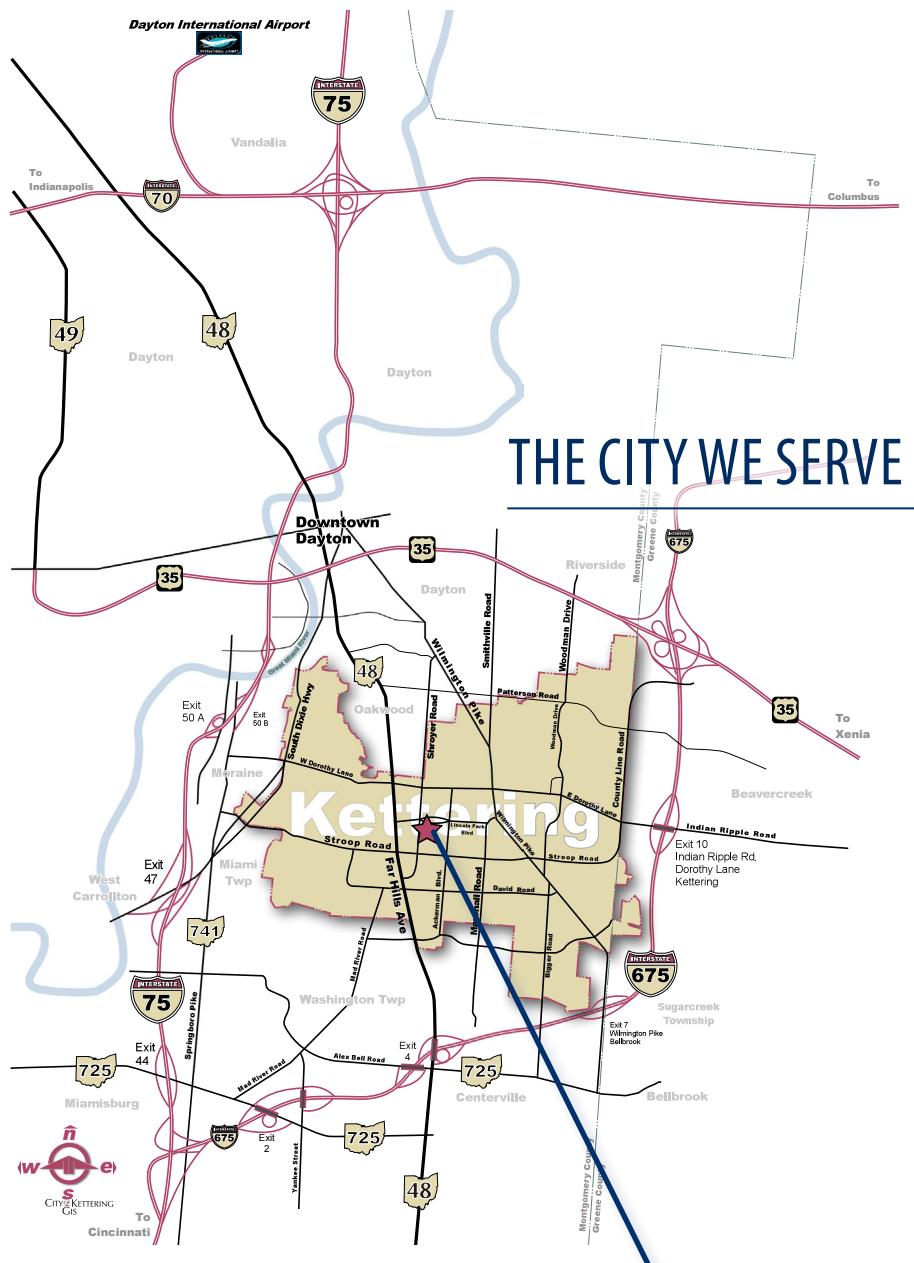
