

Mayor's Greeting

Dear Friends and Neighbors:

We are a few months into the survey process for the 2020 Census, and I am overwhelmed with pride as I watch our response rates continue to rise. Kettering was founded on progress; and our strong participation is a shining example that our community remains invested and proud to call Kettering home.

Even with some monumental life distractions along the way,

we are responding to ensure we are counted.

More Than Just a Headcount — The true significance of the census is much more than just an accurate count of the number of people in our community. The results of the 2020 Census will determine:

- The number of seats given to Ohio in the House of Representatives.
- The boundaries of state and congressional legislative districts.
- The amount of money we will receive from state and federal sources over the next ten years for roads, bridges, hospitals, police and fire facilities, festivals, parks and other recreational facilities that add to the quality of life we have come to enjoy.

It is estimated that for every person not accounted for, the City of Kettering will lose between \$1,200 and \$2,500 per year in federal and state funding. Over the next decade that equates to a loss of \$12,000 – \$25,000 per person.

You should have received the survey by mail at your home between March 12 and 20. The questionnaire is short and should take just ten minutes of your time to complete. For the first time, the census can be completed online or by phone, in addition to the traditional response by mail. Census takers have begun visiting homes that have not completed their census forms; the best way to avoid a knock on the door is to complete the form.

Who is Counted? — Everyone living at your address should be counted, even if they are not related to you. Children need to be included, as well as babies born on or before April 1.

It's Confidential — The census is mandated by the U.S. Constitution and conducted by the US Census Bureau, a nonpartisan government agency. Census takers are sworn to confidentiality, and revealing your information is a federal crime!

Your effort will pay great dividends to our community over the next ten years by providing significant financial support and reducing your personal tax burden. I understand life has been more hectic than usual these past few months. Even so, your support has not wavered. I feel blessed and honored to be a part of this all-in community.

Gity of Kettering, Ohio – Government







One of the most unique and highly valued services the City of Kettering offers to our residents is free curbside collection of your leaves each fall. Leaves are picked up by City crews and taken to the City's leaf composting center where leaves will be converted

to mulch and compost, then offered free of charge to residents each spring. The City will begin in District 1 on Monday, October 19, and will continue leaf pick up until early December. Please note that all leaves should be raked to the curb by Monday, November 30, for the final fall collection.

Please remember the following tips for leaf pickup:

 Know your leaf collection district. Reference the above map to find your district or visit www.ketteringoh.org and enter your address in the My Services tab on our home page.

Don't wait until our crews are near your district to rake leaves.
 As leaves begin to fall, rake piles to the edge of your lawn. We

will make several passes through each district for collection.

• Call 937-296-3255 (FALL) or check the Kettering website to determine the current location of leaf pickup crews.

 Prior to collection, rake your leaves to the edge of your lawn, but not into the street where they will block traffic and cause a hazard to storm drains. Do not block storm drains or waterways.

- Do not bag your leaves.
- Make sure leaves are not under, between or around parked cars.

 Don't rake anything except leaves to the curb for pick up. Branches, sticks, grass and other yard waste clog the machinery and throw the crews off schedule. Leaf piles containing branches, grass, etc., will not be collected. You may take your tree branches and brush to the City's Yard Debris Drop-Off

Center located on Woodman Center Drive or put them in your Rumpke cart for pick up on your normal trash collection day.

Construction Updates

Wilmington Pike Improvements

The asphalt pavement on Wilmington Pike is being resurfaced from Stroop Road south to the corporation limit with Centerville. This work is scheduled for early September. In addition to resurfacing, the project includes construction of a sidewalk on the west side from David Road to Woodman Drive. Pedestrians and bicyclists will be pleased not having to traverse the worn dirt path, especially in poor weather. Kettering was awarded over \$900,000 in federal funds for this project.

Traffic Signal Replacements Phase 2

Kettering was awarded nearly \$1,200,000 in federal funds to reconstruct traffic signals at six intersections. The project will take up to a year and a half. Locations include:

- 1) East Dorothy Lane at Powhattan Place
- 2) East Dorothy Lane at Valleywood Drive
- 3) Woodman Drive at Adventure Drive
- 4) Woodman Drive at Aragon Avenue
- 5) Woodman Drive at Forrer Boulevard
- 6) Forrer Boulevard at Culver Avenue

Vectren Gas Main Replacements

Vectren planned five gas main replacement projects in Kettering this year. Because the work involves restoration of pavement and yards, Kettering requires Vectren's contractor to obtain permits for each location of work in the right-of-way.

Roadway Projects for 2021

Far Hills Avenue Resurfacing

For the past three years, preparatory work has been underway on Far Hills Avenue. This work includes Vectren gas main replacement, curb ramp reconstruction, and repair to drainage inlets. Project limits are from David Road to north of Dorothy Lane. The Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT) will administer the project to resurface the asphalt pavement in the first half of 2021. Kettering costs will be leveraged with up to 80% funding through ODOT.

Ridgeway Road Bridge Replacement

Design and right-of-way acquisition for the Ridgeway Road Bridge project is now complete. Kettering will request bids this fall from contractors for construction. Kettering received \$2,400,000 in federal and state grant funding and \$400,000 in state loan funding for this project. For more information, see: https://www.ketteringoh.org/ridgeway-bridge/

County Line Road Widening

Design and right-of-way acquisition are nearly complete for the County Line Road Widening project. Kettering, in coordination with Beavercreek, will request bids this coming winter for construction in 2021. The project was awarded nearly \$2,500,000 in federal funds. Yard Debris Management

Kettering is known for its beautiful landscapes and, with beautifully manicured properties comes yard waste. To protect the environment, please remember to keep grass clippings and other yard debris off of the public street and out of storm drains. Ultimately, debris washes into the storm sewer system, pollutes our streams, clogs our storm sewers, and can make travel on the roadway hazardous. Be a good neighbor and do your part.

Stormwater Pollution

- Yard debris (including grass clippings, leaves, plants, dirt) trash and pet waste are a significant source of stormwater pollution.
- Excess nutrients in streams or ponds can cause algae blooms.

When algae die, they sink and decompose in a process that removes oxygen from the water. Fish and other aquatic life can't exist in water with low dissolved oxygen levels. "Red Tide" is a common name for these algae blooms that kill local fisheries and make water smell foul.

 Debris that ends up in the storm sewers can cause flooded streets and impact creeks and ponds downstream.

Stormwater Pollution Solutions

- COMPOST: Grass clippings, thatch, sod, dirt and other yard waste can be used in your own compost pile, keeping excess nutrients in your yard or garden.
- PLACE DEBRIS WITH YOUR TRASH: Yard waste (including grass clippings, leaves and other organic plant materials) may be placed in your trash cart and can be comingled with your trash.

• YARD DEBRIS CENTER: Brush, limbs, and trimmings less than 6' in length and 4" diameter can be taken to the Kettering Yard Debris Center on 1840 Woodman Center Drive.

 RAIN BARRELS: Rain barrels collect rain and reduce the amount of stormwater to the system and redirect it to improve the health of your garden, lawn, and trees at a later time.

Medicare Open Enrollment — Kettering Connection is Here to Help

Medicare is a very complex program that offers people who are 65 years of age or older and disabled persons medical insurance at retirement or when they can no longer work due to their disability. Like all federal programs, there are many rules and regulations governing the system making it not so user friendly. Having a professional who understands the system can help you get the most out of your Medicare.

Individuals approaching 65 should start considering Medicare. The enrollment period begins three months prior to applicant's birth month, continues during individual's birth month and ends three months after the year applicant turns

65. Those who do not enroll during the aforementioned months relative to their 65 birthday may pay penalties unless there is coverage from other sources such as applicant's or spouse's employer.

Each year, Medicare coverage plans and offerings change; and, it is important to review plan choices annually to evaluate the impact of the changes and determine whether or not updates need to be made for optimal benefits.

The annual open enrollment period is October 15 through December 7. During this time, beneficiaries can change their Medicare for the coming year to keep up with those changes. Health care needs change from year to year, so what works best this year

may not meet the needs for the future. With hundreds of choices, it is even more important to seek help from someone who knows those changes.

Medicare-trained professionals will provide individual consultations by appointment at the Kettering Connection in Town and Country Shopping Center during the open enrollment period. Appointments are free and open

to Kettering residents, City volunteers and Charles I. Lathrem Senior Center members on a first come, first serve basis.

Kettering Connection staff will follow all CDC precautions to prevent the spread of COVID-19 and video or phone counseling sessions are also available as well. To schedule an appointment with a Medicare-trained professional, contact the Senior Service Coordinator by phone at 937-296-3330 or by email at vickie.carraher@ketteringoh.org.

Fire Prevention Week October 4 - 10



Cooking is the leading cause of home fires and home fire injuries. The most common cause of fires in the kitchen is unattended cooking. "Serve up Fire Safety in the Kitchen" has been chosen as the theme for the 2020 Fire Prevention Week. Follow the Kettering Fire Department on Facebook for more fire and injury prevention tips. Here are a few steps you can take to prevent fire and injury while you are cooking.

- Stay in the kitchen when you are frying, boiling, grilling, or broiling food.
- If you are simmering, baking, or roasting food, check it regularly and stay in the home.
- Always keep a lid nearby when cooking. If a small grease fire starts, slide the lid over the pan and turn off the burner. Leave the pan covered until it has cooled.
- Keep anything that can catch fire away from your stovetop.



- Loose clothing can hang down onto stove burners and catch fire. Wear short, close-fitting, or tightly rolled sleeves when cooking.
- Have a "kid-free zone" of at least 3 feet (1 meter) around the stove and areas where hot food or drink is prepared or carried.

Recreational Fire

Fall is a popular time for recreational fires as the temperature begins to cool. Here is a list of rules that the State of Ohio has set for recreational fires or open burning.

 The only authorized fuel source is clean dry wood. (No yard waste or rubbish material) If the fire is confined to an approved container such as an outdoor fireplace, barbecue pit, etc. the fire must be at least 15 feet from a structure or combustible materials.

- For an open fire not contained, the fire must be at least 25 feet from a structure, wood fence, neighboring structure, or combustible materials. Conditions that could cause a fire to spread within 25 feet of the fire must be eliminated before ignition of a fire.
- An outdoor fire, where the fuel being burned is not contained in an outdoor fireplace, must have a fuel area of fewer than 3 feet in diameter and fewer than 2 feet in height.
- The fire must be constantly attended while burning and must be extinguished if it is not attended.
- A portable fire extinguisher with a minimum of a 4A



rating, garden hose, bucket of sand, or other suitable means for extinguishing the fire must be provided.

- The fire must not create an offensive or objectionable condition that interferes with the neighboring residents' use and enjoyment of their property. If this occurs, the Fire Department is required to order the person responsible for the fire to extinguish the fire.
- The Fire Department is required to extinguish fires which create hazardous conditions.

Often complaints are received from neighbors when a recreational fire is not conducted following these rules, or when a recreational fire produces smoke that migrates off of the property and into the residence of neighboring properties. Persons with chronic breathing problems can often be affected by these conditions.



Frequently Asked Questions

Why did Kettering choose Rumpke?

Rumpke provided the lowest and best cost proposal of the four vendors that submitted proposals through a competitive proposal process.

How do I sign up?

Rumpke became your new service provider beginning July 1.

There is no need to sign up unless you recently moved to Kettering and need to start new service.

Does Rumpke have qualified senior service?

Yes. Eligibility requirements include:

- Residents whose age is 65 years or older.
- Annual household income is less than \$35,000 AGI.
- The curbside rate is \$7.63 per month and house side is \$16.50 per month.
- Refuse and recycling carts are 65 gallons under this program. In lieu of 65 gallon carts, Rumpke will substitute 35 gallon carts, at no extra charge, upon request.

Is my service day staying the same?

Your service day will remain the same; however, pickup times may change.

Please place your carts by the curb or in their appropriate place for pickup the night before your service day.

May I change my cart size?

If you would like a different size cart, please contact Rumpke at **1-800-828-8171**.

Why do I need overage bags?

All refuse and recycling must be contained in your Rumpke container. When your cart is full, you may use Rumpke-specific bags or rent additional carts.

What are the sizes of Rumpke carts?

Rumpke provides 95 gallon, 65 gallon and 35 gallon carts for both trash and recycling.

Can I still dispose of bulk items?

Yes. Rumpke will collect up to 3 bulk items each week. You are not required to contact Rumpke to schedule the pickup.

Will Rumpke pick up yard debris?

Yes. Yard debris may be commingled with refuse in the cart for all service levels.

How do I get additional carts?

Call **1-800-828-8171** to request additional carts for \$4 per month.

Does Rumpke provide service in alleys?

Yes. If you are currently receiving alley service, this will continue.

When is this happening?

Rumpke became your new service provider beginning July 1.

What is the price?

Regular Curbside service: \$15.25/month Regular House side service: \$33/month Qualified Senior Curbside service is: \$7.63/ month

Qualified Senior House side service: \$16.50/month

What if I need senior service/house side service?

Rumpke will provide the same service that you had with WM. To have your service adjusted or updated, call 1-800-828-8171.

What are Rumpke holidays?

If the holiday falls on a weekday before your regular service day, collection will be delayed one day.

Kettering Welcomes Life Connection of Ohio to Miami Valley Research Park

Life Connection of Ohio plans to relocate its regional office in Kettering. Life Connection of Ohio will breathe new life into nearly nine acres with innovative and profound service offerings.

Life Connection of Ohio is a non-profit organization that has promoted and facilitated organ donation in northwest and west central Ohio for 30 years. Last year, Life Connection of Ohio (LCO) coordinated the recovery of organs from 93 donors, providing 310 lifesaving transplants.

The move from their Wyoming Avenue office in Dayton will more than triple LCO's square footage, allowing for a larger workforce expected to nearly double from 58 to nearly 100 in 5 years. The Miami Valley Research Park location also allows LCO to work in close proximity with a broader group of businesses in the industry.

According to Matthew Wadsworth, CEO, projections over the next three to five years show that rate of expansion would increase the organization's \$5 million annual payroll to about \$9 million.

Community Tissue Services (CTS) broke ground on their 130,000 square foot expansion at Research Park in 2019 and hopes to move into the new building by the end of this year. CTS and LCO work toward similar missions, and their close proximity will only strengthen service provision for both companies.

According to Gregg Gorsuch, Economic Development Manager for the City of Kettering, Life Connection works closely with Community Tissue Services located on College Drive adjacent to this site in Research Park. "We think it will benefit both Community Tissue Services and Life Connection of Ohio, as well," he added.

While Life Connection of Ohio (LCO) has a regional site in Maumee, Ohio, the

Kettering location would be the primary office, according to Wadsworth.

LCO is purchasing approximately nine acres on the northeast corner of Woodman Drive and Research Boulevard. The land is part of the undeveloped acreage Kettering purchased in late 2017.

LCO's new location in Kettering is expected to be nearly 30,000 square feet among two stories. The site is also being planned to provide sufficient parking for administration, nurses, therapists, social workers and community services located there.

Wadsworth added, "We're here to serve the community and we really wanted space for our mission that would allow people to come in and gather and for us to provide education on donation and transplantation and also be able to serve other organizations that wanted somewhere to go off site."

"We're excited about going over to Kettering and being a part of Research Park — what that's going to offer for our employees...as far as a recruitment tool — so we can have the absolute best employees working for the organization...so we can save more lives."

According to Wadsworth, Life Connection of Ohio looks to break ground by the end of the year. In partnership with Shook Construction and MODA4 Design, LCO hopes to take occupancy by the end of 2021.

Congratulations to the Kettering Leadership Academy's Class of 2020! Class members began with an overnight retreat at Camp Joy last September. Their journey through the Academy consisted of outdoor learning experiences, classroom activities, leadership development and teambuilding exercises. Class members met once a month to learn about local government, education, health care and public safety. Although classes were cut short due to COVID-19, the Class of 2020 truly exemplified the leadership qualities necessary to strengthen and improve positive efforts in our community!

The Kettering Leadership Academy was created in 2003, by Council member Bruce Duke. It is administered through the City's Volunteer Office. The principal goal of the Academy is to build a resource of community leaders on a continuing basis. Now in its 18th year, over 75 percent of Academy graduates serve our community in some capacity.

Environmental Education Supervisor Kerri Miles has made necessary adjustments to the programs offered at Habitat Environmental Center to ensure safety for all. As with all our program offerings during this reopening time, Kerri reduced class sizes and enforces social-distancing rules. An example of a program she's had to tweak is *Archery Basics* for kids. She said, "The kids have been so great about following the new rules. They wear masks all the time



and think nothing of it and have a ton of fun."

The Rosewood Arts Centre staff kept busy from home this spring by creating a robust

collection of *Art From Home* projects, including a homemade kite, a zoetrope and many more. They also presented a virtual

Art on the Commons event, which took place in August. Rosewood Gallery went virtual as well, with a grand total of four exhibitions currently housed online.
