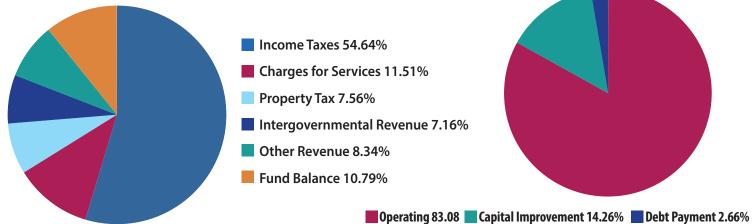

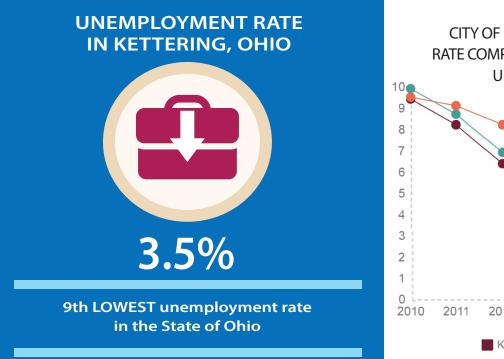

CITY OF KETTERING CITIES OF SERVICE INITIATIVE

Established by Mayor Donald E. Patterson in 2012, the City of Kettering's Cities of Service (COS) initiative is a joint effort by city departments coordinated by our Volunteer Office and Planning & Development Department. Each year the City chooses a neighborhood in Kettering to participate in the initiative. In 2017, the COS team welcomed a partnership with ArtLocal to incorporate a public art piece into the initiative. Support for this project is made possible by CitySites, the Community Foundation for Kettering and the Ohio Arts Council. The artwork will be dedicated in Oak Park in June. **Oak Park Timeline:**
